

Corporal Punishment, Spanking, and Shaming Officially on the Naughty List

The American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP) has released a new policy statement taking a strong stance against using spanking, yelling, or shaming children as forms of discipline. There is little evidence to indicate these types of punishment are actually effective tools of discipline, but more evidence is linking corporal punishment to worsened behavior and other negative outcomes in cognitive, psychosocial, and emotional results.

Dr. Jennifer Shu, pediatrician and author of Baby and Child Health: The Essential Guide from Birth to 11 Years, and Dr. Robert Sage, one of the authors of the updated policy Effective Discipline to Raise Healthy Children, presented the findings of the AAP. Shu said there is more evidence that spanking is causing more damage to children. "We know that the brain does not grow and develop as well once there has been physical punishment to the point where it can cause learning problems and problems with vocabulary and memory, as well as aggressive behavior," Shu said.



But it's not just spanking that causes damage to children. Shu continues on that verbal reprimands can be just as detrimental to a child's well-being. "Anything that's verbally abusive in addition to being physically abusive can change the brain architecture," Shu said. Spanking, yelling and shaming elevate stress hormones. "Basically, these are adverse childhood events that can cause toxic stress and lead to health problems as well as emotional problems as a child reaches the preteen and teen years."

Physical punishment and verbal abuse may cause an immediate fear reaction that redirects a child's behavior, but does not result in overall improved behavior, and, in fact, may result in more aggressive behavior. Shu encourages parents instead to reward good behavior and also stick to consistent expectations of behavior. Set up rules and expectations early on and then follow through with those consistently. Focus on teaching children right from wrong.

In response to the often-heard argument from many parents that they were spanked as kids and turned out just fine, Shu compares it to changes in car seat requirements.

"There weren't any car seats, for example, when I grew up, [and] we turned out fine — those of us who lived to tell about it," Shu said. "But now that we have safety information and car seats, we do recommend that everybody use them all the time."

Protecting Your Family From Wildfire Smoke By Alexa Bigwarf

The air quality across California is impacted by the wildfires, and the polluted air can cause many respiratory and other health issues, including asthma and low birth weight. All children, regardless of current health status, are at a higher risk than adults from the negative impacts of smog. For young children, smog may harm the development of their nose, throat, and lungs and may impact their health for years to come. Air pollution can increase the child's likelihood of catching colds or make it more difficult for a child to recover from a cold, because their body is already working hard to handle the inhaled pollutants.

But, there are some actions you can take to reduce the impact of the high smog levels.

WAYS TO AVOID SMOKE INHALATION

- **1.** Stay inside if possible, and when outside, avoid exercise or intense physical activities when the air quality health index is at dangerous levels.
- **2.** Get a high-efficiency particulate air (HEPA) filter for your home. If you can afford to place them in the rooms you spend the most time and in your child's bedroom, that's optimal. If not, get a portable one that can move to where the child spends the most time in the day and back to the bedroom at night.
- **3.** If the cost is prohibitive in your home, consider spending more time in community spaces like libraries or malls.
- **4.** Do not smoke inside your house.
- **5.** If you have a child with asthma or allergies, ensure you have a good supply of their medications on hand.
- **6.** Pay special attention to coughing, labored breathing, wheezing, or any complaints of pains when breathing and take your child to the doctor if any of these occur.

7 Tips for Beating the Blues

Wildfires, continued violence, and other tragedies may have your child feeling anxious, stressed, or even a little depressed. There are some simple ways to help your child work through these emotions and beat the blues.

1. Get out of bed and hop, hop, hop. Or do some jumping jacks, squats, or lunges. But do something, even if you only have time for just a few minutes when you wake up. According to research by Dr. Kenneth Fox, there is now plenty of evidence showing that exercise – which causes your body to release endorphins that make you happy – is helpful for beating depression. So, start your morning by hopping on over to that coffee pot!

2. Try Smiling. Even if it's a fake or forced smile, research shows that people who smile more are actually happier. So, even if it's cold and dark, plaster that grin on. For a fun "experiment" with the kids, go someplace and walk around smiling at everyone. Tell the kids to record the reactions. There's a good chance you'll all be giggling in no time.

3. Dance it out. Put on some upbeat music and dance around the house. The kids will love it, you'll feel better, and you'll burn some calories while you are at it. Singing along can also help boost your morale.

4. Sniff something that smells good! Flowers, essential oils, household cleaners? Whatever smell lifts your mood. Citrus (particularly orange) and lavender scents have been associated with mood enhancement. Buy some flowers, light a candle, or get into the essential oil trend and let those happy smells waft through the house.

5. Throw on a green sweater, green socks, or some green accessories. Green, which symbolizes nature, can increase your mood by giving you the feeling that you've escaped into nature.

6. Do something good for someone else. The organization Action For Happiness explains that there is psychological evidence proving that doing something good for someone else actually makes us happier. Helping oth-

ers boosts our mood and reduces stress by giving us a sense of meaning and purpose, among other things. This could be something as simple as doing a chore for someone you know needs help, all the way to longer term volunteering. There are plenty of ways to give back and do good for others in our communities, bringing happiness to ourselves in the process.



7. Eat chocolate! Yes. It's allowed. Dark chocolate, that is. Dark chocolate is full of antioxidants and helps regulate our stress hormone, cortisol.

Pay attention to serious signs of sadness and depression. If your child is experiencing significant mood or behavior changes, be sure to reach out to their pediatrician.





- 7. Top with blackberries and dust with powdered sugar before serving.

Engaging the Whole Family for the Holidays

With all of that in mind, there are some things we, as parents, can make sure we do that will make all of the holiday experiences even better for our children.

First, be available for your children. Be available to allow them to just talk with you; be the better listener that everyone needs. Be sure to sit down and really look at and listen to your child, perhaps even repeat back, more or less, what you heard her or him say. That process allows your child to feel heard and thus feel significant to you. That, in and of itself, is a gift. Also, find some time in each week throughout the holidays to participate in an activity with your child one-on-one, if possible. This could be an activity directed by the child, one of her favorite things to do or listen to, which you wildly accept with no judgment, or something you both have repeatedly done together and always had a great time. Your child feels comforted by your personal attention, and that will always make the holidays better for him or her. Perhaps even talk with your children about your childhood holiday experiences and how they were important for you, and they may share with you what experiences they have had as well as what they find important and significant for them.

You can always use the holidays to continue with family traditions. These activities are as important as your heartbeat. These traditions represent family and the longevity of enduring family experiences. Taking everyone to the Melodrama for the Holiday shows, out viewing holiday lights in the neighborhoods, or participating in available services for those who are less fortunate can contribute to a sense of family and of giving.

Perhaps use the holidays this year to begin new traditions, to make time for ideas you have had before but felt you did not have the time to initiate them. Assisting the children in making their own gifts for family members,



grandparents and others, by encouraging creativity and the actual idea of contributing and sharing may be a good way to start. The sense of well-being gained by making something for a parent, relative, or a sibling is extremely rewarding. These days there are plenty of on-line places to get ideas for holidays gifts made at home, from using wine corks or candle jars to a collage of family pictures for the grandparents. Have the children be more involved in any usual holiday preparations from getting out the decorations to having them participate in deciding what to put out, and where, this year. Your expressed confidence and approval will, again, go a long way in allowing them to feel accepted and loved throughout the holiday season.

Parenting is a challenging process, yet it is always an opportunity for you to stretch yourself. This means that during the holidays you have the opportunity to look beyond what you are currently doing as a parent and think about different approaches you can utilize with your children, including listening to your child in a positive and supportive manner and engaging with him or her in family activities, particularly throughout the holidays, thus making the holidays merry and joyful for all.

"It's the perfect formula that works for Christmas – it's the smell of the Christmas trees, Santa Claus, the whole concept of snow," he says. "We put our heart and soul into decorating, and we put on the best show we can."

He and his wife Jessica have six children ranging in age from 25 to six years old. Over the years, the children have helped with the Christmas businesses in different ways. Nowadays, only two of the children live in town, Mark, age 10, and Jack, age six. Mike says their family has a "Christmas habit" that has turned into a year-round venture attending conventions, testing things out, and planning to make the next year's production even bigger.

He's been selling Christmas trees for 17 years, and his lot is still open for Noble Firs and Douglas Firs on Rosedale Highway, just west of Jewetta. He started making snow and having Christmas activities as a way to sell more Christmas Trees, and then it turned into a business of its own. First there was "Santa's Playground" and now it's evolved into what it is today. He's excited to have it back at the Kern County Museum this year.

At Bakersfield Christmas Town you can find something for everyone. In Santa Claus' Cozy Cottage you will find Santa, and sometimes Mrs. Claus, enjoying a relaxing night by the fireplace. With his reindeer nearby, Santa



is excited to meet all the boys and girls in Bakersfield and spend some time finding out what they want for Christmas.

Guests can cozy up in scarves and hats to embark on a Holly Jolly Hayride to tour Christmas Town through its poinsettia forest, snowflake arches, a Victorian village, and Toyland. With music filling the air, you will enjoy the kaleidoscope of lights, its twinkling penguin family, Frosty the Snowman, and the 12 Days of Christmas.

What does every magical Christmas experience need? SNOW! And Ross has spent years perfecting his man-made snow to be the right texture and consistency. Using 300 pounds of ice, he makes the perfect wintry sledding hill 40 feet in the air. Slide down the 100-foot snow hill on an old-fashioned tube. In fact, this is his son Mark's most favorite activity at Bakersfield Christmas Town.

One of the popular activities gives guests a chance to save Christmas Town from the abominable snowman at the paintball shooting gallery. In the game, Shoot the Yeti, you can shoot a "real-life" Yeti that pops in and out of his cave and growls to create a unique interactive experience. Paint balls are not included in the price of admission.

After you've warmed up with hot cocoa from one of the food concession booths, you can lace up your ice skates and take a turn on the Under the Mistletoe Skating Rink. The center of the rink features a 12-foot tree with 18 poles of lights, all synchronized to seasonal music for the whole family to enjoy.

The amazing Elf Hamlet has many activities for children including a place where they can send a letter to Santa from its Candy Cane Post Office, frolic in Frosty's Play Area, get a Winterland face painting, help Buddy the Elf save Christmas in the Laser Tag Arena, climb Rudolph's Rock Wall, and ride its Sugar Plum Christmas Train.


