of building if I don't like it. The point was made that Cajuns, George's Steak Pit, Casa Mexicana, and Fiesta Mexicana were the only establishments that allowed some degree of smoking, compared to several years ago when ten restaurants allowed smoking. A vote failed then. The only difference is that there are fewer people offering resistance at this point.

The business owner's choice was eliminated

in each case. The new law would also prohibit smoking within 20 feet of any building entrance.

I have to side with mayor Ian Sanford and councilman Steve Nix in a dissenting position on this. It's not bad policy, it's bad for government to decide this policy. It should be up to the business owner to make the decision to allow tobacco products or not, period.



SIGNS OF THE PAST



W.C. HANDY BIRTHPLACE

William Christopher Handy, widely honored as the "Father of the Blues," was born in this house on November 16, 1873. In his autobiography, Handy traced the key events in his discovery of the blues back to his time in the Mississippi Delta, beginning in 1903. He also wrote that the music he had heard as a child in Florence "generated the motif for my blues." Here he also received the musical training in school and church that prepared him for his illustrious career.

620 W College St, Florence, AL 35630 34.7955°N, 87.6848°W

Handy's two-room log cabin originally was several blocks north of here, but reconstructed in this location in 1970. He moved to Memphis in 1909, where he wrote his, now famous, "Memphis Blues". His very successful publishing business moved to New York in 1918. Handy often visited friends in Florence, until his death in 1958. Each July, we celebrate the "Father of the Blues" with the W. C. Handy Music Festival. The last was held July 20th through 29th, 2018.



DRIVING ME

I suspect some people were confusing this hoax with the recent news of a real Facebook security breach where 50

is complicated and the news reports are a bit overblown but this news has nothing to do with the hoax at hand.

The message hints that the receiver may have been the victim of a cloning scam. That's where a scammer copies images and information from a person's Facebook profile and creates a duplicate "clone" account, then sends out friend requests to the victim's friends. The duplicate user then sends messages to these friends in an attempt to propagate various scams that all million user accounts were ultimately end with attempts to potentially exploited. This breach get you to send a stranger some ultimately end with attempts to

money. But, again, the message that people were spreading through Messenger is unrelated to this. The reality of actual Facebook cloning scams simply feeds into this viral hoax.

Facebook users often state that they were "hacked" when they were actually "cloned." In fact, almost no one is "hacked" on Facebook. Hacking involves someone guessing your password somehow and actually logging in to your account. So there is no need to change your password if your account is cloned. If you are a cloning victim, the only recourse is for you or your friends to click on the "report this profile" link and tell Facebook about it. Facebook is pretty good about quickly taking down these accounts.

So what should you do if you receive one of these hoax messages? Nothing. Delete the message and move on but please,

for the love of all that is good, don't share it. Don't talk about it on Facebook. Don't even think about it! This hoax needs to die before I start drinking.

Whew! Thanks for listening. Now brace yourselves because the "Christmas is banned" and "I can no longer say Merry Christmas!" hoaxes are just around the corner.

daughter, Lora, was probably eight, she said something that describes our family to a tee. One morning after church as I was standing in the parking lot talking to a friend, Lora came to our conversion van with her lips poked out. She, hurriedly and with a huff, slumped down in her seat. When I finished my conversation, I asked her what was the matter. She said, "I want to go home. All those kids are talking about is the dog behind that fence.'

We don't love small talk. It is when we are our least comfortable and most awkward. But give us awkward. But give us something to chew on and we will chew. We thrive on words, thoughts, beliefs, interactions and discussions. the years have not been used to carry that weight. I have heard words like "arrogant" or "pompous" being used to describe us "jokingly" My mom and grandmom were like that. My husband's mom is like that. Not necessarily argumentative but interested in why, how, This is our son, Garrett, what, how to improve or better something, or how to thrive or solve something. Kind of like Cuba Gooding

One Sunday when our Jr. said in "Jerry Maguire", aughter, Lora, was probably "You think that we are fighting and I think that we are finally talking."
We question, think and challenge. And sometimes it's to our detriment.

Recently I was discussing with my son how that we are hard friends to have. I told Randall that for instance, he can talk in such detail about something that he is interested in, that he will lose his listener after the first five or ten minutes, but that he will keep on talking for another 5 or 10 minutes. And I confessed how that I tend to be intense and that a lot of my relationships over the years have not been able because we use words. To demonstrate how we use words, check out this quote - its word usage and depth. writing recently on sexual

"Men, it's on us. I've heard a bifurcation

stories of survivors of sexual assault. Some men are astonished, claiming these acts are inconceivable. Others scoff as though these acts are inevitable. Sexual assault is neither inconceivable nor inevitable. We aren't exempt just because we find these acts abhorrent. And it's not so prevalent that it's beyond our control, fellas.

Even the "good men" are culpable for patriarchy. You don't have to have sexually assaulted someone to be complicit in rape culture. Our silence about it is enough to perpetuate these cycles. I have recklessly wielded my own male privilege. I've admitted it. I've apologized. I've spent time reflecting on how I learned these behaviors and from where these impulses come. I had to die to myself (Romans 6:3-14). I am daily and actively unlearning a toxic masculinity inculcated in me by our culture.

We first have to acknowledge our culpability in this system in order to begin to dismantle it. And there are plenty of tangible ways we can fight back, men. We can start with ourselves. With any sexual encounter, consent should be unambiguous. Let there be unambiguous. Let there be no grey line. Make it clear. Squash the "harmless" joking and the disrespectful rhetoric. Don't laugh. Call it out. Don't allow us to talk about women as sexual objects. Listen to women. Believe women. Elevate their voices. Be willing to give up power. The responsibility is ours, men. It's on us."



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


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A Short Thought About Eternity

Eternity is one of the most difficult words for the human mind to comprehend. Yet, the Bible has much to say about this subject. For one thing, we are instructed that God is eternal. The Psalmist wrote, "Before the mountains were brought forth, or ever You had formed the earth and the world, even from everlasting to everlasting, You are God" (Psalm 90:2). For yet another thing, each one of us has a soul that lives inside our physical bodies that is destined for eternity once it leaves the body (cf. Matthew 25:46).

Perhaps the reason we have such difficulty conceiving the idea of eternity is because most of what we see about us is not eternal. We see vegetation sprout forth from the ground in spring only to die in the fall. Also, most of us have witnessed the birth of animals only to see them age and die, usually in a matter of a few years. The same can even be said of our physical bodies. As surely as we are born, there is a time coming that we will also die (cf. Hebrews 9:27).

However, it is here that we must note an all-important distinction. We are unlike vegetation and animals, not only in looks and purpose; but in each of us, God has placed a living soul that will never die. Sure, the outward body will someday wear out and return to the dust of the earth (Ecclesiastes 12:7). But the real you on the inside that thinks and reasons (even as you read this) will "go to its eternal home" (Ecclesiastes

Further, the Bible puts a lot of emphasis on man's eternal dwelling (after this life) and makes it clear that there are only two possibilities. On the one hand, the Bible says that only those who have lived righteously and served Him from the heart will eternally abide with Him in heaven. One the other hand, those who do not serve Him have the tragic fate of everlasting punishment in the fire prepared for the devil and his angels (Matthew 25:31-46).

We can sum up these two eternal destinations in the following way. Heaven is an eternally prepared place for a prepared people (John 14:1-3). Hell is also an eternally prepared place, but for an unprepared people (Matthew 22:1-13). In short, no one goes to heaven by accident! It will be by purpose and design.

Knowing these things should move each of us to think seriously about our present spiritual situation, understanding that it has eternal implications. That being said, where are you preparing to spend eternity?

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


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Ask Dr. Webb



Can a patient stay in hospice indefinitely?

No. The Medicare Hospice Benefit was created to help patients who were dying to remain comfortably at home: 'dying' means having a terminal illness and expected to die within six months, if the disease runs its usual course.

Hospice eligibility requires two physicians (as in the patient's primary doctor and the hospice medical director—unless the patient chooses the hospice physician to also be their primary doctor) to certify that the patient meets this definition. If a 'terminal' patient lives longer than six months, the medical director must recertify, every two months via a personal visit, that death is still expected within another six months, and document evidence of decline.

The $\underline{average}$ length of stay in hospice care for all patients as of 2014, was 73 days; Alzheimer's was the longest, at 118 days, whereas those with cancer were 47 days. Regardless of the diagnosis (even some cancers), if there's no decline, you could be discharged—in 2014, 17% of all hospice patients were discharged.

Some families are upset when discharge is recommended. But, the law is clear: if death is no longer expected within six months, we must discharge them.

Despite what some hospice agencies are telling families, hospice was never meant to be for only symptom management [as in controlling pain] or as a 'custodial' service (that's what nursing homes provide, keeping people clean, dry, fed, and comfortable, for as long as they live, possibly years).

The bottom line: if a person is not likely going to live another six months, they deserve to be in hospice [improving their chance of a more comfortable and dignified death], but if they are stable and not 'dying', they must be discharged, until such time when evidence of terminality becomes obvious.
