# UNA/Jax St. is **Back on Field**

FLORENCE -- The University of North Alabama has signed a fouryear contract to renew its oldest football rivalry with

Jacksonville State University beginning in 2019.

The initial game of the contract will be at Jacksonville State's Burgess-Snow Field on Sept. 21, 2019. The Gamecocks will then travel to Florence to take on the Lions at Braly Stadium on September 12, 2020. The two schools will meet against in Jacksonville in 2021 and in Florence in

The 2020 contest will be JSU's first game in Florence since winning the 1992 Division II National Championship at Braly Stadium.

Although UNA and Jacksonville State have only met on the football field three times since 1991, the series is the oldest in Lions' football history. It dates back to the first game in UNA's modern football history on September 29, 1949.

The Lions travelled to Jacksonville for their initial game in 1949 after more than 20 years without a football program. Jacksonville State won the game 12-7. UNA got its first win in the series the following year in Florence,

The 2019 meeting will be the first between the two schools as Football Championship Subdivision (FCS) opponents, with UNA's move to the FCS beginning this fall.

JSU won the last meeting between the two schools 31-12 to open the 2016 season. UNA went on to finish that season 11-1 and advanced to the NCAA Division II National Championship

UNA's last win in the series came on September 13, 2003 with **Mark Hudspeth** as head coach. The Lions won that game 28-16 in Jacksonville and went on to a 13-1 season that ended with a loss in the semifinals of the Division II playoffs. JSU went on to win the Ohio Valley Conference Championship.

The Gamecocks lead the all-time series 25-18-3.





How long do I have to file my

If it's a personal injury case and it happened in Alabama, you have two years from the date of the accident or incident that caused your injury. If it's a worker's compensation injury, you have two years from the date of the accident or injury as long as your employer had notice.



How do I report an on the job injury?

If you were hurt on the job (actual notice) and you tell your employer in detail you were hurt and how you were while on the job it must be within five days of the injury. If you don't know and you don't tell them, then the last chance for a legal recovery is to put it in writing within 90 days from the date of the injury.



Do you charge for consultations?

We never charge for a consultation. We will tell you if your case is one that we will take. If your case is one that we are not comfortable taking, we will tell you why. If we do take your case, we will never ask you for a dime until you win.



How much do you charge if you take my case?

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
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
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# Who is on The Lord's Side?

Even though when one is rescued or adopted you actually save two because you free up room for another one, the revolving door continues because the problem is not stopped at the source. When you understand that one unaltered femåle cat and her offspring can produce 420,000 cats in seven years

and that one unaltered female dog and her offspring can produce 67,000 dogs in six years, it's easy to see where the problem and the solution lay.

Until laws are enacted that make it mandatory for people to have their animals fixed and those people actually suffer consequences for not doing that, there is no reason for them to think that it is necessary. The health benefits for the animals that are fixed is another reason that it is a good practice.

more websites have taken advantage of a relatively new technology that asks visitors if the website can "send notifications." I have avoided answering "Yes" to any of

them so far because I find them annoying. Websites are much like my in-laws: I don't' want to hear from them unless I need something.

So what are these dumb things and what can you do about them? The notifications allow a website to send you a pop-up message informing you about new content on the website. This might be very handy for some websites. For instance, your credit card company can send

you a pop-up notification that your card was just charged. ESPN's website might send you a notification when your ťeam makes a big play. These notification appear as small blocks of text in the lower left corner of your computer even when you are not surfing the web. I receive all the notifications I need to receive on my smartphone so have no need to replicate them on my computer and those notification requests distract me. If you agree, then I have a solution for

All major browsers -- Edge,

Chrome, Firefox, and Safari for the Macintosh -- have a setting you can toggle to prevent the annoytification. Unfortunately, telling you how to do this in this little column would be a bit tedious so you'll have to do your own search for "block website notifications in (Chrome, Firefox, whatever)" and all will be revealed.

Another related annovance most of us have been seeing is "Cookie consent notifications." A cookie is a small text file containing a small amount of data that is stored in a user's web browser. These cookies

identify your computer to the website as a "returning visitor" and stores preferences, how often you visit, and other handy information. If a website you've previously visited greets you by name, it's because you've logged into that website before and it gave you a cookie. Cookies are mostly harmless but there are exceptions. Some types of cookies can track your computer's journey across the internet. No personal information is gathered (usually), but it is still considered by some to be an intrusion of your privacy. For that reason, the European Union passed a law a few years ago that required website owners to display a notification of how their website uses cookies. The law only applies to the EU but since the web is "worldwide" we all see the notifications.

Some of these warnings

cover half the webpage making them super-annoying. Those annoyances can also be disabled by installing a browser "add-on" or "extension" that will prevent those notifications from appearing. Again, this is too long to explain in this column but if you're familiar with how to install add-ons, search in your browser's add-on/ extension library for "cookie consent" and all will be revealed.

our crab apple tree was a place of refuge for me. Because, as I have told you before, our nights were filled with drunkenness raging which lead to loud cussing, fussing and fighting – verbally, physically. So when I was very young – preschool to elementary age – during the day and in the afternoons, I would climb high up into the blooms and fruit of that tree. It would be quiet and safe. I would stay up there above my world, even with the blue sky, for long bouts enjoying God's handiwork and the silence.

The other place of silence

that I sought when I was young was the swimming pool. My mother was the Executive Secretary of our local YMCA in my hometown, and the pool was my babysitter. Except for, the Y did not have a pool. Every morning I would ride that old rickety white Y bus out into the county to The Fruitland Baptist Bible Institute where the Y taught its swimming lessons. The Executive Director's daughter and I played all day long, every summer day for years in Fruitland's pool. My favorite thing to do there, besides for dive, was to sit cross-legged on the bottom of the pool and listen to the silence. No fussing, cussing or fighting. The water drown out all of the harangue and hardships of

my nights.
"Hello darkness, my old friend...I've come to talk to you again...People talking without speaking. People hearing without listening. People writing songs that voices never share...And

**7**hen I was little, no one dare...Disturb [my] sound of silence."

I have always had the habit of using songs not for their intended use. But these were the only words that I knew of that Paul Simon song. As I sang my revamped version of it underwater to myself, when I was twelve, I simply wanted a world where everyone got along - a world of peacefulness where people listened to each other – and could be gentle and quiet. I still want this.

When I became a teenager and got my driver's license, when things would get hard, I would get in Herbie (the light seafoam green Volkswagen Beetle that everyone got when they turned 16), and I would drive to quiet, beautiful places, such as the shoals at Camp Kanuga or to the Davison River in Pisgah National Forest. And I would let the sound of suggestions to CatnKids1@ the rushing water cover gmail.com

my tears. In these quiet, beautiful places, I would recapture my soul. I would lift my eyes in those hills and I would find my strength. I would regain my power by seeing that there were good things on earth – trees, water, air; my heart was beating; my brain was sharp; I had food, clothes and shelter, and I was blessed. I had been given this day another day – so I should live within it. I would then be able to restart, because I took the time to be still and see the grace of God. I would find my voice, and I would go back home ready to encourage once again.

I recently retreated back to a pool to let the water lapping in my ears drown out the hardship of the day - to find silence and peace and strength. And I almost couldn't do it. The craziness of this world is so strong, but more so than that, I had not taken the time to be truly still in so long that I could hardly find me or Him. "[He] echoes in the wells of silence," (my emphasis). But He is still here,

providing for me – air, crab apples, life and strength. I just have to get silent, see His care, and trust Him.

either the western (Gaza Strip / Hamas) area or the northern border near the Lebanon border (Hezbollah). Funds are being raised in the amount of \$17,000 for a bell-shaped bomb shelter which can hold 15-20 people, protecting them from shrapnel and percussion blasts. The shelter will be manufactured in Israel using pre-cast steel-reinforced concrete also known as B-50 trauma cement.

Jim Bevis, President of CSR Ministries, and his wife, Anne, spent almost two months in Israel during 2015. There they met Orthodox Rabbi Shmuel Bowman who heads Operation LifeShield which has deployed over 300 bomb shelters since 2006. Operation LifeShield is a humanitarian, non-profit organization providing lifesaving protectives to all Israelis – both Jews and Arabs.

The bell-shaped concrete bomb shelters are placed above ground in the areas most needed, such as school playgrounds, parks, bus stops, senior citizen centers, and along busy streets where people are walking. They are also movable.

"This is an emergency campaign to save innocent lives by providing Israel's threatened communities with desperately-needed air raid shelters," said Bevis. "While donations of any amount are much appreciated, we are specifically hoping to find 170 people willing to contribute \$100 each which would make the project possible."

Upon learning about the 170 donors needed to meet the objective, a youth group from Union Hill Church in Anderson, Alabama agreed to raise \$100 toward the goal. The youth group planned to follow CSR's lead by similarly breaking their \$100 target into smaller amounts.

"Our initial plan was to see if ten kids could raise \$10 each by doing odd jobs for people in the congregation," said Union Hill youth minister, Angela Bailey. "But we were blessed by one couple who hired the whole group for the total amount to help with cleanup along their creek property."

To give the youth group a sense of what children in Israel face and to help them stay focused on why they were working to raise the funds, Bailey gave the kids an additional challenge. While the kids were scattered at various parts of the property helping clean, she would sporadically blow a whistle, giving the kids 15 seconds to drop what they were doing and rush to a designated safe spot. Some of the group would inevitably be outside the safe zone after 15 seconds had elapsed, demonstrating proximity to bomb shelters is such a critical factor.

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# **Medicare Minute** "4 Parts of Medicare"

Did you know there were four parts to Medicare not two? This is an excellent website that will tell you everything you want to know about Medicare. You can also refer to the "Medicare and You" handbook. 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
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

parliament in April of 2009. "So let me say this as clearly as I can: The United States is not, and will never be, at war with Islam." (That statement is not assured forever).

"Every challenge that we face is more easily met if we tend to our own democratic foundation. This work is never over. That's why, in the United States, we recently ordered the prison at Guantanamo Bay closed." (Nine years later it is still not closed.)

Some may think that Trump's comments lessen our credibility on the world stage. The point can be argued with some validity.

However, President Obama felt the need to propitiate for past American actions and attitudes, which he claimed helped create divisions between countries.

Whether or not we want to qualify his comments as seditious or apologies, Obama repeatedly sided sympathized with oppressors against the United States... as if he were officially speaking for the people of the United States.

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

#### **HIRING THE RIGHT PERSON**

Dear Dave,

I own a small business with two employees, and I have a bit of a hiring conundrum. I'm looking at two candidates for a position, and on paper they're evenly matched. I've interviewed each of them four times, and I'm still undecided. I was hoping you had an idea for determining which is best for the job.

#### Dear Bryan,

As an entrepreneur, that's a great problem to have. I'm glad you understand the wisdom of interviewing potential hires more than once. Sometimes business owners hire a person after just one meeting. That's a really bad idea.

Have you let your team members talk to them? Sometimes other people especially those who might be someone's co-worker will pick up on things you missed during a formal interview. You might also think about scheduling a meeting with each of the candidates off-site. People tend to be more at ease in an informal setting, like a restaurant or coffee shop, and this could lead you to discover new things. Sometimes, a more relaxed setting allows you to see the whole person, and decide if you like who they really are. It can also lead someone to say things that might cause you to hire them — or not hire them.

Something we always do at my company is a final interview over dinner. Spouses are invited to this meeting, and we encourage them to speak



into the situation. I'm not talking about a big test, just conversation and a friendly, family atmosphere. You can tell a lot about a person by how they talk to, and interact with, their spouse. And sometimes a spouse, if there is one, will catch things you missed during other interviews.

I'm impressed that you're taking this seriously, and devoting some real time and energy to hiring. Your thoughtfulness leads me to think you'll make the right decision!

In essence, you're asking me how to get her to grow up. I'm not sure there's a way to convince her at this point. If she's not willing to delay getting or doing things she wants, that's a sign of immaturity. You can't change that within another person. It must be a conscious, willing decision on their part.

Maybe you could try letting her know that being careful with your money and planning for the future doesn't mean you can't have any fun. My wife and I do and have lots of cool things now, because we saved like crazy and sacrificed years ago.

"What good does it do if you tell me, 'I'm cold,' while I have two coats and I say, 'Well, God bless you; maybe somebody will find you a coat.' That's not the way it is. If I have two coats, Christ's is interpretation: Give one to your brother."

Hill was involved in a severe car accident in 2006 that left her in critical condition. She suffered a traumatic brain injury, a broken back, shattered pelvis, and nerve damage to her spine. Doctors warned her family that she would likely be in a permanent

likely be in a permanent vegetative state if she lived past the initial trauma.

"They said I'd never walk, talk, or anything again," she recalls. "And my children and my husband said, 'No, we're not going to accept that.' And thank God I had a Christian doctor who was a Christian doctor who was a brain surgeon."

Hill underwent three brain surgeries during her long recovery. Her family continued to see that she received the highest quality care. Over time, she began to recover.

"When I finally met my brain surgeon, he told me, 'I didn't expect you to make it.' I said, 'Well, my children Florence.

and husband said you saved my life.' And looked at me and said, 'No ma'am, Mrs. Hill. Almighty God saved your life. My name should not even be mentioned. If you do mention it, say God used me as an instrument in your time of need. I never thought you'd make it.'"

Hill received extensive physical therapy, spending some time in a wheelchair and receiving in-home care. While she was still under home care in 2014, her oldest son, Joe, died while

paying her a visit.

Hill had previously lost her daughter Lisa to leukemia at age 32.

After she began walking again, Hill joined the volunteer staff at SVDP.

The SVDP store accepts

donations of gently-used clothing, shoes, dishes, furniture, toys, instruments, books, music, and more. Donations should be in good, working condition and apparel should be gently worn.
Once items have sat





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
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# Life's Boxing Ring
