Included in our comprehensive range of treatments and wellness programs is South Central Sports Medicine and Performance+. The sports medicine and performance enhancement program provides full spectrum care to all types of athletes. The program involves a conglomeration of physicians, physical therapists, athletic trainers, exercise physiologists and athletes who seek to provide the best care possible for athletes in our area.

South Central Sports Medicine and Performance+ is led by orthopaedic surgeon and sports medicine specialist Dr. Derrick Burgess, MD. Dr. Burgess attended Howard University in Washington, D.C., for medical school training and orthopaedic surgery residency. He concluded his training at Cincinnati Sports Medicine and Orthopaedic Center in Ohio, where he served as an assistant team physician for the Cincinnati Bengals.

Dr. Burgess explained the importance of the South Central Sports Medicine program: "At South Central Sports Medicine we provide total care for the athlete. We provide services for injury prevention, surgical care and rehabilitation for return to play. We know the importance of sports to an athlete, so we are here to help through each stage."

PREVENTION OF AN INJURY

South Central Sports Performance+ is an athletic enhancement program offered to kids starting at age 12 and up. This program offers training in all types of sports – football, soccer, tennis, golf, swimming and more – to help athletes maximize their potential on the field. By participating in this program, athletes are able to improve their skills, learn techniques for preventing injury and ultimately reach their optimal athletic performance.

Derek "Spike" Richards, program coordinator, outlined the

program. "By participating in our Sports Performance+ program, athletes are able to maximize their potential on the field. It is 360 degrees of care for athletes. We train each participant in mobility, strength, speed and agility. Each sport has its own specific need, so every athlete has a workout tailored to their skill level."

WHEN AN INJURY OCCURS

Not only does the South Central Sports Medicine team provide care at their facility, but they also provide coverage for local athletic games and events. Joel Pierce, DPT, explains: "With the extensive coverage we provide to area sports, I am on the field when the athlete gets injured. From there, I can follow them from time of injury to recovery. Our goal is to return the athlete to a competitive level as quickly as possible."

South Central Sports Medicine offers a free Saturday Morning Injury Clinic to all area athletes who may have suffered an injury on Friday night and still faces issues on Saturday morning. The injury clinic is offered at the Wellness and Rehabilitation Center in Laurel at 23 Mason Street. "If a significant injury is found, we refer the patient to South Central Orthopaedics to meet with our physicians to determine the next course of treatment," said Pierce. "It is important that the athlete and the parents know we are here through every step of the recovery process."

PUSHING THROUGH TO RECOVERY





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HANDBAGS and HIGH HEELS

If it isn't glaringly obvious from the title of this column, my favorite accessories are shoes. I've tried to be more practical in my shoe purchases lately, but let's be honest – sometimes, you just need to buy a pretty pair of shoes that will inevitably hurt your feet after an hour of wear.

I have three main requirements for my shoes – pretty, comfortable, and inexpensive. I usually get two out of three. Pretty and inexpensive? They will kill your feet. Comfortable and inexpensive? They are probably not

very cute shoes. Pretty and comfortable? That will be \$500, please.

That description is perfect

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for the shoes I am wearing today. They are Steve Madden pointed toe pumps with a 4" heel. I usually stay away from pointed toe shoes, but I had to have these. The shoe is black patent leather at the toe and fades to leopard print. They are beautiful. They were on sale. And they kill my feet. But I refuse to let that stop me from wearing them.

Instead, I did some research on how to deal with painful shoes. I found an entire list of shoe hacks that supposedly make it easier

HACK #2: Use lip balm to prevent blisters. Apply lip balm to any area of your foot that is prone to blisters. I'm on the fence about this one. I tried it, and it did work to an extent, but it also made my shoes slip on my foot. That's probably more of a testament to my extremely narrow feet than the actual hack, though. If you do this, you will have to reapply several times a day, so make sure to keep your lip balm handy. And don't mix it up with your regular lip balm, or you'll be spreading foot sweat on your lips. That's not good for anybody.

If you're wary of using lip balm, you can order Pre Heels from Amazon for only \$15. It's a special spray that dries to create a barrier around your foot to prevent blisters for up to six hours. The spray is flexible once it dries, so it won't make your feet feel stiff.

HACK #3: Stretch out shoes that pinch with ice. You fill two small Ziploc bags about a quarter of the way with water. Put one bag in the toe of each shoe, and place the shoes in the freezer until the water turns to ice. This supposedly stretches the shoe to make it more comfortable. Honestly, this didn't work for me. Last year, I found a gorgeous pair of Gianni Bini nude faux-crocodile patent leather heels. There were a half size too small for me, but they were 75% off. I had them professionally stretched at Dillard's - a service they provide for free, by the way – but the shoes still pinched my feet, so I tried the water/baggie hack. I couldn't tell a difference.

I think I would be better off going back to Dillard's and asking them to stretch the shoes again.

HACK #4: Use bread to get stains off of suede. Weird, but true. Just be sure to do it over the trash can, because the bread crumbles and

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Student physical examination tips

School time requires having all of the necessary supplies, clothing and gear ready for the year. In addition, preparing for a new school year often involves providing updated physical health information to the school administration.

The requirements for health screenings and reporting may vary between school districts. Some physical examinations need to be conducted annually, while others may only need updating at certain intervals, such as when kids transition from elementary school to middle school or middle school to high school. Updated physical forms also may be required at the start of a sports season.

Health screenings are intended to detect problems that may interfere with learning. Physical exams may indicate issues that can hamper progress or shed light on undiagnosed problems that may

require further assessment and necessitate customized learning plans to help students succeed. Physical exams are also a way to ensure students' immunizations are up to date.

According to the Pennsylvania Department of Health, physical exams typically are completed by students' primary care providers. Some school districts offer free or low-cost health assessments through school providers as well.

Work with physicians who have access to electronic health records. EHRs are secure technology that provides easy access to vaccination records, health history, appointment reminders, and even prescription information. Some providers even make it possible for patients to directly access their health information through a secure login, helping save time.

□ Make appointments during school hours. After-school appointments are peak times for pediatric offices and medical clinics. Sign students out of school early to visit the doctor for medical exams. The staff likely will be less harried, and you can spend more time



The Story Teller: A town started as saw mills; birth of avenues in Laurel

Children can and do ask many questions, and I know I asked my share back when. I remember my daddy giving me a 45 record called "Why Daddy?" It was about a child who asked questions about everything. He told me that I was a virtual question box. But when I look back on those days, I realize that I really didn't ask nearly enough! Gosh, how I wish I could sit across the kitchen table from him now and get some answers.

He moved our family to Laurel when I was four, and I know he would know so much of what I now want to know about Laurel. She has been an awesome hometown with such a rich history, about which I want to know more. Daddy always said that a smart person isn't the one who knows everything but rather is the one who knows how to find out what he needs to know. So, now I'm digging!

I've decided that the best place for me to start my research concerning Laurel is right where I started – here. I remember being told that he bought our house from the Burton family, the family that owned the jewelry store. But I wanted to know when and why they built it where they did. I have discovered that it was built in 1910 in the area designated for Laurel's merchants and business owners to buy and build upon.

Were you aware that at one time what we now call Laurel was nothing more than 'village' camps around two saw mills, the Kamper and the Kingston mills? These were owned and operated by two men who had partnered to provide cross ties for the railroads being built through our area along about the closing of the War of Northern Aggression. Kamper and Louin did fairly well until the rails were established and there was no longer a big demand for their cross ties. These two men had a 'falling out', and their partnership split, with Kamper keeping the mill close to today's depot and Louin keeping the mill on the site of today's Crumbly Paper company. Both men still owned vast acres of timber land in the area.

In 1891 Kamper's mill and accompanying timber land were bought by George Gardiner, Silas Gardiner and Lauren Eastman, and the Eastman, Gardiner & Company was born.

Then, in 1907, Gilchrist-Fordney bought the remaining Kingston mill and acreage from Louin and formed the Gilchrist-Fordney Lumber Company. Today's Laurel sits on land from

both of these purchases and on much of what was then the Lindsey farm, which was then north of the

original area. The first "business district" and residential area of our town was built just east of the tracks on Maple, Pine and surrounding streets. It was later that



Laurel would be moved to the west side of the tracks, and businesses and homes would be built there.

Originally streets were given names. Later a grid was drawn numbering streets and avenues, and in the residential areas north of "downtown" land was first offered for sale. From what I've discovered, lots on the south end of First and Second Avenues were sold to members of upper management in the mills. Lots on Third and Fourth Avenues were sold to business men and merchants. The mill owners, their families and close associates built on Fifth and Sixth Avenues. Mr. Burton was a jeweler and built his home on the hill above Gardiner Park.

Having lived, played and biked all over these neighborhoods, I often wondered why Kingston Street was right there between 10th and 11th Streets. I walked that pavement to and from Jones Junior High four times a day for three years, but I never asked why it was named such. Perhaps if I had asked, Daddy might have told me that Laurel had her start only three blocks from my back yard. (I grew up almost right in the middle of the distance between the locations of the two original mills.)

Oh, it is a history buff I am, for sure! And I dearly love discovering these facts about our home. There's so much more I want and need to know, and I'll keep on digging! Can my doing so stir up your curiosity too? There was somebody who chose your lot and built your house as well.

Wouldn't you like to know more about who, when and why? May I challenge you to find out more? And I'd love to know what you find!

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Smith County's Shemar Page selected to NJCAA national baseball team

Pearl River Community College Wildcats pitcher Shemar Page recently received a huge honor when he was selected to play on the NJ-CAA National Baseball team. Page was one of only 13 pitchers in the country who were selected to be a part of the 26 man roster. The National team will meet at Tyler Junior College July 25-26 and will begin training for a week before leaving for Wichita, Kansas, for the 84th annual National Baseball Congress (NBC) World Series, which will be played Aug. 1-11 at Lawrence-Dunmont Stadium.

"Being chosen for this is the biggest honor in my opinion. It's mind blowing," the former Raleigh High star said. "It's tremendous."

The freshman right-hander was a big part of Pearl River Community College's 2018 MACJC State Championship team, posting a 10-2 record and 2.73 ERA with 77 strikeouts against 44 hits and 19 walks in 59 1/3 innings on the mound.

He also hit .307 as a designated hitter for PRCC and was named both MACJC All-State and NJCAA All-Region 23.

"Honestly going into my freshman season I didn't even expect to get any of the honors that I got." Page said.

Page was quick to credit his PRCC coaches for his '18 success.

"I don't throw the hardest so working with Coach (Anthony) Izzio, I got a little bit more consistent than I was in high school," he said. "I try to get ahead and stay in the strike zone and once I do that I put myself ahead of the batter and get myself in a good position to get an out."

It's safe to say that Page's high praise for his coaches is being reciprocated.

Former Laurel standout Keon Howard leaving USM

Quarterback Keon Howard announced via Twitter recently that he is leaving Southern Miss. Howard, a former Laurel standout, was preparing to enter his junior season in Hattiesburg.

Howard started in nine games for the Golden Eagles the last two seasons. Seven of them came during his sophomore campaign in 2017 as Howard passed for 1199 yards and eight touchdowns. Howard, considered a 3-star prospect by 247 Sports, signed with Southern Miss in February of 2016, picking the Golden Eagles over Memphis, Louisville and Mississippi State.

Prior to signing day, Howard was a four-year

starter at Laurel, where he passed for over 11,000 career yards and accounted for 149 total touchdowns, according to MaxPreps. He also led the program to a state championship win over Oxford in 2014.

At this point in time, it's unclear where Howard's next stop will be. His departure leaves Southern Miss with eight quarterbacks on the roster heading into the 2018 season. It also likely makes the quarterback competition a little simpler as frontrunners Kwadra Griggs and Jack Abraham are expected to battle it out to see who starts against Jackson State on Sept. 1.

"Shemar is an incredible young man that is a really good baseball player," PRCC head coach Michael Avalon said. "His hard work and dedication has paid off as evident by this honor of being selected to the NJCAA National Baseball Team.


"He will be a tremendous representative of his faith, family and our program. We wish him the best of luck.'

The camp will be limited to the first 100 applicants. Cost is \$155 and includes insurance, instruction and a camp T-shirt.

Father/Son Camp

This camp, open to children kindergarten through 8th grade, will provide an outstanding bonding opportunity for the parent and child while also learning the game of baseball and developing an understanding of key fundamentals in maximizing their child's full potential. Teaching areas will include pitching, hitting, catching, infield and outfield play. The goal of this one-day camp is to provide answers and training solutions to the questions that are most often asked by today's fathers and youth league players. The camps takes place **Aug. 25** from 1-5 p.m., with check-in at 12:15 p.m. The cost of the camp is \$100 for both child and parent and an additional \$25 for each additional child. The fee includes a free t-shirt for all campers.
