

The first step to seeking a new job is to update your résumé

When professionals are ready to take a new step in their careers, it's wise to revisit their old résumés and see what can be done to update them for the current day and age. This is especially true for people who may have been out of the job-seeking arena for



rules for finding a new job are continually evolving, and résumés remain a big component of that process. The following are some current résumé trends that will help professionals stand out from the masses.

Work Enjoyable

CONSIDER DESIGN

Design your résumé so it will look good whether it's viewed on a screen or a mobile phone or printed on paper. Classic serif style fonts can make a résumé seem dated, so select modern fonts that are crisp. The idea is for the résumé to look balanced and clear, without being overdone with modifications, like italics and bold lettering. However, a spot of color could provide much-needed atten-

BE BRIEF YET EFFECTIVE

A concise design is key. Many recruiters

spend little to no time reviewing the hordes of résumés they receive. In fact, automated résumé bots may initially screen the documents to thin the crowd. According to data from the 12th annual Mystery Job Candidate survey by CareerXRoads, the average recruiter spends six seconds looking at a résumé. If a résumé is lengthy or doesn't attract atten-

tion, it will likely be ignored. Stick to a single-page and make sure wording is brief but

KEEP JUICY DETAILS UP TOP

Format the résumé so the most pertinent information is within the top one-third of the document. Beef up a summary statement and use it in lieu of an objective. Make sure that summary includes keywords that promote your skills and experience to potentially lure the recruiter into reading more.

TWEAK JOB TITLES

Mimic phrasing from the job listing to beat the bots and get résumés flagged for

Slightly change job position titles so they mirror the wording used. For example, if a recruiter is looking for a "financial account manager," and you have the experience, list your title as something like "Senior manager of new financial accounts."

WHO YOU KNOW

Landing a new job is often about what you know, but getting a foot in the door is also largely influenced by who you know. Include any professional groups to which you belong or alumni associations. Who knows? The recruiter may have the same alma mater, and you can bond over your shared mascot.

Keywords, phrasing, formatting, and having the right skills for the job can ensure a résume is seen by a recruiter, and perhaps even lead to a new career.

This week, I decided to step away from clothes to talk about something just as important - makeup. Makeup is a part of most women's lives. Along with clothes, it shapes how we present ourselves to the world.

While I wear a decent amount of makeup, I would not call myself an expert, but I know the basics and have used a lot of different brands, thanks to Ipsy.

Ipsy is a monthly makeup subscription. For \$10, you get a makeup bag and five samples ranging from mini to full-size. It is a great way to test brands without paying top dollar. I have tried a LOT of products and thought I would share my favorites. They won't all fit in one column, so this will be part one of two to be continued next week...

Moisturizer: For years, I used Oil of Olay as my daily moisturizer. But then I found the holy grail of skincare -Tarte Maracuja Oil. I was hesitant to put oil on my face, but it absorbs immediately. If you are unfamiliar with maracuja oil, it is the ultimate skincare powerhouse. It balances your skin and is and packed with vitamin C and fatty acids to help boost radiance. It gives you firmer, brighter and smoother

The 1.7 oz bottle will cost you \$48, but you only use 2-3 drops at a time. I bought a bottle in November and didn't have to replace it until May. When you think of it that way, you're only spending \$8 a month. Trust me when I say it is worth every penny.

Foundation: I used to buy Maybelline Fit Me Matte + Poreless foundation. The humidity down here makes me

shine, so I always look for a matte finish. While I liked the Fit Me formula, it didn't stay put, especially on really hot, sweaty days, so, I switched to Maybelline's SuperStay formula, and it lives up to its name. Last weekend, I spent an entire day in Starkville in 90 degree heat. I put my makeup on at 8:00 in the morning. At 10:00 that night, it hadn't budged. It is, in fact, so "super" in its staying power, that my regular cleanser doesn't get it all off. I bought an addon to my nightly cleansing routine - a bottle of Garnier Micellar Cleansing Water. After I wash my face, I swipe a cotton ball soaked in the micellar water over my face and it removes the lingering foundation.

Eyeliner: Ciaté London Fierce Flicks liquid eyeliner is the best eveliner have ever used. It has a felt tip, so it is precise while also being flexible enough create to a perfectly winged eye. Plus, it doesn't

smudge, and is vegan and cruelty-free.

Eyeshadow: I am an eyeshadow junkie. I have so many palettes and individual colors. During my last trip to Ulta, I discovered a brand called Makeup Revolution. The most expensive palette is \$20 and has 30 colors. The smaller, 16-color palettes are only \$6 and are perfect dupes for the Urban Decay Naked collec-

The colors are highly pigmented and have great staying power. In my opinion, it is the best cheap eyeshadow palette out there.

Mascara: I was a drugstore mascara user, usually Maybelline, but then I got a sample of Benefit Cosmetics BADgal

BANG mascara. It is awesome. I used to curl my eyelashes every morning, but with this mascara, I am able to eliminate that step from my morning routine. It is lightweight, smudge-proof and volumizing. The \$25 price tag is a little high, but worth it. If that prices turns you off, try Maybelline Volum' Express Falsies mascara. I haven't been able to bring myself to splurge on the Benefit mascara yet, so I use this Maybelline brand as a back up. It is great mascara for the price.

Lipstick: I drank the Kool-Aid, y'all. I swore I would never use Lipsense. No part of me could fathom spending \$50 on lipstick, but a friend convinced me to try it. I am hooked. It really does stay



on all day with no feathering and no bleeding, and it is not as drying as I thought. My friends who sell Lipsense won't appreciate this, but I do suggest skipping the remover. I have found that my Garnier Micellar Water takes it off perfectly, and is only \$7 com-

pared to the \$20 remover. I have so many other products to recommend. Tune in next week for the rest of my suggestions. For now, give the maracuja oil a shot. It will change your life.

and then one of the children or maybe one of theirs will haul them off, splinters and all, and rock on some other porch until they fall apart. But if these old chairs could talk, they'd tell much of what our life was all

It was on the way to the mountains that we first passed that store. Its porch was full of rockers, and its parking lot just as full of cars. We were hungry, but neither of us cared to wait in line, and off we went to find a quicker dinner. And then we passed another and another, just as inviting and yet just as busy too. But curiosity will kill a cat just as sure as satisfaction will bring it back, so finally after miles of wandering and wondering, we stopped to see if the food really was good enough to draw such crowds.

We gave the girl our name and went to wait out on the porch for her to find our table. It was when we sat that we knew why we'd really come. It had been the rockers all along that we had stopped to see. Oh, how smooth they were, with rhythm right in sink, and we, the weary travelers, had rather rock than eat. And we did. We got a seat by a window and watched how so many like ourselves sat and waited for a place inside.

Having been that way before, we had known to take the pickup. Folks shouldn't go to the mountains without a way to carry home found treasures, and we'd been before and had to leave behind what we couldn't pack for home. So, as we sat there, sharing greens and cornbread, we agreed that two rockers would fit nicely around our luggage. And so we brought two home.

These old chairs have lasted longer now than the truck we brought them home in, and it looks as if they'll outlast the two of us. He's gone home already, and I'm not far behind, but while I'm here. I'll rock and sip my coffee and remember what they've seen.

It was in these chairs that we rocked our babies, shelled our peas and watched the sun slip behind the trees across the pasture. It was here that we studied our lessons so they'd make sense on Sunday morning. From these rockers we

spotted the deer in the edge of the pines, laughed at the pecking order of chickens and marveled at a squirrel's ability to fly. We watched when neighbors had a visitor and when others came and went. It was in his chair here that he rocked an orphaned lamb to sleep after giving it a bottle, and it was from his rocker that he watched the school bus pass and laughed because he was no longer on it.

Mine has sat closer to the back door so I could hear and catch the phone. His sat near the porch edge so he could spit tobacco and throw peanut hulls across the yard . . . and sometimes they sat closer so we could whisper what children ought not hear.

The pavers on the porch aren't as level as they could be, and sometimes the chairs move and crawl as they rock. But they've been faithful, and they've lasted, and they probably know too much.

So, I guess that it's a good thing that they'll keep their slats together, and that it's shoes that have the wagging tongues. Our rockers won't be telling what they've seen or sharing what they'd heard. But as often as I can make it, as soon as the weather cools. I'll come out to my rocker and pull his to its side. I'll put my hand on the arm of his and make them rock in sink and think about our morning coffee and laugh out loud when the school bus doesn't stop!



The big powerhouse high schools wasted no time in demonstrating they are on the road to the championship again with dominating performances and big scores. Proving they can repeat as champions, the Wayne County War Eagles seized the Heidelberg High School Oilers and didn't relent with a commanding 77-20 win. As two of the teams in the Engineering Division, Wayne County set the pace in the points column taking the lead in the division. Last year, the Oak Grove Warriors lost in the championship round to the War Eagles, so expect the two foes to tangle all season. In their match this week, the Warriors slayed the Quitman Panthers, 70-26, giving Oak Grove the second place spot in the division; Quitman ended up in third place.

Returning Wayne County Math Coach Ashley Phillips was part of the 2008 and 2011 Wayne County Math Bowl Championship teams. While he's not new to the "competitive spirit" at Wayne County, he is new to the Bobcat Math League format

"I understand after the first week how the Math League requires our students to earn their position in the finals, just as a football team would earn a spot in the playoffs," said Phillips. "I am proud of the outcome of our first match and I am proud of all fifteen members that we have representing our school this year. I feel that we will be very competitive this season and have a great shot at being champions again because that is the goal that we have set for the team."

Surprises within the Science Division between perennial contenders Northeast Jones, Presbyterian Christian and West Jones High Schools allowed the Mustangs to land on top as Division leaders. The Mustangs trotted their way to the lead over the Raleigh Lions with a convincing,

44-29 win. The match between the Bobcats of Presbyterian Christian and the Tigers at Northeast Jones ended in a 40-40 tie. In the final playoffs in 2017, PCS managed to knock off West Jones to capture the overall third place winners spot, leaving the Mustangs in fourth place. Anticipate a fierce fight in the Science Division over the next five weeks with three top teams each planning to be in the playoffs. With 13 teams participating this season, division rankings are likely to change often with at least one team being "forced" to take a bye each week. Laurel High School had this week off and West Jones has the bye in week two. These variables have West Jones Math Coach Courtney Hagan concerned.

"I am nervous about our team this year because most of my students are new to the team. I have three returning players. I am hopeful we will do pretty well since we only have four matches this year, but I know there is a learning curve for the students when it comes to the advanced STEM questions. I definitely miss the

days of just math questions, but sometimes those STEM questions are the ones that help our score. Overall, I am excited to have some younger students that I can rebuild a team with for the next couple of years," said Hagan.

In the Technology Division, it is not surprising that Sacred Heart dominated competition and is starting the season as division leaders. Fighting on home turf, the Sacred Heart Crusaders cruised to victory over the Wayne Academy Jaguars, 77-30. Columbia Academy's Cougars trounced on the Perry Central Bulldogs, 45-5, taking the second place rank in the division with the clear win. Expect the Crusaders to prove they deserved more after going home in the 2017 playoffs in fifth place tied with Quitman.

A three-way tie exists among the top students who accurately answered the most questions. The top Most Outstanding Players with a 70 percent accuracy

rate are Matthew Morgan of Presbyterian Christian, Warren Parker of Columbia Academy and Benjamin Dunn of Sacred Heart. Seven "mathletes" tied for fourth place in the individual competition with students scoring a 60 percent accuracy average.

Next week, expect a battle to secure division rankings with Northeast Jones hosting Laurel High School, and Presbyterian Christian enters the lion's den as they face Raleigh at Jones College. Perry Central hosts division leaders Sacred Heart and the two academies face off with the match between Columbia Academy and Wayne Academy taking place at Jones College. The Quitman Panthers will host its division leader, the Wayne County War Eagles, and Heidelberg hosts the Warriors of Oak Grove.

Weeks of heartbreak and adversity only strengthens the game Arrington loves

Raven Arrington reached both hands up helmet high and pulled in a pass from teammate and quarterback Ty Keyes. The slant route Arrington ran before his reach-and-grab near midfield Friday night in Week 5 provided a clear shot to the end zone. Like a thoroughbred finishing its final stretch at the Belmont Stakes, the Taylorsville wide receiver turned on the gas and outran the Columbia defenders to his left and right.

The second Tartars touchdown and first of the night for Arrington is one he will likely reminder for a long time. Before he could reach the sideline on the opposite side of the field, his younger brother Maurice "Reece," a team manager, was the first to meet him on the field in celebration.

"You did it," Maurice shouted three times in a row recalled Arrington.

It was something to celebrate, in a series of week's that had little to celebrate. Following Taylorsville's previous Friday night game, Arrington's father Ike Mikell passed away due to a massive heart attack. Arrington was in the room with his father when it happened. Mikell's unexpected passing wasn't the only one Arrington, and his family has endured as of recent. Just 10 days prior, Arrington's older brother Isaac Herring passed away due to liver failure.

"It's been hard on me," admitted Arrington. "Losing my older brother, and then turning around and losing my father, its

something many people couldn't deal with." Football has helped Arrington cope.

"I just come to the football field and get my mind off everything," said Arrington. "It comes to my mind now and then, but its life and that is going to happen. I have to get through it."

In each of the games that followed the passing of Arrington's immediate family members, the Mississippi Gulf Coast commit racked up over a 100-yards receiving

and two touchdowns. He added a second touchdown last Friday night vs. Columbia and ensured a Tartars' win in the battle of unbeatens. Arrington finished with 102 yards on three catches.

On Aug. 31 vs. Mize - three days after the passing of his older brother Issac - Arrington had the biggest night of his career, catching five passes for 161 yards and two scores.

"All this just shows what kind of kid he is; it's his character," said Taylorsville head coach Mitch Evans. "He has want to and grit in him. Just for him to come out on the field and perform at all is just a testament to what

kind of kid he is.

"Its just Raven being Raven. I know its clique, but he comes to work every day and doesn't say a word. He does his job, and he talks by the way he plays on the field."

Small town Taylorsville is like one big family. When one hurts, they all hurt. When one rejoices, they all rejoice.

"In Taylorsville, we're all family," said Arrington. "It doesn't matter what color you are, what race you are, we're all family. With everything me and my brothers have gone through, the school, the team and all the surrounding people have been with us every step of the way. It's a blessing to have these people around us. We are one unit."

Ty Keyes has been a huge part of Arrington's success on the field and vice-versa. The 5'9 receiver is Keyes No. 1 target on the field. Arrington leads the team in catches with 20 for 513 yards and seven touchdowns, averaging 25.7 yards per catch and 102.6 yards per game. All of which are team highs. Keyes says the two are brothers.

"He's my brother," said Keyes. "I'm going to make sure he stays up. We had that good bond. I can trust him out on the field."

Keyes lost a handful of key receivers from last years' 2A championship team. Arrington makes up for that this year says the state's leading passer.

"Raven means a lot to this team," Keyes notes. "He's one of our true leaders. I respect him for that. Everyone talks about the receivers we lost last year, but Raven stepped up to the plate and delivers."
