rederick J. Ferrer, a resident of Willow Glen, has been named CEO of Child Advocates, CASA of Silicon Valley, the Santa Clara County nonprofit that provides trained volunteer Court Appointed Special Advocates (CASAs) for children in the Santa Clara County foster care system.

Ferrer replaces outgoing Executive Director Karen Scussel who is retiring. Scussel has been involved with Child Advocates for over 18 years. During her tenure, Child Advocates grew from serving 595 foster children in FY 2014 to 905 foster children in FY 2018. During this time, Child Advocates became one of the largest CASA programs in California with a budget of \$2.4 million.

In fiscal year 2019, Child Advocates plans to serve nearly 1,000 foster children and recruit, train and support 700 CASA volunteers in Santa Clara County. "Karen is an exceptional leader who achieved the monumental challenge of See FERRER, page 3

Kathleen Erdmann in charge of Publicity and Community Outreach quotes the mission statement of Thrift Box "We are here to raise funds to promote, foster, and maintain the welfare of children treated at the Lucile Packard Children's Hospital Stanford." And so they have been and continue to do!

With a membership of approximately 300 and an active membership of approximately 200 members, these devoted volunteers maintain the day to day activities of making this great organization work. Some are called 'sustainers' which means they have been members for more than 10 years and continue to work at The Box!

Some members are in a professional category, which means they still have full-time jobs, but continue to volunteer on a regular

basis. The current President is Kelly Burns. Kathleen goes on by saying, "We have managers who manage the store on a single day of the week. So if they are there on Monday, there will be a different manager on, say Tuesday, etc."

Kathleen further states as regarding disbursement of funds to L.P.C.H. "We have monthly luncheon (business) meetings at local restaurants and at the quarterly meetings representatives from the hospital attend and are presented with a check. We also have a semi-annual event (Spring and Fall) called "Best of the Box" and a separate check for each of those events is presented at the same time. Our next Best of the Box is March 29th from 9 a.m. – 5 p.m. and March 30 from 9 a.m. -3 p.m. Details and photos are on the website. We have many beautiful things at these sales from Designer Clothing, Jewelry, antiques, collectibles and a wide variety of books for all ages." The Box donated close to a million dollars to the hospital just last year alone!

Major Achievements

When asked what she would

consider some major achievements of The Box, Kathleen declared, "We have a campaign each vear for a special need and vear before last we sent some transplant patients to a medically supervised camp which in many cases was the first time away from home in a camp setting. We raised enough to send each child to camp for TWO years. Members as well as some generous businesses and individuals donated and this was over and above what we raised in the store!"

Outstanding Volunteers

The Box has many dedicated workers who have served in several capacities. Many of their volunteers are retired teachers who have dedicated their lives to children but they have members from many professions like social workers, realtors, banking and those who have worked in high tech. It's a wide variety of life experiences and skill sets. All are dedicated volunteers!

Interesting items that have been sold

Kathleen proudly says, "We have sold beautiful artwork and antiques and we regularly display and sell what we refer to as "Treasures". They are generally displayed to coincide with the appropriate season. The Box is a great place to find gifts that are collectible. We have sold designer clothing like Escada and Burberry clothing and our designers will many times pair jewelry with clothing." This reflects the devotion of donors who really care about their fellow citizens!

Great pride is taken in the condition of the Thrift Box! In addition to general housekeeping they close between Christmas and New years for major maintenance that is not possible during store hours or overnight. The last major overhaul was the replacement of carpets among other things. They are very grateful to a generous community who donate and shop with us from all over San Jose. They try very hard to put their best foot forward.

Frederick J. Since the release of the first Star Wars movie nearly 40 years ago, the Star Wars saga has had a seismic impact on both cinema and culture. inspiring audiences around the world with its mythic storytelling, capti-

vating characters, groundbreaking special effects and iconic musical scores composed by Williams.

Fans will be able to experience the scope and grandeur of this beloved film in a live symphonic concert experience, when the Star Wars: A New Hope performs in San Jose March 29 through 31 at San Jose Center for the Performing Arts.

Legendary composer Williams is well known for scoring all eight of the Star Wars saga films to date, beginning with 1977's Star Wars: A New Hope for which

In 2005, the American Film Institute selected Williams' score to 1977's Star Wars: A New Hope as the greatest American film score of all time.

The soundtrack to A New Hope also was preserved by the Library of Congress in the National

Recording Registry, for being "culturally, historically, or aesthetically significant." Williams was inducted into the Hollywood Bowl's Hall of Fame in 2000. and he received the

Kennedy Center Honors in 2004, the National Medal of Arts in 2009, and the AFI Life Achievement Award in 2016. Williams has composed the scores for eight of the top 20 highest-grossing films at the U.S. box office (adjusted for inflation).

Teacher occupation and compensation needs reform

Dear Editor,

San Jose Unified School District is proposing to replace district schools with teacher "affordable housing" as a way to attract and retain teachers. In evaluating this salary issue

there are certain factors to consider: Teachers work fewer days. SJUSD teachers have two months summer vacation with pay; four weeks vacation during the school term (Fall, New Year, Winter and Spring breaks) plus holidays during the year, like Thanksgiving, break. Summer breaks are a relic of a time when children needed to help parents for summer farming duties. Why not have schools all year around?

2. Teachers have generous postretirement benefits including defined benefit pension plans; many private sector employees have only social security benefits; and hopefully, a 401K retirement savings plan.

3. Increasing amounts of school revenue are diverted to address the \$100B CALSTRS unfunded pension liability.

4. Increasing revenues are being diverted from the classroom to fund an increasing bureaucracy to initiate, implement and evaluate multiple programs to improve academic achievement.

5. Teacher compensation is based on seniority and number of college degrees obtained; not performance. Charter schools arose in popularity because of the failure of unionized public schools to educate our kids to meet the 21st Century educational challenges we face in a global economy.

In short, we need to radically change the teaching employment model that inherited from the 19th and 20th centuries.

We need to change the education business model from a bureaucracy dedicated to selfpreservation and expansion to one that focuses on satisfying the customers' needs or else loses customers

YMCA partners with Stanford to offer no cost cancer survivor fitness program

Living Strong-Living Well 12 week program

MCA has joined with Stanford to provide a free strength fitness program.

LSLW (Living Strong Living Well) is a 12-week program now being offered free of charge to adults who recently experienced a battle with cancer at the Evergreen-East Valley Family YMCA and other selected locations in the Bay Area.

Some enter the program while in treatment too. The goal is to enhance spirit, mind, and body for those confronting the disease. Participants meet two times a week for 75-minute sessions offered at no cost thanks to the generous support of donors.

Goals of the program

The Living Strong Living Well program offers support so that one can meet new friends and charge together in learning and defending their bodies against the foe called cancer. The warm small group setting composed of certified staff provides personalized attention to each participant to expertly meet their individual needs.

The program uses exercise machines as well as time for stretching to help guide each participant through their choreographed paces and nurture their total unique health needs. Some key areas focused upon are; reducing side effects of treatment, addressing weight changes, support for how to gain energy and confidence and help in planning continuing activities after the program comes to a close.

Testimonials

One participant stated, "When I finished chemo, I had no energy, muscle tone, strength for stamina and a decrease in coordination and memory. I started the Living Strong Living Well Program and began walking and then lifting

minimal weights. I felt better physically and my memory improved. Now I exercise regularly. The staff understood my limitations and encouraged me along the way."

In speaking with caregivers, other factors also became apparent in the recovery process. For example, taste buds may deplete the flavor of foods. Appetite may change. Survivors of cancer often experience a "de-conditioning" and have a lack of energy causing them to become chronically fatigued.

Certified trainers Misty and John are heroes

It is seen while observing in the area that houses over a hundred various training machines called the "Wellness Center," that John and Misty offer meaningful encouragement. One person stated, "It's amazing what they do for there is a passion seen in how they help others and one just realizes that they give of themselves in a very deep level." This backs up the meaning of the word "Family" stated on the front of the building of the East Valley Family YMCA.

Trainer John states, "With my experience over the past five years in teaching the class, it makes me feel good to see participants grow in strength from the beginning to the end of the class and succeed in their goals. For example, one participant built up their balance skills and everyone witnessed confidence in their walking."

"Doctors often refer people to our program and suggest the class to build strength," said John. "The first days we do testing to measure ability balance and strength and we get an idea of what a person can do. We help decide which machines are capable of being used. The length of visit varies, and we work the sessions on how the participants feel in that some sessions might last 15 minutes while others, the

entire time. We always end the sessions with stretching exercises."

A wellness coordinator at the "Y" explained that the stretch time helps not only the body but allows the individual to bond with the group and know that they are not alone in their journev.

Another instructor named Misty shared, "Every participant comes to the program at a different level of fitness due to the types of treatment he or she may be undergoing: cancer medications, chemotherapy and so forth.'

Misty shared her personal story about losing her dad and her brother to cancer and expressed that the Living Strong Living Well program at YMCA is very dear to her. She said, "When I experienced my dad and brother dying of cancer, I thought to myself, if I had to bring back all the stars from the night sky to save them, I would have. After that, I returned to the YMCA motivated to do all I could for the living. I knew, and I know that I could positively impact the people with the knowledge I have.'

Misty went on to explain, "What I like most about the program is that I get to witness the transformation in the participants. I see their faces glow, and they become more happy and energized. It seems I am making an impact on their lives. I feel a deep sense of gratitude." Misty states that each day when she wakes she thinks about the word "gratitude" and "how it is so vital to make the best of each day we are given."

Everyone cares about each other

An experience shared by the YMCA staff: one participant had not shown up to the program for a long period of time, so a friend reached out and asked if they were OK. This element of connectivity and care allowed the family to invite many over to see the individual. The person was not doing well and a day was set for others to visit. After the group visited, the spouse called the next day to thank all and said, that night their partner passed, but it was a beautiful thing that so many came to say hello. Rainy day blues

By Dr. Raj Singh Special to the Times •t's a downer for every dog to stay indoors during the rainy season. LIt affects their physical and psychological health.

As a responsible dog owner, you should prepare your dog before you go out together, as well as when you stay inside vour home. Activities should continue even if it is raining. Dogs are creatures of habit. You should not let the rain alter their routine, or they will stress out.

The rain is not good if you and your dog are not prepared for it. It's

not only cold, but it's also very wet out there. Making sure that your dog is healthy even when he has his daily walk in the rain is essential for your furry friend's wellbeing.

It's never an excuse for a dog to stay cooped up inside just because it's raining. All you need to do is be aware of the safety and protective measures you need to take when it is time to walk in the rain. You are not the only one who needs to stay dry. Even if dogs are covered with fur, they still need to be shielded from the elements. Take care of your dog during the rainy season, and you will have a loyal friend for years to come rain or shine. The rainy season is nature's way of cleaning up and rejuvenating your surroundings. It would be great to go outside and enjoy the sights, smells, and sounds of the rain with your loyal furry friend. Of course, you should be aware that the rainy season is not exactly ideal weather for dogs. Discomfort and health issues are the main things you should watch out for during the rainy season. Here are some ways to care for your dog when it's wet outside:

1. Keep your dog's fur dry

Wet or damp, fur is an ideal incubation area for fungi and bacteria. Make sure that you rub down your dog before and after your walk. You can also blow dry your dog's fur to fend off the dampness. During the rainy season, bathing your dog can be tedious and messy. It will also help if you use a dry shampoo instead of giving your dog regular baths.

2. Clean your dog's paws

Paws are sensitive. They come in contact with the ground all the time. This is the reason they are prone to infection. It is ideal to wipe your dog's paws during the rainy season. Doing so will prevent mud, water, grass, and insects from getting into their paws. Paws can easily harbor pathogens or vectors of diseases. It could also help if you trim the fur around the paws, especially if you have a longhaired breed such as a golden retriever, Shih Tzu, poodle, etc.

3. Keep your dog's bedding dry

There is nothing better than having a warm, dry bed to sleep in dur-

ing the rainy season. If your dog is used to spending time on the terrace or balcony, a covered resting area with dry bedding should be provided. All food or drinking bowls should be covered as well. During the rainy season, any surface gets cold, and this could harm your

dog's joints. The bedding should be changed frequently to prevent bacteria from accumulating. **4. Clean your**

dog's ears

Your dog can contract ear infections during the rainy season. Moisture easily accumulates in dogs with closed ears such as Dachshunds, Labradors, and Basset Hounds. Earwax and moisture come together and cause ear infec-

tions. Just like the paws, ears should always be kept dry, especially after your walk outside.

5. Conduct activities inside the house

Since it is raining, outdoor activities are not going to be pleasant. Another resort is to have activities for your dog inside the house. If long walks are not possible you could just play fetch or perform tricks in your house or garage. If vou live in an apartment building. you could take your dog up and down the stairs instead of just using the elevator. This would be a good exercise for you as well.

6. Pay attention to feeding

When it's raining too hard, you should make sure you monitor your dog's diet. Adding more fruits and vegetables to your dog's diet will provide additional fiber. More fiber in your dog's food will allow regular bowel movements, even if you don't walk much. To prevent your dog from becoming overweight, reduce the amount of food during feeding. Balance out the level of activity with the food intake

7. Be on the lookout for infections.

It is very irritating for dogs when they have infections. During the rainy season, infections are usually rampant. Signs that your dog has an infection or allergies are: constant licking of body parts, scratching, odorous ears, and itching. Itchiness may indicate fungal or bacterial infections or allergies. These can be caused by the inability of moisture to escape from the skin's surface. Dog breeds that have deep skin folds, such as boxers and pugs, are prone to such skin infections. Be sure to consult vour vet once vou notice signs of infections or allergies.

Nobody wants to be depressed; neither you, nor your pet. Make sure you stay on top of your game by adjusting your schedules to fit what you can and can't control.

Cities that do not make good faith efforts to meet their housing goals are failing their communities and their children, and they should be held accountable. The Governor's proposal will incentivize more of our suburban cities to meet their housing responsibilities, increase the supply of affordable housing, and do the right thing."
