Pat Dando sculpture in the works

Artwork would honor cherished lawmaker's memory By Carina Woudenberg

Plase City Councilmember representing Almaden Valley – District 10 and vice mayor, remembered for her advocacy and tireless work ethic, will be honored with a bronze sculpture at the Almaden Library and Community Center next year.

The idea for the sculpture took shape at Dando's memorial service held after the beloved politician and community advocate died from lung cancer in July 2017 at the age of 71. It's a tribute that seems appropriate on a number of levels, friends said.

"She loved art," said Bill Baron, a longtime friend of Dando's who is leading fundraising efforts for the project. Baron noted that Dando

committee of 20 community members who were either friends of Dando's or at least knew her over a span of decades. It is co-chaired by current San Jose Mayor Sam Liccardo along with former mayors Chuck Reed and Tom McEnery.

Reed served on the council with Dando when she was vice mayor and continued to work with her after she became the president and chief executive officer of the San Jose Silicon Valley Chamber of Commerce, which is now known as the Silicon Valley organization.

"She was a great, strong woman," Reed said. "It's good to have a statue made for her; it would be a good addition to the city."

The sculpture itself will feature Dando sitting on a bench with two children. Next to the sculpture, organizers envision a boulderencased plaque that includes *See DANDO, page 6*

Grease' burnin' up a stage near you!

rease" may not only be the 66 word that you heard," but it may just be the musical that

blows those bobby socks right off your feet! For many of us "Grease" was a favorite movie soundtrack if not outright movie. The story, with its nostalgic return to the 50's for some, the relating to high school teen dramas and challenges for others, the music that has time, place and motion undercurrent in every lyric and even the somewhat controversial ending engages all of us on some level.

For those who haven't yet seen "Grease" all the way through those who know it by heart, you're in for a treat! First, though, you should know this is the musical, not the movie. Coleman says of her 90 person cast and crew, "this musical suits the cast and students we have. Every year I look a year ahead and try to figure out what musical will fit the talent we have. I always have to play with the team that shows up, so I had to ask for this show 'do I have 10 people who can hold their own with a solo?' and fortunately I do." Coleman is always impressed with the sheer number and

level of talent in the Pioneer program, which makes casting challenging.

"The characters have nothing to do with what they look like," said Coleman. "We would never cast based on what someone looks like - we cast on whether someone can sing, how well they dance, how well they can act, and how well they fit a character. So the casting of this show may surprise some who are expecting (characters who look like those in the movie.)" Senior Connor Sechrist, who plays Danny, agrees, "'Grease' is a show that has a lot of roles, and I think Pioneer has a lot of really talented people that can fit those roles. Even if we recast the show right now, we'd have a full set of new people who could fill in the roles and do just as well."

Known for harnessing and channeling students' multiple talents, Pioneer High School is also renowned for their high level productions of any script they've purchased the rights to produce. "Grease" is no exception, leaving audience members wanting to return again and again to join the fun. If you've seen a production by Pioneer, you know the musicals are always directed towards the positive. This makes for a thoroughly enjoyable night out. Megan Hunt shares "we have the right director. San Jose Unified School District is proposing to replace district schools with teacher "affordable housing" as a way to attract and retain teachers.

In evaluating this salary issue there certain factors to consider: 1. Teachers work fewer days.

SJUSD teachers have two months summer vacation with pay; four weeks vacation during the school term (Fall, New Year, Winter and Spring breaks) plus holidays during the year, like Thanksgiving, break. Summer breaks are a relic of a time when children needed to help parents for summer farming duties. Why not have schools all year around?

2. Teachers have generous post-retirement benefits including defined benefit pension plans; many private sector employees have only social security benefits; and hopefully, a 401K retirement savings plan.

3. Increasing amounts of

school revenue are diverted to address the \$100B CALSTRS unfunded pension liability.

4. Increasing revenues are being diverted from the classroom to fund an increasing bureaucracy to initiate, implement and evaluate multiple programs to improve academic achievement.

5. Teacher compensation is based on seniority and number of college degrees obtained; not performance. Charter schools arose in popularity because of the failure of unionized public schools to educate our kids to meet the 21st Century educational challenges we face in a global economy.

In short, we need to radically change the teaching employment model that inherited from the 19th and 20th centuries.

We need to change the education business model from a bureaucracy dedicated to selfpreservation and expansion to one that focuses on satisfying the customers' needs or else loses customers.

As Reagan once observed, ""A government bureau is the closest thing to eternal life we'll ever see on this earth."

a short summary of Dando's life. A QR code will be included to direct readers to a website containing more information about her life, personality and accomplishments.

"The website will be full of inspiring information encouraging those visiting about the importance of ethics, importance of education, to be friendly and polite, to care about your fellow citizen and to become engaged in the community and to serve in leadership roles," Baron told San José Spotlight on Friday.

The group set a fundraising goal of at least \$350,000 for the project, with \$250,000 going toward the sculpture and the remainder pegged for an endowment to the San Jose Public Library for children's educational programming.

Baron says the group hopes to continue funding the endowment on an annual basis. The committee had raised \$360,000 as of Friday. Additional donations will now benefit the endowment fund for future years.

Dando served on the San Jose City Council for 10 years beginning in 1995. She became vice mayor for two years during former Mayor Ron Gonzales's term. Before that, Dando worked for McEnery during his second mayoral term which began in the late 1980s.

Before immersing herself into politics later in life, Dando worked as a school teacher in Schenectady, New York. After her family's move to San Jose, Dando focused on raising her children and became a strong advocate for improving the local schools and surrounding community, according to her obituary.

The mother of three co-founded the Almaden Valley Youth Counseling Center and served as president of the Almaden Women's Club. She

The school was founded in 1969 by a group of parents in south San Jose who wanted to participate in their children's early childhood education. They formulated a philosophy that was based on sequential intellectual (or cognitive) development. The parents wanted to be present with their children and witness their growth and new discoveries and created a co-op preschool model.

Together, parents and teachers create an environment that is happy, safe, and secure so that the children can grow physically, emotionally, socially and intellectually. Since its opening in 1969, APPS continues to develop the whole child through the dedication of its teachers and the active participation of parents.

also was involved with the first Almaden Art and Wine Festival, serving as publicity chair.

Dando also has been credited for her role in financing the construction of the city's SAP Center, which is home to the San Jose Sharks. The project passed by just a few votes during Dando's time on the council.

Baron described Dando as a unique person in her ability to touch others and embrace the "it takes a village" mentality. She never took sole credit for projects she had a hand in, Baron said.

"She sort of instilled a certain set of values that we now carry forward," Baron added. "Pat continues to give back through the hundreds of people that she touched."

Coleman hopes you'll come away feeling "joy and spellbound by all the energy" you've just seen, as well as being "very impressed with what these students can do" so much so that you're bound to forget they're just students and instead feel vou've watched semi-professional theatre at its finest. "Pioneer High is the right school to produce "Grease" because first-off we have high schoolers playing high schoolers (so they're) playing someone their age going through similar life situations," Coleman explained. "We also have the talent to support it. It's a very well-known show. A lot of people who aren't theater people know "Grease" so that comes with a responsibility to do it well because people come in with high expectations. We're also the right school because of the group of students we have - how good and dedicated they are. They are able to meet the expectations head on. If I went to see 'Grease' I'd have certain expectations, too. Pioneer High School is the right one to showcase "Grease" because the students will be able to produce what an audience expects, if not more.3

We start believing now that we can be who we are

For those who may not know, "Grease" is set in and around 1950s fictional "Rydell High," with teens facing many of the same issues they have all along, even

today: Defining friendships, handling rumors and speculation, confronting stereotypes, learning to overcome obstacles, and finding the balance of change while still holding onto yourself are just some of the themes found in "Grease."

Sandy, played by senior Kaylan Tate, and Danny help shape the give and take underlying the plot. Kaylan "loves drama - it's one of my happy places!" but wasn't drawn to acting until the end of her sophomore year. Prior to that, she performed in an elementary school play with a feeling then of "pure stage fright." Fortunately that stage fright is long behind her. She's now found herself in a starring role - one she worked hard to achieve. "Sandy brings a pure wholesomeness to the plot. She goes through a lot of individual growth and comes to a deeper understanding of who she is and who she wants to be." Kaylan's "super excited, over the moon and I hope everyone who sees it enjoys it!" It's the first (main) role that she's had - ever. A 4-year Varsity Tennis player, she also coanchors PHS News, is active in Girl Scouts, and previously played in the band for many years. "My understanding of music helped me grasp not only the words of the songs but the meaning of the songs...so it's a good way for me to express what Sandy's feeling throughout the play."

Like Kaylan, Connor Sechrist was drawn to PHS musicals after seeing their "Les Miserables" his freshman year. His experience spans chorus and supporting roles, including solo vignettes in last year's "Guys and Dolls." He hoped for Danny, working hard preparing his audition, and now that he has it "those who know me will be surprised by how I'm acting" in this role. Doing this show has been eye-opening for some of the students involved, captured by Connor as "it's surprising to see how people acted back in those days, like what was acceptable. The language they used is kind of funny to hear but they actually talked like that. (It's) surprising how grown up they all are. I feel like we're becoming younger - I don't feel like I'm as old as Danny would be. It feels like teens now are younger." It's in some ways funny for Connor to be playing this role. For one he's very athletic. "I really appreciate going out and doing exercise. I've played soccer and swim - I still swim....actually it's hard to be a character who is not athletic. (Although Danny) tries his best to be athletic in the show, that is not a role that fits Danny Zuko. I feel that's a little fun to act because I see myself as kind of the opposite from him." Besides running marathons on his own, Connor "really enjoys rock climbing. It's a hobby I just started recently. But I'm not doing it as much right now as I don't want to hurt myself before the show." Mrs. Coleman breathed an audible sigh of relief to that!

Rizzo, played by the familiar sight of Isabella Osborne, now finishing her senior year, is the play's antagonist. "Rizzo's the bad girl and is very promiscuous very different from who I am. Rizzo provides a more serious tone, she is a mean character but deep down she's very angry and very sad. Danny and Sandy are lighter characters, so she gives depth and makes it more relatable in that way" explains Osborne. As she has done with past characters, Osborne's portrayal makes you fully believe Rizzo. "Experience with acting really helps. I'm very aware of my emotions, so it's easy for me to tap into how Rizzo is feeling and I can use that to grow her character."

Senior Megan Hunt plays Frenchy. It's a perfect role for her as she has proved her comic relief in past productions by nailing the timing. Her talent for this show is no different. "I'm really happy I'm playing Frenchy. She's important as she's a link between the other characters, and she's always there for Sandy." Megan mused the audience would be most surprised by "probably how well our cast goes together. We all get along, and it's going to be really good I think, because of how well we all go together." Perhaps through all the music rehearsals those lyrics have rubbed off?

In this musical and different than the movie, the character Patty Simcox is a key part of the unfolding story. Played by senior Brylie Carlson, "I'm the one everyone makes fun of, the happy-go-lucky goody-two-shoes. I move the story along in a way. For example, Sandy and Danny have a cute moment, but I come in and break apart the moment. I'm also a comic relief part, too." Brylie has observed of past audiences "overall people who haven't seen our shows when *See GREASE, page 10*

The Booster Club parents knew that the risers were crucial for the audience which can number up to 300 people per show. The risers are a necessary but expensive aspect of each performance. Any profits made at the show are spent renting risers which mean other areas of the drama department go wanting.

"We would like to take any profits from the shows and put that money toward new costumes or technical equipment for the enhancement of our theater program," says Rachael Parakh, Vice President of the Castillero Drama Booster Club. "But the cost of the risers takes up almost all of the profit we earn from our plays and musicals."

This year the newly formed Castillero Drama Booster Club decided to submit a grant to the Almaden Valley Women's Club to help raise some funds for the risers. Each year the Almaden Valley Women's Club produces the Art & Wine Festival held in September at Almaden Lake Park. All proceeds from that event are donated to local organizations or set aside for scholarships. Rachael Parakh and Mary Ann Frank, President and Treasurer applied for and received a grant from the AVWC.

"This grant enabled us to kick off our fundraising campaign for the risers," says Parakh. In addition to the grant, funds were also raised by the Castillero *See RISERS, page 21*

they come to see our productions, they're really overwhelmed with 'Wow this is a lot of talent!' Or, those who come to see show after show, we keep surprising them with how good our cast is. And, overall the way (shows are) produced (when comparing to other schools she's seen on YouTube). Our school puts a lot of work into it, we try very hard, and it shows in our performance. Also the communication onstage is all our relationships on stage because we're all friends outside so it shows on stage."

Every interviewee remarked about the sheer force of passion the PHS drama students possess and the family they've created both onstage and off. Take a look at the Facebook page @Pioneerdrama to see junior Emily Nguyen's visionary photo shoot done outside of school with costumes these young adults put together on their own, all to promote this musical. Joy, fun, family and character shine through. And that's just a fun photo shoot. Wait 'til you see them all bring what they've got to the stage.

Besides notoriety as a high quality production house, Pioneer also has the distinction of drawing in talent from all walks of high school life. Cheerleaders, robotics team members, track and field stars, artists, football players, dance team members, math whizzes, linguists, swimmers, scientists, golfers, journalists, varsity tennis players - those and many more all make up the multi-talented cast and crew. In addition many work including Megan, who works an average of 24 hours every week beyond attending school and rehearsals, and others volunteer like Brylie who is very involved with Foster The Bay, a local organization supporting families fostering children. These well-rounded students bring their multi-faceted outside experiences combined with shared acting experiences to the stage nightly creating characters and a story you will thoroughly enjoy. "One thing that (sets us apart) from other school shows is that we have great chemistry together - all the characters and that will really show and make the musical so much better" observed junior Josh Radzinski who plays Kenickie. "Not only do we have a bunch of great female (actors) but we also have a bunch of boys as well and there are a lot of high schools where the Drama department is full of a lot of girls but not a lot of guys. In ours, there are a lot of guys and they're all like best friends. All the girls are so close to each other and all the guys are so close to each other and it's really gonna show."

Each of the leads has hopes for you, the audience, to gain from this show. Connor is "hoping the audience learns sometimes you do have to change a little to appeal to who you want to appeal to, and that it's not all about one side, it's that both sides have to change to accommodate the other side.' Kaylan hopes "we can inspire future actors and actresses to take the stage and pursue their passions early, because when I was little I would go to plays like this and the people on the stage were stars. (Also) to young and old alike it can help show them even though there are dark times in our lives we have to go out and find the things that make us happy, that we're passionate about, and that we can serve the world best." Josh said "knowing they saw a great show, hoping they had fun, too, because there are parts where people go into the audience and interact with them...so hopefully they'll walk away with a big smile on their face knowing they saw a great production of 'Grease." Isabella shared you will be "surprised by the size of the cast (and) the amount of talent. Often when you go to a high school play your expectations may be kind of low, but there's something about Pioneer - the directors, the talent and that all coming together to create an amazing piece of work." Megan shared "I'm hoping they walk away with 'Wow! This was a really well done show not necessarily put on by high schoolers (and that they're) proud of their community knowing we can do things like this. It doesn't cost a lot but it's really, really good because of the people who are onstage." Brylie adds "I hope the audience walks away thinking this was a great production with great kids who can really act. Also, that the show is not as sexist feeling as maybe one would think. They are keeping the reality of the show but with a modern twist. It's pretty well known so it will be fun for people, too, because the songs are really well known.'

Probably the best part of producing a play is the creative license given to the director to interpret it through their own vision. With "Grease" often the ending has been a bit controversial as, although it's not written that way, many have left with the feeling that the right way for a woman to "get a man" is to change into a promiscuous-looking character. "As a woman that hasn't sat well with me; however, we've talked how Sandy hasn't chosen to sell herself out but instead has become empowered," said Coleman. "Same with Danny Zuko, that he has also changed. It's instead through both making changes, both becoming vulnerable, which to me is more indicative of what would happen in a real relationship. I hope the audience really enjoys the ride the characters take them on and that the end is considered a happy ending. I hope they come away very impressed with what these students can do, their energy, their creativity, and that they continue to uphold the standard that Pioneer is known for. Most leave saying 'that's another one for the books and the next time Pioneer puts on a show I'll be back.' Our students are the show's best marketers - what they put out on stage is what will keep people wanting to come back year after year. I also hope that we gain more new audience members, more fans of PHS Drama. Also for the kids that come to see the show - this is a very fun show for children, a lot of whom know the music - I hope it inspires them. I hope they get excited about theatre and hopefully come to Pioneer one day and want to be on stage here. I hope to maintain those ties and grow them."

It's suggested to get tickets to "Grease" early, as word of mouth has already garnered fast-moving ticket sales. If they appear sold out online, go to the door upon opening any night to gain a seat until sold to capacity. The sound from multiple chorus numbers, the enthusiasm, the talent will surely surprise and move you to toe-tapping, groove-in-yourseat delight. And as Kaylan Tate reveals "(it might surprise you) how the leads interact and the kind of subtleties you might not see in the first show, but if you go a second or third night you'll be able to pick up on them."

Performances are scheduled for Friday-Saturday March 22-23 and Wednesday-Saturday March 28-30 at 7 p.m. Tickets (\$15 Adults; \$7 for students and children, and \$10 for seniors 62 years and older) are available now at phsdrama.ludus.com.

Under VTA's current plan, the Ohlone/Chynoweth-Almaden light rail line will be eliminated. It will be replaced with bus Route 80, which is scheduled to run every 30 minutes. Bus Route 83, slated to replace Almaden Valley's Route 13, will also be terminated.

For those who don't drive, like students who take buses to and from school, and the elderly who use them to go food shopping, to medical appointments and the community center, this is especially problematic.

"I am concerned about the service cuts and especially how it will affect the senior population of Almaden Valley," says Councilmember Johnny Khamis. "I will advocate for alternative methods like an on-demand service that VTA can provide like Uber or Lyft."

Almaden Valley Community Association Treasurer Michael Lee has proposed a revised Route 83 to replace Route 13. Almaden Valley Community Association Director Matt Mahan is working on a blog post and petition requesting VTA to investigate Lee's "Winning VTA Solution for Almaden."

VTA has cut more than 90 percent of service into Almaden Valley since the 1980s, including Route 63 along Meridian Ave. and Route 65 along Redmond Ave. "Why is VTA now targeting the one remaining viable lifeline bus through this Valley?" asks Lee.

VTA cites low ridership for justifying further cuts. However, Lee says that past service cuts and longer wait times led to the ridership losses. After public opposition in 2017 to VTA's plan to cut Almaden Valley service, VTA approved a new Route 83 to serve more destinations. But faced with a budget deficit. VTA now proposes the elimination of Route 83 before it was even implemented.

Lee notes that the elimination of Almaden's buses might not be obvious as people currently ride Routes 13 and 63. "Route 83 is the improved version of 13," he says. "Unless you knew it was to replace 13, you would not necessarily realize that your bus is going to disappear. The 63 was eliminated in 2017, but that change has not yet come to pass because it's to coincide with the Retains connections to Light Rail mainline and Express 102 Retains service to Oakridge Mall

arrival of BART. Route 64 going south on Almaden Expressway would stop at Camden, rather than at the Almaden Light Rail Station. Here we are saving our lifeline buses without asking for any expenditure other than those already committed to Almaden Valley. It's an absolute win-win."

"Some of the proposed cuts on our side of town seem reasonable," says Mahan. "But I believe that the high level of community feedback and the vulnerability of the residents who will bear the burden of these cuts create a compelling case for preserving route 63 and giving route 83 a try. The 83 will give VTA the opportunity to increase quality and ridership on a key bus route in Almaden Valley."

The Next Network Plan, developed in 2016 and 2017, was the first major redesign of VTA's transit network since 2008, and intended to improve ridership, cost-effectiveness and connections to regional transit. It sought to balance the contradictory objectives of maximizing ridership (serving more people per dollar spent) with providing geographic coverage.

But according to VTA, the Next Network Plan proved financially unsustainable. The Transportation Authority is up against a \$20 million structural deficit in fiscal year 2018 and a \$26 million deficit in fiscal year 2019.

"VTA must find an appropriate and difficult balance between spending its fixed budget on ridership and coverage goals," says VTA Public Information Officer Holly Perez. "Staff has been tasked to create a transit plan that balances putting a greater emphasis on ridership within a fixed budget."

In response to VTA's Board of Directors request, the staff developed the Draft 2019 New Transit Plan, which costs about 4 percent less to operate and places a greater emphasis on increasing ridership. Under both plans, the routes proposed for reduction or elimination demonstrated low ridership and high costs per rider.

Investing in high-frequency routes and connections with BART is projected to save VTA about \$15 million annually. Although financially more secure, this shifts the balance of ridership versus coverage.

VTA's current service employs a Continued on next page

70/30 balance. The Draft Next Network Plan proposed an 85/15 balance that was adjusted to 83/17 for the Final Next Network Plan. The Draft 2019 New Transit Service Plan proposes a 90/10 balance.

In the New Transit Plan, light rail routes will operate every 15 minutes on weekdays and 20 minutes on weekends, except for early mornings and late evenings, when ridership declines.

VTA is proposing discontinuing some express and school routes as they are less cost-effective. These include: Express Routes 101, 122, 182 and 185. Additionally, the number of trips operated on Express Routes 102, 103, 121 and 168 would be decreased. Currently, VTA provides additional buses around bell times on school routes. Three of these extra services are proposed to be discontinued: Route 81 serving St. Francis High School in Mountain View, Route 66 to Santa Teresa High School and the

Route 55X line that provides a direct route from Fremont High School in Sunnyvale to North Sunnyvale.

Increased bus frequency is proposed for routes from Gilroy to San Jose (Route 68), Westgate and Curtner light rail (Route 26), on Stevens Creek Boulevard (23) and El Camino (522).

The 2019 New Transit Plan was presented to community groups in January and February. In March, VTA will analyze the community input and incorporate it into the new plan. In May, it will seek VTA Board adoption of the Final 2019 New Transit Service Plan. Implementation is scheduled for October through December, coinciding with the projected start of BART service to Santa Clara County.

The Americans with Disabilities Act requires VTA to provide services within ³/₄ of a mile of a fixed transit route. Passengers with disabilities who can't use fixed route bus and light rail may

qualify for paratransit service, a door-to-door shared ride service for a premium fee, with rides outside the service network costing considerably more. In 2017, it was projected to cost \$16 per ride for those outside the service network as opposed to \$4 per ride inside the service network.

With the intention of increasing ridership, the Next Network Plan increased the number of frequent routes in VTA's network. After analyz-



ing its ridership, it also decided to decrease service levels during weekday commute periods, reallocating it to weekday middays and weekends.

VTA says that it intends to incorporate community input received during the development of the Next Network Plan, minimize impacts to current riders and provide equitable service while adhering to VTA Board direction to reduce cost. "The new proposal makes the frequent network proposed in the Next Network Plan stronger," says VTA, "and brings even more people into a short walk of frequent transit."

However, while seeking to be financially solvent by increasing service to high ridership routes, VTA is cutting back or eliminating essential services to areas with few or no other transit options.

Fundraising for the Pat Dando Legacy Project has topped its \$350,000 goal

Well for the last year and a half we have been building community consensus, working with the city staff, and gaining approvals from the appropriate city committee (Public Art) and commissions (Parks & Rec. and Library) to Remember and Honor Pat and Inspire others to follow her example of Community Service.

Once we received approval of these groups we launched a fundraising effort headed

by Bill Baron (former Chairman of the Board of the SJ/SV Chamber of Commerce) and co-chaired by Mayor Sam Liccardo and former Mayors Chuck Reed and Tom McEnery.

The goal was to privately fund (without city/taxpayer dollars) the creation of a life size bronze statue of Pat sitting on a bench reading to a boy and girl located just outside the main entrance of the Almaden Library/Community Center. In addition to the bronze statue, there would be a \$100,000 endowment for enhancing children's programs at the Almaden branch library. Total dollar goal was \$350,000, for both.

Well, through the hard work of the fundraising group and the generosity of many in Business, Political, and development communities along with the Dando family & friends they have topped their goal. As of March 1st they had commitments for \$391,925 (112 % of goal).

So, what happens to the extra dollars? They will go directly into the library endowment for enhancing children's programs at the Almaden Library.

The installation of the bronze statue just to the right side of the main entrance should happen sometime in March 2020.
