Jim Odom honored with Chamber's Citizen of the Year award

At the Chamber's Annual Meeting, Jim Odom of Decatur was presented the organization's Miss Athelyne C. Banks Citizen of the Year award for his contributions to and volunteerism in the community.

At the Chamber's Annual Meeting, Jim Odom of Decatur was presented the organization's Miss Athelyne C. Banks Citizen of the Year award for his contributions to and volunteerism in the community.

The award, presented each year at the Chamber's Annual Meeting, is named after the longtime Decatur educator and honors those whose life reflects the dedication, service and faithfulness to Decatur modeled in the example of Ms. Banks.

"Jim is a tremendous example of what servant leadership looks like for our community and the nation," said John Seymour, president and CEO of the Chamber. "His passion for lifting up all corners of our area has left a generational impact on Decatur and Morgan, and each day he's looking for more opportunities to serve others."

A native of McKenzie, Ala., a town with a population of a little more than 500, Odom graduated from McKenzie High School, and later received his bachelor of science degree in mechanical engineering from Auburn University. He moved to Decatur with his wife, June, in 1955.

"Jim always looks to serve in places where his gifts can be best utilized, and sometimes that's in the front and sometimes that's behind the scenes," said Trudy Grisham, a past winner of the award and who nominated Odom. "But never once does he want recognition for his work. He simply does what needs to be done."

In his professional life, Odom joined the Army Ballistic Missile Defense Agency at Redstone Arsenal in 1956. Three years later, in 1959, he transferred to what was to be established the following year as NASA's Marshall Space Flight Center. At the Marshall Center, Odom held various engineering and technical management positions. He was actively involved in the development of earth satellites and unmanned space probes prior to his assignment as chief of the Engineering and Test Operations Branch for the second stage of the Saturn V launch vehicle. In 1972, he was appointed manager of the External Tank Project in the Shuttle Projects Office, and in

1982 became deputy manager for production and logistics in the Shuttle Projects Office. In 1983, Odom was asked to take over the Hubble Space Telescope Project, which at the time was behind schedule and over budget. His task was to get the mission back on track, lead it through its final design, assembly and testing phases and have the telescope ready to launch in the fall of 1986. Delayed four years due to the January 1986 Space Shuttle Challenger tragedy, the Hubble Space Telescope was put in orbit in 1990 and called by NASA the "most significant advance in astronomy since Galileo's telescope."

For the two years following the Hubble success, Odom served as director of the Science and Engineering Directorate at the Marshall Center, leading a group of more than 2,500 people. Then, in 1988, he was relocated to NASA headquarters in Washington, D.C., to develop and direct the \$24 billion International Space Station (ISS) Freedom Program, which is the largest space station program in history. Odom retired from NASA in 1990 and was appointed

president and CEO of Huntsville engineering firm Applied Research Inc. In 1994, he began working as a consultant to Science Application International Corporation (SAIC), a position he still holds today.

Among his many awards and recognitions during his time in government service, twice Odom received the Presidential Rank of Meritorious Executive. The first time, in 1981, he was recognized for his technical and managerial accomplishments for the shuttle's external tank by President Ronald Reagan. In 1990, he was honored by President George H. W. Bush for the Hubble project's significant advances made under his leadership.

In his community life, Odom has a long history of service to committees and organization in Decatur and the State of Alabama. Jim is a Rotary Club of Decatur Paul Harris Fellow, a board member of the Decatur Cemetery Legacy Society, a chair of the Frazier Park fundraising committee, a Camp Bluebird and Power of Pink volunteer, past deacon at First Baptist Church of Decatur, a member of the Auburn University Engineering

Council, and serves as a mentor for the Best and Brightest Initiative – an effort to recruit young professionals to Decatur and match them up with mentors in similar fields. In 2011, he was recognized by the Decatur Morgan Hospital Foundation as the John A. Caddell honoree.

Jim and June Odom have been married 65 years and have two children, four grandchildren and one great grandchild. Their daughter, Melanie, lives in Decatur; their son, James B. Odom, Jr., and his wife and children live in Texas. Mrs. Odom was the 2017 recipient of the Miss Athelyne C. Banks Citizen of the Year award.

Ms. Banks – for whom the award is named – devoted 42 years of her life to education, serving 29 of them with Decatur City Schools. She was a public school teacher, the first woman principal at Carver Elementary School and a public school administrator. The award honors a member of our community whose life reflects the dedication, service and faithfulness to Decatur modeled in the example of Miss Banks. Chamber members submitted nominations for the award,

and applications were judged by a committee of past recipients.

Leadership programs continue developing next generation of servant leaders



During the session focusing on economic development, Excellence class members heard from a panel of community leaders representing the Chamber, EDA, the City, Downtown Redevelopment and the E-Center.



The group played several rounds of the EDA game, where class members are given a simulated society to select certain qualities they wanted in their community, then competed against one another to recruit businesses to their area.

The Chamber's three leadership programs – Excellence in Leadership for business professionals, Edge Student Leadership for high school sophomores and juniors, and Equip Leadership for eighth graders – continued in February and March to connect with other leaders in the community to help develop their own leadership narrative.

The Chamber's Excellence in Leadership program spent their February session discussing the role economic development has on our community. The day began at the Chamber and featured a panel discussion of community leaders discussing their organization's role in economic development, as well as fielding questions from the group. Jeremy Nails, president and CEO of Morgan County Economic Development Association; Rick Paler, executive director of the Downtown Decatur Redevelopment Authority; John Seymour, president and CEO of the Decatur-Morgan Chamber; Wally Terry, director of development for the City of Decatur; and

John Joseph, executive director of the Decatur-Morgan County Entrepreneurial Center. They each shared their expertise in their area and how projects are recruited and sustained here in Morgan County. Following several rounds of the Economic Development game - where class members are given a simulated society to select certain qualities they wanted in their community, then competed against one another to recruit businesses to their area – the group toured the GE Appliances, a Haier Company facility, which is the largest employer in Morgan County and produces more than a million refrigerators annually. The group gathered for a working lunch at the E-Center and heard from Joseph again about the work of the center and its impact on Decatur and Morgan County's economy. After lunch, Dr. Ed Nichols of ERI Services and a subject matter expert on Emergenetics, conducted a workshop with the group on goal setting in their personal and professional lives. The day ended back at the Chamber with a work session for the group's community project partner, The Boys and Girls Club of North Alabama. Excellence in Leadership is presented by **Nucor Steel Decatur**, along with Day Sponsor **GE**. The March session of Excellence was comprised of the Montgomery public policy trip.

On Feb. 14, the Chamber kicked off Session Two of Equip Student Leadership, a program for 8th grade students from across Morgan County exposing them to post-high school college and career opportunities in the skilled trades as well as degree programs that require less than a fouryear degree. On day one, class members gathered at the Chamber for an "icebreakers" and teambuilding session with Taylor Simmons of Horizon Point Consulting. Among many of their lessons, Simmons paired up students and asked them to address a series of "either/or" value statements. For example, students were asked to select between "I want to feel fulfilled in my job" or "I want to make a comfortable living." Once they selected one, they were presented with a similar statement and

then asked to select between those two. After approximately 25 choices and arriving at their final statement, students went around the room and shared how they came to that conclusion. After other group activities, students enjoyed lunch in the Chamber board room while discussing the day and providing evaluation feedback to Chamber staff. Equip in February was made possible by Day Sponsor **Decatur Heritage Christian Academy**.

On March 1, Equip explored several parts of Calhoun Community College and learned about opportunities available following their graduation. After

starting the day with breakfast at the Chamber, the group received a campus tour from Ashley Robison, recruitment coordinator for Calhoun, of several programs on the Decatur campus. Stops included the machining laboratory, the welding and advanced technology classrooms, as well as the health science facilities. Calhoun - the largest community college in the State of Alabama – features one of the most competitive nursing programs in the state and clinical classrooms featuring some of the most state-of-the-art educational equipment available to students. After returning to the Chamber for lunch, Lewis Nall - an automotive instructor in the Automotive Technologies Department at Calhoun – shared with students his education path to becoming a Calhoun instructor, including his work in private industry. Nall shared stories about teachers who had helped motivate and encourage him while showing him the value of hard work.

Later in March, Equip discussed infrastructure and financial literacy for their half-day program. After starting the morning at the Chamber, the more than 20 students traveled to Decatur Utilities' Water Management Facility off Church Street to learn about the role

Chamber trip to Montgomery connects students, business leaders, legislators



More than 70 students, business leaders and elected officials attended the Chamber's annual trip to Montgomery.



During the Montgomery trip, attendees toured the State Capital and discussed with members of the legislature public policy issues impacting the business community.

On March 12-13, more than 70 Chamber members, community leaders, elected officials, and members of the Excellence and Edge Leadership programs traveled to our state capitol of Montgomery to visit with legislators, tour exhibits telling the story of our state history and learn more about the impact of state government on our business community and our quality of life.

The Excellence class, made up of 36, started their two-day trip with a visit to Dexter Avenue King Memorial Baptist Church in downtown Montgomery to learn about the history of the church, its role in the civil rights movement and the work it continues to do in the effort of racial reconciliation in the region. From there, the group walked three blocks to observe the Alabama Legislature in session. Following floor debates and observing from galleries of both the House and Senate, the group took part in an extensive Q&A session with members of the Morgan County Delegation: Sen. Arthur Orr, Rep. Terri Collins, Rep. Parker Moore, Rep. Proncey Robertson, Rep. Randall Shedd, and Rep. Scott Stadthagen.

After checking into the hotel and getting settled, the group gathered for a meet-and-greet at the hotel before attending dinner on their own for the evening. Wednesday morning, Katie Britt - recently named president of the Business Council of Alabama - served as the breakfast speaker when the group gathered at Farmer's Market Café, presented by Valley Budweiser. Britt discussed several topics impacting the business community, including infrastructure, healthcare and education. Following breakfast, the group was treated to a tour of the Hyundai Motor Manufacturing facility, where they learned about the impact of the auto industry on the state's economy and the work done at the facility. The group returned to the Capitol just before lunch and met with Clay Redden, public information officer for the Alabama House of Representatives, where he discussed the process of bills becoming law and gave the group – which at this point in the day included members of Edge Student Leadership – the opportunity to cast mock votes on current legislation. Lunch, presented by Huntsville International Airport, featured former

Decatur resident and area tourism leader Lee Sentell, director of the Alabama Department of Tourism, discussing the Alabama Bicentennial and how tourism helps tell Alabama's story. Once lunch was complete, the group met Gov. Kay Ivey on the steps of the Capitol Building for a quick greeting and group picture before returning to Morgan County. Excellence is presented by **Nucor Steel Decatur**.

The Edge group - made up of more than 30 tenth and eleventh graders from across Morgan County - arrived in Montgomery Wednesday morning and started their day at the Rosa Parks Museum on the Montgomery campus of Troy University to learn about the role of the icon during the civil rights movement and the historic bus boycott. The group later toured the Capitol before meeting up with the Excellence group to hear from Redden and cast floor votes. Continuing with the Excellence class, Edge attended the luncheon featuring Sentell as well as the group picture with Gov. Ivey. Following the picture, the Edge class walked down to Dexter Avenue King Memorial Baptist Church for a tour

and discussion about our state history in the civil rights movement. The group later toured the Museum of Alabama – part of the Alabama Department of Archives and History – to discuss the Bicentennial and our state's rich past. 
