# "Beau-frog: The Art of Peter Archambault" opens at Museum L-A

A new gallery exhibit opening at Museum L-A explores the Franco-American experience through the medium of cartoons. "Beau-frog: The Art of Peter Archambault" displays the artwork and political cartoons of a Madawaska native whose artwork for Le F.A.R.O.G. Forum, a monthly publication of the University of Maine at Orono that explores Franco-American themes, provided rich political and social commentary on Franco-American culture in Maine and New England.

An opening reception for the exhibit will take place on Monday, October 3 at 5:30 p.m. Susan Pinette, Director of Franco American Programs at the University of Maine, will discuss Archambault's life and art on Wednesday, November 14, at 6:30 p.m. Both events are free and open to the public and will take place in the Museum L-A gallery.

The history of Franco-American communities in the 1970s and '80s has yet to be written. Archambault created a character called

"Beau-frog" to reclaim the common slur often directed toward francophone and French heritage people during this era. The daily exploits of the frog illustrate the trials and tribulations of a minority figure coming to terms with their personal and cultural identity while surrounded by the pressures of an Anglophone majority, a theme that also speaks to the experiences of people in Lewiston-Auburn, a community deeply affected by French Canadian immigration since the 1850s. The

exhibit was created in partnership with the Holocaust and Human Rights Center of Maine and the UMaine Franco American Programs.

"This exhibit comes to our gallery at a very appropriate time, since Museum L-A is dedicating Fall 2018 to talking about immigration at the local and national level through the Becoming American program," said Director of Education and Outreach Kate Webber. Becoming American is a public program series that features films, discussions, and other events across the Twin Cities through the collaboration of over 20 community partners. Museum L-A was selected as one of 32 sites across the country to host the series. For more information, see www.museumla.org.

# Governor's Address: Smart investments in marine terminal have opened new markets to Maine companies

Dear Maine Taxpayer, A decade ago, the International Marine Terminal in Portland was nothing more than a derelict ferry dock in an overgrown, empty lot. Yet, in the 1800s, that same lot was booming with hundreds of ships and trains. We have brought this port back to life.

When I became Governor, Maine DOT Commissioner Dave Bernhardt laid out an ambitious vision for the IMT. Our administration secured investments that would transform the IMT back into a bustling, multi-modal freight facility.

By 2013, federal, state and private invest-

ments in the port led to Eimskip's decision to make Maine its North American headquarters, positioning our state for a new era in the global shipping industry.

The new International Marine Terminal has opened countless new trade and economic development opportunities in the Arctic and the North Atlantic for Maine businesses.

Business through the port has increased steadily over the last five years. This business growth prompted Eimskip to increase ship calls to Maine by more than 40 percent.

This shipping connection has led to even more innovation: the Maine Beer Box. The Beer Box is a re-

frigerated shipping container that highlights our craft beer industry. It has 78 beer taps and a fully contained draft system made by two Maine companies.

This idea started right here in Maine, between the

Maine Brewers' Guild and Eimskip. The Beer Box is filled with craft beer from our brewers and sent to another country to market them. The Beer Box is then filled with beer from that country and sent back here, where it is shared with craft beer lovers.

This is part goodwill trade mission, part economic development, and part marketing of Maine as a top craft beer destination in the United States.

In 2017, the Maine Brewers' Guild joined forces with Eimskip to take Maine's craft beers to Iceland. This first exchange provided our brewers the opportunity to explore new markets, collaborate with fellow brewers, and establish relationships overseas.

Last week, the Beer Box participated in the 2018 Global Brewers' Trade event at Leeds International Beer Festival in the United Kingdom with beer from more than 60 of Maine's breweries

The festival is one of the highlights of our UK and Ireland trade mission this month, where we are developing new markets for our lobster, forest products, and other industries - all made possible in part by our new shipping capacity.

For decades, businesses looked at Maine as too far from markets in terms of miles. But investments in our shipping infrastructure

have reduced the cost for Maine businesses to reach those markets.

This has opened new opportunities for Maine businesses, like our brewers. It can cost the same or less to ship beer to another country than it can to travel by truck to Florida.

Maine businesses now have access to North Atlantic and European markets that were once cost-prohibitive and out of reach. This is bringing more job opportunities to our state. Smart investments in infrastructure pay off.

### Western Maine Community Action receives funding for Health Insurance Marketplace Navigators

Western Maine Community Action has received a 2019 Federal Navigator Grant from the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services that will support the work of Health Insurance Marketplace Navigators in Maine. WMCA coordinates a group of Navigators at Community Action Agencies across the state. This funding will support their work providing free, unbiased assistance to Mainers seeking more affordable health insurance options.

The WMCA-led group of navigators are very experienced; since 2013, they have been helping Mainers understand their health insurance options, enroll in coverage, and address

related issues. This year, adjustments made to the Affordable Care Act resulted in some uncertainty about the future of the Health Insurance Marketplace and the navigators who provide assistance with it. While some details remain unknown, the 2019 health plans will soon be available through the Marketplace.

Across the state, local navigators will be available to provide information about new options for health care coverage and to assist uninsured people with the enrollment process. Those who already have a plan through the marketplace should also remember to investigate new options available for 2019. Open

Enrollment Period – the time when any eligible person can sign up for this type of health insurance - begins on November 1 and runs until December 15.

"We want people to know that they can still apply and enroll in health coverage, often with tax credits, through the Health Insurance Marketplace at HealthCare.gov." said Hillary Barter, WMCA Health Navigator. "Anyone who needs assistance with enrollment (or re-enrollment) should contact a certified Health Navigator to schedule an appointment."

### Good Food Bus reaches more citizens in third season



The Good Food Bus, a mobile, mostly-local food market operated by St. Mary's Nutrition Center and Cultivating Community, is reaching more shoppers in its third season, making healthy local food easier to access for people in Lewiston, Auburn, Gorham, and Westbrook through diverse neighborhood and business stops. Once a week, the bus also heads to Bath Iron Works in Bath.

"We're happy that this healthy food initiative is continuing to grow," said Kirsten Walter, Director of the St. Mary's Nutrition Center. "So far this year, we've increased the number of market stops to 15, we've seen an almost 80% increase in transactions, and 600 people have joined our new membership program, which provides updates, recipes, and discounts."

The market on wheels carries a selection of local, fresh fruit and vegetables along with foods from away, such as citrus. It also offers locally-sourced eggs, cheese, and bread; pre-prepared frozen lunch items such as burritos and soups; and Anchor Meals, boxes stocked with a recipe and all ingredients needed to prepare a delicious, nutritious dinner.

The project helps meet

vital community needs. A 2014 Community Food Assessment conducted by the Good Food Council of Lewiston-Auburn found that healthy food remains out of reach for many residents due to lack of access, convenience, and affordability. It also found pervasive food insecurity in some Lewiston neighborhoods.

The bus brings healthy food to where people live, work, and play. Everyone is welcome. Cash, credit/ debit, SNAP/EBT, and WIC coupons are all accepted. Customers who use SNAP/ EBT and/or WIC get twice as much fresh food at no extra cost. For more information, visit maineharvestbucks.org.

Bus staff and volunteers are also proud of increasing healthy food access for employees at BIW.

"The Good Food Bus visits BIW every Thursday," said a Bath Iron Works customer. "Typically, I buy two anchor meals each week, one for my niece. An anchor meal includes all the fixings (in one bag) for a healthy meal. I am hoping employers and the community will continue to support this project. This is great prototype for other communities to bring healthy and affordable food to citizens."

Like other food access

projects, the Good Food Bus would not exist without philanthropic support. The lead philanthropic partner for the project is the Harvard Pilgrim Health Care Foundation.

"Regardless of race, income, or geography, food impacts our health and our environment, and we know that prevention in health often starts with the food we eat," said Karen Voci, President of the Harvard Pilgrim Health Care Foundation. "At Harvard Pilgrim, we are committed to helping individuals and families get access to fresh, affordable, local fruits and vegetables to help improve their health. Across the country, organizations are using mobile markets to increase access to fresh food. Here in New England, Harvard Pilgrim supports a fleet of mobile markets to address this challenge and create better access to healthy food."

In addition to the Good Food Bus, Harvard Pilgrim funds mobile markets in Worcester, Mass., Hartford, Conn., Lowell, Mass., and the seacoast of New Hampshire.

"Orthopedic care is in high demand in Maine, the most rapidly aging state in the nation, and we are proud that our work has been recognized with this certification," said Dr. David Tupponce, president of CMMC and Executive Vice President of Central Maine Healthcare. "Our patients rely on us for safe, effective, and high quality care and that is our ongoing

commitment."

In fact, a reviewer from the Joint Commission called the CMMC orthopedic program a "top tier program in the nation." More than 1 million total joint replacements, which are considered one of the most successful and cost-effective interventions in medicine, are done in the United States every year. At Central Maine Medical Center, 181 total hip replacements, 316 knee replacements, and 45 shoulder replacements were done in 2017. The hospital treated 162 hip fractures.

"I'm extremely proud of our team for this accomplishment," said Dr. Jeffrey Bush, a board-certified, fellowship-trained orthopedic surgeon with Central Maine Orthopaedics in Auburn. "We have an amazing group of providers caring for our patients from their initial visit through their pre-operative work-up, surgery, therapy and beyond. This certification reflects CMMC's commitment to continuous improvement in how we provide for our orthopedic patients."


Greg Marston of Bridgton had both knees replaced at CMMC. To Marston, an avid skier and outdoorsman, the surgery "gave me my life back." He credits the joint replacements, and the rehabilitation services he received at Bridgton Hospital (part of Central Maine Healthcare) with allowing him to return to the sports he loves - and his work as a skilled traditional cabinetmaker and restoration specialist.

"Dr. Bush, CMMC, and Bridgton Hospital are responsible for giving me back my life," he said. "I tell everybody who is considering surgery, 'Do it, because it really is life-changing."

The Joint Commission has accredited hospitals for more than 60 years and more 4,000 hospitals nationwide currently maintain Joint Commission accreditation. CMMC's accreditation is an initial certification, and the hospital will have a recertification inspection every two years going forward.

Back by popular demand, Ellis Paul, one of Maine's most lauded singer-songwriters, will perform the next Concert for a Cause at the Unitarian Universalist Church of Brunswick on Saturday, September 29 at 7:30 p.m. The church is located at 1 Middle Street. Two-thirds of the series' net proceeds from 2018-19 will be donated to the Gathering Place and the Brunswick Teen Center.



More than just a quirky tale of memories lost, The Town that Moved a Mountain is a story of how three rope tows and the dedication of a group of volunteers brought together a community and made a positive impact that carries on to this day. The film's director, Rick Groleau, is a Boston-based multimedia producer from Livermore Falls.


