# How to get a handle on work-related stress

Work-related stress is an all too common problem in workplaces across the globe. According to the American Institute of Stress, 80 percent of workers report feeling stress on the job. Perhaps most troubling, nearly half of those people admit they need help in learning how to manage their stress.

The American Psychological Association notes that stressful work environments can contribute to a host of physical problems. in-

cluding headache, sleep disturbances and short temper. Chronic stress can produce more serious consequences such as high blood pressure

while also weakening sufferers' immune systems. Stress at the workplace also can make it difficult to concentrate, which in turn can compromise workers' abilities to perform at the peak of their abilities. That supports the notion that stress is a problem for both employees and employers. As a result, finding ways to reduce that stress should be a team effort.

Getting a handle on stress can be difficult. Since so many people trace their stress to the jobs they need to get by, they might think it's impossible to address that stress without derailing their careers.

But there are a handful of ways for professionals to get a handle on their stress without negatively affecting their careers.

□Speak up about your stress. As noted, stress at the workplace can affect workers' performance, which employers are looking to optimize. Workers can speak to their employers if they feel their work environments are conducive to stress. Work in tandem with an employer to develop time-saving strategies that make it easier to get work done on time. Supervisors may encourage employees to delegate more often, freeing up time to get their work done. Employers may also direct employees to wellness resources that can help them more effectively combat stress. The outcomes of such discussions may never be known if workers never take the initiative and speak up about their stress.

□ Take more time off. According to the "State of American Vacation 2016" report from Project: Time Off, American workers failed to use 658 million vacation days in 2015. Vacation is not just a time to get away, but a valuable, effective way for workers to recharge.

The APA notes that avoiding the negative effects of chronic stress and burnout requires workers to take time away to replenish and return to their pre-stress level of functioning. Taking time off to disconnect from work and avoid thinking about work can be just what workers need to overcome their work-related stress. And plenty of workers have the time to take off; they just need to take it.

□ Embrace relaxation methods. The APA recommends professionals coping with workplace stress embrace techniques that can effectively alleviate stress. Such techniques include meditation and deep-breathing exercises and can help workers develop their ability to focus purposefully on a single activity. That improved focus may help workers better navigate hectic working environments without succumbing to the stress such environments can produce.

Work-related stress is a significant issue for many professionals. But working in tandem with their employers can help professionals effectively cope with that stress.

Bennett also said several of his relatives have attended Jones through the years.

"I found out that I'm a fourth generation Jones County family member here," he said. "I had a great aunt who hitchhiked to school 5

or 10 miles to get here and would stay in the dorm. It's wild. Small world, I guess."

Jones, rated No. 13 in Street and Smith's Magazine and No. 14 in the JCGridiron. rivals.com preseason polls, opens the season at home at 7 p.m. on Aug. 30 against Coahoma.

Buckley said the Bobcats would begin specifically looking at the Tigers soon.

"We start game-planning after next week," he said. "We are going to work against each other this weekend and through next week.

"But obviously we have to start getting ready for Coahoma. Just looking at their roster, they are going to be an outstanding football team. They have done a great job recruiting there. We will have a tremendous challenge when they get here on Aug. 30."

Bennett is excited about the season and knows the Bobcats will have to work hard in practice to be successful.

"I think it all boils down to how fall camp works out," he said. "We've got good players everywhere – offense, defense, special teams. It just comes down to how well we prepare each day. It's not going to be given to us."

After a scoreless third quarter, Southern Miss all but put the game away with a pair of touchdowns -- Michael Boley's 62-yard interception return and a 1-yard scoring run by Sherron Moore. North Texas finished the scoring with an 11-yard touchdown pass from Scott Hall to Johnny

Quinn with one second remaining, ending the game, 31-10. Boley was named the 2004 Wyndham New Orleans Bowl MVP, finishing the game with eight tackles, three tackles for loss and two sacks. Almond finished with 247 passing yards, his second highest total of the season, as he completed 16-of-30 attempts, while Anthony Harris finished with 14 carries for 104 yards. Antwon Courington led the receivers with five catches for 57 yards, and Graves led the team with 58 receiving yards on three catches. Jamario Thomas, the leading rusher in the nation entering the game, finished with 92 rushing yards, Quinn finished with eight catches for 92 yards, and Hall finished with 134 passing yards for North Texas.

The two teams have played 12 times in the series dating back to the 1954 season and each squad has won six times.

Mitchell saw action in 12 games last season as a freshman and posted 24 tackles for the squad. Evans comes to Southern Miss after a stellar two-year career at East Mississippi Community College.

"We are looking for consistency and making sure we are executing everything with our coverages, playing hard," said Hopson of the defense back corps. "We are talented at that spot, but we just have to make sure we are precise and not blowing any coverages."

One guy who Hopson is expecting big things of this year is sophomore linebacker Racheem Boothe, the Bassfield, Miss., product who finished second on the team in tackles last season with 79.

"Racheem is tough and physical who fights through things," said Hopson. "He is a special talent who had a great freshman year and who is just going to get better and better."

It's never easy to replace a guy that rushed for 4,538 yards over his four-year career. That is exactly what Southern Miss must accomplish this fall with the departure of Ito Smith following his graduation last season as he became just the 10th running back to post over 4,000-rushing yards and 1,000-receiving yards in Division I history during his collegiate career.

The Golden Eagles have several options heading into the season including seniors Tez Parks (LaGrange, Ga.) and George Payne (Mobile, Ala.). If for some reason those two are unable to go, the Golden Eagles have needed depth at that position including fellow senior T'Rod Daniels (Bassfield, Miss.), freshman Trivenskey Mosley (Shreveport, La.), redshirt freshman Steven Anderson (Live Oak, Fla.) and senior Brian King (Crystal Springs, Miss.). For third-year coach Jay Hopson, because of injuries throughout the year, it is a position that the Golden Eagles are glad they are deep at.

"That's part of being a running back," said Hopson on injuries and rotating in different guys during the year. "That's why we are so deep at that position, because you always need a next guy available. Guys get banged up and the next man will get his opportunity. That's the beauty of it. You open the door, and another guy steps in and car make his claim for it."

He also praised several of those guys at the running back spot who have had a good camp.

"Brian King had a good day and T'Rod has had a great camp," said Hopson. "If there's one guy in the backfield who has started turning my head is T'Rod Daniels and also Trivenskey Mosley. T'Rod has made some good cuts and big runs, and Trivenskey has shown explosiveness."

Daniels, who had 21 carries for 160 yards a season ago, should get more rushing attempts for the Golden Eagles this fall.

"T'Rod has to keep doing what he's doing right now," said Hopson. "He's talented and a tough little back, just a very hard-nosed kid."

The practice session Wednesday was the fifth for the Golden Eagles this fall and the first in full pads. They will return to the practice fields on Thursday. Hill is considered an awesome athlete who played special teams for the Saints last year after being picked up on waivers from the Green Bay Packers. Hill was 8-for-9 passing for 72 yards and ran for another 52 yards in his half of work.

#### Kelly, Mullens sparkle

Chad Kelly is battling for the backup spot with the Denver Broncos. Kelly was 14-for-21 for 177 yards with two touchdowns in a 42-28 loss to Minnesota this past Saturday night. Kelly is a former East Mississippi Community College (Last Chance U) and Ole Miss quarterback. He is battling former Memphis quarterback Paxton Lynch, who was a No. 1 pick of the Broncos three years ago. Kelly was the last overall selection in the 2016 draft by the Broncos. He has lost 20 pounds, changing his diet and commitment

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to football after battling knee and wrist injuries at Ole Miss. Case Keenum is the No. 1 quarterback in Denver. Former USM quarterback Nick Mullens also had a stellar performance in San Francisco with a 24-20 win over the Dallas Cowboys. Mullens is also battling for the backup spot with the 49ers. Oklahoma's No. 1 quarterback makes more than Sooners head coach Lincoln Riley. Kyler Murray signed a \$5 million baseball contract with the Oakland A's this past June.

He was the ninth overall pick in the Major League baseball draft. The A's agreed that he could play college football this season. He backed up Baker Mayfield last year and is a former starting quarterback at Texas A&M.
