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STANDUP PADDLEBOARD WITH US

Imagine...the sky is a beautiful blue with the golden sun just overhead. You are standing on the beach with your feet in the sand as the small waves roll slowly onto shore. As you look over the harbor, you see the water smooth as glass. You pick up your stand-up paddleboard and set off to explore the gorgeous water before you.

You don't have to fly four or five hours to experience this scenario—it is right outside your door! A short drive to the north coast and you are there. There is nothing better than being on the water on a stand-up paddleboard early in the morning, enjoying the peaceful serenity of Lake Erie as eagles fly overhead or when you see a steelhead swimming beneath you. Stand-up paddleboards (or SUPs as they are commonly called) have been in the Northeast Ohio area for the past decade and every year more and more people are taking up the hobby. When summer hits, you start to see cars with colorful paddleboards strapped to their roofs heading to the beach.

But you don't have to have your own paddleboard to enjoy this great hobby. Lake Metroparks offers SUP rentals at Fairport Harbor Lakefront Park from Memorial Day Weekend through Labor Day at a cost of \$10 per hour (ages 16 and older are able to rent by themselves; ages 15 and younger must be accompanied by an adult; identification is required for rental). Rentals are offered from 9:30 am to 8 pm on weekdays and 8 am to 8 pm on weekends and holidays (with boats back to shore by 8 pm), weather depending.

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Follow these tips for an enjoyable time paddleboarding at Fairport Harbor Lakefront Park:

- Mornings and evenings are the best time to rent for a couple of reasons: conditions on Lake Erie are typically best at these times. Also, on weekends and holidays, it can become extremely busy between 11 am and 5 pm.
- Always call Fairport Harbor Lakefront Park at 440-639-9972 before your arrival. The staff can let you know how busy it is and if we are renting paddleboards (based on weather or lake conditions).
- Double check the weather on your phone. Many apps are available that show the current weather as well as what is incoming. Summer can bring pop-up storms along Lake Erie, so it is always best to be prepared for any on-the-water activity.
- Check out the webcam. Lake Metroparks provides a view of the beach and water online at lakemetroparks.com/webcams. This will allow you to see how busy the beach is and also get an idea of the water conditions.

Lake Metroparks can teach you how to stand-up paddle-board too! Classes cover the basics including getting onto the board, paddling and maneuverability, and yes, even how to fall off the board correctly (most peoples' biggest concern). Once you realize that falling off of the board is not a big deal, you can really start to enjoy the experience.

Classes are held on Saturday mornings from 8:30 to 10 am and Thursday evenings from 6:30 to 8 pm. You can sign up at lakemetroparks.com or by calling 440-358-7275.

Best of the Bluffs: A Natural Beach

Climb down the new steps to the beach and discover driftwood and rocks on the beach... While some people think this looks messy, it actually provides important habitat for a number of different plants and animals. Discover what creatures live in and along Lake Erie's natural beaches.

Lake Erie Bluffs is 592 acres of protected natural area on the shores of Lake Frie, Between forests, fields and wetlands, the park offers abundant and diverse habitats for wildlife including deer, coyotes, cottontails, bald eagles, an array of songbirds, snakes and pollinating insects. With three miles of trail, a 50-foot observation tower, a wonderful picnic shelter, and multiple points of beach access, there is plenty for you to explore. To highlight the many special features of the park, Lake Metroparks has held the Best of the Bluffs event each summer since 2015.

This year's event will focus on the

natural beach, which is the zone from the water's edge to the edge of the bluffs. The actual bluffs are the cliffs that face Lake Frie that create sunny habitats for rare plants such as fringed gentian and Oakes evening primrose. At their base, waves pile up heaps of driftwood. People often wonder why we don't "clean" the beach and remove the driftwood, but the wood helps stabilize the shore and provides shelter for plants and animals such as inland beach pea and Fowler's toads.

Best of the Bluffs offers something for evervone! Some of the activities will include:

Nature-themed information booths and activities

Guided hikes of the park

Trail cart tours offer visitors a closer look at what makes the park unique.

Self-auided hikes on over three miles of easy trails

Does My Child Have a Reading Problem?

In my business. we receive many calls from parents of struggling readers. Here are some clues to why a child is a poor reader.

My child doesn't understand what they read.

Reason 1: The child can't read all the big words effortlessly. This is knowing what the words say, not what they mean. Here's a home test. Have your child read a decent size paragraph in a grade level book. If they misread five+ words they aren't reading effortlessly.

Reason 2: They don't understand what they are reading and/or can't infer the book's meaning. Often the child has a lower ability or is on the Autism spectrum. Most average ability children, even those with a learning disability, can understand what they read if they can read the words well.

My child likes to listen to books.

If you child doesn't like to read, but listens to books and understands what is read. This is another clue that they can't read effortlessly.

My child doesn't like to read.

Well, if your child can't read well, it isn't much fun.

My child can't focus.

Some children do have attention issues. but some children day dream or lose focus because they can't read well. Most of us would daydream if we couldn't read well, but all day every day we were required to read things. My mind would go to a happier place!

My child is a terrible speller

This is not on a spelling test; rather it

is seen when writing something. Good spellers can write the words they want to use almost as effortlessly as they read.

My child isn't motivated

Every child wants to be successful in school. If your child isn't doing their work, he or she be a poor reader? Of course, there are other reasons, but poor reading is a cause.

My child has good grades but hates to

Good grades doesn't always equate to good reading skills. A child can work hard in school and be a poor reader. By middle school or before, it becomes difficult to sustain good grades with poor reading skills.

What is a good reader and how is the U.S. doing?

A good reader has broken the reading code. They know:

- Sounds in little words.
- How to break big words into pieces (syllable)
- Rules for each syllable

This method is called multi-sensory systematic phonics. Some students break the code but don't know the rules. Many students can't break the reading code and read poorly.

Since 1992, the National Assessment of Education Progress (NAEP) finds 9% of fourth graders and 4% of eighth graders read at the advanced level. College students should all read at the advanced level to be successful learners.

So, you decide. Does your child have a reading problem?


