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




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Brides

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Elopement really does bring wedding commitment down to the basics: each other

It occurred to her while sitting in a church pew watching her friends practice getting married. Jami Dawson and her boyfriend were at a rehearsal for a large, traditional wedding.

She looked over at him and asked, "Are you ready for that to be us?"

"I just couldn't envision us doing that," Dawson continued. "I said, 'You want to just run off to the mountains in Colorado?'" He did.

Dawson and her boyfriend, Jonathan Dixon, of Clarksville, Tennessee, took two weeks to plan their elopement — yes, even elopements require some preparation — on Green Mountain outside Denver.

Besides getting married, eloping is one off the best decisions Dawson ever made.

"If I had to do it all over again, I'd recommend it

to anybody," she said. In the South, the fairytale wedding with a white dress, a dozen bridesmaids and a tiered cake, preferably at a country club, church or rustic barn still reigns. But for couples who've already had one storybook wedding (without a happily ever after) and others who crave simplicity in their hectic lives, eloping is the answer.

Florence-based photographer

Heather Sherrill of CREATE Portraiture has an elopement package at her business, and most couples who buy it are first-time brides and grooms.

Sherrill is a fan of eloping



because it distills the meaning of a wedding ceremony — to pledge unconditional love, forever — to its basic elements. Bride, groom, love, officiant; anything else is optional.

For many brides, wedding planning is reason enough to elope to escape the time and often unwanted but well-meaning input from loved ones.

"The stress of it is terrible," Sherrill said. With eloping, "you really have the people there who care, and that's great."

The image of an elopement once might have brought to mind a couple marrying at the county courthouse in their blue jeans. It can be that relaxed or more elaborate, with the dress, the cake and the flowers, yet on a smaller scale.

Dawson and her husband married with only themselves and Sherrill present to photograph the event. Colorado requires no witness or officiant. Dawson married wearing a dress she found on Facebook from Nashville, holding wildflowers she and her mother picked from the mountainside. Her mother fashioned Dawson's bouquet and her husband's boutonniere from those flowers. Dawson and

her husband winged their lines. Her parents, aunt, cousin and younger sister stood a few feet away, allowing the couple privacy to become husband and wife.

For almost half an hour, they felt like the only people in the world. Besides their voices, the only sound they heard was the wind.

When Dixon, her husband, screamed, everyone knew it was official.

"We made it our day as opposed to everyone else's day," Dawson said. "A lot of times, it is for your guests. I wanted it to be about us."


She knew she and her husband needed a small affair to maintain the seriousness of their commitment.

"I know we'd be making jokes out of our vows if we had to do it in front of everyone," she said.

Krystina Lovelady, of Town Creek, married her husband, Zach, in Orange Beach. It was the second marriage for both, and could not have been more spontaneous.

"We literally decided three days before that we were going to go do it," Lovelady said.

She found out her friend Sherrill was heading to the beach for






work, and she and her fiancé would be there too, on vacation. They married at Perdido Pass as fellow vacationers and swimmers enjoyed the ocean. Lovelady wore a \$29 white halter gown.

"I had a huge first wedding, and he did, too," Lovelady said. "I just wanted something simple and intimate with just us. We wrote our own vows. It was great."

She advises couples considering elopement to remember what the wedding is about.

"Don't stress about it because in the end, you just want to be married anyway," Lovelady said.

3. Where do I start in customizing my wedding invitations?

These days, this is totally up to the bride, but we do love when a wedding suite all ties together and has a central theme!

5. Save-the-dates...what are my options and when do I need to send those out?

We recommend sending out save-the-dates four to six months before the wedding.



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

Like booking a wedding venue or finding the right bridal gown, planning a honeymoon can't be done too soon, according to Kimberly Mann, a travel agent at Two Sisters Travel Company in Shelbyville, Tennessee.

In fact, as soon as a ceremony date is set, she advises couples to start considering where they want to go and when. Knowing whether they want a low-key trip to a mountain cabin or an all-inclusive resort helps them stick to a budget.

"It doesn't hurt to book in advance or as soon as flights are available to that destination," Mann said. If a couple wants a special room or suite for an extended period, she suggests scheduling a year in advance.

She advises couples to use a travel agent to plan foreign honeymoons and those at resorts to get the most for their money as well as special packages offered to newlyweds. Agents are practiced in asking for such deals and bargaining for them if they aren't included in packages. Flowers waiting on beds and welcome platters of appetizers and chocolates are perks usually reserved for honeymooners. Cruises with their many ports and





destinations are often easier to book with the assistance of an agent, she added.

"A lot of times booking online can be very confusing," Mann said. "It helps to have someone who can have all the resorts and cruises available."

U.S. News & World Report ranked Tuscany as the best honeymoon destination for 2017-18. The exotic French Polynesian locales of Tahiti and Bora Bora followed, along with St. Lucia and Fiji in the South Pacific. Jamaica is a local honeymoon favorite, and is fairly accessible since it is relatively close to the





continental United States.

"There are a lot more flights to and from Jamaica, so it's more affordable." Mann said.

Many couples opt to stay closer to home, going to Gatlinburg or Gulf Shores.

As far as what to bring, definitely pack an outfit and toiletries in your carryon in case your checked bags get lost. And pack less, especially for beach getaways.

"You'll spend most of the time in a bathing suit and cover-up," Mann said.

Couples who choose to travel abroad should take care to monitor any changes in weather or security that might hinder flights or cause interstate delays.

Arrive at the airport 2.5 hours before flights out of the country and at least 1.5 hours before domestic departures. Keep in mind that shuttle rides, security checks and early arrivals of other flights can hasten departure times. Mann cited a local couple whose international flight got canceled but because they were in the throes of post-marital bliss were oblivious to delayed flights and other cares of the world. Because they had no one to notify them of such changes, they arrived late and spent their wedding night in Atlanta.











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

- Photographers and videographers put in long hours on your wedding day. They work better if they are fed and watered well!
- Seeing the bride before the ceremony just go take a seat and enjoy the element of surprise like everyone else. The bride is busy with last minute makeup and hair and needs to relax for just a few minutes. If one person starts this, a line of people think they need to see her before the festivities begin. This just increases the chances of putting the ceremony behind schedule.
- Do not live the ceremony through your cellphone! The bride has hired a photographer so leave it to the professionals to capture the moment. Plus, there is nothing a photographer hates more than snapping a perfect moment and the picture being crowded with everyone's cellphones in the air snapping away.
- Guest that come in late! Invitations come out weeks before the wedding date. Mark your calendar and make it a priority to be there and be on time. Guests coming in late can be a distraction to the ceremony, and photos and video of the blessed union. Do your part and be on time!
- It's been a long day, you're hungry, we get it! At no point is it appropriate for a guest to go take desserts off the table until the bride and groom have had photos or you have been released to eat by the wedding director.
- When guest just HAVE to enter the reception space to claim their seat and leave their sparkly bag to mark their place or their shoes on the chair. CALM DOWN LINDA, no one is stealing your seat - get back to cocktail hour!










- Do the math. When ordering food for your party based on your RSVPs make sure you cover more people than you actually plan on serving. Caterers suggest ordering 15 percent more than RSVPs. Everyone isn't going to reserve their spot. Don't under shoot your numbers this can be a negative reflection on your caterer if they run out of food because you didn't plan accordingly.
- Getting drunk just don't do it! It's distasteful and tacky. Your best friend's wedding is not the place to re-live your wildest college days. Drinking too much at an open bar reception or just drinking too much in general is never a good idea.
- When the photographer has stolen the bride and groom away for a few last-minute portraits before the reception don't stop to have a conversation with the couple. Just wave from a distance and move on. You WILL talk to them again!
- Children are a precious gift, however they are not to be the center of attention at a wedding. This is not their day and they will live and so will you, momma!
- The night is winding down and the bride and groom are enjoying their LAST dance at THEIR wedding. This is never the time to interrupt just to get a hug and say goodbye.





Wedding registries

morph into broader range

Wedding registries remain popular, and the nature of gifting has morphed into a broader range of options, including cash registries, that are being embraced by friends and family, a new survey shows.

The average wedding registry was valued at \$4,835 in 2017, featuring 125 items, according to the survey by the wedding site TheKnot.com of nearly 7,000 engaged or recently married couples. Nearly 9 in 10 couples, or 88 percent of the American couples who responded, set up registries in 2017, about

the same number as the year before, the findings showed.

But what couples asked for and how they asked changed in 2017 over 2016 in some key ways, said Kristen Maxwell Cooper, The Knot's editor in chief.

"Couples no longer want to be put in a box when it comes to wedding registries," she said in a recent interview. "They want to be able to register for whatever they want, whether that is stuff that comes from a traditional retailer, stuff that comes from a specialty store. They want

to register for cash, they want to donate to charity, they want to do all of these things, or they just want to choose one of these things that fits their lifestyle."

The industry has responded with digital options allowing couples to make registry requests from a variety of sources, Maxwell Cooper said.

The number of couples using their registries to give back was up significantly, the survey showed, but that has not been widely embraced by couples. One in 10 couples, or 10 percent of those surveyed, made

a request on behalf of charity in their registries in 2017, up from 3 percent in 2016.

"Couples are a little bit older now when they're aettina married." Maxwell Cooper said — the average age is 29 for brides and 31 for grooms. "They're a little more established and probably lived together before getting married. They may feel like they have all the material things that they need. It's great to have a retail registry as well, if your arandmother and areatgrandmother feels like they really want to give you something tangible."

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Perhaps a little more challenging for traditionalists buvina gifts are cash requests to finance such things as honeymoons. They were used by 6 percent of those surveyed. compared with 4 percent the vear before. Of those in 2017, nearly half used their cash gifts to help pay for honeymoons. One in four put the money toward a down payment on a home. On average, couples received \$1,437 for their honeymoons.

In 2011, asking for cash was a faux pas, with only 1 percent of couples asking.

"We will just continue to see that go up," Maxwell Cooper said. "I think it's becoming more and more acceptable. As long as people feel that their cash is going to something."

For the first time in The Knot's annual registry survey, Maxwell Cooper said, more

couples said they set up their primary registries online — 55 percent in 2017 compared with 48 percent in 2016. Instore brick-and-mortar registries were used as the primary registry by 44 percent of couples surveved.

Nearly all the couples with registries overall managed them digitally, most by smartphone using apps or retailer websites.

So what are all these gifts?

More than 1 in 5 couples, or 22 percent, registered for electronics in 2017. For the third consecutive year. wireless speakers were the most popular item at 28 percent, according to the survey. Smart home devices were second at 26 percent. Robotic vacuums got a bump, with 16 percent of couples asking, up from 6 percent.







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
