





Johnson retires from United Way of the Pine Belt Region

After 19 years of service as executive director of the United Way of the Pine Belt Region, Barbara Johnson has retired. Many folks involved with the organization never thought the day would come that Johnson would actually leave; she had talked about retiring for several years. Friday December 14, she walked out of the Chisholm Center Building at the corner of Oak and Magnolia for the last time leaving the executive directorship in the hands of longtime friend and former coworker Rhonda Gilbert.

Johnson began volunteering with the United Way in 1984 when she was working at Trustmark Bank. "I still remember Bob Gaddis calling me into his office and asking me to be a volunteer with the United Way," said Johnson. Gaddis was the bank president, and very active in United Way. "He asked me to serve on the Citizen's Review Panel."

The Citizen's Review Panel visits and reviews the United Way partnership agencies and works with the Fund Distribution Committee in deciding on the amount of money allocated to each agency.

"The first year I was on the Citizen's Review Panel, I went for four interviews and I still remember them. I visited the

Christian Food Mission, Parents for Drug Free Youth, Laurel Language, Speech, and Hearing, and the Pine Belt Drug Alliance," recalled Johnson. "After going on those four interviews, I thought, oh my gosh, look at what these people are doing with the amount of money they are getting from the United Way and the services they are providing to our community. I thought how awesome it was that they could provide those services. Then I thought, they're not getting enough money."

Johnson said she served on the Citizen's Review Panel for three or four years. "I always wanted to do more," exclaimed Johnson. "My goal was to be Fund Distribution Chairman. I knew that the Fund Distribution Chairman oversaw the Fund Distribution committee and all the people on the Citizen's Review Panel. I thought about being able to influence how much money we could raise in the community if I was Fund Distribution Chairman." Johnson became Fund Distribution Chairman and served three or four years as chairman.

"Then one day, Bob Gaddis called me into his office again and asked me if I wanted to get involved with the campaign process of the United Way. I became the Commercial Division Chairman. At one point, I was Fund Distribution Chairman and Regional Campaign Chairman. It was a unique situation. As far as I know, I'm the only person that has served a dual chairmanship like that."

After serving as a volunteer for 15 years, the opportunity for Johnson to serve fulltime with the United Way came in 1999 when the Executive Director at the time, Anna Willis, decided to retire. "I told them I would give three years. The

first year I was going to access where we were and make changes. The second year I was going to implement those changes and determine their success. And, the third year I was going to analyze those changes to make sure everything was in shape, and then I would be gone. I was going to do something else." Nineteen years later, Johnson has decided to finally do that "something else."


"I believe that sometimes in order for an organization to be more successful you have to have a change in leadership," said Johnson. "Times have changed, attitudes have changed, and our community has changed. I've always wanted what was best for United Way. I've had a great 33 years with United Way. It's time for a leadership change."

Johnson said she's looking forward to traveling and spending more time with her family.

Gilbert comes to the United Way with over 30 years' experience in the Banking Industry having previously worked with the Bank of Jones County and First State Bank as assistant vice president, and most recently with Grand Bank in Hattiesburg as internal auditor.






The Story Teller: "Left for Dead"

A meal was provided by FCA board members at the JC Banquet Hall for the children and their families. Agape Church Pastor James Hill shared the Christmas story with everyone.


"He knocked it out of the park," Pittman said.



Mississippi all-stars stop Alabama for second year in a row

Jarod Conner was far from satisfied with his final performance in a Hattiesburg uniform back in November. That and his Tigers' early exit of the Class 5A playoffs only fueled his determination to represent his state and go out a winner in Monday night's Mississippi-Alabama All-Star Game. When the clock struck zero at Montgomery's Cramton Bowl, Conner had amassed 116 rushing yards and two touchdowns. The Ole Miss running back commit earned MVP honors, as he led Team Mississippi to a 24-20 victory and a second straight win in the rivalry.

"I knew I had to rep Mississippi across my chest and had to come out and play hard for my team," said Conner. "For Mississippi and Hattiesburg, too. I knew the coaches wanted to win bad, so I had to come out and play and have my mind focused on the game to run hard."

After Alabama struck first in the first quarter off a Bo Nix-to-George Pickens touchdown connection, Conner found the end zone late in the second quarter on a two-yard run to tie the game, 7-7. On the scoring play, he took the hand-off from Oak Grove quarterback John Rhys Plumlee, who played alongside Conner most of the night and finished with 116 yards (77 passing, 39

"That was a lot of fun," said Plumlee of teaming up with Conner. "We got to know each other over the week pretty well. We hadn't really talked a whole lot before the week started, but I'd call us pretty close now. He's a really cool guy for sure."

With 9:44 left in the third quarter, Team

Mississippi took a 14-7 lead off Conner's second touchdown run of the day—a sixyard scamper. Conner and Tupelo standout Jacquerrious Williams ran wild much of the second half.

"We saw they were getting tired," said Laurel offensive lineman Charles Cross, who started at left tackle for Team Mississippi. "We were hitting them every time and hitting them in the mouth with it."

Mississippi often brought defensive lineman Nathan Pickering (Seminary) and Byron Young (West Jones) in as extra blockers, too.

"For me to get back there, I'm ready....let's go. It was fun," said Pickering. "To be honest, I wasn't expecting them to do it because I'm pretty sure they picked someone who actually does that for a living at high school. But it was amazing for me to get back there, it was fun."

Pickering Defensively, and company locked down after surrendering that early score in the first quarter.

"We did some adjustments at halftime," said Pickering. "We just told them, 'Hey, you can't let them beat you deep and you gotta play aggressive'. That's what they did. The d-line, we kept doing what we were doing in chasing him [the quarterback] and basically agitating the offensive line."

Early in the fourth quarter, Team Mississippi extended their lead to 21-7 off a 13yard touchdown run from Williams, who finished with 97 yards. Shortly after Alabama cut the lead to seven points, Mississippi put the

game away with 35 seconds left, as Clinton's Tucker Barefoot connected on a 43yard field goal, making it 24-14 Mississippi.

"It was a really neat experience to be able to put the pads on one more time as a high school guy and win it," said Plumlee. "It really meant a lot, especially with all these guys. These are some extremely talented guys, and they're really good guys off the field as well."

As time expired, Alabama scored on another Nix-to-Pickens touchdown connection, but it was too little too late. "It's very emotional, but for me to end it like this is very honoring," added Pickering, who finished with five tackles. "To come out and compete with the best teams in Mississippi, it's just an honor for me to be here and showcase my talent."

As previously mentioned, it's Mississippi's second straight win in the rivalry. "When we came, the first thing they told us was that this was a business trip," said Byron Young. "We knew we were gonna come over here, and that there would be a lot of hard work. We had to have our heads on right and be prepared to win this football

Other local standouts who participated in the game were Sumrall wide receiver Dannis Jackson, who finished with one catch for nine yards, and Hattiesburg defensive lineman Jaren Handy and defensive back Hakeem Vance. Local coaches Tony Vance (Hattiesburg), Kenny Robinson (Mize) and Todd Mangum (Wayne County) participated
