After 23 years, East County Times closes its doors for good

It is with heavy hearts that we at the *East County Times* are announcing that we are closing our doors for good, effective Nov. 1.

After 23 years of serving east Baltimore County, ownership told employees of their plans for closing down the paper at a meeting on Monday, Oct. 22, which was, coincidentally, the anniversary of the paper.

The paper was founded on Oct. 22, 1995, with the late George Wilbanks leading the way along with Angela Hess, Linda Mrok and the late Jackie Nickel. Wilbanks passed away earlier this year, with ownership of the paper

being handled by his family.

It should come as no shock that the *East County Times* had fallen on hard times. Like many small businesses, we have had our share of issues due to economic forces outside of our control. Those issues combined with problems within our control — including too much overhead and a spate of internal thefts a few years back — have made our ability to function untenable.

When an area loses a newspaper, the whole area suffers. For over two decades we provided a service free of charge for our community, bringing worthwhile news and announcements that often go overlooked by major metropolitan newspapers. For almost the entirety of our existence, our Obituaries and Spotlight sections offered community members a free outlet to share their grief — in the case of the Obituaries section — or share their pride and joy via birthday, anniversary, engagement and other announcements in the Spotlight section. Our Politicians section gave local leaders the opportunity to speak directly to their constituents. Our Community page kept residents abreast of local meetings of community associations and much more.

- continued from page 1 - redevelopment of the old Bethlehem Steel site, local elections and Annapolis coverage, the midge infestation, school discipline and a whole lot more. We developed relationships with nonprofit groups like Back River Restoration Committee and other conservation groups. And among the hard news we had quality features, like Marge Neal's coverage of Paralympic swimmer Jessica Long.

In the past, our work was recognized with many Mid-Atlantic Community Paper Association (MACPA) awards, and just last year former co-editor Devin Crum and reporter Marge Neal took home Maryland Delaware D.C. (MDDC) Press Association awards for the first time in our paper's history (coincidentally in the first year we had entered the competition). While those awards and honors are always nice, ultimately what was most rewarding was receiving calls or emails about our work, or hearing appreciation for our efforts while out on the streets.

Far more often than not we were hearing good things about the product we produced, but obviously that's not always the case. Over the years there were plenty of stories we either missed or simply got wrong. Mrok used to muse that her biggest regret was missing out on the Joe Palczynski killing

spree story. For me, personally, it was not digging deep enough on Dr. S. Dallas Dance after the first ethics complaint was filed against him.

There were also plenty of other mistakes. Bill Gates of *The Dundalk Eagle* rightfully took a veiled dig at our lack of equity with high school sports coverage a few years ago, correctly pointing out that our coverage predominantly focused on male sports. And when the preeminent sports writer in the area calls you on your coverage, you better take notice — and we did, and we did better.

And therein lies one of my favorite aspects of this community that I'll miss. Gates and I have always had a friendly relationship, but he wasn't afraid to say what he thought was important. And that is this area in a nutshell. While I didn't always agree with what was being said by members of the community, especially when political rhetoric is involved, there's something to be said about being willing to call someone out and still be kind and friendly in the days, weeks, months and years that follow.

When I was at Loyola University, I heard about Dundalk, Essex and Middle River from locals, and 95 percent of the time the area was being talked about in jest. For the first five years I was in the Baltimore area, the southeast was perpetually the butt of the joke.

I found an area that took pride in actually making goods — whether it be at the old steel mill, the Glenn L. Martin plant or General Motors. I found a land of winding rivers and streams, with miles of pristine beach front property. I found an area so assured of itself that the words of residents in more affluent places in the county rolled off the backs of locals. I found a once economically great area trying to redefine itself. And if there's anything we as Americans love, it's a comeback story.

While you will no longer see my writings, I will be rooting hard for our readers. Whether it's rooting for the success of the next installment of the Rockin' on the River festival, or rooting for the Middlesex Elementary Sewing Club, I will always have your backs. I'll be rooting for Bowleys Quarters resident Bobby Adams, who has made a name for himself over the last few years as an outsider artist featured prominently at the American Visionary Arts Museum. I'll be rooting for Cliff O'Connell in his biblical war on rats and blight.

For the writing staff at the *Times*, we will miss going out into the different neighborhoods and hearing directly from you, our readership. We'll miss how kind everyone was, and how understanding (more often than not) when we told you that what you were looking for or had submitted will actually be in *next* week's issue.

Mostly, I'll miss our election coverage. Over the last few years, staffers would knock out election coverage on election night and into the next morning, with the printing press holding

things up for us to ensure our coverage was the latest, most accurate we could get. It absolutely pains me that we will not be able to provide that coverage for you next week.

As far as the staff here, there are so many people to mention. Hess, Jaime Gilliam and Carol Pappas consistently designed great work, so much so that their work was often used in other publications — even if those publications had an in-house art department.

Pam Spittel and Terri Knachel have worked here for decades between them, giving everything they had to this paper. Previous sales folks include Jessica Chaney, Kathleen Meyers, Beth Ritter and more.

In the writing crew over the years, we have seen incredibly talented writers like Crum, Neal, Ben Boehl and Emily Blackner, who now works at *The Hill*. Teddy Durgin became a trusted voice, along with other freelancers like Virginia Terhune and Michele Wojciechowski.

There are far too many people to thank than can fit here. But we absolutely must take time to thank the Wilbanks family. Endings are never easy, but the Wilbanks family gave a lot of time and money, and showed a lot of patience over the years. George Wilbanks should always be remembered for his tireless work for this community. He stands as an example of what it means to be an eastsider, despite being a Georgia native.

So what comes next? Who knows. I have a feeling that if someone were interested in starting a paper of their own, there are plenty of freshly unemployed workers who would jump at the opportunity to get that going.

While the future is uncertain, what is certain is that this area is a special place, one that will always have a place in my heart. And with that, I'll bid you all adjeu

Edgemere's BayVanguard Bank to merge with Canton's Kopernik

Citing numerous benefits to customers, officials at BayVanguard Bank and Kopernik Bank have announced a merger of the two financial institutions that should be completed in the first quarter of 2019.

Kopernik, a longtime Canton-based business, will merge with and into BayVanguard, a community bank headquartered in Edgemere, according to a joint press release issued by the

David M. Flair, president and CEO of BayVanguard, and Timothy L. Prindle, president of Kopernik, will serve as co-presidents and chief executive officers of the resulting, larger BayVanguard, according to the statement.

"This merger will result in a larger, stronger bank for our clients and will provide three additional branches, with two in Dundalk and one in Canton," Flair told the East County Times.

Both banks enjoy a long and proud history of serving the community, according to Flair. Bay Federal was founded in 1873, with headquarters on Light Street in Baltimore, he said. Bay merged with Edgemere's Vanguard in 1996 to become Bay-Vanguard. Federal savings Bank. The bank's most recent acquisition was Vigilant Bank, which Bay Vanguard merged with in 2012.

Kopernik was founded in 1924 as

the Kopernik Building and Loan Association of Baltimore City. In 1989, Kopernik Building and Loan converted to Kopernik Federal Savings Association and in 2012, Hull Federal Savings Bank merged into and with Kopernik. The institution converted to Kopernik Bank in May 2015.

The merger of the two banks comes at a time of growth for Kopernik and institutional strength and stability for BayVanguard, according to Flair. Kopernik was going to need to add a layer of executive oversight positions to its staff to meet some regulatory requirements based on growth, while BayVanguard already had that staff in place, Flair said.

Prindle, as president of Kopernik, was wearing many different administrative hats as he carried out the leadership of that bank, and the merger will allow him to hand off some responsibilities to existing BayVanguard staff, according to Flair.

"It really is a great move that just strengthens both institutions and improves what we can offer to all of our clients," Flair said.

Flair said the bank has a "very good executive team" and emphasized that "everyone will remain in place." There will be "no rank-and-file layoffs," and while there might be a couple of positions eliminated, that will be accomplished by attrition through a couple of retirements.

"We have always focused on our customers' and communities' needs," Prindle said in a statement about the merger. "We feel that the combined bank will be stronger than each was separately, allowing us to provide more services to and convenience for our customers and the communities we serve."

The merger will result in seven fullservice branches with consolidated assets of \$326.1 million. The bank's headquarters will remain on North Point Road in Edgemere in BayVanguard's flagship branch, according to Flair.

"That we are in the heart of the community is very important to us," Flair said. "Anyone can walk in and talk to me as president of the bank and we think that's a vital part of community banking. We have no desire to change that."

BayVanguard also announced the completion of its conversion from a federal savings bank to a Maryland savings bank, effective Aug. 23. To reflect that conversion, the name changed from Bay-Vanguard Federal Savings Bank to BayVanguard Bank.

As a result, the Maryland Office of the Commissioner of Financial Regulation will be the bank's primary regula-



tor with additional oversight provided by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation, according to the statement. Bay-Vanguard, M.H.C., and BV Financial, Inc., the bank's holding companies, will continue to be regulated by the Federal Reserve Board.

The merger has been approved by the board of directors of both Kopernik and BayVanguard, Flair said. Kopernik's account holders were to have submitted their votes by Oct. 31, and the customary regulatory approvals are expected to allow the transaction to be completed in early 2019.

"We are quite excited about this merger," Flair told the Times. "It was important for us to have like-minded individuals mesh with our bank and Kopernik is very community-oriented — this is a great fit for everyone and makes us a stronger bank for all of our customers.'



Beth Steel lamp posts will brighten footpath, shine light on history

For years, as Bethlehem Steel's Sparrows Point plant chugged and steamed and boiled to churn out steel that helped build the Golden Gate Bridge, became automobiles and formed Folgers coffee cans, many items dotting the plant's landscape became engrained in hearts and memories.

Now owned and being redeveloped by Tradepoint Atlantic, the approximately 3,100-acre campus is establishing its own identity.

But as a new identity is forged, many people believe it's important to preserve the history of the once-proud steel mill and its role as a economic driver in the community and region.

Edgemere Keith Taylor, founder and president of the Sparrows Point/North Point Historical Society, is working on a project that will see 10 lamp posts from the steel mill campus retrofitted for solar power and installed on the Sparrows Point High School campus.

While Taylor is busy with details like project plans and seeking financial backing, other community members have equally embraced the concept.

"We are absolutely behind it all the way and excited for it to happen," Sparrows Point High Principal Emily Caster told the *East County Times* on Tuesday. "I'm excited about the history and tradition that this will bring to our campus, and also the educational component of how it will tie into so many of our programs."

Sparrows Point is home to an environmental science magnet program and also offers building con-

struction and design courses.

"With our science and technology courses, environmental technology and construction and design, there are many opportunities with this project to have our students involved in course-related projects," Caster said.

Taylor's plan calls for the 10 lamp posts to be rewired for solar power. Two concession stands will have solar panel packages installed on the roofs, with each set producing enough energy to power five lamps.

Taylor is working with DMW, a Towson-based architectural and design firm, and Alpha Landscaping, to create plans for the project.


In what he describes as a catch-22 situation, he said he needs plans to procure funding and needed funding to commission plans.

In stepped Eric Hadaway, vice president and director of environmental services at DMW, and preliminary plans are just about complete. Those plans, Taylor said, will allow him to take the next steps in procuring funding and Baltimore County Public Schools approval in terms of construction and engineering.


Taylor got emotional as he talked about the sacrifices made by Sparrows Point-Edgemere residents, beginning with playing a key role in saving Baltimore during the War of 1812 through creating the steel that fought wars and saved democracy.

"This project is much deeper than just putting up a few light poles to make it safer to leave after a football game," he said. "This is about preserving some of the history of the community that started out saving Baltimore and ended up saving the USA with its steel."

"We have this chance to preserve and house a piece of our community's heritage," Caster said. "And we will be able to share it with thousands of students who will come through these halls in the years to come."

Solid waste plan heads to County Council

Ever wonder what happens to the more than 350 tons of trash that Baltimore County residents put outside their doors for pickup and disposal each year?

In 2016, about 60 percent went to the Wheelabrator incinerator in southwest Baltimore and about 40 percent went to the Eastern Sanitary Landfill in White

Trucking so much trash out of the county for processing involves paying fees to Wheelabrator, but the cheaper alternative of disposing of it in White Marsh shortens the life of that facility is the county's only remaining landfill for disposing of residential trash,

Balancing rising costs against shrinking capacity, while also investing in a "source reduction" campaign to reduce the overall flow of trash generated by residents, business and institutions, are all discussed in DPW's draft Solid Waste Management Plan for 2019 to

Required by state law every 10 years, the management plan needs approval by the County Council and the County Executive before going to the Maryland Department of the Environment for final review.

The Council is expected to introduce the plan at its meeting on Nov. 5, followed by a work session and discussion on Nov. 13, followed by a Council

vote on Nov. 19.

The 112-page plan, which was put together over two years with the help of a citizen advisory group, includes dozens of recommendations, including county participation in a state-wide look headed by MDE at incorporating food scraps into a composting program.

Baltimore County already recycles yard waste, and that could conceivably be expanded to include more organic materials, including food waste.

Other ideas to reduce the trash volume include boosting the existing recycling program by adding more county buildings to the program and also installing recycling containers at county Recreation and Parks centers.

Speakers at a public hearing in March recommended that Baltimore County consider not renewing its contract with Wheelabrator when it expires in three

The incinerator produces useful steam and electricity, allows for metal recovery and recycling, and reduces the amount of trash that would go to the Eastern Sanitary Landfill, according to the plan.

But Wheelabrator also generates ash, some of which is sent to the landfill in White Marsh, and air pollutants that some say are a health hazard to city residents, factors that also should be considered when weighing the pros and cons of renewing the contract.

As an actor, Jonah Hill has proven to be an effective dramatic and comedic presence in films as diverse as "Moneyball," "The Wolf of Wall Street," and "War Dogs." As a director, his debut film "mid90s" shows occasional flourishes of some of the top directors he has worked with over the years, namely Martin Scorsese, Judd Apatow, and Greg Mottola. As a screenwriter? Well, let's just say Jonah's never met a line of dialogue he didn't think he could make better with an "f" word ... or two ... or three ... or 14!

Hill's "mid90s" is a profane, yet affectionate snapshot of Southern California's skateboarding culture of the mid-1990s. Three decades earlier, there were good-hearted beach bums looking to surf, sand, and sex, many of whom became hippies. This flick shows the same sort of fun-loving, unmotivated ne'erdo-wells who replaced surfboards with skateboards ... yet didn't really amount to much in the pre- or post-9/11 era.

Hill has a lot of affection for them, though, his band of chatty, teen losers he centers his flick around. His failing, though, is that he doesn't get his audience to feel as much for these characters as he does. Hill's "mid90s" is a directionless film about directionless boys. Nobody or nothing amounts to anything. I'm not taking off any points for a lack of ambition here. I like slice-of-life movies. But, generally, I want such movies to

ultimately be about some sort of forward progress. Think "American Graffiti." Think "Boyz N the Hood." Think "Good Will Hunting."

The film is certainly cast well enough to resonate. Sunny Suljic is the lead, playing a 13-year-old named Stevie who gets in with a local group of older skateboarders to escape his troubled home life. He particularly looks up to Ray (Na-Kel Smith), who has the skills to be a skateboarding pro. And he is amused by Ray's profane, motor-mouthed best friend (Olan Prenatt) with a nickname too crass and profane to be printed in a family newspaper. Soon, Stevie is attempting dangerous skateboard jumps, guzzling beer, and smoking cigarettes, then running home and swigging mouthwash and spraying Lysol on himself to hide the smells of youthful debauchery from his single mother (Katherine Waterston) and hot-headed older brother (Lucas Hedges).

Stevie's home life is sketchy at best and plays right out of Dysfunctional Indie Family Movie 101. The heart of the film is in his interactions with Ray and the gang. At times, the lines play like imitation Kevin Smith dialogue. At other times, like in a quiet heart-to-heart scene between Ray and Stevie, Hill and his young actors nail the moment perfectly. I just never knew if Hill wanted some of his key moments to play as drama or comedy. Hedges' Ian, for instance, struts around like Bill Paxton's Chet from

"Weird Science" at times ... er, until his demeanor turns on a dime and becomes something quite scary. But then Hill has him walking around guzzling orange juice all of the time.

Funny? Pathetic? I dunno.

Hill's natural instinct is to go for the laugh, and I wish he skewed more towards

comedy than drama here. It would have made for a better film. Even the ending kind of irked me. Did Hill really plan to end his film there? Or did he ... just run out of money? "Mid90s" is a noble first-time effort, but I'm not sure it's worth your money, dear readers.

Thom Yorke's 'Suspiria' score a haunting, mesmerizing whirlwind

When I first heard that Radiohead singer Thom Yorke would be scoring a remake to the classic horror film 'Suspiria' I was a little thrown off. The original score is a muddled mess of cacophonous sounds and grating melodies, in the best way. The score of the original really propels the film into another world.

So when I heard that Yorke would be taking the reins, I was intrigued but kind of confused. While Radiohead certainly have some creepy songs, Yorke predominantly lives in a dreamy falsetto draped in melancholy.

Not exactly horror movie material, on its face. But if Radiohead bandmate Johnny Greenwood can pick up extra work scoring P.T. Anderson's films, well then why can't Thom get in on the action?!

Anyway, the 'Suspiria' score was re-

leased last Friday, and while it's a bit jumbled and bloated, overall it's a very strong album.

The song "Suspirium" is among the finest Yorke has created during his extensive career. A lilting waltz meditation with Yorke on piano accompanied by flute is something I never knew I needed until I heard it. "Unmade" is grandiose in its vocal delivery, but sparse elsewhere. "Has Ended" sounds like his attempt at The Beatles song "Tomorrow Never Knows," while "Open Again" provides some nice acoustic guitar covered in eerie sounds. And of course, there's a 14-minute drone track.

There's so much going on with this score that I'd recommend it to anyone, regardless of whether or not you're a Yorke fan. How it holds up in the film remains to be seen, but on its own it's a quality work of art.

'Hunter Killer' is thankfully NOT sub-standard

"Hunter Killer" is a combination of "Crimson Tide,"
"Lone Survivor," and "Air Force One" all rolled up
into one. It has the tense submarine thrills of "Tide"
or "The Hunt for Red October" with Naval seaman,
slight beads of sweat on their foreheads, barking out
such tried-and-true lines as "Torpedo in the water!"
"Launch counter measures!" and (my personal favorite)
"Dive! Dive!" Elsewhere, a small platoon of Special
Forces goes on a suicide mission to rescue the Russian
president, the target of a military coup. And back in the
halls of power in Washington, there are bureaucrats and
war-hawk military types eager to either start or stop
World War III ... if this mission doesn't go as planned!!!
OK, yes. All cliches. Everything in this film, you've seen

before. And, man, are there some hammy performances mixed in with completely believable ones. But I dunno. "Hunter Killer" caught me on just the right night. It's a rah-rah, jingoistic American military thriller, and some will blast it just for that and that alone. But on its own terms, it's pretty darn entertaining. I was never once bored. And there are a couple of sequences that are exquisitely filmed.

Gerard Butler stars here as Captain Joe Glass. Yes, Joe Glass. Just accept it. Glass is the untested commander of the USS Arkansas, an American submarine ordered to investigate the disappearance and likely destruction of another U.S. sub off the coast of Russia. En route, Glass and crew get new orders. Navigate a dangerous fjord into Polyarny where they will rescue the Navy



SEAL team that has hopefully extracted the recently ousted Russian president.

The overall mission is pretty involving ... eh, if you just sort of ignore that this isn't our real world at stake here. The Russian president is a young, buff beefcake of a man. The American president (Caroline Goodall) is a blonde older woman, completely calm-headed under pressure. And the U.S.-Russian power struggle is more 1980s-era Cold War (or, at least, '90s-era Cold War remnants a la "Crimson Tide" and "Air Force One") than today's geopolitical dynamic.

Oldman is laughably over the top as the war-mongering Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff. Completely evading direction, Oldman has one trick in this movie that had audience members around me guffawing. He says one line very quiet. Then immediately follows that by saying the same line REALLY LOUD!!! So, you'd have a scene play out like this, Oldman to Linda Cardellini's NSA agent: "You have no exit plan ... YOU HAVE NO FREAKIN' EXIT PLAN!!!" Or Oldman to Common's Pentagon commander: "You just started World War III ... YOU JUST STARTED FREAKIN' WORLD WAR III AND LOST IT!!!"

I wanna try this in real life. It could be effective. I'm always looking for new ways to command respect in my household. How about at the next family dinner? "Would someone please pass Daddy the salt? WOULD SOMEONE PLEASE PASS DADDY THE FREAKIN' SALT?!?!"

Ahem

It appears this film has been on the shelf for some time. Goodall's U.S. president is more than a bit "Hillary-esque." The filmmakers and screenwriters probably thought Hills had the 2016 election in the bag when crafting their story. The end result? Whoops! Goodall is now in the finished movie for just one scene. There's a "blame the Russians" joke here somewhere, but I ain't touchin' it. Also ... uh ... Nyqvist died of cancer in — what — June of 2017?! How long has this movie been done?!

So, I concede, "Hunter Killer" is a bit stale and more than a bit hackneyed. But it's really well-paced, Butler is a solid lead, and I particularly loved the sequence where the Arkansas has to navigate an underwater minefield. I'm making a command decision and holding my fire on this one. It entertained me!



Police identify suspect in Dundalk shooting

A thorough investigation led Baltimore County Police to quickly identify the suspect in a shooting in the 500 block of Main Street in Dundalk during the evening on Oct. 21.

Although police have received varying accounts of the events, they believe the suspect knocked on the victim's rear door around 7 p.m. and entered the home. The suspect and victim engaged in a verbal altercation that escalated when the suspect pulled out a gun and struck the victim in the head, causing the firearm to discharge into a wall of the home. The victim retrieved his own firearm, firing multiple rounds at the suspect, who fled on foot through the rear door.

The victim, a 27-year-old man, was transported to an area hospital with a minor injury to his head

and released.

A short time later police were notified of a shooting victim that responded to a hospital in Baltimore City with multiple gunshot wounds. This person was ultimately identified as the suspect in the Main Street shooting by the primary responding officer and detectives from the Dundalk Precinct Investigative Services Team. An arrest warrant was obtained, pending the suspect's release from medical care. The identity of this suspect will be released following formal charging.
