New principal takes helm of Laurelwood School





18th Annual Antique Autos in History Park

Citizens Watchdog Committee Report to the Public

2000 Measure A Sales Tax Activities Fiscal Year **2017** (7/1/16 – 6/30/17)

VTA delivers transportation solutions critical to the vitality, prosperity and quality of life for all who live, work or play in Santa Clara County.

In November 2000, Santa Clara County voters approved Measure A, a 30-year half-cent sales tax devoted to specific public transit capital improvement projects and operations. Tax collection began in mid-2006, making FY 2017 the 11th year of the 30-year program.

A few key Fiscal Year 2017 accomplishments include:

• Extending BART to the Silicon Valley cities of Milpitas, San Jose and Santa Clara. Construction for the Phase I extension to the Berryessa area of San Jose was essentially completed. Since then, testing and integration is underway, with revenue service anticipated for 2019. Phase II, the last six miles that extends the system all the way to Santa Clara, had significant progress during the period, including the release of the environmental document and the subsequent approval by the Board in mid-2018.

- Improving Caltrain through the Peninsula Corridor Electrification Project, which will increase speed, capacity, and reliability and reduce carbon footprint. Work continued for this project during FY 2017 and passenger service with electric trains is anticipated for 2022.
- Improving Bus Service in Major Corridors with the implementation of the Alum Rock Santa Clara
 Bus Rapid Transit (BRT) along the highest transit ridership corridor. Construction contract
 associated with the improvements for the Stevens Creek Rapid 523 was awarded in April 2017 and
 was completed since then.

Santa Clara County voters entrusted the Citizens Watchdog Committee (CWC), comprised of fellow community members, with overseeing Measure A expenditures to ensure your sales tax dollars are spent as intended by the ballot. After thorough and careful consideration:

It is the conclusion of the CWC that for the period of FY 2017, 2000 Measure A tax dollars were spent in accordance with the intent of the Measure.

Software startup created by students from Evergreen

Students win first place in social impact challenge

Intone is a software company that held a big competition in their San Francisco office to encourage others to break into the business of software creation.

The company started in 1997 when three Japanese engineers quit their jobs, "to chase a crazy dream of non-clunky office software."

They launched cloud based software that helped offices and their company. Soon others wanted to use their applications so they began to historically grow "with flying colors, tons of awards, and dedicated fans."

They make a platform that allows businesses to creatively manage data with cutting edge useful applications.

Today the company has over 7,500 companies building and deploying over 500,000 apps which are inspired and created by Kintone.

As Betsey Thurlo, Network Administrator McCormick Distillery states in her testimonial regarding use of their software, "It's cloud-based, no-code apps allow us to streamline our operations and communications, all without adding more staff."

16 year old C.E.O. sets up company with high school friends

Enter Abhigya Sodani who currently attends Evergreen High. He got together with five other students, Edward Frazer, Nidhir Guggilla, Tommy Vo Tran, Suhas Kotha and Samuel Brashears and began a company called Cesion Software. They curently provide software solutions for small businesses in Evergreen and beyond. Sodani along with the other five decided to scale up a new platform app creation to enter into the Kintone event.

Contest held in San Francisco

On August 9, Kintone held its Social Impact Challenge Contest at the Embarcadero Center. The boys came up with the idea of a new application that they named "Zuriel." Sodani said the application evolved because they saw,

"shortcomings in the American educational system." He stated, "Many students are subject to underfunded, understaffed and underprivileged schools."

Cesion CTO (Chief Technology Officer), Edward Frazer added, "The lack of resources has left many students unable to compete with an increasingly competitive world after graduation."

"We noticed a problem in our schools. Students weren't putting in the work to succeed because they never saw the output of their education. Teachers didn't have the patience nor money to work with these classes. That's why we created "Zurel" – to motivate students by giving them a reward for their hard work and to give teachers what they need to effectively run a classroom," said Suhas Kotha (Lead Developer).

The Zuriel application is invented

The Zuriel application is invented. The Zuriel platform (software application), states Sodani, "aims to increase school funding while encouraging students to improve their academic performance and retention of knowledge." It works by having local businesses pledge donations to schools on the condition that good academic performance is shown by each individual student. The students log into the Zuriel platform and answer a series of questions related to their school studies. If they show good answers then they earn the monies pledged to the school from the tax deductible donation awarded by the local businesses.

Sodani continued, "Students who excel can win prizes too. It also fosters a sense of community and responsibility for each person's commitment to their education. It helps the businesses better connect and identify their services to the community and connect with future employees."

Drumroll please

Over a hundred groups participated in the first round of entering to win the Kintone prize in an on-line competition. Then the field was narrowed down to about ten teams that would go to San Francisco to present their software creation to gain votes from business professionals, community members, non-profit leaders, software professionals and more. The winners were decided upon how

many votes (a poll) their team got from the audience as a whole.

"We offered them a treasure chest which could be filled up with school donations and unlocked if the students scored well on the questions. The concept was that the students and the business contacts would both get joy in seeing problems solved with the use of our application platform. Who knows, if it grows we may look into implement-

ing it on the Kintone platform someday, but that day is in the future," said

"I'm happy we won but I'm more excited to see where we take Zuriel from here," said Nidhir Guggilla (Vice President of the company).

Sodani went on to say, "It was an amazing experience. After our presentation the audience listened to and voted on all the team software inventions. When the votes were tallied up we got the most votes so we won. What was so great in the experience was we got to present our ideas to similarly minded people and on a larger scale, we gained experience on how to go about presenting actual start up software company ideas to the real world."

They took home over \$6,000 which will allow them to fine tune and scale up their platform application. They used tech to impact the Bay Area and beyond




in positive ways.

How to lower vet bills and promote wellness in pets

A trip to your vet could cost you an arm and leg especially if your pet has a medical emergency which can take a toll on any family's finances.

I would like to explain some easy ways to save money at your vet while promoting health and wellness of your pet.

1. Preventive care: If your vet suggests preventive care like vaccinations, dental cleanings including brushing, grooming, flea and tick control, heartworm preven-

- 5. Year around parasite prevention: fleas/ticks/heartworms can pose significant health risk to your pet so by using the preventive measures year round you

can keep your pet safe and hence reduce vet bills.

- 6. Compare prices: I highly recommend that pet owners compare service and prices before committing to a vet practice. Use online sites like yelp to find a highly reviewed vet practice that won't break your bank.
- 7. Exercise: about 1 in 4 dogs and 1 in 3 cats are overweight or obese and that extra weight will lead to bigger issues like diabetes, arthritis, or respiratory problems. A regular exercise regimen along with a healthy diet can keep your pet at a healthy weight hence less vet visits.
- 8. Get pet insurance: This can save you a huge amount of money if your pet's vet bills are high. Insurance won't cover preexisting conditions and inherited disorders so it's important to get pet insurance as early as possible just like people. Also

do your research to determine which insurance plan / policy is right for your pet.

9. Ask about financing options: Certain vet offices will offer payment plans/financing. They might also work with a credit lender (like Carecredit) which allows you to pay your bill over a course of several months with no interest upon credit approval.

10. Request an estimate before services are rendered: A written/rough estimate

helps you to know how much you can expect to spend. If you think a service or add-ons are unnecessary or too expensive, then don't be shy to visit another vet with the estimate in your hand. Be a well-informed owner on your pet's health condition. Ask your vet what he would do in your situation, and use the vet's response as a baseline for your decisions.

Your pets shouldn't have to suffer unnecessarily, and you shouldn't have to either under the burden of vet bills. Providing our furry friends with the things they need to live a long, healthy life isn't cheap, but it's always worth it.

Peccin, (event manager), Mari Castro, Mike Kaufman, Jinky Peralta, (treasurer) Kelly Kelana La, Karen Bonham, Lisanne Huber, and Tom Lance.

The members range in age from very young children to retired senior citizens. They are one of the most enthusiastic groups one could imagine! Robbie continued, "We even have one homeless person who comes out each time and helps quite a bit. Volunteers and donations are always welcome. For example, we get high school students completing their community service, occasional church groups, etc."

The group does not require the homeless to come to them as sleeping bags are only a small part of what they do. They go out to the encampments! They also distribute a lot of food, drink (lots of water) hygiene products, rope, tape, garbage bags, plenty of clothes, etc. On a recent Saturday, Jinky Peralta had the entire trunk of her car filled with sandwiches that part of the group had stayed up the night before preparing for the next morning. It is not unusual for some people to donate 50-100 sandwiches, 50-100 hotdogs, bags of toiletries (Advil, toothbrushes, toothpaste, feminine products, etc.) Pet food is also donated for those who have animal companions. The local Starbucks gives the group bags of food the Friday before their distributions.

Every other Saturday SB4H members (and other volunteers) gather at the church parking lot at 133 Bernal Road, San Jose. Donations are split into piles depending on how many encampments they plan to cover. Each lead has a pile of donations that they and their crew take to their encampments and distribute.

Robbie reiterated, "Keep in mind that not all homeless live in encampments. For example, my wife and I stop at a gas station on Monterey highway where there are one or two people. This is becoming more common as the authorities have



sweeps, (It is reported that there are sometimes 20 a week). One of our regular stops was under Expressway Monterrey Rd. but they have recently been swept. One resident reported that he had lived there for over four years.

When young children volun-

teer, they are sent to encampments where they can be watched closely by responsible adults. As of the present, there have been no incidents of harassing the children. Robbie and Edie have taken their six year-old granddaughter on a distribution.

Among the memorable moments this group has encountered is the generosity of the homeless. One homeless man put on a very nice leather jacket that really made him smile, then quickly took it off and offered it to someone else. The same goes for the food. They make sure that the people who cannot get their own will get their share. Robbie reflects, Someone donated a full length coat. One of the guy's eyes lit up and asked if he could try it. He strutted around, asked for a purple hat. He became known as Superfly. One homeless guy asked me where I was from and it turned out we grew up in the same neighborhood, only blocks away. We even attended the same high school!'

Some of the problems encountered by this group in trying to help the homeless are:


- That the encampments get swept and the residents lose all their stuff. Then it becomes harder for organizations like SB4H to help as the people become so spread out.
- Trash! Some people are against the group giving out supplies to the homeless as it adds to the mess around the areas.
- Security! The homeless have no guarantee of health and

SB4H is a Bay Area movement. Their only hope is that they will be able to help the homeless obtain the things we all take for granted, ie, toothpaste, clean clothes, and above all, food! The group tries to give the homeless some hope. There are hopes of creating a tent village in the surrounding area called "Hope Village" that will alleviate some of the suffering. That is another story for another time.

We can only hope that SB4H will be allowed to continue helping as many people as possible. At least, someone is trying to do something!

Mathnasium inspires children by connecting to each level of learning

Could this be the way all schools will teach math in the future?

"Kids are under pressure these days and they want to be on top of things," states Geethika Potluri, who is part of the husband and wife team that owns Mathnasium located in the Village Square in Evergreen Valley.

"It's like kids are born with a laptop in their hands and they are now self-motivated to want to keep up with the world that is presented to them."

School districts today continue to change their teaching methods in a variety of core classes to meet Common Core State Standards.

A yearlong study by the Center for Education Policy Research at Harvard University published in 2016 showed that 82 percent of math teachers, or nearly four out of five, had to change more than half of their instructional materials to meet satisfy the new standards.

It is understandably difficult to address every child's needs while also meeting the expectations of changing public policy. Couple that with a recent statistic by the Programme for International Student Assessment, which measures the math, science literacy, and the reading ability of 15-year-olds in developed countries, placing the United States at the 38th

position out of 71 countries in mathematics.

Mathnasium is a business (children and teen center) that teaches learners while acting as a support bridge to fill in the needed gaps of understanding for topics and domains of content knowledge that the children may not have fully mastered

Instructors at Mathnasium state, "We teach math in a way that makes sense to them." A feeling of joy is earned during the one hour sessions and children are heard to say...

"Oh, I get it!"

"I didn't know it could be that easy to do!"

Grade Level is not the focus

A teaching session involves one instructor to a maximum of three children (on some days one to one tutoring can take place too).
