RISE TO MUSIC FAME While he was active in encouraged to join the music business by country stars such as Red Sovine and Red Foley, and was working towards this career. In 1958, in Memphis, Pride visited Sun Studios and recorded some songs. One song has survived on tape, and was released in the United Kingdom as part of a box set. The song is a slow stroll in walking

He played music at clubs in Montana solo and during the time he lived in Montana. His break came when Chet Atkins at RCA tion tape and got Pride a contract. In 1966, he released his first RCA Victor single, "The Snakes Crawl at Night". Nashville manager and agent Jack D. Johnson signed Pride. Atkins was the longtime producer at RCA Victor who had made stars out of country singers such as Jim Reeves, Skeeter Davis, and others. Pride was signed to RCA Victor in 1965. "The Snakes Crawl at Night" did not chart. On the records of this song submitted to radio stations for airplay, the singer was listed as "Country Charley Pride". At this time, country music was a white medium. Jack made sure that no pictures of Charley were distributed for the first two years of his career, to avoid the effects of Jim Crowism.

Symptoms of a Heart Attack

• Uncomfortable pressure, squeezing, fullness or pain in the center of your chest. It lasts more than a few minutes or goes away and comes back.

• Pain or discomfort in one or both arms, the back, neck, jaw or stomach.

• Shortness of breath with or without chest discomfort.

• Other signs such as breaking out in a cold sweat, nausea or lightheadedness.

As with men, women's most common heart attack symptom is chest pain or discomfort. But women are somewhat more likely than men to experience some of the other common symptoms, particularly shortness of breath, nausea/vomiting and back or jaw pain.

Symptoms of a Stroke







BEN KNOWS THE BIG BEND COUNTRY Tumbleweed Smith



"By and large, the region was only miles upon miles of loneliness, which is just the way most of the inhabitants liked it."

That sentence is from a book by Ben English of Alpine titled Yonderings: Trails and Memories of the Big Bend.

I've interviewed photographers, writers, historians and all sorts of folks who have attempted to convey their impressions of the Big Bend of Texas. They've all expressed their thoughts in such a manner that indicated a fierce love and appreciation for the area along the Rio Grande. When I interviewed Ben English and read his book I discovered a man who knows the names of every plant, animal, trail, mountain, stream, insect, mesa, canyon, rock, bird or legend found in this intriguing part of Texas. He writes about his long hikes. His descriptions of the terrain make you feel every step he takes. And he has taken lots of steps, especially around Lajitas and Terlngua.

Ben is the 6th generation of his family to live in the area. His grandparents ran the Lajitas Trading Post. His great aunt was Maggie Smith, who ran some hot springs and became known as the first colorful female character in the mountain country. In the late 1950s she bought a brand new station wagon and filled it with goats. "Any time you bought a car from Casner Motor Company when you came into town you got a free wash job and they'd clean out the inside of the car. Nobody wanted to clean Maggie's vehicle because there were goat pellets all over the place." Ben was born in 1959 and during his formative years spent weekends and summers with his grandparents at Lajitas. He developed outdoor skills and a big dose of self-reliance.

At Terlingua, he attended a one-room school with 9 students in 6 grades. Later he went to school in Fort Stockton, a more civilized part of the state, as his parents called it. But Ben missed his small school in Terlingua. He was not used to big crowds of students. His graduating class in Fort Stockton had 150 students. He joined the Marine Corps at age 17 and spent seven years developing a distinguished career. He says the Marine Corps made him a man because he had some great mentors. After his discharge he attended San Angelo State and graduated with honors. Then he became a Texas Highway Patrolman and spent his entire career in the Ozona-Sonora area before retiring to Alpine. He's glad to be back.

"If you're born and bred in this country it does not matter where you go or how long you're gone, the Big Bend is still home and there will still be a pull back to the Big Bend."

He told me he wanted to do 3 things in his life: be a Marine, a Highway Patrolman and a writer. He is now working on some novels. "When my publisher told me I needed to be on Facebook I found out how to do it and the first people I heard from were some of my classmates from Terlingua. I hadn't seen them in over 40 years. They still had that close feeling for each other."


