Charles Cross ready for next level at MSU

Previously committed to Florida State, then switching to Mississippi State, Laurel's four-star OT signed his National Letter of Intent with the Bulldogs on Wednesday, December 19 as a part of the NCAA's early signing period.

"It's been a long and I wouldn't say stressful, but an interesting process," said Cross inside the Laurel High School Auditorium. "I've enjoyed it."

Upon his decision to decommit from Florida State in late November, Mississippi State became the obvious choice for Cross after a 19-day decision process. "It felt like a family environment, and I felt comfortable with it," said Cross added. "I enjoyed my visits there. They care about their football players. I felt that it was the best place for me."

"He's such an outstanding young man," said Laurel head coach Todd Breland. "Everything good that comes to him, he deserves it. He works hard, and he's a humble young man. We here at Laurel are certainly proud of him. Mississippi State has a good one coming."

Accolades and awards seemed nonstop of the nation's No. 194 overall player as rated by ESPN 300. Back in September, Cross was selected to play in the U.S.

Army All-American Bowl along with another Jones County standout, Byron Young from West Jones. Young is currently committed to Alabama and will sign his NLI in February. The All-American Bowl is set for early January. Cross played in the Mississippi-Alabama All-Star foot-

ball game in Montgomery, Alabama. He was also selected to Sports601's All-Area Team for the 2018 season.

Mississippi State finished the early signing period with the No. 14 ranked class in the nation, according to ESPN.com. Their ranking according to 247 Sports is cur-

rently No. 19 in the nation. The Bulldogs presently have 22 commits or signees, including Cross, and MSU head coach Joe Moorhead is looking to add several more players by the February late signing date. The Bulldogs have seven four-stars in its 2019 class, including Cross, according to the 247 composite rankings.

"I'm happy to be able to stay in the state [of Mississippi]," said Cross. "I love Mississippi, and I'm not ashamed of where I come from. I'll keep on representing."

Cross added that he loves the idea of playing nearby in Starkville, where family and friends can easily watch him play.

The Story Teller - Building on the bank of Big Creek

"It'll take us a good month to get to Mississippi, even on these horses, and there ain't no tellin' what we'll find along the way. Should be safe enough, once we get into Alabama, but Georgia's likely to have Yankee troops still around."

Ed was talking to himself and pretty much thinking out loud. Clariesa didn't speak much that he could understand, and she surely couldn't understand much of what he said

She had understood that her brother and Ed had agreed that she go with Ed, and she hadn't hesitated to do so;

she'd grown fond of him over the last few weeks. He could travel now, and life for her people wasn't what it ought to be any more.

There had been soldiers passing through off and on for quite a while, and most of them had helped themselves to whatever they'd seen and wanted, women included. They all knew things for the Indian would



never be right again. So many had been made to leave their homes, and life was uncertain for those still scattered around. Yet, she had no real idea of where he was taking her or of how far from her home she would always be. Whether or not he was really a good man she didn't know, but she figured she had no choice but to make of her situation what she could, and she'd give it her best regardless.

Edward was 46 years her senior and likely was leaving a family in Carolina when he and Clariesa set out for Mississippi. He was at least 63 at the time, and any children he might be leaving were most likely grown. Nor was it unusual for a man of his age to take a young wife as he had taken her. He had agreed to come to Mississippi as an Indian agent, and his having a Choctow Indian 'wife' certainly was to his advantage. Clariesa's having been a mid-wife among her people would make her an even more valuable asset to Ed as he moved among the tribes to whom he'd

It did take a bit over two months for them to reach Jones County and the area that they would call home. The war hadn't had much effect on the area, since no real battles had been fought nearby. Not many of their soon-to-be friends and neighbors had gone to the war. Most had felt it wasn't their war to fight, and some locals had even hidden out to avoid being made to join up, so he wasn't given a whole lot of attention one way or the other when they arrived. His worn, tattered and bloody uniform had been burned weeks ago back in the Indian settlement, so what he wore didn't make him look like a soldier anyway. What was most important to him now was the building of a cabin and the getting some sort of garden planted.

They stopped briefly at farms they passed to introduce themselves. He agreed with several that they had to get in touch with the preacher to make their marriage official and legal, and that they would do. But first a cabin had to go up,

and that was something Clariesa would have a say about. The community in which they chose to settle had for years been called Big Creek, because of its creek that swelled so in the spring.

Edward picked out a spot where he wanted to put the cabin. He thought how nice it would be to have the creek so close to the house. "I'm thinking I could almost fish from the porch," he laughingly said.

But she had other, better ideas. Being an Indian, after all, she had a pretty good understanding of choosing house sites. Her people had moved round more than they had wanted to as of late. So, she studied the lay of the land, the width and current of the creek, and the height of the banks, and she could tell that the place he had chosen would more than likely be under water come spring. Therefore, they put the new cabin up on the hill above the creek and back about a hundred feet from the edge of the bank. "The poor boy will have to walk a ways to drown his worms," she giggled to herself, as he began to lay the logs for the room.

Edward knew quite a bit about the home life of an Indian family, and he was most pleased with what she expected of him. To her way of thinking, the home and the running of it was her job. Not only would she keep house, prepare meals and rear children, but also would she be responsible for most of the work around the place. She had been brought up to take good care of her husband, and that she would do. Putting in and working the garden was woman's work, and she did so with an ox.

Clariesa expected Ed to keep danger away from their door and meat on their table. He spent most of his time hunting in the winter and fishing in the summer. If he even tried to lighten her work load, she got insulted. Again, her way of thinking was well engrained in her consciousness. "No woman worth her salt would allow a man to do her work and certainly not where any friend or neighbor might see him doing it," she told herself and her husband.

Between the years 1864 and 1886, she birthed nine babies of her own and reared all of them. They had four daughters and five sons. Clariesa cooked in the fireplace of their cabin and often was seen to move the hot coals around the pots with her bare, calloused hands. If you were a customer of Shorty Royal's Western Ware in Soso when he was still its owner, you might remember having seen Clariesa's picture hanging on the wall there. Shorty was one proud grandson of this couple. A great percentage of the folks now in and around Jones County, Mississippi, are descended from this hearty couple. My mother-in-law, Frances Eugina McCarty, was the youngest child of Ed and Clariesa's third child, John Sampson, who married Mary Ardella Coats. And it is my pleasure to be able to know and to say that my children inherited much from these steady, hard-working pioneers. I have heard our Granny Mac speak so fondly of the stories of Edward and Clariesa that her parents shared with her and am so glad that they lived long

enough for many of their grandchildren to know and

to love them.

Jones College nursing faculty played a significant role in preparing confident nurses, graduate Alex Hill of Laurel shared with the audience. On the first day of classes, Hill said the classes' fears impaired them from remembering how to do simple tasks but waned with more experience and support from faculty. She explained, "We knew they'd be watching our every move. We knew what to do but we were unsure of ourselves. However, I don't believe any of us will be able to thank them enough for sharing their knowledge, teaching us things we need to know, and even teaching us things to do at clinical to make our lives a little bit easier. They are not only our instructors, but they are also our role models."

As the students endured through the nursing program, several students earned special honors and were recognized by the Associate Degree Nursing Program Division Chair Erin Knight, MSN, RN. Four students were inducted into the National Honor Society for Associate Degree Nursing programs, Alpha Delta Nu, including Emily Davis of Laurel, Austin Griffith of Laurel, Ma-Calla Matthews of Laurel and Haley Merritt of Lucedale. 



Fifteen Bobcats sign with senior colleges ELLISVILLE - Jones College head

coach Steve Buckley enjoyed a little early Christmas present on Decem-

ber 19. Fifteen of his Bobcats signed with Division I programs that Wednesday, the first day of the early national signing period for college football.

"The two most exciting days of the year for me as

a head coach would be our signing day when we bring our new class in and then watching our own kids realize the fruits of their labor," he said. "To see them go on and sign with a four-year college is exciting and puts a stamp on the things we told them that could happen for them if they came in and committed to the program trusting the process, so to speak. They did everything athletically and academically to achieve this goal."

Four players will be heading to play in the Southeastern Conference, including safeties Jonathan Haynes (Ray Brooks) to Ole Miss and Fred Peters (Columbia) to Mississippi State, cornerback Jamar Richardson (Aliceville, Alabama) to Ole Miss and end/linebacker Marquez Bembry (Atlanta, Georgia) to Kentucky.

Tackle DaShawn Crawford (Bay Springs) is headed to the Atlantic Coast Conference to play for Virginia Tech. Three Bobcats will be playing in the American Athletic Conference, including cornerback Gabe Rogers (Jackson Callaway) and end Wardalis Ducksworth (Mize) to Memphis and linebacker Nick Anderson (Vicksburg) to Tulane.

Three Bobcat offensive linemen are going to play for Tennessee-Martin of the Ohio Valley Conference - tackle Cru Birdyshaw (Jasper, Alabama), guard Kordel Watts (Vicksburg) and guard Malcom Miller (Warren Central). Linebacker Davis Harrison (Lamar School) signed with the University Central Arkansas of the Southland Conference, defensive tackle Edward Haralson (Yazoo County) signed with Louisiana-Monroe of the Sun Belt Conference, end Devonte Toles (Pass Christian) signed with the University of North Alabama of the Atlantic Sun

Conference and offensive tackle Bryce Wade (Albuquerque, New Mexico) is going to the University of Massachusetts, which competes as an independent.

Buckley notes that all 15 of these players are going to

Division I schools.

"Look back over the last three signing classes with our kids going on to four-year schools and we have had 63 kids to sign and 53 of those have signed Division I," he said. "It speaks volumes to the kids' commitment and what they have done for the program and our assistant coaches for doing a great job of recruiting the right kids."

Each signee graduated from Jones earlier this month and will be enrolled at their respective four-year schools for the spring semester.

"All of these players will be enrolled in January and ready to go for spring training, which is so, so important," Buckley said. "It's important for our kids that come in as freshmen that they know they must graduate in December (sophomore year) for your stock to be most valuable."

The head coach expects a couple of more Bobcats to sign in the near future.

"I think we will have at least two more sign in the next few days or weeks," he said. "Every kid that signs (Wednesday) will have graduated in three semesters. That's pretty incredible. We have brought in 76 kids over the past three years and 74 of them have graduated in three semesters. The other two have graduated or will graduate in May."


Buckley said it's enjoyable to keep up with the players as they go on to play senior college football, noting that 11 former Bobcats are involved in bowl games this postseason.

West Jones girls basketball in great shape heading into Christmas break unbeaten

Heading into the Christmas break, West Jones is perfect on the season in girls basketball. Only one other team in the immediate area is without a loss on the season thus far. County and Region 5-5A rivals South Jones are holding steady at 12-0. Both are set to begin region play on Jan. 4th, squaring off against each other in Ellisville.

"It's hard to get ready for region play," said West Jones head coach Sharon Murray. "Some of the best teams are in our region, and they are our rival games. You don't know what's going to happen on a given night that you play."

Before that day comes though, Murray said some areas need to be addressed.

"We have to clean up our rebounding and blocking out," said Murray. "Communication on the floor needs some work, too. We have to communicate defensively.



Louisiana St. No. 1 In Collegiate Baseball Poll; all three Mississippi teams make Top 40

TUCSON, Ariz. — Louisiana St. is ranked No. 1 in Collegiate Baseball's Fabulous 40 NCAA Division I pre-season poll presented by Big League Chew bubble gum. The Tigers, winners of six national titles, will field its best ball club since 2017 when LSU finished second at the College World Series. Five returning position player starters are back and six superb pitchers. Plus, key players return after sitting out virtually all last season because of

RHP Eric Walker (8-2, 3.48 ERA, 78 K in 2017 and a Freshman All-American by Collegiate Baseball) didn't pitch in 2018 as he recovered from Tommy John surgery in 2017. Shortstop Josh Smith suffered a stress fracture in his back during the season-opening Notre Dame series last season and only played in six games before he was shut down. The Tigers have a number of high profile pro prospects, including RHP Zack Hess (7-6, 107 K, 49 BB in 92.6 IP), SS Josh Smith (.281, 5 HR, 16 2B, 48 RBI in 2017), CF Zach Watson (.308, 7 HR, 15 2B, 34 RBI, 14 SB), RF Antoine Duplantis (.328, 2 HR, 13 2B, 48 RBI, 19 SB) and LF Daniel Cabrera (.315, 8 HR, 18 2B, 54 RBI) to name a few. Plus, LSU landed the No. 1 recruiting class in the nation last fall by Collegiate Baseball with an impressive haul of 16 newcomers that features seven drafted players.

"We should have a very fine ball club in 2019," said LSU Head Coach Paul Mainieri. "I feel as though we had three separate recruiting classes during the past year. We had our regular recruiting class that was ranked No. 1 in the nation. We also were able to bring back Zack Hess, Zach Watson and Antoine Duplantis, who were drafted after last season but didn't sign with pro teams. Then we got back two superb players who were injured last season in RHP Eric Walker and SS Josh Smith."

"With all of these players coming together on one team during the past fall, our 2019 ball club reminds me a lot of our 2017 team that finished second at the College World Series to Florida. We have a nice blend of veterans back and new guys.

"Last season, we fought through some key injuries to players, and we showed a lot of character. While we didn't finish where we wanted to (College World Series), our players gained a lot of confidence and played well at the end of the year," he continued. "We beat three teams in the SEC Tournament that ultimately made it to the College World Series in Arkansas, Florida and Mississippi St.

5 ways to raise a confident, adventurous child

(Family Features) From taking steps toward the stairs to learning that bubbles don't taste good, exploration is a part of development for babies and young children. While it's an exciting time, it also can be coupled with anxiety and hesitation as parents find themselves saying "no" or jumping in when baby discovers a new space.

An Open for Adventure survey from Babyganics found a majority of parents (69 percent) believe a child can learn to be more confident if he or she is allowed to explore freely as a baby. However, letting go doesn't always come naturally for parents.

Clinical health psychologist Dr. Bobbi Wegner encourages parents to be explorer parents, which focuses on raising resilient, confident and adventurous humans through challenge and discovery. She offers these tips for parents:

- Aid in discovery. Encourage and applaud baby's healthy risk-taking, such as mastering a challenging stair climb or pushing through moments of frustration and failure. Additionally, create teachable moments that introduce your child to necessary limits. For example, if you have hot coffee in the morning and your little one wants to touch the mug, let him or her gently touch a warm area of the mug with a fingertip and repeat that the mug is "hot" to help encourage exploration and flex baby's senses.
- Let baby be free. While you may think baby gadgets are necessary for playtime, consider rethinking those toys. Instead of searching for stimulation through lights and sounds from a toy, allow your baby to explore the natural environment. Look for opportunities that allow him or her to make a manageable mess and even get wet or dirty. This could be as simple as playing with a container filled with water or letting your baby pull up grass in the backyard. These small unstructured play adventures can help develop independence and confidence.
- Engage the senses. Exposing your baby to new flavors and smells helps engage him or her on a multi-sensory level. For example, allowing your baby (at an appropriate age, typically between 4-7 months) to try new foods can provide a feeling of accomplishment while also exposing him or her to different textures and flavors. Encourage even more sensory exploration by allowing your baby to smell the food and even play with it using his or her fingers.
- Provide early exposure to new places. Bringing baby along to restaurants and other public spaces allows for positive exposure to new places, people and sounds, which can help build the immune system, encourage social interaction and support development. While letting a child explore in a public setting like an airport or train station can make many parents anxious, carrying products such as Babyganics Alcohol-Free Hand Sanitizing Wipes can help ease parents' apprehension and keep little hands germ-free while on the go.
- Wait a moment. It's common for parents to intervene the moment baby awakes from a nap or starts moving toward the stairs. "Parents often look to their own internal response to guide parenting: 'If I am worried then it must be dangerous, and I should not allow my baby to do it,'" Wegner said. "When in fact, parents should prioritize their baby's exploration and needs to provide learning opportunities rather than allowing their own anxieties to impede their children."

Southern Miss baseball adds 11 for 2020 campaign, including West Jones' Dickerson

HATTIESBURG, Miss. - Southern Miss baseball coach Scott Berry announced 11 additions to the 2020 roster who were added during the early signing period. Those individuals include right-handed pitcher/infielder Michael Brewer (Hillsboro, Mo.), catcher/outfielder Cody Milligan (Binger, Kan.), infielder Brady Faust (New Orleans, La.), outfielder Billy Garrity (Hattiesburg, Miss.), infielder Dustin Dickerson (Laurel, Miss., West Jones), left-handed pitcher Chandler Best (Mobile, Ala.), along with right-handed pitchers Matt Adams (Pearland, Texas), Dallas Dyar (Raymond, Miss.), Ben Ethridge (Collinsville, Miss.), Isaiah Rhodes (McKinney, Texas) and Blake Wehunt (Carnesville, Ga.).

"We have put together another solid group of additions for our program starting for the 2020 season," said Southern Miss coach Scott Berry. "Associate head coach Chad Caillet and Christian Ostrander did a great job of going out and identifying the types of players that thrive in our baseball program – ones that excel both on the field and in the classroom. We look forward to them joining us next fall."

Brewer, at 6-foot-4, 215 lbs., batted .429 last season for Hillsboro High School, where he collected four doubles, four triples, two home runs and 20 RBI in in 56 at bats. In addition, he posted a 3-1 pitching record over 10 appearance (six starts) with a 3.73 ERA which included 52 strikeouts and 14 walks over 35 2/3 innings of work. He earned first-team honors on both the Jefferson County Activities Association in both basketball and baseball.

Milligan, at 5-foot-9, 170, comes to Southern Miss after playing this spring at Cowley County (Kan.) Community College. He originally signed at Oklahoma State and was 1-for-8 with the Cowboys in 15 games during the 2018 season. He helped lead Binger-Oney High School to back-to-back Class A state championships as a junior and senior, while batting .571 with 10 home runs and 49 RBI as a senior, to go along with 12 doubles and five triples. Milligan was named a 2017 MaxPreps Small Schools All-American.

Faust, at 5-foot-10, 175 lbs., hit .352 with 13 RBI and 11 stolen bases as a junior at Brother Martin High School on his way to all-district honors. He was also an all-district wide receiver for the Crusaders football team, catching the game-winning touchdown pass in the waning seconds of Brother Martin's victory over Bastrop.

Garrity, at 6-foot, 200 lbs., has seen action for Sumrall High School since his freshman season. In his career, he has played 96 games, with a .315 batting average, 15 home runs and 87 RBI. He hit .377 as a sophomore with hit seven homers, and then followed that up with a .341 season and eight long balls as a junior. He played football as well for the Bobcats.

Dickerson, at 5-foot-4, 160 lbs., played for former Golden Eagle great Trey Sutton at West Jones High School. Dickerson has been a starter for the West Jones baseball program since his freshman year. He holds a .283 career batting average, including at a .333 clip his junior season. As a junior, Dickerson helped West Jones (27-5) advance to the MHSAA Class 5A South State Championship series for just the fourth time in school history, standing out at both shortstop and on the mound. In 2018, Dickerson finished 8-1 from the mound in 14 appearances with a 1.18 ERA and led all Mustang pitchers with 83 strikeouts in 66.1 innings pitched.

Best, at 5-foot-11, 185 lbs., has seen action for McGill-Toolen High School since his freshman year. Best holds a 25-1 record with 194 strikeouts over his career, including 103 as a junior. His ERA is at 0.66, while also hitting .327 at the plate with 20 RBI. Last season, he fanned 15 of 21 batters to throw a perfect game against rival Murphy and went on to earn ASWA Class 7A first-team all-state honors.

Adams, at 6-foot-1, 170 lbs., helped his school – Pearland High School – to a 25-11 record his junior season. He threw a sixinning no hitter as a sophomore in a district game and has earned first-team All-District 23-6A the last two seasons. He also was a member of the Pearland Little League that went to the 2014 World Series in Williamsport, Va.

Dyar, at 6-foot-3, 195 lbs., posted a 5-2 record over 14 appearance the last two seasons for the Clinton High School Arrows. He has a 2.69 earned run average with 65 strikeouts and only 30 walks over 54 2/3 innings of work. In addition, he was a member of the 2018 Mississippi State Games played last summer

Ethridge, at 6-foot-1, 170 lbs., plays at West Lauderdale High School where over the last three years the school has won 76 games and won the 2017 MHSAA Class 4A state. He carried a 9-2 record as a starter behind a 1.07 earned run average last spring with 90 strikeouts and only 14 walks in 59 innings pitched. As a hitter, Ethridge posted a .377 batting average and accumulated nine RBIs with 15 runs.

Rhodes, at 6-foot-2, 155 lbs., preps at McKinney North High School where he has been an all-district performer the last two seasons. He threw a no-hitter as a sophomore with seven strikeouts and just one walk

Wehunt, at 6-foot-6, 218 lbs., was an allregion 8-AAA performer last season both as a position player and as a pitcher at Franklin County High School in Georgia. The righthander earned Region 8-AAA Player of the Year honors as a junior and threw a five-inning perfect game as a sophomore, in which he fanned 10 in the contest.


