Deason Home shooting reenactment set for October 27 in Ellisville

On a dark and stormy night in October, 1863, Major Amos McLemore was shot in the home of Amos and Eleanor Deason. The Deasons lived on a farm in Jones County, near Ellisville. They were friends of McLemore and had offered their home as a headquarters for him during his time in Jones County.

McLemore was on a mission for the Confederacy, sent to round up a band of deserters. Speculation was that the shooter was Newt Knight, head of this band. No one was ever charged with the crime, although Knight is said to have told several family members that he did it.

On October 27, from 6 - 11 p.m., a reenactment of the shooting will take place at the scene of the crime! The Deason Home in Ellisville will open its doors to the public for a trip back in time. Members of the Tallahala Chapter NSDAR,

assisted by the Rosin Heel Camp SCV, will give visitors a glimpse of the past. Dressed in period costumes, the hosts will share stories of the home and those who lived and died there, plus a little history of Jones County thrown in for good measure.

Horne shares some history of Congressional firearm duel at JCGHO September meeting

The Jones County Genealogy and Historical Organization met in the upstairs meeting room of the Laurel-Jones County Library on Saturday, September 22.

President Carolyn Horne called the meeting to order. Following prayer and the Pledge of Allegiance to the flag, she asked for committee reports and made the announcements. She announced that the combined October/ November meeting would be October 27 and would include finger foods and fellowship. Betty Morad was asked to coordinate the food.

The scheduled speaker for this meeting had a previous engagement and had cancelled. Keith Horne had volunteered to share some interesting genealogy/historical information that he had come across.

Keith talked about the abstract of title to land where he and Carolyn live. When he bought the property, he had been given the abstract of title. Until recently, he did not realize what a valuable piece of history he had been given. Keith's mother, who was a Graves, and all of her brothers and sisters had lived on the road where he now lives.

He mentioned an article in the *Wall Street Journal* dated September 8, 2018, titled "When Congress Came to Blows."

He shared the story of how Congressman Preston Brooks attacked Charles Sumner on the floor of the Senate Chamber on May 22, 1856.

The article tells of Joanne B. Freeman, author of "Affairs of Honor," a book about dueling and related matters. Freeman's tales aren't figures from the margin of society; they occupy its very center: The Congress of the United States. The author's research uncovered at least 80 incidents of violence between members of Congress in the three decades before the Civil War.

Freeman's detailed story of the 1838 duel between William Graves of Kentucky and Jonathan Cilley of Maine caught his attention, as Keith wondered if William Graves was part of his ancestry.

Until the 1830s, slavery had been one bone of contention between North and South but not the only or always most important one.

The weaponization of morality provided context for the duel between Graves and Cilley. As in all such matters, personalities played a large role. Cilley was unusually pugnacious for a New Englander; Graves, in the words of a Northern Congressman, was a "Kentucky Rowdie." Cilley didn't like the swagger of Southerners and their hair-trigger habit of threatening violence if they didn't get their way. He decided to call their bluff, starting with Graves. Words were exchanged, a challenge issued, accepted and the dueling ground was chosen and prepared.

The two men squared off, or rather each turned sideways to present a narrower target. They chose rifles, rather than pistols. They stood 80 paces apart. The duelist's Seconds, hoping to keep their Principals from actually getting killed, took extra-long paces to increase the distance between the antagonists.

The signal was given. Both men fired. Both missed. The Seconds huddled, trying to negotiate an end to the affair but after 20 minutes the negotiations failed.

Again, the signal was given. Again, both men fired. Again, both missed. Once more the Seconds negotiated. Once more they failed.

On the third round Graves's bullet hit Cilley, severing an artery. Cilley died within minutes.

During the question and answer session that followed just before the meeting was adjourned, it was decided that family information might be found in the strangest places!

He is a member of the award-winning South Jones High School Band of Braves Marching Band, South Jones High School Symphonic Band, South Jones High School Free State of Jazz



There's usually a pretty informative program, geared to the senior, and it's so nice to realize that few of them are geared to my needs. The meal is excellent; I don't have to cook it or clean up behind it either. And, again, there are folks who come whom I never get to see anywhere else. I've renewed old friendships there and made new ones as well, and being with them makes it worth the effort to get ready and to go.

But the highlight of my gatherings has got to be one I attended as a guest of a friend. As a writer I am fascinated by behaviors and was vividly aware that its membership was priceless.

In any such group there are such varied personalities, and this group could cast a terrif-





Bobcats win first-ever men's MACJC soccer championship

History was made here Sunday night at Bobcat Soccer Field.

And it was all good.

Thomas Carlile (Athgarvan, Ireland) scored 34 seconds into overtime to lift Jones College to a 2-1 win over Southwest Mississippi in the MACJC championship match.

The victory gives Jones its first state championship in men's soccer.

The win also gives Jones a 14-2 record, which is a school-record for wins in a season.

"We did not really set that goal (state championship) at the start of the year," said Jones head coach Brendan Connolly. "We just wanted to have a good season and improve all of the time. I think a couple of weeks into the season we figured out we were a good team. We just kept getting better."

The Bears took the lead late in the first half when Felipe Madero headed the ball into the goal on a corner kick from Joaquin Bermejillo at 43:38.

It remained that way until 69:33 when Steven Caston (Laurel) scored on a beautiful header off a long pass from Carlile.

"They go ahead and we had to dig deep again," Connolly said. "Steven Caston came off the bench and had a great moment – a great goal."

It did not take long in overtime as Carlile broke free and zipped the ball into the net at 90:34 setting off a wild Sunday night celebration in Ellisville.

"Tom has been scoring goals all year and did so at the end – a golden goal," Connolly said. "We are just really happy right now. I think this is the seventh come-frombehind win we've had this season. That just shows the hunger and desire these boys had. I could not be any more proud of them."

Callum Harley (Whitley Bay, England) was in goal for Jones and had another stellar effort.

The win does two things for the Bobcats.

First, it assures them of a berth in the NJCAA District

playoffs in early November. And it means Jones will host the Region 23 Tournament later this week, possibly Oct. 26, Oct. 27 or Oct. 28.

But the Bobcats may not even play a game in the regional.

Southwest will face LSU-Eunice in a first round regional game. If LSU-Eunice wins, the Bengals would play Jones the next day for the region title. However, if Southwest wins, Jones will be the region champion and will not have to play Southwest.

Regardless of what happens the remainder of postseason play, the future is very bright men's soccer at Jones.

"It's been a long time coming," Connolly said. "We are all set up here to be successful and that's what we want to do here from now on."

Southwest falls to 13-3-1 on the year.

"It was just another day at the office for Margro," said Raleigh head coach Chad Collums. "He's done this for us all year long. He's had some big games this year.

Raleigh beat McLaurin 35-7 behind the sophomore's four touchdown night and improved to 2-1 in Region 6-3A. Perkins scored two touchdowns as a running back, one as a wide receiver and one on special teams as the team's punt returner.

The Lions led 12-7 at the halfway point, thanks to a 12yard rushing touchdown by Perkins in the first quarter and a 50-yard punt return for a touchdown in the second. Perkins night, though, wasn't over. He helped seal the win for Raleigh with another rushing touchdown in the third quarter and topped the night off with a 74-yard touchdown reception at wide receiver in the final stanza. He finished with 222 all-purpose yards. Offense and special teams were not the only areas Perkins contributed big plays too. He recorded a sack and forced a fumble on defense.




