Delta Road is on the candidate list for Pedestrian Safety Enhancement projects.

The Department of Transportation and Council Office are coordinating to select the locations where projects are going to be implemented and Delta Road is one of the top locations to be analyzed.

The candidate list for Pedestrian Safety Enhancements came about after nearly 500 residents in the Delta Rd. area signed an online petition. The petition was initiated after two pedestrians (71-year-old and 10-yearold) were hit by a car in August 2018 while walking to Evergreen Elementary School crossing Delta Road at the intersection of Middle Park Drive. They were both seriously injured and are recovering from multiple fractures and concussions.

As the coordination progresses and the project selection is finalized, the Evergreen Times will update the status of the project for readers.

Publisher Olly Cuevas has set an incredible goal of running from California to New York to raise awareness and funds for Challenged Athletes Foundation (CAF) to help individuals with physical challenges get access to sports.

Molly, who grew up in Evergreen, will start her courageous journey from Santa Monica, CA on April 1 and run for more than 3,000 miles (40 miles per day) until she reaches Montauk, NY.

"I am running across the country to make a statement and prove that you can accomplish great things if you put your mind to it," said Molly. "CAF has a similar message of resiliency and perseverance. It's easy to raise money for a foundation just by asking - not that there is anything wrong with that but it's not my style. I want to put in the work and really get people's attention so they will be exposed to CAF and their incredible mission," explained Molly. "The end goal is to of course finish the run successfully, but to also educate as many people as I can about this life changing foundation."

"Sports have been a huge part of my life and have made me the hard-working, self-assured, gogetter person I am today, said Molly. "I was fortunate enough to be born with full physical capabilities, and to be frank, I took it for granted up until a few years ago. San Jose – Evergreen Community College District program wins 2019 Bellwether Award

Silicon Valley Career Pathways, a partnership between San Jose – Evergreen Community College District's (SJECCD) Center for Economic Mobility and Metropolitan Education District, was named winner of the 2019 Bellwether Award in the category of Planning, Governance, and Finance during the annual Community College Futures Assembly this week in San Antonio.

The Bellwether Awards, which are presented in three categories—Instructional Programs and Services; Planning, Governance, and Finance; and Workforce Development—are widely regarded as the nation's most competitive and prestigious recognition awards for community colleges. They are designed to identify outstanding and innovative programs which can then be shared and implemented as best practices at other colleges.

Out of hundreds of Bellwether Award submissions received annually, only ten programs are selected as finalists for each category. Those ten finalists then present information on their submitted programs at the Futures Assembly, where they are competitively judged by a panel of community college faculty, staff, and administrators. Programs are judged on a variety of factors, including replicability and scalability.

Led by Alexandra Duran, dean of workforce and economic development with SJECCD, Silicon Valley Career Pathways project is designed to create career pathway programs that are aligned to highneed, high-growth, or emerging regional economic sectors. As Northern California's largest network of science, technology, engineering, and mathematics (STEM) education and career programs, Silicon Valley Career Pathways has a goal of strengthening collaboration between education and industry, preparing students with fundamental STEM competencies, and encouraging students at every level to pursue high-demand careers.

"Silicon Valley Career Pathways is fun-

damentally changing the way educational entities interact with industry partners to prepare students for 21st century careers," according to Dr. Byron D. Clift Breland, SJECCD chancellor. "The Bellwether Award is a great honor and recognizes the truly innovative nature of this approach."

The primary objective of Silicon Valley Career Pathways is the development of a technology employee pipeline comprised of local students. "In a region where a majority of residents are from traditionally underrepresented populations, less than 12 percent of the STEM workforce is comprised of employees from these groups," said Dr. William Watson, executive director of strategic partnerships and workforce innovation with SJECCD's Center for Economic Mobility. "This program helps diversify the tech workforce while creating more opportunity for more local students. This works to mitigate the growing economic inequity in our region.³

In addition to Silicon Valley Career Pathways, two other SJECCD programs were selected as finalists for the Bellwether Awards, including Evergreen Valley College's (EVC) "EVC to San Jose State University Registered Nursing to Bachelor of Science in Nursing Collaborative," which was a finalist in the Instructional Programs and Services category, and San Jose City College's "Technest" program, which was selected as a finalist in the Workforce Development category.

"It is unheard of for a single District to have three programs selected as finalists and the fact that we were chosen in every category illustrates the outstanding and innovative work taking place within our District," said Chancellor Clift Breland.

The first fundraiser for Molly's ambitious journey was held at the home of Mike and Jen Labarbera in the Silver Creek Country Club on February 9. Molly was joined by Susan Butler, CAF's development Director in Northern California, and Ella Rodriguez, age 14, a recipient of CAF services.

Butler explained that CAF provides opportunities and support to people with physical challenges so they can pursue an active lifestyle through physical activity and competitive athletics. In 2018, CAF distributed 2,806 grants across 95 different sports totaling \$4.3 million in support that goes towards adaptive sports equipment, training and competition expenses.

Butler continued, "Our mission to support individuals with physical challenges by providing access to sports depends on the efforts and generosity of extraordinary supporters like Molly. We are grateful for Molly's efforts to shine a light on our mission and her commitment to getting more people into the game of life through sport." Ella's story

Ella attended the fundraiser to share the impact that CAF has had on her life and world at large. She was born with a clubbed foot and three toes. It was determined that amputating Ella's foot would give her the best functioning leg possible. At nine months old, Ella's foot was amputated and she learned to walk on her first

prosthetic leg.

"At age nine, she became discouraged about the difference between herself and able bodied peers, "said Ella's mom, Susan. "Ella wrote a letter to Santa asking for a list of friends that wore prosthetics just like her. I posted the request on Facebook and immediately CAF responded and connected Ella to several girls in the Bay Area who were also amputees and we headed for the San Diego Triathlon Challenge where she received her first running prosthetic.

Ella ran cross-country for her middle school team and she received the 6th grade Athlete of the Year award. "There are many champions in this life, and CAF has

Ella currently competes in track and field at Christopher High School in Gilroy where she is also a cheerleader. She also competes in wheelchair basketball. "

A whole new world has opened up for me in the past five years since I've been a part of the CAF family," said Ella. "I have become confident and proud of who I am, which affects my performance as an athlete, student and as a person. Now I get much joy mentoring new or younger athletes on my team and watching them grow and improve. CAF allows people to achieve their dreams by providing equipment, travel and training. Beyond that, it also touches the hearts of athletes and their families."

Training for the big run

Molly has been training to run across the U.S. for the past 11 months. She hired a coach, Bree Lambert Sanders, a successful and well known ultra-runner in the Bay Area to help her prepare for this challenge. "I can't imagine a life without sports and to think that someone could miss out on athletic opportunities and the life skills that come with athletics because of a physical disability really saddens me," said Molly. "I want to do all that I can to help people get those chances and to live out their dreams.'

Molly was raised in Evergreen Valley and attended Silver Oak Elementary School and Chaboya Middle School. She attended Santa Teresa and Leland High School where she lettered in Tennis, Soccer, Track and Field Hockey. She graduated from Leland in 2012. Molly received a scholarship from Adelphi University where she majored in Sports Management, and minored in Marketing graduating Magna Cum Laude. She also received a minor in Communications from Murdoch University while studying abroad in Perth Australia. As a student athlete Molly was Northeast Conference Rookie of the Year, three- time All-American, Academic All-American, holds virtually all AU offensive records, numerous conference records and is currently the all-time NCAA DII Assist per game leader. After holding internships with the Major League Soccer and the San Francisco 49ers, Molly went on to manage the social media platform for Rocktape. Magdalena Carrrasco running for Supervisor in District 3

S anta Clara County Supervisor District 3 election is only a year away.

That's when Dave Cortese is termed out of office whose district spans north San Jose, Alviso, Evergreen Valley, Milpitas and the northern half of Sunnyvale.

There is currently a crowded field of high-profile supervisor candidates, which now includes Magdalena Carrasco, who just announced she is running for Cortese's District 3 seat.

Carrasco was elected to the San Jose City Council in 2014 after serving as a trustee for the East Side Union High School District. Carrasco served two years as San Jose City Vice Mayor, but declared her independence when she didn't see eye to eye with Mayor Liccardo on some issues.

There are at least six candidates that have either officially announced they are running or have announced they are considering running for the District 3 Supervisor position. Those that have announced their candidacy along with Carrasco include Milpitas Mayor Rich Tran and former Sunnyvale Mayor Otto Lee.

Former San Jose City Vice Mayor and Evergreen District 8 councilmember Rose Herrera, former San Jose City Councilmember Madison Nguyen, and former Sunnyvale mayor Jim Griffith have expressed interest in running for District 3 supervisor.

Herrera, who served eight years on the San Jose City Council representing Evergreen Valley and as Vice-Mayor, has not made a decision on whether to join the race.

"The county needs experienced leaders who can get things done for our residents," said Herrera. "I'm very proud of what we accomplished during my tenure on the city council including a new Village Square library and city wide ball fields across from Eastridge (which will be opening soon). I also played a leadership role in moving forward critical transportation projects like Tully and 101 and Capital Expressway and 101 and light rail to Eastridge. I care deeply about our community and if I decide to run for the board of Supervisors it will be to improve the lives of County residents, especially our most vulnerable. For example too many mentally ill many of them homeless end up in our jails instead of treatment programs that could provide better results at a lower cost.'

Bill introduced to protect seniors by requiring better labeling for prescription drugs

ssemblymember Jesse Gabriel (D-San Fernando Valley) has introduced legislation to protect patients by requiring physicians to include the purpose of any prescription medication on the medication's label, unless the patient opts out.

Labeling medications will help

to avoid confusion and reduce the risk of adverse drug events including medication errors, adverse or allergic reactions, and overdoses—for patients taking multiple medications.

In introducing this legislation, which is designated AB 387, Assemblymember Gabriel made the following remarks: "For some patients, especially seniors, there can be severe consequences for failing to distinguish between two medications that look or sound alike. Requiring doctors to note the purpose of a medication on its label is an easy way to avoid confusion, reduce errors, and improve patient safety." "A few years ago, my grandfather had a scary episode when he was traveling and confused one of his prescription medicines with another drug," Gabriel added. "I'm confident that the whole incident could have been avoided with better labeling."

Some are called "sustainers" which means they have been members for more than 10 years and continue to work at The Box!

Kathleen goes on by saying, "We have managers who manage the store on a single day of the week. So if they are there on Monday, there will be a different manager on, say Tuesday, etc."

"We have monthly luncheon (business) meetings at local restaurants and at the quarterly meetings representatives from the hospital attend and are presented with a check. We also have a semiannual event (Spring and Fall) called 'Best of the Box' and a separate check for each of those events is presented at the same time. Our next 'Best of the

We have many beautiful things at these sales from Designer Clothing, Jewelry, antiques, collectibles and a wide variety of books for all ages." The Box donated close to a million dollars to the hospital just last year alone!

Major Achievements

When asked what she would consider some major achievements of The Box, Kathleen declared, "We have a campaign each year for a special need and the year before last we sent some transplant patients to a medically supervised camp which in many cases was the first time away from home in a camp setting. We raised enough to send each child to camp for TWO years. Members as well as some generous businesses and individuals donated and this was over and above what we raised in the store!"

Outstanding Volunteers

The Box has many dedicated workers who have served in several capacities. Many of their volunteers are retired teachers who have dedicated their lives to children but they have members from many professions like social workers, realtors, banking and those who have worked in high tech. It's a wide variety of life experiences and skill sets. All are dedicated volunteers!

Interesting items that have been sold Kathleen proudly says, "We have sold beautiful artwork and antiques and we regularly display and sell what we refer to as "Treasures". They are generally displayed to coincide with the appropriate season. The Box is a great place to find gifts that are collectible. We have sold designer clothing like Escada and Burberry clothing and our designers will many times pair jewelry with clothing." This reflects the devotion of

donors who really care about their fellow citizens!

Great pride is taken in the condition of the Thrift Box! In addition to general housekeeping they close between Christmas and New years for major maintenance that is not possible during store hours or overnight. The last major overhaul was the replacement of carpets among other things. They are very grateful to a generous community who donate and shop with us from all over San Jose. They try very hard to put their best foot forward.

Marvelous Milan Italiano

or many years the Evergreen community has been asking for an upscale restaurant, and now they have one with the new Milan Italiano restaurant located at 4898 San Felipe Rd.

My wife and I decided to review the restaurant for *Evergreen Times* readers after seeing some excellent online reviews. We have to say that the service and atmosphere at Milan are first class. We enjoyed the luxurious décor and the soft jazz music playing in the background as we were seated by our server Harrison in comfortable, elegant high backed chairs. Harrison is very knowledgeable and pleasant, with great attention to detail.

We started our meal with a glass of Merlot and ordered the Milan's homemade bread with a secret cheese garlic spread recipe, and we also shared the Bocce Balls appetizer which is topped with cheese and marinara in a light baked dough crust; very tasty. Other popular appetizers at the restaurant are the fried Calamari and the Bruschetta. Milan's general manager, Roberto Rivera, said the Calamari is very

tender, and patrons come back often for the menu item.

We both decided to try two different salads; my wife ordered the Roasted Beets, which is prepared with baby Arugula, beets, Fennel, red onions, shaved Parmesan and sprinkled with Champagne Vinaigrette. She enjoyed it very much! I decided to order the Greens and Apples salad which is prepared with mixed greens, Gorgonzola, walnuts, cranberries, and topped with a poppy seed dressing. It was the best tasting salad I have had in a restaurant in years. Also offered on the salad menu are classic Caesar and baby spinach.

Now the big decision, what to select for our entrées. My wife loves Ravioli, so she chose her dish from the pasta section of the menu and ordered the Porcini Mushroom Ravioli (\$24), which is prepared with wild mushrooms, cherry tomatoes, spinach, and covered in a light Marsala cream sauce; an excellent choice. She loved the combination and the flavor of the ravioli's mushroom filling. She remarked she would definitely order them again! I ordered the Sea Bass from the entrée section of the menu. The sea bass (\$36) is prepared with Saffron Risotto. I was pleasantly surprised with how tender, delicious and flavorful the entrée was to eat. Roberto mentioned that the Sea Bass entrée is prepared with three separate skillets; all three coming together at just the right time.

Shall we order dessert, why not? We selected the Gelato of which the flavors change frequently because they are made fresh daily with Milan's own gelato machine. The Gelato offering includes a nice display of three flavors on the plate. Ours included Carmel, vanilla and chocolate. The Gelato had a clean fresh taste – very nice!

The presentation of each dish was excellent; a real work of art prepared by executive chef, Luis Rodriquez. The portions were generous and the prices are reasonable for such high quality food. Milan Italiano is marvelous!

U.S. Bankruptcy Court rules in favor of County of Santa Clara and upholds sale of O'Connor and St. Louise hospitals

The U.S. Bankruptcy Court in Los Angeles recently denied a request from the California Attorney General to block the purchase of O'Connor Hospital, Saint Louise Regional Hospital, and the DePaul Health Center. Barring further opposition by the Attorney General, this action allows the County to complete the sale and continue offering high quality, critical health care services in these hospitals.

"We are happy about the Court's decision and will move forward with the maintenance and expansion of community healthcare services in San Jose and South Santa Clara County," said County Executive Jeffrey V. Smith, M.D., J.D. "We will ensure the continued availability of essential healthcare services in the entire region, something the Attorney General was jeopardizing by attempting to block the sale and threatening the closure of these hospitals."

As a public hospital system, the County provides care to all people living in Santa Clara County, and this acquisition will support the County's ability to serve even more residents in the community. California law (under Government Code and Welfare and Institutions Code) lays out very specific guarantees requiring county governments to provide comprehensive healthcare to residents of their counties. The County of Santa Clara has effectively complied with all the medical and clinical conditions for the purchase and will continue to meet all state law requirements – as it already does throughout its high-quality health system.

Since October 2018, the County has been working with the Attorney General's office to address the conditions of the sale. The County of Santa Clara has been very clear about why the various nonclinical conditions drafted for private entities were either inapplicable or made no sense when applied to the County.

"Sadly, the Attorney General's Office has refused to work with the County to assuage its concerns. The Office of the Attorney General continues to make false accusations regarding the County's ongoing commitment to the provision of medical services," Smith continued. "It is simply not accurate for the Attorney General to argue that the County has not explained and provided reassurances that we will provide all appropriate healthcare services to all patients in need in Santa Clara County, regardless of their ability to pay."

The Verity Health facilities in Santa Clara County will be owned by the County of Santa Clara and will be operated as community hospitals with appropriate local control by the physicians at the hospitals and by local administrators. The County health system provides a wide range of specialty and other essential services and is known for offering state-of-the-art care to all patients. The addition of these hospitals to the health system will expand access for all residents to the highest quality healthcare.

Contrary to the Attorney General's assertion, throughout the entire purchase process the County has been committed to continuing to provide essential healthcare services, including access to emergency care, urgent and intensive care services, coronary care and neonatal intensive care. The only reason for the County to purchase the hospitals is to keep them open. It is misleading to suggest otherwise.

"All of the clinical services the Attorney General has been talking about are also provided comprehensively and with high quality at our County's award-winning hospital, Santa Clara Valley Medical Center. The County intends to expand those high quality and intensive care services to O'Connor and St. Louise hospitals upon the close of the sale," Smith said. "We hope that now that the Court has made its ruling, we can all focus on the health and welfare of our residents."

The County is awaiting Attorney General Becerra's response to the ruling, as the Attorney General can request a stay at the District Court level and further attempt to block the sale. We hope the Office of the Attorney General will not continue its opposition in the District Court. If the Attorney General's office continues its attempt to close the hospitals, we will continue to fight for the health and welfare of our residents.

Saanika Wanzakhade, a student at Tom Matsumoto Elementary School in Evergreen, will be among 71 of the best spellers from the Bay Area participating in the regional spelling bee on Sunday, Feb. 17, starting a 9 a.m. at the Amador Theater in Pleasanton, California.

Students from more than 230 enrolled local schools began their spelling journey in their classrooms. Grade-level winners advanced to their school bees. The next step for school winners was an online test administered in late January. The top finishers on the test advanced to compete onstage in the 2019 Bay Area Regional Spelling Bee.

Kevin Moch, 2003 third-place finisher in the national finals, will serve as pronouncer, and George Thampy, 2000 National Champion, will serve as a judge.

The champion of the Bay Area regional bee earns a spot in the national finals of the Scripps National Spelling Bee and will receive an expenses-paid trip to Bee Week. The prize includes six nights for the champion and one parent at the Bee's official hotel, Gaylord National Resort and Convention Center, and a \$1,500 travel stipend. Bee Week 2019 is set for May 26-31 with the competition taking place May 27-30 in National Harbor, Maryland.

California receives nearly \$11 million Federal Early Childhood Education Grant

State Superintendent of Public Instruction Tony Thurmond announced that the California Department of Education (CDE) was awarded a federal Preschool Development Birth Through Five Initial Grant Award for \$10,620,000 from the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services' Administration for Children and Families.

The grant helps California analyze and enhance early learning and care systems to maximize the availability of high-quality early learning and care options for low-income and disadvantaged families. It will also help California improve the quality of early childhood care by streamlining administrative and funding systems.

"This grant helps streamline access to early education through more effective and efficient operations," said Thurmond. "That in turn will help us take a step towards meeting the crucial goal of expanding these programs and reducing the achievement gap."

California has 3 million children

younger than five years old, half of whom come from low-income families. Through this federal grant, California will first conduct a statewide birththrough-five needs assessment and then develop a strategic plan that will provide guidance to policymakers to increase access to services for children and families with high needs.

Things that annoy dogs

Special to the Times ogs often tolerate human behavior because they are loyal and easygoing. However, there may be some things that you or others do that your dog secretly hates.

Even the most laid-back dog will hate some of the things we humans

do. Yes, certain things are unavoidable, like vet visits or grooming. However, there are other ways we can try to take it easy on our dogs. No two dogs are exactly the same, so what one dog hates another dog may enjoy. What does your dog hate? Is it on the list? Here are 10 things that often annoy dogs and how to avoid doing them

1. Hugging: Of course, some dogs do love to be hugged but

many dogs do not enjoy hugs, especially from strangers. Placing your arms around a dog's neck or body may be perceived as a threat. Most dogs tolerate gentle hugs from trusted humans, but that doesn't mean they actually like them. A better alternative is to let the dog cuddle on his own terms and pet him along the back and on the chest (especially if you don't know the dog well).

2. Getting in a Dog's Face and Personal Space: Much like hugging, dogs tend to dislike it when humans get in their faces. Think about how it would make you feel! Avoid putting your hands in a dog's face, towering over dogs, and rushing towards them. This is especially important if the dog does not know you well. As an owner, if you need to poke and prod your dog for his own good (like ear cleaning or tooth brushing) go slowly, be gentle, and reward your dog with treats and/or praise. If your dog shows signs of fear, or acts aggressive, back off! It's always best to be careful and prevent a dog bite.

3. Not Letting a Dog Sniff and Explore on Walks: Dogs enjoy going on walks for more than just the exercise. Taking a walk outdoors gives your dog a chance to

explore the world. Your dog explores the world primarily through scent, then with his other senses. Rushing your dog through a walk without allowing him to stop and sniff (and mark) is unkind. If you think about it, it's like someone dragging you by the arm through your favorite shop without allowing you to

stop and look at anything. So next time you walk your dog, give him plenty of time to explore his environment.

4. Lack of Routine and Rules: Your dog may not seem like it, but he needs rules. Training is an important part of providing structure in your dog's life. A routine is important because your dog has an internal clock. Try to feed your dog at the same time each day. Establish an exercise routine too. After a few days of structured rules

and routine, you will probably notice that your dog is happier. Routines and rules make your dog's world more predictable and can actually boost his confidence.

5. Yelling and Harsh Punishment: No one likes to be yelled at or harshly punished (such as being spanked). Dogs may not understand the words we are saying, but they sense your emotions when you do it. If you have a sensitive or fearful dog, you may find that yelling and harsh punishment actually upsets or scares your dog. Fear does not equal respect, and you will not strengthen your relationship with these methods. Even if your dog is aloof or ultra-happy, you will probably find that yelling and harsh punishment don't help in the long run because your dog becomes desensitized (meaning he does what he wants anyway and you just keep repeating yourself). Dogs are more likely to listen to you when you issue a request rather than a non-specific "no" or "stop it."

6. Dressing Them Up: Unless you got your dog used to wearing clothing gradually (or as a puppy) there's a good chance your dog hates being dressed up. Many dogs will tolerate outfits or costumes, but

most don't enjoy them. Get to know your dog before you force him into a bunny costume! Some dogs are fine with simple clothing items like shirts, but loathe wearing things on their heads or feet. How important is it that you dress up your dog anyway? If your dog needs protection from the cold, start with small, lightweight items and associate them with treats or other rewards. Work your way up to sweaters, jackets, and booties. Watch your dog's body language to determine when he has had enough.

7. Strong Fragrances: In case you didn't already know it, your dog's sense of smell is about 10,000 to 100,000 times more sensitive than yours. In general, dogs enjoy taking in all types of scents and odors. However, strong fragrances and chemicals can bother dogs and even irritate their noses. As a rule, it's best to avoid directly spraying your dog with anything. When you use your own products (perfume, hairspray, air fresheners, cleaners, etc.) do so away from your dog and make sure the product is not toxic

8. Being Left Alone or Ignored: Dogs are social creatures who generally hate being left alone. Some dogs are comforted by the presence of another dog, but others only want human companionship. In extreme cases, some dogs actually fear being left alone and experience separation anxiety. Spend as much time as possible with your dog when you are home. Take the time to bond with your dog. Set a daily routine, providing plenty of exercise and mental stimulation. If you travel frequently, find a trusted pet sitter with whom your dog is comfortable.

9. Forcing Them Into Uncomfortable Situations: Most of us have experienced it: your dog "puts on the brakes" and refuses to go somewhere or do something. Maybe it's the bathtub. Often it's the veterinarian. Sometimes it's the car or even a certain street. It might even be a certain person or animal your dog wants to avoid. Most of the time, your dog is refusing because he has a fear or phobia. When you force your dog into a scary situation, you are keeping him in a state of stress. If the phobia is serious, you may need to get help from a trainer or behaviorist

10. Being Upset: Life has its ups and downs. You can't expect to be happy all the time. However, your dog can sense your emotions because of the close bond you share. If you are going through a period of depression, stress, or grief, it is bound to affect your dog. Some dogs will match your emotions, becoming sad or even sick. Others will get bored or frustrated and "act out" because they are not getting enough attention, exercise, or stimulation.

Do your best to keep with some sort of routine and spend time with your dog. Dogs can offer wonderful emotional support. Go for a walk with your dog and you might even find yourself feeling better.
