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The Importance of Passion

I don't talk about my son, Justice, very often. Probably because for the most part, he's under the radar. Not because he's the baby, as my girls always point out. Not because he's my favorite, as the girls always say. I don't have favorites. I actually bought them a book one year, "You're All My Favorite" by Sam McBratney, to help visualize and explain via someone else's brilliant storytelling, that they're all very special to me.

I think Justice isn't talked about much because he's kind of quiet. If you know him, he talks quite a bit, but on a daily, even annual, basis he doesn't require much. Just food, hugs, rides, hot chocolate, and sports equipment. He's kind of low maintenance but can be a bit costly. Since pee-wee-league days, he's played football, baseball, basketball, wrestling, and the new one lacrosse. He excels at most of them. We share a love of football together. He's taught me to love basketball. And, we're learning lacrosse together. But, his passion, in my opinion, is wrestling. If you watch him in the zone...view him in action...listen to him tell the play by play of each match (even if you were right there with him and saw it all), you know there's a drive and a thirst for it like no other sport so far. I might live on the sidelines, but he is staying out of trouble, so it's worth it.

As a child, I wasn't the focus of my parent's lives. My folks were too busy arguing and working. Then too busy divorcing, moving on, and working. In elementary school, I found choir to be of interest because I loved singing. I enjoyed being on stage with the other kids, learning new music, it made me happy. But, no one at home came to watch me, or even seemed to care. So, I didn't continue. I wished I had. I'd go on to high school with no focus, hobby, or passion, except for paper, books and journaling (which I used mostly to deal with feelings). Still, no one took notice of that. If they had, they would've realized I was creative, good in English, and if I tanked in one class, like History, I would make it up on my reports because I wrote my way to into it. No one paid attention. No one tried to foster my interests. That is why I'm always an advocate of my children's talents and interests.

I have put my kids in karate, dance, drama, sports and library/community offered



classes which all matched their current interests. Some of them stuck, some of them didn't. The ones they wound up loving, were the ones they wound up staying in. And, as I watch the differences between these kids and myself at their age, I see that the hobby, the passion for something, has kept them focused and out of trouble. No matter the cost, the time, the taxiing, I will invest 'til my last penny, or gallon of gas for them. Because, if before and after school they are working out with their team, or every day after school they are practicing for the next choir performance, there really isn't any time to hang out with the wrong 'bored' crowd and get into trouble or wind up places you shouldn't.

I wish my parents had realized that. I began smoking at 10 or 11 (well, that was because the cigarette butts were in my Nanny's ashtray and the matches were close by, and well, put my cousin and I together and we could do some damage). But, it went as far as hanging out with the kids who smoked marijuana, in junior high, having a sip of my first beer at 12, and winding up at parties I had no business being at in high school (when I

didn't even know what they were drinking or the party drink references). It wasn't me, I was out of the loop, not too interested actually, but would wind up in the wrong places anyway, because I didn't have anything else to do...and nobody cared. My parents weren't paying attention, to me. If they had, they would've noticed my love and talent for art, music and photography. If they had been, they would have taken me to the local library to take books out on those things. If they realized how much I loved writing and drawing, they would've bought me pens, paper and art supplies. But they didn't. If they would have believed in my ability to see things in a very artistic, creative way, they would have found the ways and the means to support my high school art class choices and my college selections, rather than pull me out of my chosen classes, buy me a type writer, and send me to secretarial school. Okay, so I'll admit, I'm a damn good administrative assistant and I kill it on a keyboard, but it still leaves many of my inner passions by the wayside, not to mention a better paycheck.

There is no promise that later in life we'll be blessed enough to have a career doing what we love. Some will. But, even if it never happens, we have to think about the other side of life for our children (and for ourselves). The time we have before and after work, the weekends, retirement. That part

of us is important too. What we do in our down time, helps keep us focused on the other parts of life.

Passion brings purpose, joy, release. Passions equals fun, and often times it's the only fun a kid or parent has on a given day. Whether a very small child, elementary schooler, middle school or high schooler, even in college, kids need an outlet. Someplace they can find happiness. Life is stressful. Life can be hard. Without a hunger for something more; a hobby or activity that allows a person to let go of what must be done...it can sometimes feel pointless. The balance must be there, or there's burn out, frustration, exhaustion and depression. There are too many 'have to's' and not enough 'love to's' in daily life sometimes

For years I've boycotted New Year's Resolutions. Instead, I've chosen to incorporate into my year one word that can make a difference in my daily life, and which will lead up to a larger goal for the whole year; to become better. What that is each year, I never know until I'm almost through the previous year and look back at how it went with the last word I chose. This year my one word is PASSION!

When my kids were small, I found a ton of things that kept a fire burning outside of being a mom (which is my favorite job in the



Can Learning Be Fun?

Regularly, I see students of all ages that need a respite from learning and school. My first question to them is, "What would YOU like to learn?" They are often shocked that anyone

cares what they want to learn.

Over my many years consulting with families, I have found creative ways to take any interest and make it into a positive learning experience. This does not mean we ignore skill deficits. It does not mean we don't teach the required subjects for a high school diploma. However, it means the student becomes more engaged in the learning experience.

I tell parents not to expect miracles. If your child has shut down and does not want to learn, it may take months to repair enthusiasm and motivation.

About ten years ago, we had a tenth grader that had been thrown out of a private high school. He was barely making it to his public high school one period a day. The school even provided a van to pick him up.

Through the Ohio Autism Scholarship Program and a school we work with to grant diplomas, we began to slowly help this young man become engaged in learning again. He was interested in gaming blogs so his English course was designed around researching them and writing about them. He was improving his writing skills. He wanted to visit London so his geography course focused on planning a trip to London. Transportation, sites, housing, and a budget were all part of the course. It required research, math and problem-solving skills.

Why does learning have to be boring? I know the Common Core directs our



students' learning. We have "important" standardized tests that require preparation. But, must all learning be like this?

Learning how to learn should be the purpose of school. We do not need to pour information into our children's heads. Some of them even have poor memories. Students need to learn basic skills: reading, spelling, writing and math. With these skills and curiosity to learn will take you far in life.

I never took a business course and knew nothing about accounting when I started my business 34 years ago. But, I had passion for learning how to learn and believed that I could succeed.

Yes, learning can be fun! We spend about \$640 Billion dollars a year on education in the United States, yet statistically year after year we fail to give our children the skills they need. And, typically learning isn't even fun for the \$640 Billion!

St. Gabriel Community and School Celebrate **Christmas By Giving Back**

The whole St. Gabriel community pulled efforts together during Advent to provide gifts to brothers and sisters in need. Sue Bettelev has become known as "Head Elf" at St. Gabriel. Since 1980 she and other parishioners along the way have led the annual gift giving effort at St. Gabriel, better known as The Scrolls.

Sue lives in Painesville with her husband, Gary, and works in Willoughby at Meister Media Worldwide as an Office Manager. She has six grown children and six grandchildren. In the mid-eighties Sue implemented the "Scroll Idea" her ministry still uses today. Her ministry receives requests from St. Vincent de Paul clients as well as other churches and referral agencies.

New this year, St. Gabriel provided gifts to Altercare residents who do not have families. The total number of families and single recipients for Christmas 2018 was over 200, resulting in close to a thousand gifts for the needy.

Many ministries such as St. Gabriel School classes, Christ Child, and Good Shepherd participate by "adopting a family." They "adopt" the whole family and buy and wrap the gifts. Sometimes local companies will adopt families as well. Most gifts are bought and wrapped by parishioners and dropped off at the parish waiting to be distributed.

Two weeks prior to Christmas the sorting begins. Armed with her spreadsheet,

codes, and volunteers the elves set out to do a mini North Pole Workshop of sorting and bagging by family. Sue checks her list twice making sure all clients receive a gift. It is an awesome experience to witness the thousands of gifts together in one room. Truly the love of Jesus is present in each and every gift.

"We have a very generous parish. It's not just me—it's the WHOLE parish pulling together! The generosity amazes me!" Sue thankfully exclaims. "I am also thankful to the volunteers for sorting day. This piece has really improved over the years! It does more for me than it does for the recipients. You just have to give back. My family gets more out of it each year," Sue shared.

This past year, Steve O'Hearn, Parish Council member, had an idea to add a seed of evangelization to the effort. All bags that went home to families had a Christmas blessing tag that included an invitation to join us for Christmas Mass. This new tradition will hopefully take root when we welcome them to our commu-

"This idea to invite the recipients to Mass took the scroll effort to a whole new level. With God's help this powerful prayer and invitation to people can be the seed that takes root to change lives and give the ultimate gift of Jesus' Love. The gift of faith goes way beyond the material gifts," said Fr. Fred.

SLED SAFE

Don't sled in parking areas, roadways, rivers or lakes. Always ride sitting and facing forward (going down head first increases the chance of head and spinal injuries). Sledding equipment should be in good repair without sharp edges. Avoid "jumps" that send a rider airborne—the higher they fly, the harder they fall. The building of such "jumps" is a violation of Park Rule 5.1(e) and the offender can be cited. Watch for other sledders and walk up the side when returning to the top of the hill.
