Louisiana Blackberry Pie

Ingredients

- 1 cup sugar
- 1/3 cup quick-cooking tapioca
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 4 cups fresh blackberries, divided
- Pastry for double-crust pie (9 inches)
- 2 tablespoons butter

Directions

- 1. In a large saucepan, combine the sugar, tapioca and salt. Add 1 cup blackberries; toss to coat. Let stand for 15 minutes. Cook and stir over medium heat until berries burst and mixture comes to a gentle boil. Remove from the heat; gently stir in remaining berries.
- 2. Line a 9-in. pie plate with bottom pastry; trim pastry even with edge of plate. Add filling; dot with butter. Roll out remaining pastry to fit top of pie; place over filling. Trim, seal and flute edges. Cut slits in top.
- 3. Bake at 400° for 35-40 minutes or until crust is golden brown and filling is bubbly. Cool on a wire rack.

Texas Pecan Pie

Ingredients

- 1 cup all-purpose flour
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1/3 cup shortening
- 3 tablespoons cold water

FILLING:

- 1-1/4 cups chopped pecans
- 1 cup plus 1 tablespoon light corn syrup
- 3 eggs
- 1/2 cup plus 1 tablespoon sugar
- 1-1/2 teaspoons vanilla extract
- Pinch salt

Directions

- In a bowl, combine the flour and salt; cut in shortening until crumbly. Gradually add cold water, tossing with a fork until a ball forms.
- Roll out pastry to fit a 9-in. pie plate. Transfer pastry to pie plate. Trim pastry to 1/2 in. beyond edge of plate; flute edges. Sprinkle with pecans; set aside.
- In a small bowl, beat the corn syrup, eggs, sugar, vanilla and salt until well blended. Pour over pecans.
- Bake at 350° for 45-50 minutes or until a knife inserted in the center comes our clean. Cool on a wire rack.

Oklahoma Strawberry Pie

Ingredients

- 1 pie shell (9 inches)
- 3/4 cup sugar
- 2 tablespoons cornstarch
- 1 cup water
- 1 package (3 ounces) strawberry gelatin
- 4 cups sliced fresh strawberries
- Whipped cream, optional

Directions

- 1. Line unpricked pie shell with a double thickness of heavy-duty foil. Bake at 450° for 8 minutes. Remove foil; bake 5 minutes longer. Cool on a wire rack.
- 2. In a small saucepan, combine the sugar, cornstarch and water until smooth. Bring to a boil; cook and stir for 2 minutes or until thickened. Remove from the heat; stir in gelatin until dissolved. Refrigerate for 15-20 minutes or until slightly cooled.
- 3. Meanwhile, arrange strawberries in the crust. Pour gelatin mixture over berries. Refrigerate until set. Serve with whipped cream if desired.

Missouri Butterscotch Pie

Ingredients

- 6 tablespoons butter
- 6 tablespoons all-purpose flour
- 1-1/2 cup packed brown sugar
- 2 cups milk
- 1/4 teaspoon salt



- 3 eggs yolks, beaten
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 1 pastry shell (9 inches), baked

MERINGUE

- 3 egg whites
- 1/4 teaspoon cream of tartar
- 1/2 cup sugar

Directions

1. In a saucepan, melt the butter. Remove from the heat; add flour and stir until smooth. Stir in brown sugar. Return to heat; stir in milk and salt until blended. Cook and stir over medium-high heat until thickened and bubbly. Reduce heat; cook and stir 2 minutes longer. Remove from the heat. Stir about 1 cup hot filling into the egg yolks; return all to pan, stirring constantly. Bring to a gentle boil; cook and stir for 2 minutes longer. Remove from the heat. Gently stir in vanilla. Pour into pastry shell. 2. For meringue, beat egg whites and cream of tartar in a small bowl on medium speed until soft peaks form. Gradually beat in sugar, about 1 tablespoon at a time, on high until stiff glossy peaks form and sugar is dissolved. Spread evenly over hot filling, sealing edges to crust.

3. Bake at 350° for 12-15 minutes or until meringue is golden brown. Cool on a wire rack for 1 hour. Re-frigerate for at least 3 hours before serving. Refrigerate leftovers.

Dale Medical Center Challenges of Rural Hospitals

Dale Medical Center continues to serve the community providing quality care close to home at a time that Alabama Rural Hospitals are in a crisis. Providing an array of services including primary, chronic and long-term care, behavioral health, addiction services, rehabilitation beds, radiology, laboratory services, MRI, CAT Scan, 24-hour ER, inpatient and outpatient surgery as well as home health and hospice care. DMC has been recognized nationally for the care provided in our ER and Inpatient Nursing Units for delivery of high quality patient care in an efficient and cost-effective manner. "In healthcare there are many things over which we have no control, such as payer mix of the patients we serve or reimbursement rates. However, what we can control is how we treat our patients and we have a very caring and compassionate staff that do a great job every day," says Vernon Johnson, CEO.

Although Dale Medical Center is not currently in danger of closing, the pressures of the current healthcare environment are being felt. "We have worked hard over the years to operate a financially efficient organization. We have worked to pay off debt and accumulate cash during financially challenging years for Alabama Rural Hospitals," said Vernon Johnson, CEO. "However, with the evergrowing pressures associated with day to day operations, growing uncompensated care, and declining reimbursement, as a rural hospital we struggle to remain financially viable. We have reached a point that we are having to make tough decisions, looking for additional revenue streams, as we lobby for equitable reimbursement relief from Washington DC."

According to the Alabama Hospital Association, 80 percent of Alabama Rural Hospitals are operating in the red with an average operating margin of -11 percent because of lower and inadequate reimbursement for services. This current financial crisis facing hospitals today is a culmination of years of declining reimbursement, increasing under-insured and uninsured, and unfunded mandates and regulations.

The three biggest issues facing Alabama's hospitals include:

• The Medicare area wage index, which determines the rate at which hospitals are paid for the care they provide to patients insured by Medicare. Sixty-five percent of the patients served by Dale Medical Center are insured by Medicare.

Cuts to programs funding hospitals for providing care to uninsured patients, as the thought process was that the Affordable Care Act was to assure that everyone had some form of health insurance.
A general drop in patient volume at hospitals nationwide. A trend toward more care being delivered in clinics and home settings and more stringent admission criteria as set by insurance companies that patients must meet to be admitted to the hospital has contributed to the drop.

The first and biggest issue is the area wage index. The theory behind the index is that a uniform rate of payment for all hospitals rendering services would be inherently unfair because the cost of living varies from city to city and state to state.

The Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services tries to remedy this by using a formula to calculate an adjusted rate of repayment, but Alabama's hospitals have some of the lowest rates in the nation. Dale Medical Center's reimbursement rate is roughly .68 compared to Santa Cruz California at a rate of 1.8. So, for a procedure costing \$1,000 to perform, Dale Medical Center would be paid \$680 compared to \$1,800 in California for the exact same procedure. Not many businesses can remain in business if they operated under similar payment schemes. This might have been a good idea when it was first implemented, however, it has been manipulated by politicians in places like New Jersey and California who make sure hospitals in their states have the highest reimbursement rates possible. And since the system must remain budget neutral, if the rate is increased in one area it goes down even further in other. Currently under this system, the more efficient and cost-effective Alabama Hospitals become the formula drives the reimbursement for the State even lower. "We are falling on our own sword as Alabama hospitals are punished for holding cost down and proving good quality

"Religion says: God will love us if we change. The Gospel says: God's love changes us." care compared to states being rewarded for higher cost. Seems like it is totally backwards during a time of financially challenging times within our country," said Johnson.

"In some cases, Alabama hospitals are being paid three to five times less than other hospitals providing identical care to patients," says Danne Howard, VP of Alabama Hospital Association. "It's a death spiral we never can seem to get out of, this is the most egregious issue we've been working on, and it continues to get worse every year. Now we're at a breaking point, and we're asking our legislative delegation for help. If we could only fix one thing the Wage Index would go furthest in providing relief to the stressed healthcare system in Alabama."

Continued cuts to federal funding programs to hospitals is another factor that is causing undo stress on the financial stability of rural hospitals. When Alabama didn't expand Medicaid, no new dollars came into our state to fund healthcare. Federal assistance programs designed as safety nets for hospitals providing care for the uninsured were cut thinking that the Affordable Care Act would provide everyone with insurance. With no new Medicaid dollars coming into the state and no reduction in the number of uninsured or underinsured patients, rural hospitals in the state struggle financially with eleven closing since 2010. Another challenge is many patients with new insurance plans have very high deductibles that are uncollectable by the provider driving uncompensated care up.

A national trend of declining admissions to hospitals is driven by more stringent admission criteria and a push to treat more in an outpatient or home setting. As hospitals adjust to this trend of decreased utilization, they are faced with the challenge of the high overhead of maintaining required equipment and staff within the facility.

For over 65 years Dale Medical Center has been providing healthcare to this local community. But many don't realize that it is also an economic driver for the community as well. Some facts about Dale Medical Center's economic impact to this community are:

• As one of the largest employers in Ozark, Dale Medical Center employs 400 people and indirectly supports an additional 390 jobs in other industries, for a total of 790 jobs.

- DMC provides \$18 million in salaries and benefits for employees and another \$12 million indirectly for a total of \$30 million in labor income for our community.
- The economic impact of DMC for our community is estimated to be \$60 million.
- Although Dale Medical Center receives approximately \$1.1 million in county tax support annually, it provided \$8.6 million in uncompensated care in 2017.
- Dale Medical Center paid \$1,024,742 in utilities in 2017.
- Over 18,000 patients were provided care in the ER in 2017.

Reimbursement isn't growing; no inflation of rates and no influx of new patients seem to be on the horizon. DMC's strategy includes providing the very best care possible and being more creative with services, such as new physicians, swing beds, behavior health, addiction medicine, hospice, home health and growing outpatient services. The bottom line is that we need local community support to survive and continue to grow our services. In 1952 the Dale County Hospital was constructed at a cost of around \$600,000, today to build a new replacement facility would cost \$72 million. As badly as it is desired and needed, a new hospital will require major reforms in reimbursement from Washington DC and renewed community support, says, Vernon Johnson, CEO. "Until then, the staff of Dale Medical Center will continue to work daily to become a better place to receive care, physicians to practice medicine and employees to work."

Claybank Master Gardeners



On the 2nd Wednesday of each month the Dale County Extension Office, in cooperation with Claybank Master Gardeners, offers a free Lunch and Learn on a topic of interest to gardeners. In August the topic was about Wildflower Gardens. We learned that wildflower gardens encourage native pollinators (hummingbirds, butterflies, bees, etc.) which are vital to the health and diversity of the natural ecology of the area. A small or large patch for a wildflower garden in some corner of the yard, or even in clay pots for smaller areas, can be seeded in the early spring. Mix seeds with damp sand, 9 parts sand to one part seeds, and spread over soil where weeds have been removed, and cover with a thin layer of straw (wheat straw, not hay) and keep moist but not too wet. Plant in an area that gets about 6 hours of sunlight for best results. Seeds should begin to sprout in 10 to 20 days. For more complete information look for free bulletin ANR-0623 available for at the Extension office or online at www.aces.edu.

The next **Lunch and Learn** will be held on **September 12th** on Invasive Plant Management, then on **October 10** on Indoor Plants. and on **November 14th** there will be one on Holiday Décor.
