The deadliest and most destructive fire in California history erupted at dawn on Nov. 8 in Paradise, and within minutes, stiff winds whipped it into a monster.

At first what has come to be known as the Camp Fire devoured 10 football-fields of terraine every minute, and then moved onto the neighborhoods. The fire hit so fast and so hard that many people had no time to react and if they did escape it literally was with just the shirt on their back.

Flames virtually destroyed the entire 27,000-population town of Paradise and surrounding communities. What makes this especially devastating is that typically with these types of events there is a community rally to pull See CAMP FIRE, page 3

together for comfort; support; and to help with the building and healing process. With this event, there is nothing left at all of this community. Therefore it is up to us to all do our part and rally for this community.

We all feel it in our heart and wonder, "What can I do?" One couple took that approach with the concept of "just help/adopt one family". They started a Facebook group that networks those in need, and those wanting to help. They ask that you just join, and be led to adopt a family (or individual) or do what you can. Maybe adopt someone as a group with some friends?

There are many layers to this tragedy. But healing of the heart is an important one. Sharing a play-byplay description of their personal ordeal and expressing their family needs is therapeutic for many of the victims. It is true that many of the donation sites are packed with an abundance of clothes. But you might see a family with children your same size and just reach out to them directly! There are many posts, so utilize the search function for areas on your heart or items you have (such as "autistic; tools; landscaping; books; furniture").

Yes money is needed, but not just money. I found one autistic young

woman who is 19 years old and was heartbroken because she lost her homemade crocheted doll that was her comfort source. Then there was someone who posted that her arts and crafts group wanted to help. Of course the girl had pictures of her precious doll, which I forwarded to the arts and crafts group, and less than a week later a replacement doll was on it's way from Washington!

Or maybe if you are a therapist you can post offering a set amount of free counseling sessions remotely for a family/families dealing with the trauma for a defined number of sessions. Or prayers are at the top of the list, so adopt a family and add them to your prayers. The facebook page is called "Paradise Fire Adopt a Family."

An immediate need for many is housing, because many are trying to stay in the Chico area for work/family, so that is a tough need to fill. But we do have one family that actually has chosen to relocate to San Jose - a young couple, Ashley and Kevin Burns and their 11 year old daughter. They had a distant relative in the area that they reached out to for help. Their daughter is now enrolled in school and they are looking to get jobs and even find a place on their own eventually. hristmas Carols wafted through the halls of Sunrise Retirement Community in Evergreen as children from St. Francis of

Members of the Cecilia
Family Choir, led Sunday by
Nga Doan, Choir director,
came to Sunrise to treat residents to some wonderful
Christmas Carols, as well as,
beautiful instrumentals played
by four members of the Cecilia

F.C. group.

Nga Doan, who came to the U.S. in 1989, first went, with 57 other Vietnamese along with her parents and siblings, to Kuala Lumpur camp in Malaysia on a small boat from Vietnam. They were the last boatload to arrive there before the camp doors were closed to refugees in early April, 1989.

Since coming to the U.S., Nga has acquired a degree in Business Administration and works with the children as one

of several choir directors. Nga began working with the group of Cecilia F.C. children sometime in 2014. She, along with a collaborative group of different conductors direct the children each month. She began that effort 2.5 years ago. The children of the group range in age from 5 to about 17. Most of the children are taught to sing at home by parents, and attend choir practice twice a month before worship day. All the musicians have private lessons outside the church or choir. There are roughly 25 to 30 members of the group, but on special occasions, there can be upwards of 40 children.

Doan reiterates, "This is our second public event, and we thought it would be nice to go sing for those living in Nursing Homes. In the a.m. we visited Carlton on Branham Lane and in the afternoon came to Sunrise on San Felipe Road." One would never know that these were not seasoned troupers! As one of the young singers stated as each child introduced themselves, "Hey, Y'all, we sure enjoyed singing for you and sure look forward to coming back next year."

As the old familiar carols were being sung, or played by the Cecilia group, the older residents sang along with gusto. The musicians did not miss a beat and the carolers sang the very difficult "Twelve"

Days of Christmas" seemingly without taking a second breath! This is an amazing group of singers and musicians!

Nga continued, "Some of the older children sing or play in other groups, but most of the group are part of the Vietnamese services at Saint

Francis. The amazing thing is that most of the children do not speak Vietnamese, but learn the songs by repetition. Some speak Vietnamese fairly well, but to retain our Vietnamese language and culture, we service our Vietnamese community in our lan-

guage at the 4 p.m. mass on Sundays at St. Francis of Asissi Church.

"The "Y" team leaders are cause driven in striving to help others and we're determined to do this by finding genuine ways," explained Ruvalcaba. "Being positive really matters here; every day matters. I think it is important for people to love what they do. If not, best to do something else that interests you so that you find your passion in doing something that motivates you and is inspiring to you." One elderly man backs up this statement and earlier in the day, while having coffee in the entrance, stated, "There is zero negativity here!"

Ruvalcaba continued, "I like to lead by example and for me, I just love connecting with people for that makes me happy. Sometimes people have a concern and I try to meet everyone with a smile. I listen to their story and gain more information on the situation. Often through clarification issues are mended and solved. I always allow for listening for it builds trust and I can guide people to solutions."

How will I present myself today?

"When I start each day, I ask myself, how do I wish to present myself today," said Ruvalcaba. "This gets me started down the right path. Everything revolves around the people who work at the YMCA exuding a positive attitude! I get to know my members in this YMCA. The coffee at the entrance and the many tables allows groups of


people to meet each day and talk. When I speak to a member it is always individualized. When I understand my members I can find out in more depth their needs and this allows me to assist."

Ruvalcaba continued, "At the end of each day I reflect on how it all went. I think about ways we created positive impact in the lives of our members. Sometimes things happen that are unexpected and I get strength and joy out of quickly managing the unexpected."

Weight training offered

Weight training is one of many programs offered at the "Y". Recently, a community member was not sure about using weight training equipment due to having lost a limb. Just as the person was ready to give up, Ruvalcaba stepped in and created with staff a new way of addressing the unique challenge. A wellness coach was called in to help develop a sophisticated workout that not only engaged the person into coming back but also developed strength in her body so that she could find that winning feeling to become a regular there. Ruvalcaba states, "I spoke with our wellness coach and exercises were carefully created so that a comfort level was developed which turned into trust. We wanted to let this person know that we were there for them and it was perhaps a scary moment in their life too.



Summit on Firearms Safety brings residents together

County

anta Clara County works best when we work together. I've been saying that, and trying to live by it, since I joined the Board of Supervisors in 2007.

A few months ago, I was able to watch those words come to life at the

Community Summit on Firearms Safety, a day of table-top discussions of 300 people about a topic that has polarized our nation.

We called for the summit shortly after the horrific school shooting in Parkland, Fla., and since then, the U.S. has suffered two more mass shootings in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, and Thousand Oaks, California. The Firearms Summit was

a civic engagement experiment to see if we could share diverse opinions and avoid the all-too-common shouting matches we have experienced at town hall meetings.

It worked. Residents came together representing a wide variety of viewpoints and experiences with firearms, including National Rifle Association members, public health workers, educators, Second Amendment Rights advocates, students, clergy, parents and community leaders. They were conservative and liberal, diverse in ethnicity, age and income.

The goal was not to change anyone's mind, but to simply listen to, and perhaps better understand, another's beliefs. But we did agree on a few things:

Firearms must be used safely, children must be safe in their schools, and nobody wants to promote the infliction of harm on self or others, whether it be criminal activity such as domestic violence, or the use of firearms in suicide.

The use of firearms in suicide is especially alarming in Santa Clara County. According to data from the County Medical Examiner/Coroner's Office, from 2014 to 2017, 179 of 275 deaths from firearms were suicides. That's 65 percent, or nearly twothirds of all deaths by firearms during that period.

While the taking of one's life is complicated, and solutions are not always apparent, attendees at the summit called for more mental health services focused on crisis intervention and better communication to the public about services that are available now.

We also came up with recommendations, including one that I introduced to the Board of Supervisors at the November 20 meet-

ing. The idea came from Rayna Ritchie, a summit participant and member of the NRA, who proposed that owners of unwanted guns should be able to turn them into law enforcement offices without the monetary reward offered at gun "buy back" events, at any time, with no questions asked. Through my initiative, and with Board approval, the Sheriff's Office is working to develop that idea into a program.

In a post-event survey, 98.5% agreed we should continue this work. I am committed to working with agencies, individuals and community organizations on increasing mental health services and in widely spreading the word that the County can help. Estate, gift tax laws are confusing TeethXpress[®]

This Week's Question:

I am confused by current estate and gift tax laws. Can you provide an overview? What can be done to minimize estate taxes on my death so my children keep more of what I have worked hard for?"

John M., San Jose

Most all of us would rather give our assets to our children, grandchildren, etc. when we (along with our spouses) are gone, rather than having it go to good old Uncle Sam. With some planning, you can maximize what goes to your children, and minimize what Uncle Sam gets.

Let's have a look at the basics of fed-

eral estate and gift tax planning. California does not have any estate tax or filing requirements (it was repealed) with rare exceptions, so this article addresses federal estate and tax laws only.

To put it simply, when you die, your estate will have to pay estate taxes if the net value of the estate (assets minus debts) is more than the permissible exemption amount for the applicable year. For 2018, the individual federal estate tax exemption is \$11.18

million per person in 2018 (it generally increases each year with inflation), meaning every dollar over the exempt amount is taxed at forty percent!

While you may be thinking hey, I am well under the exemption amount, so I have no worries, the laws could change and exemption amounts reduced, but more so, your assets are likely to grow substantially in value before your death. In Silicon Valley, this is all the more true, where small properties cost millions and appreciate consistently over measured time periods, and some fortunate start up employees come into millions in a matter of years. Or maybe this is your year to win the lottery!

As you and your spouse each get an 11.4 million exemption in 2019, a married couple jointly has 22.8 million in assets they can pass along without paying any federal estate tax. Amounts above the 22.8 million will be taxed heavily at 40%. If you are fortunate enough to be above this amount, you would be wise to consult counsel and get a proper estate plan, including a living trust, in place, for starters. Getting a revocable trust in place is also wise for those that fall under the exemption amounts and are not at risk of paying any estate taxes, because trusts have many other benefits such as avoiding probate court and bringing certainty to estate administration and distributions, to name a couple.

In addition to the individual estate

tax exemptions at death, you can currently make annual tax-free gifts of up to \$15,000 per recipient, and if you are married, you and your spouse together can give \$30,000 per recipient per year. Additionally, subject to specific rules, you can also give an unlimited amount for tuition and medical expenses if you make the gifts directly to the educational organization or health care provider. With respect to real property you want to pass along to your family, you can give your child a \$15,000 "interest" in the property each year, which can be discounted via appraisals under certain conditions, which can be a very effective way to transfer wealth at a discount.

> If you want to give more than \$15,000 in a given year, you can do so, but must report it to the IRS and it will begin to reduce your lifetime gift and estate tax exemption. Like estate assets, gifts in excess of exempt amounts are also taxed at forty percent at the federal level. Some planning here is the key to effectively utilizing annual and lifetime exemptions.

> For example, it can be especially wise to gift assets that are appreciat-

ing in value, because any income and appreciation that occur after such gift is made are removed from your taxable estate. However, the recipient then may have to pay capital gains tax if the asset is later sold, with such tax calculated using your original basis ... meaning the recipient is taxed on the difference between your purchase price and the sale price. That could be a lot of tax. If the property passes through your estate after your death, the recipient may receive a step up in basis as of the date of your death (basis is the fair market value at your death), which would save a lot of capital gains tax on the subsequent sale of the asset.

No offense, Uncle Sammy, but I want my kids to keep as much of our family assets as possible! Consult counsel and get an appropriate estate plan in place. It makes good sense to take care of your family, whether you are under or over the estate tax exemption thresholds.

Care needed in using fuel-burning heat sources during the winter months

uring the winter months, fuel-burning heat sources increase the risk of carbon monoxide (CO) poisoning. While these devices provide comfort from the cold, thorough precautions are needed to protect against this silent killer.

CO is a colorless and odorless gas whose symptoms mimic those of the flu. Each year, CO poisoning is the cause of 450 deaths due to accidental exposure and First Alert, the most trusted brand in home safety, recommends the following tips and tools for staying safe and warm this winter:

- Have fuel-burning appliances inspected regularly: Arrange for an annual, professional inspection of all fuel-burning appliances, such as furnaces, stoves, fireplaces, clothes dryers and water heaters to detect any CO leaks.
 - Never use generators

Continued from page 18 for media on reporting suicides, training sessions for community members on warning signs and how to talk to people in crisis, as a long list of resources available from the County, nonprofits and community organizations.

The County's Suicide and Crisis Hotline is staffed 24/7 in three languages, and most school districts in the County have received training in youth suicide prevention. The County's School Linked Services Program, which is now at schools in 13 districts throughout the County, provides mental health treatment for youth and families.

But we can all do more. If you know of anyone who suffers from depression or other mental health diagnoses, take time to let him or her know that you care and that there is help available. If the schools in your district lack sufficient mental health services, let the school boards know that this is not acceptable. Or let me know. There is more the County can do through the School Linked Services program.

indoors: In the case of a power outage, portable electric generators must be used outside and at least 10 feet away from the home. Never use them inside the home, in a garage or in any confined area where CO can collect. Additionally, homeown-

ers should refrain from using charcoal grills, camp stoves and other similar devices indoors.

• Install/test CO alarms: CO alarms are the only way to detect this poisonous gas. Alarms should be installed on

every level of the home and near each sleeping area for maximum protection. Newer alarms, like the First Alert 10-Year Battery Carbon Monoxide Alarm, have a sealed battery that provides up to 10 years of protection. Regardless of the battery life, CO alarms should be tested monthly.

• Be aware of the garage: Never leave a running car inside a garage, even if the door is open. CO emitted from the car will not only fill the garage, but will seep into the home.


