OPA candidates debate

Six of the seven men and women vying for the two open seats on the Ocean Pines Association (OPA) board came together last Tuesday afternoon for a candidates' forum held in The Parke.

Terri Mohr, Cheryl Jacobs, Tom Herrick, Bill Zawacki, Carol Ludwig and Slobodan Trendic fielded questions on topics that included the financial realities of the community's amenities, the performance of the general manager, the community's conversion to natural gas and the infighting and pettiness among the current board and the general manager. Ray Unger was absent from the proceedings.

Diane McGraw moderated the forum, asking prepared questions as well as questions submitted by residents of the subdivision.

During his opening two minute statement, Mr. Trendic referenced the DUI charges that are pend-

ing against him and that were the focus of a recent front page story in a local newspaper. Although he declined to speak directly to the charges on the advice of counsel, he did apologize for the incident and emotionally said he was sorry for the strain the matter has placed on his supporters and most especially his wife.

When it came to the financial performance of the amenities, especially the Yacht Club, Mr. Herrick said, "We can't give up. Breaking even or losing a little is not good." He stressed the importance of more inclusive programs to attract customers, especially at the golf course which he said was not competitive with other courses in the area. He also said the being more competitive would also assist in making the Yacht Club more profitable.

Mr. Herrick also articulated his concern that fa-

Chamber flounder tourney approaching

The Ocean Pines Chamber of Commerce will host its 8th annual Flounder Fishing Tournament on Saturday August 1.

There will be cash prizes for the largest flounder caught. The first place winner will get \$500 plus a trophy. The second place winner will win \$300 and the third place winner will get \$100. There will be an optional Calcutta Contest. The cost is \$10 to enter. There will be first, second and third place winners for contest entrants. Last year's first

place winner took home almost \$2,000.

The tournament is a relaxing, fun contest. Participants can fish from the shore, pier, private boat, flounder party boats or charter boats; anywhere in Maryland and Delaware coastal waters between 7 a.m. and 3 p.m. on tournament day. Tournament excludes the Chesapeake Bay. Fish must be caught within 3 nautical miles of shore and inland waters to the Virginia state lines. The weigh-in will occur at Pines Point Marina from noon and 4 p.m. The ma-

rina is located at 869 Yacht Club Drive in Ocean Pines.

Entrants can bring in legal sized flounder (16" or larger, up to 4 fish per angler) for weighing in. Anglers must be registered for the contest by Friday July 31 at 3 p.m. to participate in the tournament the next day.

The first 100 entries also receive a free tee shirt. Shirts will also be available for purchase at the chamber office on Cathell Road or at the weigh-in the day of the tournament for \$10.

Entry forms are available at the Ocean Pines Chamber of Commerce office located at 11031 Cathell Road in Berlin or on-line at OceanPinesChamber.org. Just click on Events from the home page. The entry fee is \$35 per person with discount for multiple fishermen. (two or more \$30 per person)



Ocean Pines Crime Bulletin

Theft of Guns:

An Ocean Pines couple went on a Caribbean vacation and left their teenage daughter at home. Of course, the daughter had a party at the house, without her parent's permission. One of the "guests" located two pistols in a closet and stole them. An extensive police investigation resulted in the arrest of an 18 year old and the recovery of one of the weapons. The suspect will not divulge the location of the second weapon. The investigation is continuing.

First Degree Assault:

An Ocean Pines resident was assaulted while walking one of our community trails. The victim was shot at by a BB gun from a resident in an adjoining home. The suspect was identified by police and charged with 1st Degree Assault. The victim was unknown to the suspect.

Suspect Arrested for DUI Four Times in 12 Days:

A 57 year old resident was charged with Driving While Intoxicated on four separate occasions within a 12 day pe-

riod. He is now residing in the Worcester County Detention Center.

Suspect Arrested for Drunk Driving and Leaving the Scene of an Accident:

A 59 year old resident was arrested for drunk driving and leaving the scene of a property damage accident. The suspect lost control of his vehicle, while intoxicated, and drove into a parked vehicle at an Ocean Pines residence, causing extensive damage to the vehicle and yard landscaping. The suspect then fled the scene, but police investigation followed a trail of radiator fluid and damage back to the suspect's residence. The suspect was charged with numerous traffic charges, including driving while intoxicated and leaving the scene of a property damage accident.

Domestic Assault Arrest:

In a residential community, like Ocean Pines, police are often called to domestic disputes. In this case, a 57 year old resident was arrested for Second Degree Assault as the result of a domestic incident. In cases where police view injury, Maryland law requires the police to make an arrest. This insures safety of the victim and prevents a reoccurrence of violence.

Warrant Arrests:

Police made two recent warrant service arrests. Crimes committed in other jurisdictions often result in warrants being issued for suspects who may have moved to a new residence. When the suspect is located in Ocean Pines, we serve the warrant and take them into custody.

Runaway Arrests:

With the summer season upon us, an influx of troubled youths who run away from home to go to Ocean City occurs.

At times, we are able to locate some youths who may be in Ocean Pines. Recently we located two runaways and returned them to their families.

Car Fire:

Police were able to pull an individual out of a car that had caught fire from mechanical reasons. This is the second such incident in recent months. As first responders, police often flirt with danger at life threatening situations. They also may be the first responder on the scene of a heart attack or life threatening event. Ocean Pines Police have Automatic External Defibrillators (AEDs) in their vehicles in cases of heart attacks. They have been used, periodically.

Heroin Death:

Heroin has unfortunately become the drug of choice for drug users. The effects of an overdose of heroin can result in death. Our nation, and Maryland, has seen a dramatic increase in heroin-related deaths. A 23 year old Ocean Pines resident died as a result of an apparent overdose. Police conduct investigations on ALL deaths occurring in Ocean Pines.

Theft Arrests:

Police charged two individuals with theft in two unrelated incidents.

DUI Arrests:

Since our last Bulletin, police have charged 11 individuals with Driving While Intoxicated. As the summer progresses, and beach traffic and partying increases, police must deal with problems that arise. Please remember to have a designated driver or call a taxi should you decide to drink to excess.

Special Events:

Ocean Pines Police, along with our Neighborhood Watch volunteers, assist at all large special events. Recently we assisted at the Memorial Day Celebration at our Veteran's Memorial, traffic control, along with the Sheriff's Department and State Police, at the 4th of July Fireworks Celebration at Showell Park.

We Need Your Help to Take A Bite Out of Crime:

Information gathered from citizens is a critical component in effective law enforcement. Criminals often like to talk about their activities, and citizens are the eyes and ears of our community. Suspicious activity needs to be reported, and it is often the alert observations of a citizen that provides critical information to the police. Information can be passed along anonymously to the Police Department.

when I left work early and spent the afternoon with my granddaughter Giana.

It was a beautiful clear afternoon so I asked my daughter if she would mind if I took Giana on the boat. I always ask the parent first so as not to raise the hopes of the little one if the mother says no. Fortunately for me, the answer was yes.

When you ask a child if they want to do something and her face lights up and she starts jumping up and down with excitement, it is one of the more poignant aspects of being a grandparent. Such was the case with Giana who gave me a big hug and told me that I was her best friend.

Very quickly she went with her mother to change into her bathing suit. In the meantime I got the boat ready. Giana appeared in short order wearing her Jelly sandals and smeared with sun screen.

Off we went, the boat in tow, to the ramp. Not long after we were on the water skimming across the bay toward Assateague. My granddaughter makes a point of sitting in the captain's seat or as she calls it, "my seat." She stands on the seat with her hands resting on the windshield, the air rushing through her blonde hair. Her face is intent as she watches the birds, the boats and the waves.

We pulled close to the beach and anchored. I carried her to shore and she watched as I unloaded the cooler, umbrella and a chair. Once that was done she rushed into the water up to her chest calling for me to join her. I did.

Then I inflated a large donut that in the past we pulled behind the boat for

fun. Now we just use it to float on. Giana quickly climbed onto it and asked that I pull her around. I did.

Eventually we took a walk along the beach. She stepped along the water and from time to time pointed out shells and little fish just below the surface. We strolled for a while before turning back. She wasted no time in getting back on the tube which was now tied to the back of the boat. I sat on the

swim platform eating watermelon chunks and watching her. She had me pull her close so she could snag a piece of watermelon and then had me push her away, or at least as far as the line would take her. This went on for about an hour. It was an enjoyable time.

At one point four ponies walked along the shore, stopping at our site to investigate whether there was anything they could appropriate. There wasn't.

Finally it came time to leave. Although she didn't want to go, she acquiesced when I told her we would take a ride on the bay. This settled, she "helped" me bring up the anchor. Again she positioned herself on the captain's chair and we were off.

There's a tradition on our boat that when we're ready to throttle up we count, "One. Two. Three!" Excitement filled her eyes as she counted, loudly. This time I had her place her hand on the throttle and when we reached "Three," I told her to push down. She was so excited. As she pushed down on the throttle and the engine roared and the bow rose, her eyes grew large. She was giggling and I must admit so was I. We cruised around for about a half hour before turning toward home. It wasn't long after we turned the boat that she started to fall asleep. She accepted my suggestion to lay on one of the bow seats. She put her head down and she was out like a light. It wasn't until after I had gotten the boat on the trailer that I woke her up and placed her in the car.

Our day on the boat is one that will stay with me. It was just the two of us: Giana and Nino. Many memories have been made aboard our boat but this particular one ranks at the top. What a day!

cilities such as the golf club and the Beach Club are not being properly maintained which will lead to higher costs in the future.

"Budgeting is only part of the problem," said Mr. Zawacki who served on the board between 2006 and 2009 holding positions as treasurer, vice president and president. He said that management is a problem at the Yacht Club and that although it was been talked about by General Manager Bob Thompson, he (Mr. Thompson) has not shown a business plan for the facility to the membership or the current board of directors.

Mrs. Ludwig touted the idea of "Ocean Pines Bucks" to stimulate customer traffic to the amenities. She used the example of a member buying \$400 worth of "Bucks" and getting \$500 to use at the various amenities.

Ms. Mohr, who served on the board between 2010 and 2013, stated the amenities must be kept up and should break even or better.

The responses varied on the question of how each of the candidates would rate the performance of the general manager. They were asked to frame their responses from the perspective of a resident not a candidate for the board.

Ms. Jacobs questioned rhetorically how to make such a judgment. Would she base her answer on talking with other residents, attending OPA board meetings, talking with the general manager or by reading the local newspapers? She said the local community newspapers are to blame for the negative coverage of the general manager, saying that it was their way of "selling newspapers." She went on to say that she realized that the local papers were free and relied on paid advertising for their revenue.

Mr. Herrick said the general manager should not overstep his bounds and that the board must set objectives for the general manager. He finally said the general manager could do a lot better.

Mr. Zawacki said that looking from the outside the general manager's performance is unacceptable. But he went on to say that if elected he would talk privately with Mr. Thompson to make a more informed determination. He admitted that he really doesn't know what is "going on behind closed doors."

"He's being micromanaged," believes Mrs. Ludwig who said Mr. Thompson has been the target of criticism because of his salary and bonus compensation package. Mr. Thompson is paid a base salary of \$165,000 plus

bonus opportunities based on the financial performance of certain amenities that could bring his total compensation to over \$200,000.

"Do we hold the general manager accountable if the board changes things," asked Mrs. Ludwig who stated that in her opinion Mr. Thompson's job performance is acceptable.

"I'd hire him in a heartbeat," answered Mrs. Mohr who fully supports the general manager. She related that he is on call twenty-four hours a day, seven days a week. She said that when she was on the board she supported the lucrative compensation package for Mr. Thompson.

Mr. Trendic said the general manager's performance was unacceptable.

Answers to the question about the process the community has endured in finalizing a conversion contract with Sandpiper Energy brought varied responses.

Mr. Herrick said the community wants closure but that he did not expect there would be the extraordinary savings that many expect. This sentiment was echoed by Mr. Zawacki who expressed concern that the savings idea has been "oversold." Mrs. Ludwig said there was "no magic" for the cost to go

down.

Mrs. Mohr said she was glad Mr. Thompson is heading up negotiations and that it has been important that OPA sign a good contract.

The candidates were asked how they would stop the infighting and pettiness that currently exists on the board.

"I know how to work together with diverse people," responded Ms. Jacobs who stressed the importance of not talking disrespectfully about other board members.

Ms. Mohr criticized the negativity in the local papers and said that the board "needs to figure out how to get along in the sandbox."

The board "needs to work together on common goals," said Mr. Trendic. They "need to pay attention to property owners."

Mrs. Ludwig said that if elected she would not have individual interviews with the media and would not talk negatively about fellow board members.

Mr. Zawacki said that he can work with anyone as long as everyone understands that respect is a two way street.

Ballots were expected to be mailed to members in good standing on Monday. Election results will be announced at the annual meeting set for Saturday, August 8.





**Croaker Fishing**

What is a croaker? The Atlantic croaker is one of the most abundant fish in North American coastal waters and is important as a commercial fish as well as a sport fish. Locally they can be caught from fishing piers as well as the surf and by boat in both the Ocean and Coastal Bays. They usually arrive in our waters in early July or as late as August. Just keep up to date with the fishing reports to find out when the action starts. Croaker will not remain in the bays for long. Usually, 2-3 weeks at the most then they will migrate offshore to the shoals.

Croakers are bottom feeders and a close relative of spot and red drum. They are given their name because of the unique sound they make when caught. However, they are fun to catch and good to eat. They make great Fish & Chips. Kids love to catch them because when they are biting it can be non-stop action.

Maryland Regulations: In the state of Maryland croaker must be a minimum of nine inches in length to keep and the limit is 25/per person/per day. I must admit I usually do not keep croaker less than 13 inches as I like to fillet croaker and you need larger fish for a reasonable size fillet. Also keep in mind that in Maryland a 14 inch croaker will get you a citation and a 17 inch croaker will get you a patch.

What type rig should you use? Croakers are one of the easiest fish to catch as they are bottom feeders. The best way to catch them is with a standard two-hook high-low rig with a 2-3 oz. bank sinker. Hook size is important as you need to use a smaller

hook in the size 4-6 range. Usually either a wide gap or (long shank) hook will do the job.

What bait should you use? Expensive bait is not necessary when fishing for croaker. A small piece of squid, shrimp, cut bait such as spot or mullet or a piece of clam will do just fine for these hungry fish but like any other fish if you want a bigger fish put on a bigger piece of bait. If you are also fishing for flounder you can also catch them on frozen shiners and squid combination.

When is the best time to fish? I personally have had my best luck on the early outgoing tide but most fishermen feel you should fish the same tide as you would for flounder. That is the last two hours of the incoming tide and the first two hours of the outgoing tide.

Where is the best place to fish? Any of the local fishing piers, Route 50 Bridge, or surf but if you are surf fishing be certain to comply with local regulations as to when and where you can fish. Behind the Ocean City Convention Center and along the bulkhead from Second to Fourth Streets. Also, check with your local tackle shops as they will give you great advice as to where the bite is best. If fishing by boat, try the area around Harbor Island in 12-15 ft. of water. Also the thoroughfare around the Convention Center and the south bay behind Assateague Island is a great location. Move around and watch for the concentration of boats as this is a good indication someone found a school of croaker.

Enjoy the shore and remember to take a kid fishing,

That's how my garden grows...

Hello Fellow Gardeners,

I hope you all had a happy and safe Fourth of July and are enjoying this beautiful summer weather. I know many of you are harvesting the fruits of your labor in both great vegetables and beautiful flowers. It was all worth it, wasn't it?

Back in early June, while visiting a local garden center, the owner gave me a small tomato plant and asked me to grow it and try it. He indicated it was a new variety of cherry tomato called "Sweet Million." I returned home and planted it in a large container, complete with crushed eggshells and some Epsom salts, and placed it on my rear deck. This spot gets the morning sun until early afternoon. It grew very well and before long there appeared many tiny yellow blossoms. Those many blossoms turned into tiny green tomatoes. On June 26 as I was watering the plant, I discovered many red, ripe, cherry tomatoes. They were sweet and absolutely delicious – all 10 of them but more are coming. I highly recommend this cherry tomato variety for the future.

Some gardening tips for the month of July are as follows:

Plants that are blooming vigorously and are producing lots of flowers or vegetables could benefit from a side dressing of fertilizer at this time.

Continue the summer watering routine, especially on those hot or windy days of summer. Remember, plants that are in containers dry out more quickly than those in the ground. The same is true for those plants in hanging baskets. They may need to be watered almost every day.

Do you get tired of dead-heading all those spent blossoms? Jot down the names of these annuals for next year that do not require dead-heading: narrow leaf zinnias, wax begonias which come in many different colors, impatiens, ageratum, pentas, New Guinea Impatiens and spider flower. Ageratum may tend to brown out in high heat but will revive in the cool, moist weather of early fall. Continue to water this plant but don't fertilize.

For you tomato growers, if you did

not use tomato cages to help protect your hardy plants, you can use sturdy wooden stakes. Just be careful when you drive the stake in the ground or container that you don't damage the roots. Once the stake is in place, you can use strips of cut up panty hose or strips of an old sheet to tie and secure the plant to the stake. You will be glad you did this on a very windy day.

Going on vacation and concerned about your outdoor container plantings? First, arrange for someone to water the container plantings. Try grouping the containers in a semi-shaded spot and provide each plant with a large saucer.

Groom and prune back spring flowering shrubs and hedges. Toward the middle of July, take a half inch off leggy shoots of older azalea shoots. Do not prune new growth on azaleas as that is where next year's flowers will be.

Along with hot weather comes those cussed Japanese Beetles. In the

cool of the morning, knock the beetles off into a jar of sudsy water. Do not install those pheromone traps that attract beetles from everywhere as they will leave your neighbor and live in your yard.

Shrubs which do well at the shore and tolerate salt spray, sandy situations and require well-drained soil found at the shore and inland (as well)

are the following:

Adam's Needle – big, dramatic, evergreen rosette of sword-like leaves that sends up six foot flower spikes

Bayberry – For zone six and north. A beautiful big shrub with gray-green, semi-evergreen leaves that are aromatic when crushed.

Beach Plum – A round bush that

bears clusters of white blooms followed by purplish fruit.

Hydrangea - There are many species and varieties. These are deciduous shrubs with huge flower heads, blooming in midsummer to late fall.

Inkberry - Black-berried, usually evergreen shrub grows to three feet high.

Japanese Rose (Rugosa Rose) A tall, rugged bush that bears handsome roses and brilliant fruit.

Juniper - Creeping Juniper and Shore Juniper spreading gray-green evergreen foliage and blue berries.

Lavender cotton - Gray-leaved evergreen

shrubs with aromatic leaves and inconspicuous flowers.

Scotch Broom - The arching stems bear pea-like flowers in spring and summer.

Vicary Golden Privet - A small-leaved evergreen for tall hedges.

Tamarisk, Salt Cedar - For zone seven (our zone) and north. Tall shrubs with delicate leaves and feathery clusters of flowers in late summer.
