The decision follows the announced retirement of Superintendent Kathy Gomez. Nunez is a former superintendent at San Jose's East Side Union High School District. He currently serves as an elected member of the Milpitas city council and is a former member of the Milpitas Unified Board of Education. He has a 40 year career in education.

Celebrate literacy for the New Year

Teaching a child to appreciate reading not only promotes academic achievement, but it also it opens opportunities for the imagination to soar and for kids to learn about topics beyond their wildest dreams.

This year, you can help promote children's literacy with these ideas:

Give books to children. You can find a book on virtually any topic, aimed at nearly every age and reading level. If you're not sure what a child likes to read, simply choose a book about a topic he or she enjoys, or a favorite fictional character.

After the parade, spectators can view the float up close, and the store will hand out 10,000 children's books – many of which were donated by Scholastic, the global children's publishing, education and media company – to parade-goers and post-event attendees.

Encourage kids to get hands-on with books. Reading isn't the only way to appreciate books; kids can get creative and make their own literature, too. Encourage them to write and illustrate their own stories they can share with the family.

"After interviews of very qualified candidates for the role, the Board of Trustees worked to select a person with the knowledge and experience needed to continue to help the District move forward with the excellent programs and operational details that make Evergreen great," said Charles Crosby, Information officer for the Evergreen School District.

Crosby said the Board made their choice based on a series of key criteria they sought in a successful candidate: "The ability to reestablish trust and confidence in stakeholder groups; someone who could quickly establish positive relationships with District employees, a leader who would be a champion for the students in the district - one who understands their diverse needs and who values their academic achievement as well as their social and civic development; a person who will be visible and active throughout the district, a valued adviser to the Board on crucial issues, and a leader in all aspects of the organization."

The Board is currently focused on important time sensitive issues such as budget development, staffing, land use planning, and program evaluation while simultaneously embarking on the inclusive process of finding a permanent leader for the District. They were particularly focused on finding an interim superintendent with valued experience and a proven skill set in these areas.

The search for a permanent Superintendent will begin this year.

At the conclusion of the 2018 season, Quimby Oak had been league champions for 18 years in a row; along the way piling up countless league, section, and county champions.

Most notably is Abbey Cabuag, who won her 2nd consecutive county championship this season wrapping up an undefeated season. She was the first girl in Santa Clara County history to win a county championship last year and repeated this season.

Middle school girl wrestlers compete against boys in each weight division. In recent years, girls have had a spike in success. Quimby had 22 girls try out for the team this year. Abbey and Kiely Tabaldo, 2018 league champions were the two team captains.

The majority of these wrestlers have gone on to wrestle at Evergreen High

In her younger years, Caitlin attended Cadwallader Elementary School, graduating in 2014. Six years later, as she aimed to receive the highest Girl Scout award, the Gold Award, Caitlin decided to devote over eighty hours to give back to her old elementary school for all the fond childhood memories Cadwallader Elementary supplied her with.

Understanding the very limited spacing for safe interactions between students and the rundown garden that began to collect weeds, Caitlin fundraised for her project to improve Cadwallader's appearance by communicating with local hardware stores for donations and asking her family and friends for any kind contributions. After obtaining a total of five hundred dollars, this young Girl Scout purchased all materials necessary for her project, and with her new team, she began to execute the project that she had be planning for over two years to accomplish her goal of creating treasured memories for the younger generations.

With a time period of roughly two years to complete paperwork and project, starting in 2017, the benches were finally installed, and the garden received its last touchups a few months ago. Students and faculty are now provided with an abundance of areas to interact and create long-lasting friendships.

All of this couldn't have been possible without the aid of Cadwallader's principal, Mrs. McClintock, and the supporting team of Lien Doan Hoa Binh. Both exemplifying the passion to help others and improving the atmosphere of a school environment is what led to the success of the Treasured Memories project, which will now continue to be a permanent addition to Cadwallader Elementary School for future generations to enjoy.

Middle Schoolers in Evergreen advance to Lego International Tournament

T tall started during the summer of 2016 in the garage of Nandini and Satish Lakshmanan, residents of Silver Creek Valley Country Club and coaches of First Lego League (FLL) team Mindbuilders.

This summer, a group of five enthusiastic students from Evergreen: Anish Sayani (7th grade BASIS Independent), Dharshan Bellan (7th grade BASIS Independent), Harshil Ahuja (7th grade Stratford Middle), Prateek Satish (6th grade Stratford Middle) and Roshan Amble (7th grade BASIS Independent) came together to take up the Lego challenge for 2018-2019.

While coach Satish primarily focuses on the Robot design and programming aspect, Nandini helps guiding the team on effective time management with Project and Core Values.

Every year, FLL releases a Challenge, which is based on a real-world scientific topic. Each challenge has three aspects to it. This year's theme is "Into Orbit".

The first aspect is the Robot Mission, involving challenges that are mat based and need to be solved using EV3 programming. The second aspect is the Project, which requires teams to come up with prototypes or innovative solutions to real problems faced by astronauts during long distance space travel. The third aspect is Core Values, which imbibes qualities in children that are critical to their professional development.

For the Robot mission, the Mind-Builders programmed and scored a high of 242 points that earned them their Robot Performance award. For the Project, the challenge was to solve physical and social stress during long duration space travel. Their solution was a Virtual reality driven, Android platform based, fitness app for the astronauts. The intent is to combat both physical and social stress for astronauts, by making workouts a fun experience. During the season, the team met with several industry professionals who provided consistent feedback to the team, on both the technicalities of the app and its usage.

Anish Sayani was responsible for building and developing the Core Samples Mission. He also came up with the concept of using Virtual Reality for their Project. Dharshan Bellan is an excellent builder of mission frames and displayed sound understanding of EV3 Programs and Android Development Studio. Harshil Ahuja was responsible for programming and building the key missions. Prateek Satish was responsible in building the base robot, and some of the critical frames. Roshan Amble is the *Continued, next page*

programming backbone for the team. For both Mission Models and Project, Roshan was the chief programmer.

The journey for the team this year has been nothing short of a rollercoaster ride. Registered initially with NorCal, they were slated to compete out of Vacaville on Nov. 17th. As the date rolled around, so did the forest fires, especially the "Campfire." Citing poor air quality issues, their tournament was cancelled, and the team was informed that they were eliminated. However, the team persisted their case with NorCal FLL and were eventually accommodated by the Central Valley Robotics. From being eliminated to winning the Champions Award twice and earning a spot at an International event, it has been a fulfilling journey for the team, coaches and parents.

At the recent First Lego League (FLL) Championship, Team MindBuilders (#31636) received the 1st Place Champions award at the Central Valley qualifier. In the following round, the regional Championship, they won the 1st place for Robot Performance followed by the 2nd place Champions Award. The Regional Championship win has earned them a spot at the Arkansas Razorback Invitational, which will host 72 competing teams from around the world that achieved top recognition in their respective region.

Community Work

The Mindbuilders also used their team platform to give back to their community in more than one way. They prepared sandwiches for a homeless shelter in San Jose, they taught underprivileged kids how to build a base robot and some simple yet fun robot techniques, and dropped newspapers for the Animal shelter. The team also held a holiday gift drive for the underprivileged and donated boxes full of gifts to the Ronald McDonald House Charities at Stanford.

Team MindBuilders' coaches hope this inspirational story of this young team will encourage other children in the Evergreen School District and beyond to consider First Lego League robotics as a way to learn STEM and inculcate qualities needed to be both successful and grounded.

3 popular eating plans you'll come across in the New Year

I you're thinking about revamping how you eat in the new year, you might want to think twice about the trendy dairyfree plans that crop up on your social media feed - as they could leave you missing out on nutrients you need.

Three of the most popular and healthpromoting eating plans of the moment - the Mediterranean Diet, Dietary Approaches to Stop Hypertension (DASH) Diet and Flexitarian Diet - all include dairy milk as an important component, and according to a study in the "Journal of the American Dietetic Association," it's hard to get nutrients you need without it.

New research also suggests adding an extra serving of dairy to the Mediterranean Diet makes it even more nutritious, boosting amounts of calcium, vitamin D and potassium without exceeding recommendations for nutrients to limit, like saturated fat and sodium, according to a study published in "The Journal of the American College of Nutrition." A second new study found not only does incorporating more dairy improve the quality of the diet, it benefits health, as well - specifically improving blood pressure and levels of good cholesterol (HDL) compared to a standard low-fat diet, according to research in "The American Journal of Clinical Nutrition." While the Mediterranean Diet typically includes around two servings of dairy a day, these studies built in 3-4.

The DASH Diet, long known for its positive effects on heart health, includes three servings of low-fat or fat-free dairy per day. Good news for fans of whole milk: it may be just as effective when it includes full-fat dairy, too, according to recent research in "The American Journal of Clinical Nutrition." Researchers found a DASH diet that included whole milk and other full-fat dairy products lowered blood pressure just as much as the traditional version.

As a high-quality, complete protein, dairy milk is also an important part of the Flexitarian Diet, which encourages more plants and less meat. Many plant-based proteins are incomplete, which means they don't provide some of the building blocks your body needs. Dairy milk is also an important source of calcium, as substituting milk with non-dairy calcium sources like fortified soy milk or leafy greens can lead to gaps in other key nutrients such as protein, vitamin D, phosphorus, riboflavin, potassium, magnesium, vitamin A and vitamin B12, according to a study in the journal "Nutrition Research."

Instead of eating in a way that could leave you at risk of nutrient deficiencies, opt for a more balanced approach to the new year and consider a plan that includes dairy milk. Visit MilkLife.com for more information and milk-inspired recipes.

EarthTalk: Is so-called eco-friendly dry cleaning a reality?

- Jane Krause, Garden City, NJ Although some greener alternatives exist, most dry cleaners still use perchloroethylene ("perc" for short), a petroleum-based solvent that can be hazardous to the human central nervous system, with exposure causing head-aches, nausea, dizziness and memory problems for some people.

Perc's constituent components phosgene, vinyl chloride, carbon tetrachloride and tri-chloroacetic acid (TCA)—have also been linked to a range of other health issues, including liver and kidney malfunction, reproductive abnormalities and even cancer. The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) regulates perc under the Toxic Substances Control Act, the Clean Water Act and the Safe Drinking Water Act.

Luckily for consumers, safer alternatives to perc for dry cleaning are available. The most common comes from a company called GreenEarth Cleaning, whose products and process form the backbone of a large network of inde-pendent "green" dry cleaners across the United States. Green-Earth's process uses biodegradable liquid silicone-essentially liquified sand—in place of petrochemicals. Since liquid silicone is chemically inert, it doesn't chemically react with fabric fibers, and is safe to use on delicate garmentsbeads, lace, silk, cashmere-and won't cause shrinkage.

And perhaps best of all, it breaks down into natural elements (sand, water and carbon dioxide) that are safe for air, water, soil and people. In fact, liquid silicone is so safe that it is often a base ingredient in many everyday shampoos, conditioners and lotions that we put right onto our skin with no ill effects.

Another green alternative to dry cleaning is so-called professional wet cleaning, whereby fabric is laundered in a computer-controlled washer and dryer that uses water along with specialized soaps and conditioners instead of solvent—and spins its contents much more slowly than a typical home washing machine. The result is that it's much gentler on fragile clothing.

Yet another eco-friendly choice is liquid carbon dioxide (CO2) cleaning, which uses pressurized CO2 in combination with other gentle cleaning agents to dissolve dirt, fats and oils in clothing instead of perc.

One often-overlooked option is simply to hand-wash delicate clothes and fabrics in Woolite or some other non-toxic detergent, and then hang them to dry. If you need your hand-washed clothes to

have a finished pressed look, you can take them to a standard cleaner for pressing only.

er for pressing only. advertise Despite the existence of greener given that alternatives, four out of five dry organic

cleaners still use perc. Consumers should beware of dry cleaners that advertise their process as organic, given that perc can be considered organic because its petroleumbased chemicals do come out of the ground. Just because they might recycle hangers or plastic bags doesn't get them off the hook as polluters if they use perc or other hazardous substances or processes.
