On Thursday, September 13, community leaders, the local healthcare community and area athletes joined together to tour a new service line at South Central Regional Medical Center.

South Central Sports Medicine launched a comprehensive athletic program, Sports Performance+, in the spring of 2018. By participating in this program, athletes are able to improve their skills, learn techniques for preventing injury and ultimately reach their optimal athletic performance.

Dereck "Spike" Richards, program coordinator, explains the program. "By participating in our Sports Performance+ program, athletes are able to maximize their potential on the field. It is 360 degrees of care for athletes. We train each participant in mobility, strength, speed and agility. Each sport has its own specific need, so every athlete has a workout tailored to their skill level."

By participating in the Sports Performance+ program, members are able to receive full benefits of the South Central Wellness Center. Within the Wellness Center, there are many services available for members.

These include: specialty exercises, personal training, health assessments, aerobics and water aerobics classes, child care, locker rooms with complementary towels and more. The Wellness Center is open seven days a week.

"We have seen many new and exciting things occurring in our Sports Medicine program," states Dr. Burgess. "From entry level athletes to those who are working on specific skill sets, our program is tailored to improve performance and safety.

Jones County to participate in ACT Work Ready Community Certification Initiative

The Economic Development Authority of Jones County (EDA) and Jones County Junior College (JCJC) met with business and industry leaders on Tuesday, September 11, 2018 to announce Jones County's participation in the ACT Work Ready Community Certification initiative. After being accepted into the program in October of last year Sandy Holifield of EDA and Greg Butler of JCJC attended four required academies receiving the instruction necessary as part of the certification process.

ACT Work Ready Community (WRC) initiative is a globally recognized certification used by site selectors and those seeking a location for their company to open a new location or expand current facilities. A WRC demonstrates that we have a workforce that is avail-



able, qualified, trainable and ready to go to work. By participating in the WRC initiative, counties can both identify skill gaps and quantify the skill level of their workforce. This helps educators build career pathways aligned to the needs of business and industry. It also helps a

community stand out and be recognized for its workforce development efforts. A strong workforce is a tremendous economic development advantage. The goal is to ensure employee skills match employer needs while helping local educators prepare students for success in the workforce.

The foundation of a community's certification is based on individuals at the county level across the current, transitioning and emerging workforce earning an ACT WorkKeys National Career Readiness Certificate (NCRC) and employers recognizing the ACT WorkKeys NCRC. The ACT WorkKeys NCRC is a portable, industry-recognized credential that clearly identifies an individual's WorkKeys skills in workplace documents, applied math and graphic literacy. ACT has identified the current workforce as those currently employed. The transitioning workforce is identified as those currently unemployed, GED or adult education participants, and/or the current or recent active-duty military. The emerging workforce is identified as high school juniors, seniors, college students or recent graduates.

Benefits from CWRC certification include: Workers better understand what skills are required by employers and how to prepare themselves for success. Businesses can more effectively communicate their workforce needs to area education and workforce training programs. Educators have better tools for closing any skill gaps by establishing career pathways for students with stackable industry-recognized credentials.

The Story Teller: Oh, I want to go there

We were sitting in our circle as we did every morning to



have a devotion to start our day. The children with me were fiveyear-olds, and I, of course, was their teach-

er. Several of them were actually a bit wiser than I at times.

When we said the Lord's prayer together, I heard the little guy beside me pray, "Give us this day our daily breath," and I couldn't help but snicker. I remember thinking, "Yes, Lord, we do need that too."

And then I proceeded to discuss with them our morning's lesson. It was about Heaven and what is must be like to be there. I don't remember just what was said or what details we talked about other than how wonderful a place it is. But whatever we did discuss must have been exciting because another little guy spoke out and happily said, "Oh, I want to go there! I want to die so I can go there!"

I then quickly explained that "Yes, we all want to go there, but I don't think God is ready for you to come just yet! He sent you here to do some things for Him, and you haven't finished doing your jobs yet."

Again, I don't remember just what else I told him and the others, but I do remember going to the phone when later that morning that bunch was taken out to the playground. I called his Mama and told her what had been said and that if he came home telling her that he wanted to die, that this was why he might say such.

We both had a sweet laugh and were grateful that the little fellow was looking forward to knowing Jesus better. And I'm here to tell you that these little fellows can understand much more than we sometimes realize that they can!

Mother used to say, "Only the good die young." Now she had her tongue in her cheek when she said that, and I know a lot of 'good' folks who've grown quite old, but I've also known several quite young ones who've gone home, what I might call, too soon.

And then I'm reminded of what God said to Job. That fellow was reminded that God had never asked his advice when creating or when making His decisions and that He knew exactly what He was doing.

So, again, who am I to say or ever dispute what my Father does now? I know it's okay to wonder and even to question what I can't understand, but what's vital is that I trust Him. He does have His own plan, and He will fulfill His plan in His own way and in His own time. I know this, and I cannot forget to do so, regardless of how I might feel about it.

When Christ said, "Suffer the little children to come unto me," He wasn't just talking about when He was there with them on the hillside in Galilee. He meant that those children then and ours here now are very precious to Him, and He enjoyed having them near and wanted them close to Him. He also wanted them to know and feel that He loved them dearly and that they were important to Him.

I wonder often at His choice

of words, and I know that a lot of meaning is affected by translation, but I'm looking now at the word 'suffer'. I know He doesn't want us to do that, but, yes, we do that when one of ours leaves us so soon to go to Him. And then I'm reminded of what my five-year-olds learned that day and how happy they were to understand the wonders of Heaven and being with Him. But as I told the little one, He sent us each with a job to do,

and we won't be going home until we've done it. Some jobs take a long time to accomplish, and some take much less, but it's up to the Master to decide how much we need. Our part is to do our best at whatever it is and to love, respect and trust Him throughout that time.

It was hard on so many of us recently when He called one of his babies home. Those close to her have suffered. But, as the song says, I can only imagine the reunion they experienced when they reached out for each other. I can almost hear the giggle and see the grins on the faces and the sparkles in the eyes as their arms enfolded each other! I can see the angel who escorted that little one, as he put her down to let her run the last few yards to her Jesus. He must have been standing near watching and enjoying that sweet reunion as he remembered the kisses she had placed on his cheek on their way from here.

You do know that he was right there right as she left us, and he lifted her into his arms and carried her there. Oh, what must she have seen, and enjoyed on that short journey. Traveling with him was to her better than any imaginary ride on a unicorn's back or even what Lucy must have experienced when on Asland's back flying over Narnia!

And please don't forget, as hard as it is for us now, that she'll be watching and waiting to run our way soon. She'll see us coming, and when our angels set us down, she'll grab our hands and lead us to Him.

She understood much about going home. She had asked her questions and had gotten some good answers. She had had her job to do, and she had done it, and done it well, when He said it was time and sent the angel for her. So, look forward to your day and to Him and remember that now she knows enough to show us all around!

Eula Bass Lewis Art Gallery hosting artwork exhibit through September 24

A collection of various types of art created by members of the Jones College Art department will be on display until September 24 in the Eula Bass Lewis Art Gallery on the Ellisville campus.

For JCJC ceramics instructor Melanie Eubanks pottery is always her current project. In fact, Eubanks creates artwork that can be used daily like plates and cups. Most of her works are stoneware and are often decorated with whimsical imagery and patterns through a unique process.

"My plates and bowls are stoneware fired in an electric kiln. I decorated some of the plates with contrasting colors of clay and carving called sgraffito," said Eubanks. "My work is an ongoing exploration of form and firing technique. In other words, learning and creating is continuous."

While Eubanks creates practical items that can be used, JC computer design instructor Mark Brown utilizes what most call junk. His unique collection of mixed media work uses ordinary items he finds in his travels to create new objects. Some of the items in his current exhibition on display takes those found objects to form heads, stuffed with stuff.

"Technically, my sculpture draws upon gestural and figurative approaches. I use found objects based on characteristics such as texture, and color, and how they will contribute to the overall composition of the finished work. I take

advantage of the aesthetic attributes to achieve a desired effect. Because I choose to assemble such a wide range of materials, the process of art-making has become as important as the finished object itself. It is my intention that the viewer becomes aware of this process through the investigation of the layers," Brown shared.

Showing her painting skills is JC painting and drawing instructor Paula McNair Pierce. She selected a group of work to display that is primarily colorful abstracts on a variety of surfaces. Some are displayed individually, and some as a

"I hope people will enjoy the fact that my work is light, happy, and not bogged down with a lot of symbolism or hidden meaning," said McNair Pierce.

All of the artists said it is important for their students to see their work for a lot of different reasons, including offering the opportunity to validate the art profession which adds credibility to the art department and the industry, as well as showing students how to prepare for a

Second half surge carries! **Bulldogs over NEJ Tigers**

Friday night's contest against Northeast Jones was one that Bay Springs head coach Dan Brady and his team wanted after suffering a close loss to the Tigers last season. The Bulldogs got the job done at home, whipping the Tigers 34-17.

Northeast received dose after dose of a Bay Springs rushing trio - Jamarius Hosey, Anson Windham, and Dallen Jones – after going into the half knotted at 14 until thev could take no more. Brady was pleased with most aspects of his team's effort on the field, but letting Northeast creep back into the game, after Bay Springs went up 14-0 early in the first quarter, was something he said his team has to

"When you go down and score really quick like we did, it's just human nature to take your foot off the gas a little bit. We got really lax," he said. "Coming out of halftime, they understood the things they were doing, and we made some corrections as a coaching staff on both sides of the ball. The second half was on them. We told them what we expected and what is supposed to happen when you have a senior-laden team. They are supposed to come out in the second half, fix mistakes from the first half, and they got the iob done."

Bay Springs popped Northeast quickly with two touchdowns in the first quarter. On the opening drive of the game. the Bulldogs capped a 68-yard drive when guarterback Adrian Cole connected with Jacorrio Ducksworth on a 25-yard touchdown pass. Ducksworth hit the extra point, and the Bulldogs led 7-0 with 7:49 left in the first quarter. The Bay Springs defense forced Northeast to punt on its opening possession, and the Bulldogs went right back to work and picked up another touchdown. Windham and Hosey led the Bulldogs down field, and Windham polished off the drive with a 6-yard touchdown run with 3:18 left in the first.

Northeast, later in the first half, found some avenues to run, and quarterback Mason Smith put the first points of the night for the Tigers on the scoreboard with a 37-yard run to cut the lead to 14-7.

The Bay Springs offense couldn't sustain a good drive on the next possession, and Northeast took advantage when Smith hit Jay Jones on a 12-yard strike to even the score 14-14 at the half.

The Bulldogs, looking more crisp offensively at the beginning of the second half after a Northeast turnover, drove 69 yards in only a matter of minutes. Jamarius Hosey finished the drive with a 31-yard run, dragging Tigers most of the way, to cushion the Bulldogs' lead 20-14.

Jacorrio Ducksworth showed

up again a few minutes later after the Bay Springs defense stalled a Northeast drive and forced a punt. Ducksworth made a few moves, broke several tackles, and returned the punt 85-yards for his second touchdown of the night to give the Bulldogs some real breathing room, 28-14, after a successful two-point conversion.

Northeast managed a late score when Jason Garcia pumped a 27-yard field goal through, but that was as close as the Tigers could get.

Later in the fourth quarter, Bay Springs put the game out of reach when Dallen Jones capped a 44-yard drive with a 6-yard touchdown run.

The Bulldogs finished with 304 total yards against Northeast, with 234 on the ground. Windham carried for 125 yards, and Hosey finished with 81 yards on the ground. Cole was 4-of-8 through the air for 70 yards. Ducksworth caught 3 com passes worth 64 yards.

Northeast was limited to 248 yards. Petyon Pickens (8 solo tackles/sack) and Fred Barnes (7 solo tackles/sack) led the Bay Springs defensive

WA Jaguars hold on to hand Sylva Bay its first loss of season

Wayne Academy head coach Todd Mangum felt his team finally – and completely – bought in.

Friday night on the MHSAA field Mangum once coached on for six years at Wayne County, the buy-in manifested itself in the form of a win against previously unbeaten Sylva Bay Academy. The Jaguars held on late to defeat the Saints, 14-12, in game one of the 2018 Timber Bowl.

"See what happens when you guys buy in," Mangum told his team at midfield after the

Wayne County, who hosted the two-game event for the second year in a row after a 40-year hiatus, defeated Moss Point, 37-19, in second and final game.

For Wayne Academy, the Jaguars improved to 3-2. Sylva-Bay Academy falls to 4-1.

First-half stalemate

Neither team put up points in the first half. Promising drives were snuffed out by turnovers and missed opportunities. Sylva Bay missed out on a scoring chance two possessions into the game. Its 40-yard field goal attempt fell incredibly short.

After a big pass play from Saints' quarterback Phillip Anderson to B.J. Magee-Black midway through the second quarter, Colton Coxwell intercepted Anderson at Sylva-Bay's 22-yard line for Wayne Academy and returned it to the Saints' 46-yard line.

Coxwell tacked on two big runs on offense before Wayne Academy gave possession back over to Sylva-Bay on a fumble at the Saints 18-yard line.

The first half stalemate featured four turnovers and six punts.

Quick start to the second half

Wayne Academy ended the stalemate with two scores on back to back drives in the second half. Coxwell broke off a 57-yard touchdown run just over a minute into the third quarter.

A two-point conversion attempt failed. The next Jaguar drive also produced points. Quarterback Jacob Castle found the end zone from 41 yards out on a keeper to the left side of the Saints' defense. Coxwell reached the end zone untouched on the two-point conversion to give the Jaguars a 14-0 lead with 7:04 left in the

third quarter.

Sylva-Bay did answer with two touchdowns late in the third stanza, a 33-yard TD pass from Phillip to Magee-Black and a 50-yard fumble recovery and return for a touchdown by No. 50, Keagan Tumblin, put the Saints within reach. A bad snap on the PAT attempt and a failed two-point conversion kept Wayne Academy out in front, 14-12.

Last quarter defensive stands

Opportunities for Sylva-Bay to take the lead – and eventually win the game – were thawed by Wayne Academy's defense late in the final quarter.

Following a big punt return by Anderson to the Jaguars 17-yard line, Wayne Academy took advantage of a Saints' holding penalty and a big sack by its defense to force Sylva-Bay out of the red zone to the 28-yard line. The Jaguars broke up two pass attempts on third and fourth down to create a turnover on downs as just over two minutes remained on the

Wayne Academy gave the ball back to Sylva-Bay moments later on a lost fumble – its fourth of the night. After several shots at or near the end zone, the Jaguars defense forced a long field goal try by the Saints in the final minute. It fell extremely short.

Mangum said the win was huge for his program.

"We played against a good football team," Mangum said following the win. "Coach [Terry] Underwood has a solid football team and for us to knock off an undefeated football team is big for us."

For the first time, the two-year institution is offering a Career Certificate, Technical Certificate, and/or an Associate of Applied Science degree in Electro-Mechanical Technology. Upon completion of that program, students can also apply for an Advanced Certificate in Mechatronics Technology as an option for a third year in the Mechatronics program. Currently, the college conducts non-credit mechatronics and robotics courses through its Workforce College at the Advanced Technology Center in Ellisville.

"It is incredible technology we're teaching here at Jones College," said Dr. Jesse Smith, Jones College President. "It is so innovative and cutting edge. This is what our business, industry and manufacturers need."

"Our advanced technology manufacturing sector has requested this, and we are trying to ensure our students are 'work-ready' when they leave. These training labs give them skills to be multi-faceted, leaving here with multiple certifications," said Jennifer Griffith, Dean of Workforce College at Jones College.

Jones College's labs incorporate virtual reality training to prepare students for their jobs in a safe work environment. Additionally, electro-mechanical technology instructor, Greg Griffith emphasized his graduates are fine-tuning their critical thinking and problem-solving skills while they are using all forms of technology.

"I tell my students they have to love thinking through things, troubleshooting. That's the mindset we're trying to create. We also teach them the old and new systems. We have computers that run systems and we teach them the programming for that. The virtual reality training we offer gives students experience on a simulated system, keeping them safe while also keeping the system from being damaged. Ultimately, the virtual reality simulator helps prevent a costly shut down of a system," said Greg Griffith.

Successful students can work in the advanced manufacturing sector, offshore and anywhere there are systems using automation and robotics. Hattiesburg's Travis Marshall already has a degree in drafting and design from Jones College but he said this additional training could really change his future, allowing him to go anywhere he wants with more

"I think the virtual reality system is an incredible training tool. This is my first semester and I'm already addicted to it. It's a lot of fun and I can't wait to get out of the labs and into the field," said Marshall. "I want to work at Howard Industries or other companies around here or with oil companies in Texas or elsewhere."

Marshall and his graduating class will leave Jones College with nationally recognized credentials and will be competent in electrical theory, motor controls, programmable logic controllers, hydraulics, pneumatics and industrial maintenance. The students who complete the third year, Mecha-
