The Africa Mercy

Local Volunteer Dedicates Time to Change Lives

magine being on the Mercy Ship's floating hospital with 400 volunteers docked in an African

nation. Patients are carried up the gangway with knees bent at a 90-degree angle. Others have large facial tumors. Mothers bring their babies whom their villages called monsters and considered better off dead. They arrive with downtrodden eyes and rags tied over their disfigurements, shoulders sagging with the shame they've carried for years.
They receive lifesaving surgery onboard

the Africa Mercy, the world's largest private hospital ship. Patients return home walking normally with straight legs, with unafflicted heads held high, or with smiles no longer split by a cleft. The blind leave with sight, living with

Mercy Ships has performed over 95,000 free surgeries since 1978. I've served three times in three different countries. Physical healing takes place, but also the healing of souls. I carry Tahina's story in my heart, a former patient from Madagascar. Tahina suffered from a disease called Noma, also known as "the disease of the poor" as it is only found in the poorest corners of the planet. Noma is an opportunistic, gangrenous bacteria that primarily affects children between the ages of 2-6 and has a 90% mortality rate. Those 10%of children who survive are left with the

> tissues of their faces rotted away from the damaging disease. In Tahina's case, she was missing nearly the entire right side of her face. Because these children are left deformed, they are usually denied an education and shunned from society and families. their



"When we remove barriers for obtaining a prescription, compliance in taking the medication increases," said **Rhee** Perry, Director of Surgical Services.

North Alabama Medical Center has partnered with the local Medical Center Pharmacy to fill the prescriptions at no additional cost to the patient. Upon bedside delivery, the patient's nurse will review the medication and potential side effects. A pharmacist is also available to answer questions.

"When my surgery is finished, I'm ready to go home and get some rest," said Charles Isom, a same-day surgery patient who took advantage of the Meds to Beds program. "I appreciate the convenience so I can focus on recovery."

Same Day Surgery patients at NAMC will be asked by their admission clerk if they'd like to participate in the program during their preadmission testing appointment. Insurance is accepted. The program is optional so patients can still use their personal pharmacy if they prefer.

Bonnie received an Individual Fellowship in Literature from the



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




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

Mistaken Identity Leads to Tragedy

ast week it was announced that the Hoover Police Department officer who shot and killed E.J. Bradford, Jr. at the Riverchase Galleria in on Thanksgiving weekend has been found legally justified

in his action. The announcement from Attorney General, Steve Marshall's office included an 11-second two-angle video of the shooting. The officer did not commit a crime under Alabama law so he will not be criminally charged for his

The attorney general's report concluded, "Officer 1 reasonably exercised his official duties, powers, or functions when he shot E.J. Bradford on the night

of November 22, 2018.
Accordingly, Alabama law declares his action justified and not criminal. The report also said that "it is reasonable to conclude that both [Bradford and Erron Brown] presented an immediate deadly threat to innocent civilians and first responders inside the Galleria.' Brown was the actual suspect in the case but an armed Bradford was the one who law enforcement came into contact with first.

The officer's name has not been released. There are at least three things that are certain. 1.) This is a terribly tragic situation in which an innocent young man who was legally armed

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

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Medicare Minute Medicare Part A Part 2

Last week we discussed how Medicare Part A will cover you if you are admitted into the hospital. A hospital, under Medicare, can be acute care hospitals, critical care hospitals, inpatient rehabilitation facilities, long term care hospitals or mental health care.

The one aspect of Medicare Part A we get the most questions about is coverage at a skilled nursing facility (SNF). To be covered by Medicare at a SNF certain criteria has to be met. First, of course, is you must have Medicare Part A. Next your doctor has determined that you need daily skilled care given by, or under the supervision of, skilled nursing or therapy personnel. Your skilled nursing care will have to be in a SNF that is certified by Medicare.

What a lot of people don't know is that you must have a "qualifying" hospital stay to be covered at a SNF. Under Medicare a "qualifying" hospital stay is at least a 3-day inpatient stay prior to being admitted to the SNF. If you go to the ER and are held one day for observation and are admitted into the hospital for two days this does not constitute a "qualifying" hospital stay. If you are admitted on a Monday and discharged the following Wednesday this is not a "qualifying" hospital stay. In the two examples above those are 2-day inpatient stays. A good rule of thumb is you must be admitted as inpatient for at least three midnights.

You also need to know that Medicare Part A will only cover you for 100 days at a SNF and only 20 of those days are at 100%. In other words days 1-20 are covered at 100%. Days 21-100 you will pay the first \$170.50 per day and Medicare pays the rest of the cost. Starting with day 101 you will pay 100% of the bill.

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
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

Should be More Accountable

Despite growing political divisiveness, we are fortunate to have concerned citizens here who address important issues on a nonpartisan and constructive basis. Last month provided some good examples.

Scores of people saw the Southern Exposure films at UNA that focus environmental risks Alabama because of loosened regulations and failures of power companies and public authorities to do the right things. Coal ash ponds that leach toxic minerals into nearby rivers are a prime danger to our well-being. Coalitions are pressuring companies to move and bury the ash properly and to close coal-burning power plants.

There is now a local branch of the Citizens Climate Lobby which offers realistic solutions to reducing carbon emissions that cause climate change.

Florence residents expressed frustration over

the stealth 12% increase in the sales tax without more discussion about other options to generate revenue for improving pay for police and firefighters.

Citizens were blocked on Jan. 25 from raising basic questions about the feasibility of the proposed seat agri-event in Lauderdale 10,000 center County. Unlike the private partnership in Colbert County, this similar one will depend wholly upon public financing to get started. The Authority established by legislators is collecting the extended 2¢ gasoline tax and TVA payments in lieu of tax for the project. Concern is growing about transparency and whether the project will be an economic success or a taxpayer burden.

Let's continue such efforts to make government accountable and more representative.

GOOD CASE DISMISSED

Alabama is the only state in the United States that only allows punitive damages for wrongful death. In all other states, juries are entitled to consider the earning capacity and resulting lost income to the family of someone killed by the negligence of another.

In Alabama, juries decide the amount of money to award with the goal of preserving other lives. In other words, how much money will it take to show an appropriate regard for life to the extent that it will deter others from being careless. Alabama permits the recovery of punitive damages upon a showing of mere negligence resulting in wrongful death.

Alabama Code §6-5-410 is the sole remedy for the wrongful death of another. That code section provides the rules to follow when a loved one dies as the result of the negligence of another. Joel and I handle injury and death cases every day and we work with this code section constantly. This code section requires that a personal representative be appointed by the probate court. If the decedent had a Will and it is submitted to probate, the executor can file the suit. If a person didn't have a Will the administrator of their estate will act as the personal representative. The personal representative chooses the lawyer.

Money recovered as a result of the death of the person must be paid through the personal representative. This money is always distributed without regard for any written Will or expressed desire of the person who died. That code section provides that the money be distributed as if the person had no Will. The money recovered is not subject to claims against the estate or the claims of creditors.

The law provides that spouses have an exclusive right to be the personal representative for a fairly short period of time but after that time anyone who would receive a share of the estate can qualify as a personal representative and hire an attorney to prosecute the claim.

Recently we saw where a family hired an out of state attorney who didn't follow the rules and their case was dismissed. Alabama has strict rules that must be followed in pursuing a claim for wrongful death.



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



Unfortunately, data thieves don't ever take a break. In fact, they are ever creating new ways of bogus email schemes that seek to steal your hard-earned money or personal information.

Remember, criminals may have compromised your family or friend's email account and now have begun using their email contacts to send phishing emails. Therefore, it may appear to be legit, but think to yourself why a friend or family member is going to seek your personal info. The answer is THEY'RE NOT. Be on constant alert.
- 2. Double check the email address. They might also be spoofing the address with a slight change in text. For example, using narne@toillustratemypoint.com as opposed to name@toillustratemypoint.com. Merely changing the "m" to an "r" and "n" can trick you if you are not being constantly vigilant.
- 3. Please note that the IRS doesn't contact with taxpayers by email to ask for personal or financial information. This includes asking for information via text messages and social media channels. The IRS does not call you and threaten lawsuits or to have you arrested.
- 4. Please do not click on hyperlinks in suspicious emails. When you are in doubt, you should not use hyperlinks, but instead go directly to the source's main web page. You should also remember that no legitimate business or organization will ask for sensitive financial information by email.
- 5. Use security software to protect against malware and viruses found in phishing emails. Some security software can help identity suspicious websites that are used by cybercriminals.
- 6. Use strong passwords to protect online accounts. I urge you, with any type of online account, to review new, stronger standards to protect your passwords. Doing so will help protect against savvy cybercriminals who want to access your account and steal your identity.

Here are 3 Steps you can follow to build a better password:

Step 1: Use the power of association. Identify associated items that have personal meaning and use them in your

Step 2: Make unique associations. Passphrases should be words that can go together in your head, but no one else would ever suspect.

a. Good example: Items in a living room such as BlueCouchFlowerBamboo.

b. Bad example: Names of children or pets.

Step 3: Create a passphrase that you can picture in your head. The key is to create a passphrase that is hard for a cybercriminal to guess, but easy for you to remember.

7. Use multi-factor authentication when offered. Twofactor authentication means that in addition to entering a username and password, the user must enter a security code. This code is usually sent as a text to your mobile phone. Even if a thief manages to steal your username and password, it is unlikely the crook would also have your
