# Ask the Financial Doctor: Does Michigan tax Social Security benefits?

**Q**: I have about \$11,000 of medical expenses for 2018 that were not covered by my health insurance company. Can I deduct the \$11,000 on my income tax form?

A : There are two hurdles before you can deduct any medical dollars. First, the medical expenses must exceed the threshold of 7.5 percent of your adjusted gross income(AGI) and second, schedule A(itemized de-

ductions) has to be greater than your standard deduction.

**Q** : Is the annual gift rule \$14,000 or \$15,000?

A : For 2017 it was \$14,000 and for 2018 it is \$15,000. You can giftgive up to \$15,000 annually to any person without triggering a gift tax. If you are married and your spouse is in agreement, you can double the annual gift to \$30,000. You do not get a deduction and the recipient does not declare the gift as taxable income.

**Q** : What is the surviving spousal Social Security benefit?

A : Assuming that the surviving spouse did not take any early Social Security benefit, the widow or widower at full retirement age(FRA) will receive 100 percent of the deceased's benefit. If a spouse passes away and was receiving \$1,200 per month then the surviving spouse will receive \$1,200 per month.

**Q**: What is the standard deduction and personal exemption amounts for the tax year 2018?

A : For 2018 the personal exemptions are eliminated. The standard deduction is \$12,000(single filer), \$24,000(joint filer) and \$18,000(head of household). Additionally, you can add \$1,300 per person over age 65 or \$1,600 if unmarried and not a surviving spouse.

: How does Michigan tax Social Security benefits? A : Michigan is a friendly state and does not tax Social Security benefits.

Q: My neighbor has deposited money in Ally bank and is earning 2.2 percent. I am considering depositing some money but I am worried about the safety of my principal. How safe is Ally bank?

A: Ally bank is federally insured(FDIC) up to \$250,000. Ally bank is the successor of GMAC bank. When GM filed for bankruptcy in 2009 all the depositors of GMAC bank never lost a penny and were automatically converted into Ally bank deposits.

**Q**: My husband passed away 5 years ago and I recently discovered three stock certificates titled only in his name. How do I change the ownership of the stock certificates?

A : To change the title of a stock certificate owned solely by a decedent, you have to go to probate court. If the property was jointly owned, send a letter of instructions together with a death certificate to the transfer agent to reissue new certificates.

**Q**: I have five IRAs and will be 71 in July, 2019. When do I have to take my first distribution? Do I have to take a distribution from each IRA?

A: You will be 70½ in 2019 and your first required minimum distribution(RMD) must be taken by 4/½020. A second RMD must be completed by 12/3½020. Optionally, you could take your first RMD in 2019. The RMDs can be taken from one IRA or all the IRAs. If the total RMDs are \$10,000, you can take \$10,000 from one IRA or any combination of IRAs. If one of the IRAs is a decedent IRA then you must treat that IRA separate from the other IRAs. The RMD of a decedent IRA can only come from the decedent IRA.

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

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# MONEY & SECURITY Are new windows a good investment and other real estate questions answered

**Q**: I just started to read your column a few months ago and I'm not sure if you have already answered this question. I'm buying a condo and am curious if there is any way to know if the association fee will increase?

A : Welcome, glad to have you as a reader. Not everyone goes through the same thing in life at the same time so questions do repeat and that's why I'm here. It's been a couple years since I covered this topic so here it is. Eventually all monthly associa-



tion fees will go up. It's just a matter of when and if the fee will go up a little or a lot. In my opinion, what you can do is look at some obvious indicators such as the following: The association's financials; is there enough money in reserves or does it show them in the red? What is the condition of the roads and roofs? Do the exteriors have a lot of exposed wood that needs to be painted and replaced every few years or is the exterior mostly maintenance free with brick and siding? Is there a clubhouse and pool? How old is the development? While these items are not an extensive list of the factors that determine the monthly association fee they will give you a glimpse into the future. There are no guarantees with association fees except that they will go up.

**Q**: Our house needs new windows. We have gotten several bids from different companies with price differences of more than \$15,000. We probably will be selling in 5 years. Will one brand of windows get us more money for our house than another? We're not sure if we want to spend the extra money.

A: Windows can be a very personal thing. I am not a window expert and can only go by my own personal experience as a Realtor. The following is based on short term return on investment and not for someone planning to stay long term in their home. In my opinion and observation; Buyers when looking at homes, first are more interested in the age and condition of the windows than the brand. Appraisers are generally looking at the age and condition also. If the windows are in need of repair then the appraiser might lower the price of the property. If they're in good condition no adjustment in price. If the windows are less than 5 years old sometimes the appraisers will bump the price up a little bit for the overall condition of the property, but nowhere near what you paid for the new windows; just a fraction. If you spend \$35,000 on windows versus \$20,000, you will not get \$15,000 more for your home. The more expensive windows may be more desirable for a Buyer and they may be willing to pay a little more for the property, but you will not see the cost recovered in the sale. I use to be a big fan of Glen Haege, America's Master Handyman (unfortunately he passed away). Glen use to say that "the best window is the one that is installed correctly' and "improperly installed; the most expensive window will make you unhappy.'

Remember, windows are part of a home's physical deterioration/maintenance and have a lifecycle (life expectancy) just like roofs, furnaces, hot water heaters etc... Buyers expect that a house is going to be maintained. There are so many options available today to satisfy every homeowner's budget and taste. With all that said, that doesn't mean that you should install junk either just because it's cheaper. What if you end up staying longer than 5 years? Hmm...

 Market Update: January's update for Macomb County and Oakland County's housing market is no different than what we have been seeing; inventory down and prices up. Closed sales were down but pending sales were up. In Macomb County prices were up by more than 4 percent and Oakland County prices were up by less than 1 percent. Residential home/condo on market inventory was down. Macomb County's on market inventory was down by 8 percent and Oakland County's on market inventory was down by more than 7 percent. Average days on market have stayed about the same. Closed sales in Macomb County were down by almost 10 percent but Pending sales were up by almost 7 percent. 



People in their 50s should look into long-term care insurance, Spickler said, because the older you get the greater chance you might not be eligible for coverage. "The number one way to combat and offset these expenses going forward is to at least see if you qualify for longterm care (insurance)," she said.

Still, long-term care insurance is expensive, and many people may not qualify due to age or health. That's why Spickler suggests clients save for three different buckets: a bucket for living expenses, a bucket for retirement, and a bucket for healthcare expenses. The healthcare expense bucket should be used for anything healthcare related, including long-term care.

Furthermore, she suggests older adults research the assisted living and skilled nursing home options in their communities so they have an idea of what's nearby.

"Keep a notebook of prices and availability in your town in case you are rushed into something because you never know," she said. "As uncomfortable as it is to talk about, you should write everything down. You don't want to be depending on anyone else to answer the questions that are going to come up. It's always better to be prepared."

Phinney was one of many seniors enjoying almost a zen-like experience recently at the Shelby Township Senior Center during their weekly "Cookies and Coloring" session. # How to find a great part-time job in retirement

It costs only \$2 each way for riders, so the lift is an affordable alternative for those in need. The mini bus does not leave the three communities served by the OPC.

"This is such a Godsend to so many people. It's a wonderful service and for specialist, hostess, front desk agent and me it's really rewarding," he said. "I like being on the road and I like talking to people and getting to know them."


