San Jose national leader in urban trails

an Jose is striving to become the national leader in urban trail development. With plans to connect 100 miles of trails across 40 trail systems, it's well on its way.

There are currently about 60 miles of connected trails in San Jose, as well as more than 200 miles of on-street bikeways used for commuting and recreation. "We're a great bike city," says Trail Network Program Manager Yves Zsutty. "We have more paved, class-one trails than Portland."

Used for commuting, exercise and recreation, trails are essential to San Jose residents. They're also greatly enjoyed. In fact, in 2015, 70 percent of survey respondents cited "fun" as their reason for using them.

"Once the trail network is fully developed,

we will have trails in every neighborhood," says Zsutty. "They're popular and well used. It's a great investment and they're great assets for a community."

Zsutty, who's worked with the Parks, Recreation and Neighborhood Services (PRNS) Trail Program for 16 years, says that it's been rewarding to see projects completed and enlightening to see others that he's been involved with since day one still under development. "They take time and they're expensive and challenging," he says.

Sacred Heart Community Service volunteers prepare for student backpack distribution

Distribution Day for Sacred Heart Community Service's annual Pack a Back Education Campaign is Friday, August 10th.

More than 3,000 students are signed up to receive new backpacks and school supplies and more than a hundred volunteers prepared in advance for this big event, where they counted, sorted and organized the school supplies to transform the agency's Learning Center into a backpack "store."

For families living in San Jose, the rising cost of rent makes it even more challenging to pay for school supplies suggested by school districts.

For the 2017/2018 school year – according to the Backpack Index – parents were expected to pay per child: \$662 for elementary school students, \$1,001 for middle school students and \$1,489 for high school students.

In "Out of Reach" a study released last month by the National Low Income Housing Coalition, a family would need to hold down 3.6 minimum wage jobs to afford a two bedroom apartment in San Jose. Sacred Heart's Pack a Back campaign is designed to offset the cost of these supplies for our families, where a bulk of their paycheck goes to rent.

All backpack appointment slots for August 10th have been filled but the agency is still collecting new backpacks and school supplies and is currently low on scientific calculators, backpacks and \$20 gift cards for shoes.

Donations can be dropped off at the Donation station located at 1381 S. First Street in San Jose or donations can be made online at: sacredheartcs.org/pab. The Donation Station is open Monday – Saturday.

One of the most prestigious soccer championships in the country, the National Cup XVII Championship featured more than 5,000 players from 250 teams across 30 states.



Volunteer for a Day: Try it; you'll like it!

any know me as a librarian—but today I am writing this article shar-Ling my experience as a San Jose Public Library's Volunteer Away Your Fines (VAYF) program volunteer. This is not an official library narrative or commentary, but a summary of my personal perspective.

On Saturday, July 14, I volunteered for a public library Early Education outreach program. It was the Gerald and Piggie Hoedown at the Farm - Dance Party at Emma Prusch Farm Park. I didn't go as a paid staff, but went as a first time VAYF volunteer to help promote SJPL's 1000 Books Before Kindergarten program.

Almost every week, San Jose Public Library has at least one location offering the opportunity to eliminate fines by volunteering. Fines will be cleared from your account at a rate of \$20 per hour. I volunteered for four hours. Fortunately, I did not have \$80 worth of fines to clear, only \$13.50! How could someone who works at the library five days a week ever have a late book? Well, as we all know, life happens. How to explain how a book I carefully set on a table intending to take back gets overlooked? Is it a piece of my shared humanity that makes me fall victim to the same trick played on others-- forgetting to take the last audiobook disc out of the car when I finish? I always double check the case, but one time I realized when I was ready to turn it in, OOPS! So I decided time to take advantage of SJPL's Volunteer Away Your Fines.

What were my choices? Ongoing community volunteers make a regular commitment of six months or more helping in ongoing duties. These vary by branch, such as reshelving materials; facilitating book clubs or ESL conversation groups; Reading to Children; tutoring adults or students;

serving as a tech mentor providing computer help; supporting a branch's Friends group; or leading or monitoring homework clubs or classes. Teen volunteers help in different ways at each branch. Ongoing volunteers get any needed training from library staff. Jason Pell and Robert Miranda, in Volunteer Services, provide additional support to branch staff who coordinate volunteer engagement or who mentor teensReach volunteers. I knew these two had initiated several ways to help both volunteers and the public regain access to blocked accounts, or, like mine, before fines got too high. This time, though, instead of crediting library volunteers' accounts, I was in the position of a borrower with late fees to settle.

Like the public, I could sign up for a volunteer option listed at sjpl.org/vayf. Onetime volunteers usually assist with book sales, special branch programs, overall library events and outreach or with maintaining a welcoming environment in library facilities, including detailed cleaning projects. Any needed instructions are provided by a library staff, so it isn't hard. Branch buddy shifts usually are scheduled during hours when I am working. Otherwise, I could have cleaned keyboards, monitors, windows, or books like these volunteers shown on the library's Flickr page (pictured

But somehow, for me, a couple of hours with a spray bottle or cleaning toys didn't sound like as much fun as it was for our young volunteers.



Since I'm not a celebrity like Andrew Tarbell, an Earthquakes player pictured above with Carmen, I couldn't offer a high

profile to bring a large fan base into the library, even if I do love doing storytimes!

Since I work for the library, I couldn't do my Volunteer Away Your Fines at the branch where I work, like our ongoing regular volunteers can. Ladmit, it would be fun to make a cool custom volunteer shirt like Evergreen Branch's Reading to Children volunteer, Martha Kell, has, but that would have set me back more

than my late fees owed.

When the invitation was posted for volunteers to help with a dance party, I knew that would be perfect! I remembered about the Early Education Services summer Dance Parties, like the previous Pete the Cat dance party at Village Square Branch. (See photo below, bottom of page.)

I wondered if that might be an opportunity for me. If they were on days when I was already working, then that wouldn't work out, but if, like today, I were off work, that would be ideal!

Sure enough, the call for volunteers was posted for a Dance Party with Elephant and Piggie at Emma Prusch Farm Park on Saturday, July 14. I signed up and had so much fun. When you are a volunteer, you usually have to arrive a little early to help set up. As I arrived, a rooster let me know I was early enough with his greeting, "Cockadoodle doo!" Maybe I should have asked him if he'd come inside to be my partner for the Chicken dance.

An Info table was already set up. My first job was to hand out bags and to sign up people for 1000 Books Before Kindergarten, an SJPL program encouraging parents of infants and preschoolers to read to and share books with their children, promoting a lifelong love of reading. I got 38 people to sign up, but we ran out of printed booklets. We gave out our limited pile of Potter the Otter Gets Ready for Kindergarten, from the Santa Clara County Office of Education. Later I got to dance, to help read, and to help manage lines of people waiting for photos with the characters! Other volunteers managed arts and crafts. Children decorated fans with washable markers, get faces painted, or did other art. There was a quiet reading table for children who either felt overwhelmed with the loud music or wanted a quiet break. Drawing with markers, especially on a fan for a hot day, is always a favorite art activity for toddlers and preschoolers. With over 500 people attending throughout the morning, it got pretty crowded, but for those who stayed till the end, the line finally got shorter for face painting.

Volunteering can be a lot of fun. I also volunteer for Furry Friends, at my church, and for CROP Walk San Jose. Volunteering gives me a chance to connect with others, to contribute to organizations or causes that I support, and to make a difference in my community. Volunteers help extend the ability of professionals to offer their services and programs to more people and to spread the word about a variety of causes—on this occasion, the importance and fun of early education in promoting literacy and a lifelong love of learning. Thanks for providing this community connection!



Addressing homelessness

The seemingly intractable issue of homelessness is a frustration for those watching it, and a sad, often desperate reality for those experiencing it.

Homelessness can happen to anyone: sudden loss of a job, a medical emergency, divorce or domestic violence, missing a rent payment or other unexpected life experiences. And there is only one way to really solve it-housing. Homelessness doesn't end when an encampment is cleared out or with handing out blankets. Homelessness ends when people have a home.

In Santa Clara County, 7,500 people are without a home on any given night.

Of those, 2,500 are considered chronically homeless. What we need is permanent, sustainable housing for all, and resources built to last for the long term. Along with my colleagues on the County Board of Supervisors, the nonprofit Destination: Home and our community partners, we are moving forward with a "Community Plan to End Homelessness."

A recent study showed that for 100 homeless residents who were housed through the Housing 1000 program, the estimated average annual pre-housing public cost was \$62,473. The estimated average post-housing cost was \$19,767, a reduction of \$42,706 annually. Not only

is housing the right thing to do, it also saves taxpayer money.

The Santa Clara County Board of Supervisors works closely with numerous partners including the City of San Jose. In fact, the first housing develop-

ment dedicated exclusively to taking vulnerable residents off the streets in being built now. Santa Clara County contributed \$7.2 million to the project, San Jose-\$3.4 million. The rest came from lowincome housing tax credits. The project is being built by the nonprofit PATH and affordable housing developer Affirmed Housing. By October 2019, this new development -Villas on the Park – will house 83 homeless residents. This is just one of many projects that will ultimately provide 5,100 affordable housing units for

vulnerable populations.

The County portion of these projects is funded by Measure A – the \$950 million November 2016 affordable housing bond that was approved by 67% of Santa Clara County voters. The housing bond enables the County to partner with cities, residents, and the affordable and supportive housing community to significantly address the housing needs of the community's poorest and most vulnerable residents.





like Guadalupe River, Los Gatos Creek, Coyote Creek and connecting hiking trails. "We have trails within three miles of all residents," says Zsutty, "and are adding more and more access over time."

With the assistance of the City's Park Trust Fund and grants from the Santa Clara Valley Water District, construction of a 600-foot undercrossing at Coleman Road allows residents to walk all the way around Almaden Lake and enjoy better connectivity to the Guadalupe Creek and Guadalupe River Trails. "After allocating grants, the Water District said they had \$37,000 left, so we grabbed that grant, added \$8,000 more and got this project done," says Zsutty. "It was a good way to leverage funds and associate the Water District with our good works."

A five-mile project is planned for the

Guadalupe River Trail, connecting

Virginia Street downtown all the way

south to Chynoweth Avenue. The trail,

which is part of the Guadalupe River

Master Plan, has been championed by

"We're a great bike city," says Trail Network Program Manager Yves Zsutty. "We have more paved, classone trails than Portland."

Councilmember Khamis since he first took office

In addition to some of its park trust, the city plans to finance the trail through a portion of the \$250 million raised through Measure B for bicycle and pedestrian improvements. "The Masterplan defines what a \$49 million project

looks like," says Zsutty. "We're looking at public art, bridge structures that will bring neighborhoods to the trail, common signage, gateway architecture and everything you'd see downtown carried over."

The planned five bridge connections will use about half of that budget: financing has already been set aside for designing a pedestrian bridge at Chynoweth. Although Zsutty has identified this project as one of the 10 highest priority projects for the entire Bay Area, he says that construction will follow the flood control project timeline set by the Santa Clara Valley Water District and the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers.

As the trail is already heavily used, Zsutty considers the addition worthwhile. "Approximately 35 to 55 percent of people surveyed reported commuting regularly on it," he says, "so it's a nice addition to this system." (Continued next page)

In fact, a recent city survey showed an impressive 422 percent increase in the Guadalupe River Trail usage during the past decade. "We used to get 250 users a day," he says. "Now, we're at about 1,100 and that's both recreational and commuting uses."

Future plans include extending the 87

Freeway bikeway along Curtner Avenue with a connection at Communication Hill.

At full development, the Guadalupe Creek Trail would be a class one paved trail. It would continue westward from Coleman Avenue, past the percolation ponds, with an undercrossing at Meridian Avenue, and continue along the creek all the way to Guadalupe Mines Road.

Today, residents can bike along the Los Alamitos Creek Trail to Harry Road one way and Blossom Hill Road the other. One day, according to the Trails Master Plan, this trail will continue past Blossom Hill Road all the way to downtown.

Following the discovery of a juvenile mammoth fossil, affectionately named Lupe, in the Guadalupe River, the city commissioned an 11-foot tall metal mammoth sculpture along the Guadalupe River Trail near West Trimble Road where she was found. Lupe is just one of the surprises awaiting hikers on the trails.

In Willow Glen, Three Creeks Trail, which has an entrance at Willow Street, features a new paved trail with landscaping, gateway features and interpretive elements highlighting the area's historic cannery district. A Del Monte water tower beckons residents to explore the area's rich history as they wander along the trail.

Sunday in the Park

In addition to trails, PRNS is responsible for more than a hundred regional and neighborhood parks in San Jose.

This can prove challenging for Park Maintenance Supervisor Dan Greeley who, along with his 16-member staff, is responsible for the maintenance of 65 local parks.

"They work their tails off and things always grow," says Greeley. "We never get caught up. Many parks in Almaden are 35 years old. It's a struggle to make sure 25-year-old irrigation systems are working properly."

PRNS scores parks on a one to five basis. A park rated five is one that was recently built or renovated, but most are budgeted at a 3.2.

Greeley and his team are in the midst of a multi-year park standardization pilot program. Their mission is to determine a standard of costs for the work they do, but first they have to take careful measurements of everything from how much turf edging they do in a week to how long it takes to clean picnic tables (it takes four minutes each to do a thorough cleaning of the 170 picnic tables in Almaden Lake Park).

Making this assignment more difficult are the fluctuations. "Some days, it's raining and cold so, it goes slower," he says. "Some days, no one asks my staff a question so, they can get it done quickly. Other days, a mom asks lots of questions so, it goes slower. It's hard to get a number because there are so many variables

and every park is different, but we're getting closer."

Greeley says a fun part of his job is working with neighborhood volunteers. He identifies people's passions and the way they want their parks to be.

"My team and I don't have all the solutions, but we have the tools and the know-how and we're always looking for help," he says. "Luckily, I work with many community volunteers who are super passionate about their parks and able to supplement the work," he says, "and we've been able to be really creative."

For example, the City entered into a Right of Entry agreement with the Martin-Fontana Park Association, al-

lowing them to hire an outside contractor to do small projects to beautify their park.


"Working together, we can come up with interesting solutions," says Greeley. "People want to give back to their community and we're finding ways to empower them. Erikson Park has issues, but you can't tell because volunteers are working so hard watering trees and painting murals. We're working together to make a difference."

Greeley says that last year, Khamis' office dedicated \$200,000 to hire a contractor for weed abatement at Guadalupe Oak Grove Park. "We want to educate multi-generational volunteers to care for and take ownership of the park," says Greeley, "and make sure the invasive weeds don't grow back."

Guadalupe Oak Grove Park has a special place in Greeley's heart. "It's not really developed," he says. "If you walked the park, I think you'd really enjoy the wildlife there."

He says that in most parks, if a tree fell down, they'd remove it, but they wouldn't necessarily do so there. "Fallen trees are a habitat for insects and birds," says Greeley, "so, we're trying to do a good job of not always removing that habitat. It's a delicate balance of leaving some fallen material and not others and having a wholistic way of removing brush and weeds systematically. We want it to feel like nature and to support the wildlife. It's an interesting park to maintain. We try to be sensitive to that park. It's a gem."

In fact, he wrote a grant to teach children the importance of acorns at the park as it features Blue Oak trees that aren't usually found on the valley floor. "We want to make sure those Blue Oaks will be there forever," he says. Pests and funding are both issues PRNS has to deal with. Ground squirrels and gophers are issues at most local parks. Meadows Park, my irrigation system looks like a colander," he says. "We're losing the battle with rodents." Another problem at the park is upsetting neighbors: the noise of late night partying by teenagers who leave their trash behind. To deter their loitering, signs will be put up reminding them that parks close at sunset. Greeley also suggests residents call 3-1-1 to lodge complaints. "Even if nobody comes," he says, "it creates a data point, so the police know it's an ongoing issue."

Greeley says that at the top of his wish list is funding to create a new play-ground at Almaden Lake Park. "We may put a pop-up inflatable park in there for a short-term solution," he says. "But we have a \$200 million backlog on maintenance. It's hard to get funding for Almaden Lake Park's playground when others are falling apart."

"There are definite challenges," he says, "but we all love our parks and I'm lucky to be in this community with people who keep them going."










