Women ready to take the lead in local leadership roles

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Twenty years ago, the most common occupations for women, according to the U.S. Census, were secretaries and administrative assistants, elementary and middle school teachers, registered nurses, cashiers and retail salespeople.

And some of these occupations are still among the most popular career choices for women, according to the United States Department of Labor.

But more and more women are starting to transition from note-takers to decision-makers in boardrooms, council chambers and on Capitol Hill.

While men may still outnumber women in leadership roles, it appears the pendulum is starting to swing toward gender equity in leadership.

Lake County voters witnessed that in the November 2018 General Election among judicial candidates. There were six males and six females running for various benches.

In Geauga County, voters elected Terri Stupica to the bench in Chardon Municipal Court in 2011, making her the first female trial judge in Geauga County.

"As of this year or the last year, I think woman judges in the State of Ohio are now outnumbering male judges," Stupica said. "So it's not that unique of a situation any longer."

Dr. Jessie Baginski, president and CEO of Leadership Lake County, sees a difference in leadership in the county – even on the Leadership board itself.

When the organization first started there were 15 men and two women on its board; today there are 12 men and eight women board members, she said.

And 13 of those 20 board members are younger than 50.

"It's really exciting to find out – not only are women stepping into more leadership positions, but younger women are stepping into leadership

positions," Baginski said. "It means they are going to be there longer and be able to have much more impact on what they are doing."

Seeing women filling more leadership positions is important to Baginski who believes leadership should always reflect the population.

"We do have some really great female leaders here in Lake County and I think one of the things they do for each other is to take this notion of amplifying each other rather than see each other as a threat or competitor," Baginski said.

"How do we make sure that we are supporting each other, encouraging each other, and helping each others' businesses thrive. There are a lot of female-owned businesses in Lake County that are really doing well."

Baginski believes the Leadership Lake County board is a good example of leadership today.

"I think we have fabulous male leadership on our board, but they are also male leadership that are not in any way intimidated by female leaders and they really embrace the idea that leadership should be more gender neutral and that everybody has a seat at that table and a right to be at that table," Baginski said.

Stupica and Baginski agree that women leaders can tend to be more

nurturing, compassionate and emotional than their male counterparts, and they both believe that can be a benefit

"I think we do tend to think of women as being more nurturing and I think by that nurturing nature we seek to see the best in everyone who is working with us or for us," Baginski said. "You look at that individual whether they are male or female and say how do I help this person to be the best that they can be. We want people to be happy in their jobs. We want people to come to work every day, but we also want them at the end of the day to be the best version of themselves that they can be."

It's not that males can't be nurturing or compassionate or that there aren't a lot of compassionate male leaders, she said.

"I think women tend to look at the responsibility of leadership as the responsibility for developing the next generation of leaders," Baginski said. "We know that at some point we are going to sunset and want to make sure our house is in order so to speak and that our businesses are equipped with people who can take the leadership reins to the next

Stupica also believes that women are the better multi-taskers and that is also a benefit in a leadership posi-

"I try to do that. I'm not saying I'm always successful, but you do the best you can and I think we just look at the greater picture," Stupica said. "This is not undermining male judges because I think we have a lot of great compassionate male judges, I just think women have the greater ability to multi-task."

Stupica says that while it's great to see so many women in leadership positions, it's only gender equity if the person is in that position based on merit and not gender.

"It should always be a merit-based

system," she said. "What do you bring to the table, what are your qualifications, what is your experience."

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Women and STEM

The number of women entering the professional fields of science, technology, engineering, and mathematics (STEM) is slowly growing around the world, but there is still a sizable gender gap in these professions. According to the College Board, which produces many standardized tests, only 27 percent of all students taking the AP Computer Science exam in the United Science are women. Similarly, just 18 percent of American computer-science degrees are attained by females. However, this is not the case elsewhere in the world. A paper by Gijsbert Stoet and David Geary published in Psychological Science noted that women who live in countries with traditionally higher gender inequality tend to choose STEM professions more readily. Algeria, for example, has one of the highest ratios of women in STEM professions, at 41 percent. Stoet and Geary surmise that women in these countries may be choosing careers with the strongest path to financial independence.

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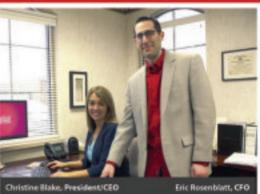

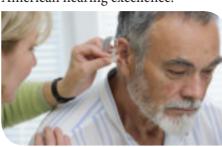
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Jen started as a Box Office Intern in 2007 and has been promoted numerous times and now serves as Assis-

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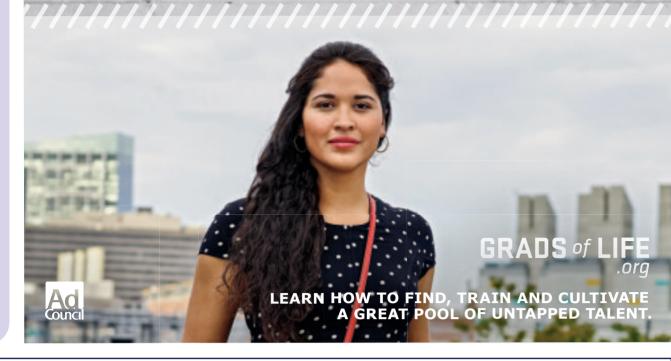
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Destiny to Dentistry

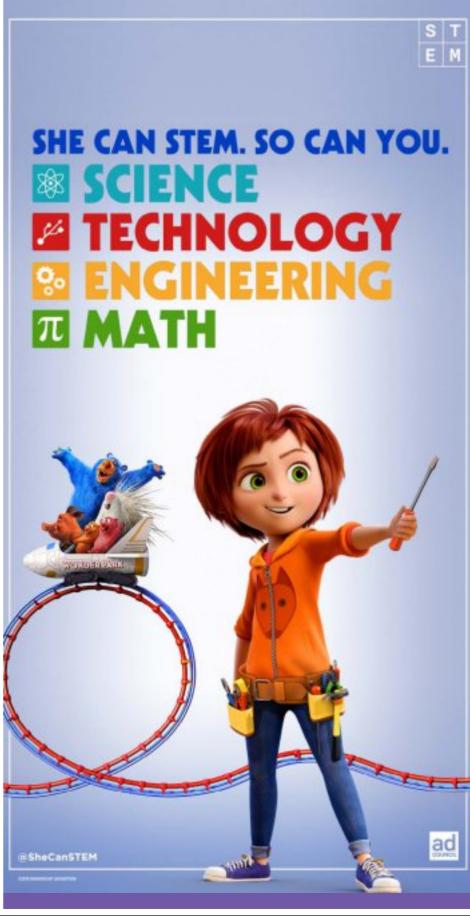

Talking about Hearing Loss

How do you begin a conversation with a loved one about hearing loss? Hearing loss is an invisible disability that they have no control over; they can only control their response to it. Beginning a conversation in a quiet, safe environment is the first step toward helping them. Here are some ways to open the conversation:

- * Talk about what you perceive and ask them what they perceive (in a non-prosecutorial) manner. "When we were at dinner last night, could you understand the waitress?"
- * Talk about situations where you both may have problems and situations where one of you seems to do better.
- * Use the common signs and symptoms of hearing loss to talk about what you have observed.
- * Go with them to their hearing test so that you can talk about your perspective as well.

Symptoms and Assessment

Hearing loss tends to be gradual. Here are some questions that may indicate that you or a loved one has a loss:

- * Have you been told that the TV is too loud for everyone except you?
- * Do you have difficulty following conversations in large groups or noisy places, such as restaurants or family gatherings?
- * Do you often ask others to repeat themselves?

If you answered "yes" to any of these, you might have hearing loss. A hearing care professional can help you decide if hearing aids are a good option for you and find the best option for your hearing loss and lifestyle.

If you do have a hearing loss, you aren't alone. More than 31.5 million people in the United States currently suffer from varying degrees of hearing impairment. The good news is that most hearing losses can be effectively treated with digital hearing aids. The key to effective treatment is identifying hearing loss early.

Causes of Hearing Loss

Hearing loss is invisible and nearly always painless. It can also develop over time. If you suspect that you or a loved one is experiencing hearing loss, visit a hearing healthcare professional to have a hearing test.

Hearing loss has many causes, but the most common include:

- * Expose to loud noise
- * Family history
- * The natural aging process

There are two major types of hearing loss: sensorineural and conductive.

Here's a quick overview of each:

- ★ Sensorineural loss, where damage has been done to the microscopic hair cells in the ear, is the most common.

 The vast majority of people with this kind of loss benefit from amplification like hearing aids.
- ★ Conductive hearing loss is the result of structural damage to the ear. Hearing loss can also be caused by certain antibiotics, viral and toxic illness and disturbances of fluid in the inner ear.

Effects of Hearing Loss

Hearing loss affects every aspects of daily life and can reduce your quality of life by making communication more difficult by:

- * Causing misunderstandings
- * Heightening stress
- * Triggering unnecessary fatigue
- * Isolating someone from society and loved ones
- * Straining relationships with family and friends

Here's the good news – hearing loss can generally be treated with hearing aids. This means you or your loved one can reconnect with life.

What to expect when you get a hearing aid

- * Have realistic expectations. Hearing instruments won't restore hearing to the same level, but will most likely provide dramatic improvement.
- * Be patient adjusting to wearing a hearing aid takes time.
- * Start slowly wear your hearing instruments for a couple of hours a day at first to get your ears comfortable then add more hours each day like wearing a new pair of glasses.
- * Be persistent it's important to consistently wear your instruments so that you get used to them.
- * Stay committed your brain needs time to readjust to hearing sounds it may not have been hearing for years. You will be amazed at your own ability to reconnect with your life with the help of your hearing aids.
