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

More retirees opting for second career as caregivers

Employment opportunities booming in rewarding field

When 69-year-old Barbara Pelish of Macomb Township stopped working a few years ago, she discovered retirement wasn't that exciting. "I said I couldn't lion paid) by that time. do it; it was just too bor-ing," she said. "You can only watch TV, clean your house and play Candy Crush for so long.

Pelish applied to become a caregiver at Home Instead Senior Care after hearing of she said.

Pelish and others like her who are taking on jobs as caregivers are filling a critical need. Some 117 million Americans are expected to need caregiving assistance by 2020, according to the Caregiving Innovations Frontiers study, conducted by AARP and Parks Associates. Yet the actual number of caregivers is only expected to reach 50 million (45 million unpaid, 5 mil-

Home Instead has developed a program geared for older workers called "Un-retire Yourself," which touts the benefits of working a part-time job in retirement.

Longtime Detroit Lions player Lomas Brown talks life after retirement

Former Detroit Lions offensive tackle Lomas Brown played 18 seasons with the NFL – including 12 in Detroit - before retiring in 2002 after a Super Bowl win with the Tampa Bay Bucca-

After he retired, Brown, 55, took a job as an ESPN analyst and broadcaster. He loved the gig, but after eight years in front of the camera, he was suddenly let go. That departure forced Brown to reinvent himself, and since then he has worked as an entrepreneur, mentor and philanthropist. Earlier this year he was named color analyst for the Detroit Lions radio broadcasts on WJR.

The former NFL All-Pro spoke to a packed house at the Rochester Older Persons Commission on Sept. 19 about his time before, during and after football, and also about his second act in life. Resist the candy dish with these healthy Halloween alternatives

It's hard to avoid candy dishes around Halloween. They're near the front door, on your desk at work, in the reception area of the auto repair place. Basically, Halloween candy is everywhere.

"Our goal is to be mindful of what we're eating and to watch our portion size," said Erin Dolinski, a Registered Dietician with Beaumont Health in Royal Oak. "We don't want to deprive ourselves, but we also don't want to over do it."

The trick to enjoying Halloween treats is to keep an eye on how much sugar you're taking in throughout the day. The American Heart Association recommends women consume no more than 25 grams of added sugar a day, while men should take in less than 36. "To give you an example of what that means, three pieces grams of added sugar," Dolinski said.

Still, it's hard to say "no" when candy is ubiquitous. With a little extra effort, you don't have to starve yourself of Halloween treats this season. Try these healthier substitutes for some Halloween staples:

Halloween Staple: Almond

Replace with: Your own chocolate-covered almonds using dark chocolate, which is a healthier alternative Dolinski said.

 Halloween Staple: Skittles Replace with: Frozen grapes. Some satisfying fruity taste, with way more health benefits.

■ Halloween Staple: Caramel or candied apples

Replace with: Dipping apple slices in honey, peanut butter or almond butter

"Our staff also visits all of the senior living facilities in the city to register residents to vote, and will pick up ballots from the senior living facilities if requested to do so," said Tina Barton, Rochester Hills City Clerk.

Most precincts have privacy booths that are handicap accessible, and most locations offer tables and chairs for voters to sit down if needed.

A 2006 survey (the most recent available) by the Brennan Center found that while 11 percent of voters overall lacked current photo IDs, 18 percent of older voters lacked them amounting to 6 million voters at that time. One reason: Many older voters either no longer drive and their licenses have expired or they never drove. Although many poll workers prefer picture IDs (even expired), for many communities, a signed affidavit is all you need to get a ballot.

To make voting easier, both Barton and Grot suggest checking out the ballot in advance. Most clerks have printed ballots that voters can look at, or find the ballots online by precinct. Grot suggests researching the candidates in advance to make sure you're making your best choice.

"Your vote is your voice. Voting is your superpower. Voting can bring about change and reward success. When we silence ourselves by not voting, we allow someone else's voice to become even louder," Barton said.

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

Does a higher selling price mean higher property taxes?

Market Update

August's update for Macomb County and Oakland County's housing market is a continuation of what we have seen for many years now: in-

August's residential home/condo on market inventory continued to drop. Macomb County's on market inventory fell by almost 18 percent and Oakland County's on market inventory fell by 14 percent.

The strong demand for houses and condos continues to be constrained by the low inventory. Average days on market have stayed about the same. Macomb County's average days on market was 26 days and Oakland County's average days on market was 26 days as well.

Many properties are selling the same day that they are put on the market with multiple offers. (All comparisons are month to month, year to year.)

: I am getting my parents' house ready to sell. Both of my parents are deceased. Do I have to disclose that my mother died in the house?

A: This is a question that is asked often. What you are technically asking is if this is considered a stigmatized property? The National Association of Realtors defines a stigmatized property as a property that

has been psychologically impacted by an event which occurred or was suspected to have occurred on the property, such event being one that has no physical impact of any kind. Included in this definition are murder scenes, sites of suicides, deaths and infectious disease related illnesses. While some states have enacted laws governing these issues, to the best of my knowledge, Michigan has not. According to the Seller Disclosure Act and common law of Michigan, a seller of residential real property has no duty to disclose non-physical defects associated with a property. As always, I suggest you contact an attorney regarding these matters.

• According to your market update each month with the selling prices going up so much this past year does this mean that my property taxes are going to take a big jump next year? I have lived in my current home for 25 years.

A: Good question and No because of Proposal A. Proposal A of 1994 amended the Michigan Constitution to provide that beginning in calendar year 1995 Michigan property taxes are levied on taxable value, not SEV. Proposal A provided that the taxable value of a residence or business cannot increase in any one year by more than 5 percent or the Consumer Price Index (CPI) (Federally published rate of inflation), whichever is less (excluding the value of new constructions and additions). 2017's U.S. Consumer Price Index was 2.5 percent. Transfers of ownership will uncap the taxable value which could increase the property taxes for the new owner substantially.

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

Modifications can remove the obstacles to aging in place

Rebecka Snell, 65, says she knew that if she and her husband Vic Labson were to continue living in their 1960s ranch home in Lakewood, Colorado, improvements would have to be made to create a safer and more enjoyable space.

Moving the washer and drver from the walkout basement to the main level was high on her wish list.

"It was not just going up and down stairs; it was carrving laundry baskets up and down the stairs," Snell said.


She consulted with Barbara Barton, a master kitchen and bath designer and certified Living In Place professional in Littleton, Colorado, who laid out a plan to provide a suitable and comfortable space.

To accommodate Snell, "we included the stackable behind cabinet doors on the main level," Barton said. the stairs going down to family room, there was just one rail, and we added a second."

For many older adults, there's no place like their own home. The problem is that most of the nation's housing is not designed to accommodate physical and cognitive challenges that come with aging.

Studies in healthy older people aim to prevent Alzheimer's

PHOENIX » It may be too late to stop Alzheimer's in people who already have some mental decline. But what if a treatment could target the very earliest brain changes while memory and thinking skills are still intact, in hope of preventing the disease? Two big studies are going all out to try.

Clinics throughout the United States and some other countries are signing up participants - the only studies of this type enrolling healthy older people.

"The excitement in the Alzheimer's field right now is prevention," said Dr. Eric Reiman, executive director of the Banner Alzheimer's Institute in Phoenix, which is leading the work.



Can I access retirement funds early without penalty?

: I am 71 years old and own five IRAs. When do I have to take my first IRA distribution? Do I have to take a distribution from each IRA?

: You were 70½ in 2018 A and your first required minimum distribution (RMD)

must be taken by $4/\frac{1}{2}019$. If you wait till next year then a second RMD must be completed by 12/3½019. Alternately, you can take the first RMD in 2018 and the second RMD in 2019. The RMDs

can be taken from one IRA or all the IRAs. Each IRA trustee will contact you about your RMD but it is your responsibility to give final instructions on the distributions. If the RMD total is \$10,000, you can take that amount from one IRA or any combination of IRAs.

: I am 67 years out and in husband recently passed : I am 67 years old and my away. My husband was receiving \$2,100 per month in Social Security benefits and I was receiving spousal benefits of \$950 per month. What will be my Social Security benefits be as a widow?

A: In most cases the wid-ow's benefits will be the same as the husband's benefits. You will receive \$2,100 per month. Survivor benefits and work benefits come from two different funds. If your work benefits, based on your employment are high enough, then you could collect survivor benefits till age 70 and then switch to the higher benefit based on vour work record.

: I am disabled from an auto accident in 2015 and have not worked since. Can I access my 401(k) and IRA funds without a penalty? Will I have to pay tax on that money?

: Yes, you can take an early A: Yes, you can take and distribution from your 401(k) and IRAs without paying a penalty. Whether you pay income tax on the withdrawals depends on the type of retirement account. Withdrawals from a traditional IRA, 401(k) or other tax-advantaged retirement plans are taxable as ordinary income, except for the portion of the distribution that represents a return of your nondeductible contributions. Roth IRAs allow tax-free and penalty-free withdrawals on qualified distributions. A distribution is qualified if it is made after a five-year holding period and one of the following is true: the taxpayer is at least age 591/2; the distribution is the result of death or disability; or the distribution is made to a qualified first-time home buyer.

: My dad died in 2017 and had no beneficiaries on his 401(k) retirement plan. What happens to the 401(k) money?

Are there any tax liabilities?

A: If there are no beneficiaries then the estate of your dad becomes the beneficiary. You need to contact the trustee of the 401(k) plan to explore your options. For most 401(k) retirement plans the only option is a 100 percent distribution to the estate of the decedent and the beneficiaries will split up the money. All distributions from the 401(k) retirement plan are subject to ordinary income tax except for after-tax contributions.

: I have been married three times. The first time was for 12 years, the second was 11 years, and the third was 3 years. I started collecting my Social Security at age 63. All three husbands are now deceased. Could I apply for Social Security benefits as a surviving spouse?

A: Yes, you can apply for survivor benefits and take the

highest of the three. To qualify for survivor benefits from your recent marriage, you only needed to be married 9 months. In each of your divorces you needed to be married at least 10 years. The survivor benefit will be greater than your current benefit. Contact the Social Security Administration and ask for guidance. If you are over your full retirement age (FRA), you would simply pick the highest of the three survivor benefits and make that your permanent benefit. If you are under FRA, you could start with one survivor benefit (reduced) and switch to the highest survivor benefit when you reach FRA. Your current age is critical to determine the best strategy.

Behind on retirement savings? How to catch up

Saving for retirement can feel overwhelming and even stressful at times for boomers and Gen Xers. Of Americans age 45 to 65, nearly half (49 percent) feel behind on retirement savings and are worried they're already too far behind to reach their savings goals, according to the Chasing Retirement Study from Allianz Life Insurance Company of North America.

this statistic: those expressing so much concern already have a decent-sized nest egg - averaging over \$400,000. These people, identified in the study as Chasers, have been diligently saving and investing throughout their lives. Even so, many of them feel they've fallen vidual Retirement Account (IRA),

saving for retirement. And many worry it will be too late for them to have a comfortable retirement if they don't increase their savings

The catch-up game

Some 54 percent of the Chasers say they have too many other expenses to be able to save for retirement the way they'd hoped. Additionally, and not helping matters, only 39 percent work with a financial professional who can help Perhaps most surprising about them create a budget to balance their expenses and design a strategy for retirement saving.

Many Chasers are also at a distinct disadvantage because their savings and investments aren't growing to their maximum potential. Only 53 percent have an Indibehind where they should be in and even fewer own individual risk. (Keep in mind, however that

stocks (35 percent), mutual funds (35 percent) or an annuity (14 percent). Money sitting on the sidelines in a bank account or moneymarket fund might feel safe, but it ultimately can have a very negative impact on long-term financial goals.

Conversely, among people who are feeling confident about their savings, 70 percent own an IRA, 56 percent own individual stocks, 51 percent own mutual funds and 28 percent own an annuity. Spreading out their investments may be playing into why these people feel more confident, since they have given their funds the most opportunity to grow.

diversification does not ensure a taining a certain level of protecprofit or protect against loss in declining markets.) As people reach retirement age, diversification becomes even more dependent on risk tolerance; traditionally those closer to retirement shouldn't take on risk that could negatively impact their portfolio as retirement draws nearer.

The Allianz Life study found that 63 percent of Chasers feel they can't take the risk of investing in high risk/high reward financial products and over 70 percent are willing to trade off some upside growth potential to have some protection from loss.

Working with a financial professional can help you calibrate your risk tolerance and determine whether more diversification is necessary to give your portfolio the opportunity to grow, while main- North America.

tion. A financial professional can also help identify solutions you may not be aware of, including newer annuities that can offer upside potential and a level of protection from market volatility.

Finding the appropriate solution

The good news is that there are ways people who feel behind on saving for retirement can try to catch up and change their mindset to a more optimistic outlook.

It is never too late to take action to help ensure a stress-free retirement.




