



# EL-G schools get boost from voters

Elkhart Lake-Glenbeulah School District Residents THANK YOU.

Your overwhelming support of the District's referendum on Nov. 6 was very much appreciated. With the passage of the referendum with 65 percent in favor, the EL-G School District continues to not only be viable, but also very desirable as an option for those parents and students looking for the smaller, personalized school experience. We are so proud to be a part of a community who believes in the value of providing a progressive, innovative, well-rounded educational experience for our students in well-maintained facilities.

Our immediate plan is to move forward with preparing for the three renovation projects: the high school culinary arts classroom/labs, the auditorium, and the athletic field lighting and bleachers. We are currently scheduling meetings with the architect and general contractor to begin the groundwork. The tentative timeline is to finalize all plans by this spring with work to begin as soon as school is out in June. The District will secure a fiveyear State Trust Fund Loan to pay for the projects. The ultimate goal is for EL-GS to again be debt free at the end of the referendum period.

As far as operations, the referendum will allow the District to return to a flat budget, while providing some revenue flexibility which will be used to address technology upgrades as needed and complete additional maintenance projects as funding allows. Examples of prospective projects include abatement/replacing of remaining high school flooring; renovating the lower level bathrooms by the elementary gym; updating the fire alarm system in the elementary/middle school and the hot water heating system at the high school; installing replacement windows on the fourth grade floor; replacing the elementary breaker panel; and updating the District's WiFi infrastructure. These projects will be done over the five-year period of the referendum on a "pay as you go" basis. It has been the goal of the District, through the past three referendums, to address maintenance and technology needs as funds allow, so we are continually improving our facilities and technology for future use. Balancing facility and technology upgrades with meeting our students' educational needs will always present challenges for the District. However, with the support for the referendum by the community and by continually to be fiscally responsible, we will be able to do so.

Again, thank you District residents for believing in your District and providing the support needed. I have often said in various conversations, "If things cannot be worked out in EL-G, they cannot be worked out anywhere." With the CAN DO attitude found in our District's staff and our District's community, I truly believe this. Together we will continue to move forward in an innovative, student-focused, yet fiscally responsible manner, which will be to the benefit of all involved—especially our students.

Please take time to stop in at the school and see what you and the District's staff have done to give the students of this school system a solid start on life. Also, if you ever have questions or concerns, please do not hesitate to give me a call or stop in—my door is always open.

## Inside the Bottle

### Pop up the bubbly!

The holiday season is full of festive celebrations and no other libation marks a celebration like Champagne or sparkling wine. I am a big advocate for celebrating the little things and enjoying bubbly more often than just at weddings or on New Year's Eve, so it is important to find a great sparkling wine that won't necessarily break the bank. Cava from Spain, Prosecco from Italy, and sparkling wine from California all offer Champagne bubbles at a more affordable price point and in a wide range of styles. But I do love a great bottle of Champagne when the occasion calls for it.

Not all sparkling wines are Champagne, though it is common for people to use that term to describe any wine with bubbles. Legally, wine that is labeled as "Champagne" must come from the region of Champagne in France, which has special rules and regulations for crafting this special beverage. Champagne is created using the "traditional method" of making sparkling wine, where the bubbles are created through a special second fermentation in the bottle. This traditional method is used by other regions like Spain and California to craft similar wines, but even though they are similar, Champagne is often superior. Think of it like a great aged cheddar versus a Kraft single. They both are cheese, but they serve very different purposes and have very different quality levels.

Sparkling wines made in the traditional method from Spain are referred to as "Cava". Traditionally aged in a "cave" they typically offer a great sparkling wine option at a very reasonable price. These are my go-to for larger events like weddings or holiday parties. They also work great in champagne-cocktails like Kir Royales or Mimosas. Another great option for cocktail concoctions is Prosecco. This sparkling wine is made in the less expensive Charmat Method where the wine is fermented in a large tank instead of the bottle. This creates slightly larger bubbles and is often a touch sweeter than wines made in the traditional method, making

it a less expensive, crowd-pleasing option.

Most sparkling wines are labeled with a sweetness indicator on the label that can help you pick the style that is right for you. The terms were developed in France, so they can be a bit confusing at first. Brut Nature, Extra Brut, and Brut on a label means that the sparkling wine is dry. These are great for pairing with savory foods (especially salty snacks like popcorn or cheese) and are typically what people think about when they think of Champagne. Extra Dry is a nice middle-ground, even though the term seems a little misleading. It is actually sweeter than Brut and is great for toasts and celebrations when you're looking to please a crowd with a range of tastes. Demi-Sec and Doux are the sweetest styles and work great with desserts and for people that like their wine on the sweet side.

Often when I am asked what my favorite wine is, it is hard for me to just pick one. But if I were to have to narrow it down to a style, it would be sparkling wine. I love the celebratory effervescence and how foodfriendly it is. While Cava and Prosecco are great for everyday enjoyment, sparkling wine from California offers a great option for something a bit more upscale, and Champagne is great when you want to treat yourself. Life is short, though, so the important thing is to drink what you like! Cheers!







## Volunteering benefits the community and volunteers

Sheboygan resident Cary Leroy is one of the 35.3 percent of Wisconsinites who volunteer their time to help others. The 39-year-old started volunteering at Fresh Meals On Wheels of Sheboygan County five years ago as a stay-at-home mom.

"My son was little and I wanted to do something where I could bring him along, so he would learn about helping people without expecting anything in return," she said.

Leroy has since gone back to work putting in 30 hours a week at a local nursing home. She fits volunteering in around her work schedule.

"I deliver meals on my day off, or if I am working second shift, I might deliver meals before I go to work," she said. During the summers, her son still goes along.

Working with an older population, Leroy knows they are often reluctant to accept assistance.

"I'm glad the Meals On Wheels clients allow us to help them. It's something you feel good about," she said.

Studies show that volunteering boosts life satisfaction, physical health, mental health, and social well-being and reduces depression. For those who think they are too busy to volunteer, one study showed that people who help others, even for as little as 10 minutes, feel like they have more time, not less.

According to CEO Kelly Heyn, Fresh Meals On Wheels of Sheboygan could not function without the hundreds of volunteers who joyfully give their time and talents working in the gardens, processing produce, delivering meals, helping in the office, and doing any number of things to ensure the program's success.

Meals On Wheels has recently seen more than a dozen volunteers retire after more than 20 years of service. This leaves open the opportunity for many new businesses and individuals to step up and help serve those who once cared for others in the community. Meals On Wheels is currently seeking high quality volunteers to deliver meals in Sheboygan, Falls/Kohler, Plymouth, the Elkhart Lake area, and the Oostburg area.

Volunteering is very flexible. Some volunteers deliver meals several times a week, some once a month, some deliver only in the summer and others only in the winter, and some fill in when a regular driver cannot make it.

"Meals On Wheels is super flexible," Leroy says. "I look at the openings in the schedule each month and look at my calendar and fill in where I can."

Volunteers pick-up meals at Meals On Wheels in Sheboygan for local delivery and a truck drops meals at locations in Plymouth, Elkhart Lake, Howards Grove and Oostburg for delivery in those areas. Pick-up time is 11:10 a.m. in most locations, and routes typically take no more than an hour to complete.

To those considering volunteering, Leroy says, "Try it out. It doesn't cost anything and there are no big requirements. Give it a shot and see if it works for you."




## EL-GHS hosts winter concert






## EL-GHS students take part in model UN effort

#### Winter Rules begin Nov. 15

Winter parking regulations go into effect on Nov. 15. As a reminder, here is the ordinance.

PARKING REGULATIONS

All Night Parking Regulated.

6.04(2) (a) No parking of any motor vehicle shall be permitted on either side of any Village street or in the parking lot north of Square Street or the parking lot on North East Street between the hours of 2:00 o'clock A.M. and 6:00 o'clock A.M. commencing the fifteenth (15th) day of November and ending on the first (1st) day of April of every year.

(b) Any vehicle parked in violation of the provisions of this ordinance shall be removed from the streets and stored, and such removal and storage shall be at the expense of the owner of said vehicle.

Vehicles violating this ordinance will be ticketed.

#### **Snow Removal**

Ordinance 10.03 Removing Snow from Sidewalks: residents must clean snow and ice from sidewalks within 14 hours of any snowfall in a 24-hour period.

Snow cannot be blown or plowed onto Village Streets. Residents must also shovel out any hydrants near their home.

#### **Snow Removal Warning**

As in past years, you will not be notified that snow needs to be removed. If you have not shoveled in the prescribed time, the Village will shovel your walk and bill the property owner. Also, the entire width of the sidewalk must be shoveled. A path is not sufficient and you will be in violation.

#### **Auto Pay Your Water Bill**

The Village of Elkhart Lake accepts Automatic Clearing House (ACH) payments for your water/sewer bills. If you are interested in having your water/sewer bill automatically debited from your bank account, please contact the Village at 920-876-2122 or email clerk@elkhartlakewi. gov and we will work to set you up on the program.






