







History Reimagined

Camp Blount Historic Site Begins To Take Shape

long the banks of the Elk River, two miles south of downtown Fayetteville, history was made at Camp . Blount. It was the location of the training encampment in 1813-14, and a rallying point for soldiers like Sam Houston and David Crockett. It is where General Andrew Jackson mustered troops during the Creek Indian War in 1813, as part of the War of 1812, and again for a march to New Orleans to be a part of the Battle of New Orleans. The latter was the final defeat of the British forces and the end to Great Britain's goal to colonize America.

For General Andrew Jackson, Camp Blount played a pivotal role in his rise to becoming the 7th President of the United States. The turnout of volunteers for these battles resulted in one of the state's earliest references to Tennessee as the Volunteer State.

The 40-acre Camp Blount property was officially purchased by the Tennessee Historical Commission in October of 2016 to be developed as the Camp Blount Historic Site. The City of Fayetteville will be the site's caretaker. Plans for the site include:

- · An entrance sign scheduled to be set in place during July
- Three historic trails with 20 wayside informational markers along each pathway. One trail will tell the stories of the War of 1812. A second will follow General Andrew Jackson's rise to the Presidency. A third will focus on the Creek and Cherokee Indian Involvement.
- Volunteer Plaza a circular stone plaza with raised borders, will be constructed from locally sourced limestone and serve as a seating and meditation area.
- An eight-foot tall bronze statue of "Tennessee's First Volunteer" will be the centerpiece of the Volunteer Plaza. The figure will stand tall on limestone gathered from the original Stone River bridge.

- Greer Cabin The historic log cabin belonging to Joseph Greer is presently under renovations with plans to relocate it to the Camp Blount site. Greer served at the Battle of Kings Mountain in 1780. He became known as the "Kings Mountain Messenger" when he delivered the news of the American victory in the 1780 Battle of King's Mountain to the Continental Congress in Philadelphia.
- Restrooms and a Visitor's Center

The developments taking place at Historic Camp Blount are part of a master plan that when complete, will be a destination for residents and tourists. Future generations will also learn the vital role it played in the history of our nation.

There are several ways you can support the ongoing efforts at the Camp Blount Historic Site. Memberships are available at \$10 per year for individuals, \$20 per year for families, and \$100 for a lifetime membership. Applications are available at the Register of Deeds office at the Lincoln County Courthouse. T-shirts are also available for purchase, and donations are always welcome.

The Camp Blount Historic Site is located at 1202 Huntsville Hwy, Fayetteville, TN adjacent to the River Oak Shopping Center.

Nonprofit Business of the Year

Fayetteville Lincoln County Senior Center livens things up with a song and a dance.

t's Tuesday at 12:30 p.m. and the parking lot of the Fayetteville Lincoln County Senior Center is full. Upon opening the door, the sound of a live band playing Hank Williams' "Hey Good Lookin" immediately gets my attention. Once my eyes adjust to the dimly lit room, I see at least a dozen couples, arm in arm, dancing to the music.

The band, Contemporary Country, is set up across the room and includes professional musicians Carl Llewellyn on bass & vocals, Thomas Lance on drums and vocals, and bandleader Ray Mangrum on pedal steel. For almost nine years, Mangrum has made the drive from Shelbyville to the Fayetteville Lincoln County Senior Center every Tuesday to play for the crowd that averages 50-60 people. No stranger to the stage, he has toured all over the county, played for Little Jimmy Dickens, and even on the Grand Ole Opry. But today, there's no place else he'd rather be than playing for the appreciative crowd, with Alice, his wife of 61 years, listening from a table in the back.

The Tuesday dances at the senior center are just one of the events that keep people coming back week after week. Bingo every Thursday is another favorite. There are also exercise classes three

times a week for all levels—the oldest participant is 93 years young. Monday through Friday from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. the doors of the Fayetteville Lincoln County Senior center are open. It's a place anyone 55 years and up can go to get a nutritious meal, engage in conversation, strike up new friendships, and have a little fun. The center also provides services including tax return preparation (740 tax returns were prepared in 2018), legal aid, a power of attorney, even assistance for filling out the lengthy forms required for the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP).

One of the most important things seniors can do to remain happy and healthy is to engage with others on a regular basis. The busier seniors are, the more they enjoy a higher quality of life. However, many of the activities they used to do are not accessible for one reason or another. In a busy society, the senior community is frequently overlooked. If Samantha Freeman has anything to say about it, that is not about to happen in Fayetteville. For the past four years, Freeman has been at the helm as the director of the Senior Center. Her top priority from the start has been to keep Lincoln County seniors active, socializing, and having fun. She not only set out to meet and exceed the state's goals for a senior center but also to make it shine. And shine it does, like a lighthouse in the community.

With an easy smile and energetic personality, Freeman exudes a feeling of joy and love for the seniors. One important thing she has learned these past few years is "the ones that you

think don't need the help, sometimes they need the most. I've learned to open my eyes. You don't know what people are going through, we all have something," she says.

Nearly 76 million boomers are heading toward senior living over the next few decades. In Lincoln County, that means a 55% increase in the senior community. Presently, the center averages 50-60 people a day. To accommodate the growth, an expansion to the current facility is in order. If the center becomes too crowded people will not want to come. "We want it to be a welcoming environment. We want them[seniors] to have a social life and to have fun," Freeman says.

Meanwhile, Lance's rendition of "Farewell Party" has the staff peeking their heads through the door to listen. Don Vannatta is dressed for the occasion in a bright red shirt and pants. Since there are always more women than men, Vannatta has made it his mission to make sure every lady gets a dance - some guys have all the luck.

The band is still playing as I walk out the door humming along with the steel guitar-my step a little lighter and my heart a little fuller. Who knew that the Fayetteville Senior Center is a hopping place on a Tuesday afternoon—and why not? After all, you're never too old to have a little fun.

The Business of the Year

For generations, Bradford Appliance has been making everyday life a little easier for people living in and around Lincoln County with reliable brands and unsurpassed service.



hen you call Bradford Appliance, a friendly voice answers the phone. It's the voice of Jane Bradford, and it only takes a moment before you feel like you're talking with an old friend. Long-time customers fondly refer to her as "Miss Jane." Since the business began, she has been answering calls, helping customers, and keeping things running like clockwork.

Bradford Appliance was established in 1974. In the early years, they sold used appliances and provided repair services. Then in the 80s, when sons Mike and Jeff took over the business, they expanded the product line to include new appliances, mattresses, and a whole lot of service. "If we didn't do service it would be extremely hard to compete with the big box stores," Mike Bradford says.

Mike runs the business side of things, including buying, selling, and the day-to-day operations. Jeff is out in the field making service calls. All three of the Bradfords work six days a week

providing Lincoln County and the surrounding areas with unsurpassed customer service and competitive prices on appliances and mattresses. In reality, however, they are never really off-the-clock. Whether they are at the grocery store, church, or eating at a local restaurant, customers approach them with an appliance question or an update on a recent repair. I guess you could say they're considered family by many of those who do business with them.

More than once, the family has come to the rescue in an appliance break-down. Their father went out at midnight one Christmas Eve to repair a water heater. More recently, Jeff answered a service call the week before Christmas to fix a dishwasher, just in time for a holiday gathering. "There's not really a schedule. We start out the day with a schedule but things come up, and most people understand," Jeff says. "Our customers are used to calling today, and we will be there tomorrow. But right now

we are about a week out." The appliance repair business is more complex now that most appliances have gone digital. But the other side of that is the idea of planned obsolescence. Things are not built the way they used to be and aren't made to last as long.

The Bradfords all agree that if it weren't for the customers, they wouldn't be here. When Jeff shows up for a service call, it's a welcome sight and some people, especially the elderly, are eager to visit. "When you get there, they want to talk. We may be all they see for a week or a month," Jeff says. He has lots of stories about the people he meets. On one call, every time he arrives there is a home-cooked meal ready and waiting. After he gets a plate, sits down, and eats, then it's time to go to work on the problem. "You meet interesting people from around the world. You think you know everybody, but you don't."

A huge advantage of shopping at Bradford Appliance is that they have first-hand experience with the products. They know what typically goes wrong, and which models perform the best. "A lot of people ask us, 'If you were buying, which one would you buy?', and we can give them an honest opinion," Mike says.

The hard work, long hours and customer-focused service have all been vital to the growth of Bradford Appliance. "The best part is working with your family. We get along really well," Mike says. And when it comes to Miss Jane, both brothers are quick to sing her praises. "I don't know what we'd do without her. She's the backbone. 

What Is Leadership Lincoln?

Leadership Lincoln is a personal development program designed to motivate participants to develop leadership qualities for addressing community needs.

Leadership Lincoln began in 1987. The program has produced leaders who are actively involved in community organizations, local government and civic groups, all working toward improving the quality of life for our county. Developing leaders is a key ingredient to the continued progress of Lincoln County.

What Is Leadership Lincoln's Purpose?

- To identify and develop potential leaders in business, government and the community and help prepare them for greater involvement in county affairs.
- To provide these leaders with a practical, clear and simple under standing of opportunities and problems facing Lincoln County.
- To enhance communication between future leaders and existing leadership, and improve networking among the participants.
- To increase participation and commitment in our community by meeting and exchanging ideas.

What Does Leadership Lincoln's Involve?

Class participants are required to attend the opening two day retreat, at least seven of the eight one-day seminars and participate in the class project to graduate from the program. Also, included in the graduation requirements are several out of class assignments such as attending local government meetings and board of education meetings. Graduates of the class receive 1.5 CEUs from Motlow University.



Tests for Driver's License and/or permits are given at the Driver's License Station, 4110 Thornton Taylor Pkwy. every Monday - Friday from 8:30 A.M. - 5:00 P.M., all testing is finished by 3:30 P.M. You must furnish the car for taking the test.* You can obtain a manual to study before you take the test by going by the Driver's License Station. Applicants must show social security card or certified document with social security number on it. All first time applicants must bring birth certificate and 2 proofs of residence. *Do not do road tests in bad weather.

Pet Laws

The ordinance regarding pet laws within City Limits of Favetteville states that dogs must be confined or controlled by a leash and all pets should be given rabies shots and must wear tags indicating they have had these shots. If, for any reason, an animal needs to be picked up off of the street, one can call the Animal Control Office number, (931) 433-3726. Rabies clinics are sponsored by the Health Department during the spring of each year and are announced in the newspaper and on the local radio stations. Rabies shots are given by any of the veterinarians in the City throughout the year.

Voting Laws

Newcomers to the City and County may register to vote after living in the state of Tennessee as soon as they become residents. Tennessee is the only state that has no durational requirement for becoming a resident. The Election Commissioner's Office is located at 208 E Davidson Drive. Anyone who is 18 years of age or who will be 18 on the day of the next election, can register to vote. The books for voter registration are closed 30 days before an election. The hours of the Election Commission Office are 8:00 A.M. until 4:00 P.M. Monday through Friday. Any registered voter can vote early.

Property taxes are due on the first day of October of each year, and are delinquent as of the first day of March. There is a 1.5% interest rate per month and a penalty charged to any delinquent taxes. City taxes are payable at the City Clerk's Office in the Municipal Building in downtown Fayetteville. County property taxes are payable in the Trustee's Office, Room 103, at the County Courthouse.

If you have moved to this area from outside of the state, you need to apply for a title and a Tennessee license plate. You should make the purchase as soon as possible. These licenses may be obtained from the County Court Clerk's Office, Room 102, in the Lincoln County Courthouse. The office is open Monday - Friday 8:00 A.M. - 4:00 P.M., and open the last Saturday of the month from 9:00 A.M.-12:00 Noon. You must also purchase a wheel tax sticker, which is \$110 per year. Registration and proof of insurance must be in the glove box of the vehicle at all times.






Sanitation Schedule





Taste The Local Difference

What they have to offer is sought after from food lovers across the region, but lucky for us, these local farmers are keeping it close to home.





Floyd's Farm Food Truck

att and Alexis Floyd wanted to open a restaurant, but when the idea of a food truck presented itself, they reconsidered. They decided a mobile kitchen might be a great way to ease into the business, gradually. What they hadn't planned on was the overnight success of Floyd's Farm Food Truck. Fayetteville fell head over heels for the young couple, and their fresh, creative, and delicious food—an affirmation they were on the right track.

Although they serve the food up fast, it's far from usual fast food fare—and rightfully so, Matt is a chef. His love for food and dreams of sauces, soups, and daily specials keep him up at night. He even keeps a pad of paper by the bed to capture the ideas as they come. When Matt gets a new idea, he looks to see if it has been done before. "In the culinary world, almost everything has been done. But, sometimes it hasn't, and that's when we get excited." Matt says. Alexis, who is equally passionate about food, puts her spin on the salads, made fresh every morning, and has a few ideas of her own-some that involve lavender. She is also the official taste tester, the photographer, the social media manager, and... well let's just say the to-do list is quite long for both of them.

There is nothing ordinary about the menu. Each item is carefully thought out with the highest attention to detail. Made from scratch broths, hand-pressed hamburger patties, and hand-cut potato chips are all prepared in the commercial grade mobile kitchen. The Southern Wontons, made with locally made pimento cheese and served with Floyd's Farm honey drizzled over the top are one of Matt's originals and a local favorite. The Pork Street Tacos, a recent lunch special, consist of locally raised pulled pork, topped with a fig sauce, goat cheese, and fried sage. For many of their customers, it's love at first bite. "I think people like different," Alexis adds. "We didn't know if they would, but they do." They also serve all of their food in bio-degradable to-go boxes.

The inspiration for many of their recipes often begins with a walk on the Dellrose family farm. It's a food lover's garden of Eden, with plum trees, apple trees, cherry trees, and even a banana tree that produced tiny bananas last summer. There are grapevines, strawberry plants, blueberry bushes, salad greens, herbs, fresh honey from the beehives, and eggs from happy hens. Everything growing on the farm becomes an ingredient, in one way or another, from the eggs in the Cobb salad and the creme brulee, to the blueberries in the vinaigrette dressing. They also source from local poultry, meat, and produce farms. In addition to serving lunches at locations throughout Fayetteville and the Tennessee Valley, they cater special events and occasions. Check their website at floydsfarm.com or their Facebook and Instagram pages to find out where they will be next. Just a quick word of advice, if you've got your heart set on the Southern Wontons, you might want to get there early.



Pilaroc Farms

At Pilaroc (pronounced pile a rock) Farms, the workday begins long before the rooster crows and ends hours after the sun has set. For owners Walt Patrick and Jennie Schutte-Patrick, it takes every bit of a sixteen-hour day to get the chores done, to tend to the daily responsibilities of running a small business, and raise three children—if everything goes as planned. It's a lot of hard work, but Walt and Jennie wouldn't have it any other way. It's the way they were brought up, a lifestyle steeped in family values. It's also teaching their children what it means to work hard, where the milk in their cereal bowls came from, and how a fresh burger should taste.

You will be hard pressed to find a better tasting steak or pork chop anywhere. Walt and Jennie have made it their mission to

produce high-quality meat through a breeding program using genetically superior animals. Pilaroc Farms consists of two USDA inspected facilities. Pilaroc north, located at the northern end of Lincoln County, is where the pasture-raised pigs spend their days rooting up rocks, eating their fill, and entertaining themselves and others, with their playful antics. Pilaroc south, 120 acres located in Park City, is where Angus-cross cattle spend their days grazing the same green pastures that have been a part of the Patrick family farm for four generations.

Walt and Jennie founded Pilaroc Farms in December of 2016. The original plan was to sell their beef and pork to high-end restaurants, and have the Pilaroc name featured on the menu. They also sold to retail locations. Although they were successful in both of those markets, it was not enough to sustain the business. "For us to continue, we have to put as much money back into the business as we can," Jennie explains. They shifted their focus to direct sales, which meant going to their customers. The past few months, Jennie, with one-year-old Colyar in the passenger seat, has logged hours and hours of windshield time, making deliveries, including three trips to Huntsville every week.

Earlier this year they purchased a trailer and had it designed to look and feel like a grocery store meat market, equipped with freezers and refrigerators. "We want to cut down on the driving," Jennie says. "and make our meat more accessible to a broader audience." Customers will now have the option of buying local pasture-raised meat with no added hormones or antibiotics, directly from the Pilaroc Farms Trailer. The mobile market, stocked with packaged cuts of pork, beef, and lamb, will be parked at a central location in Fayetteville once or twice a week-you can find out when and where at www. rocktotable.com or on their Facebook page @pilarocfarms.

Although they are still being approached by chefs who want to feature Pilaroc Farms meat on the menu, for now, this local family is keeping it close to home, giving the community a taste of farm-fresh, grass-fed, and sustainably-raised meat. Yes, a great tasting steak has a lot to do with genetics, but it also has to do with the quality of life. At Pilaroc Farms, Walt and Jennie, along with their three kids, Wyatt, Tensie, and Colyar, are working together as a family, making sure their animals are loved and cared for every single day of their lives. There is just something about knowing where your food comes from and how it was raised that makes it taste even better. And one more thing, after you pick up your Pilaroc beef for the grill, don't worry about buying any special seasonings, a little salt and pepper is all you'll need—it really is that good.




For over a century, the Lincoln County Fair has been a place for friends and families to reconnect and share the news of the past year. It's a place where the past, present, and future come together. People travel great distances to watch the harness races, a form of horse racing that dates back to 1889. In a harness race, a Standardbred horse harnessed to a two-wheeled cart called a sulky carries a driver (not to be mistaken for a jockey). Together, they travel at speeds averaging 25-30 miles per hour around a half-mile track. The horses race at either a pacing gate or a trotting gate. The majority of the horses compete as Pacers (sidewheelers), that move the legs on one side of their body in tandem—left rear and front leg, then right rear and front. The beauty of these horses in full stride is a sight to behold, one that will have you coming back year after year.

Here is a bit of inside information for cheering on your favorite horse. A horse racing 5 feet from the rail will travel 62 feet farther than the horse at the rail at the mile distance. So, the place to be is on the rail, but be sure to keep a close eye on the next horse down, in the garden spot, as this horse has won more than one race. The Lincoln County Fair is the only fair in Tennessee to have a state-sanctioned harness race.

A fair is not a fair without the sights and sounds of the midway. The midway buzzes with excitement as thrilling, gravitydefying rides delight echo through the air. Everywhere you look there are smiling faces as families and friends enjoy the rides, games and food, glorious food including popcorn, corn dogs, cotton candy and even deep-fried Oreos.

There is something for everyone to enjoy at the Lincoln County Fair. Whether it is watching the demolition derby, tractor pulls, monster truck show, livestock shows, pageants, big-name stars on the entertainment stage, or holding the winning ticket for one of the big giveaways, it's just plain fun.

Thanks to the volunteer fair board members, devoted citizens that work year-round, and the sponsors, the Lincoln County Fair will come to life once again on September 7th through the 14th, 2019. Save the date now for this unique slice of Americana at its finest. by Trisha Sandora

e're off to a great start for the Carriage House Players with the recent purchase of their future home, a building located on 301 Market Street, just a block off the square. On October 31, 2018, they became the official owners of the property, and big plans are already underway. The new home will be called The Carriage House and will serve as the organization's home office, rehearsal hall, set construction workshop, costume closet, prop room, ticket office, and theater. The renovated facility will also serve as an event center for community and social events.

CHP has tentative floor plans designed for renovations to the property and construction will begin in September. The theater will comfortably seat around 180 people in a tiered floor plan for optimal viewing of the stage. The event center will accommodate close to 140 people and include a kitchen suitable for catered events. Until the renovations are complete, however, the curtain call for this year's productions will remain at the Lincoln County Museum Theater.

The Carriage House Players is the oldest performing arts organization in Lincoln County. The group of dedicated and close-knit community members devote countless hours (outside of day jobs, school and family responsibilities),

memorizing lines, practicing character mannerisms, rehearsing, building sets, performing, and entertaining audiences of all ages with four productions a year.

CHP also offers summer drama camps the first two weeks in June to local youth ages 8-18. The participants are taught self-confidence, memorizations skills, creative thinking, stagecraft, and character building through interactive games and activities. CHP also provides scholarships to graduating seniors who have shown interest in theatre.

The "Voices of Carriage House" is a talented group of singers that showcases solos, duets, trios, and beautifully arranged group numbers. Their annual Christmas show performance consistently draws rave reviews. The Carriage House Players brings theatrical excellence to Lincoln County, with year-round, family-friendly, feel-good entertainment that is good for the heart.

Their 32nd season is well underway having recently finished their production of "Arsenic and Old Lace," but there is still plenty of time to catch the upcoming shows, and the odds are high that you might recognize a few of the cast members. Fabulous 50's Show

he Fabulous 50's Show takes the stage every March for nine show-stopping performances that will have audiences laughing out loud, dancing in their seats and singing along to unforgettable songs from the '50s, '60s & '70s. Since 1986, the show has been entertaining audiences and growing in popularity.

The annual production showcases some of the outstanding talent found right here in Lincoln County. More than 80 people of all ages contribute their expertise and valuable time as writers, artists, performers, actors, band members, costume makers, and workers who do everything from running errands to selling tickets, t-shirts, and concessions. For many, it is a family affair that includes multiple generations who carry on the Fabulous 50's tradition year after year. Producer Jane Wilcox, fondly referred to as "Miss Jane" says, "It's a great unifier for our community."

Singers and band members start learning songs in November and begin practicing together twice a week in January. The 14-piece band is composed of seasoned players including a Fayetteville High School drummer and several college students. The backup singers, known as "Simply Fabulous," have quite a reputation of their own and perform throughout the year at different events in support of the show.

The driving force that keeps the community coming back year after year is the cause that the show's fund-raising efforts support. The Multi-County Cancer Support Network (MCCSN) is a non-profit organization that reaches out to cancer patients in an eight-county region that includes Bedford, Coffee, Franklin, Grundy, Marion, Moore, Warren, and Lincoln, helping with expenses related to cancer treatment that are not covered by insurance. "There is such a great need," Jane says. Cancer is indeed no laughing matter, but laughter and quality entertainment have proven to be just the ticket to raise the money desperately needed to help those battling cancer.

The title of this year's show is Veils, Vows, and Vegas. The original script, written by Lincoln County's own Josh Ogle, brings a Vegasstyle wedding to Fayetteville. Even Elvis makes an appearance at the show. The eye-catching logo, designed by local artist and architect Carl Gleghorn, owner-operator of Dragonfly Art Gallery, has been incorporated into a fantastic t-shirt design that is sure to be a best seller—another effort that takes this show above and beyond. Gleghorn also designs the stunning backdrops, which are then painted by local high school art teachers and their students.

The \$15 price of an adult ticket is money that recirculates throughout the communities and into the hands of those that need it most. Attend once, and chances are, you will be marking your calendar for next year's show before you leave the parking lot. There are a lot of things you can spend your money on, but a ticket to the Fabulous 50's show is money well-spent-great entertainment for a great cause.





Stone Bridge Park

A Sense of Place

ucked in the heart of Fayetteville is a gathering place, Stone Bridge Park. It's a place that reflects the unique spirit and history of Lincoln County. And a place where people from all walks of life can play, fish, learn, interact, and relax.

The Past - The Story of the Stone Bridge

Stone Bridge Park tells the story of a bridge that once spanned the Elk River and served as a vital connector of the northern and southern portions of the county. The bridge in the park, designed by local engineer Steve Maddox, is a miniature replica of the historic

structure. The scaled version has three arches, instead of six, and is a detailed representation of the original, even down to the sag on top.

The original stone bridge, built in 1858 by John Markum and Patrick Flannery, spanned a distance of 450 feet and had six impressive elliptical arches. The bridge was constructed without a keystone and built using dry masonry with limestone rock quarried up the river and floated down to the construction site. At the time, there was only one other bridge of similar structure in the entire United States and only six in the world.

During the War Between the States, the bridge was used frequently by both armies. In making his march from Memphis to Chattanooga and on to Atlanta, General William T. Sherman utilized the bridge as a crossing point. According to local history, years later General Sherman once again crossed over the bridge on his March to the Sea. In 1928, a modern truss bridge was constructed over the Elk River, and the stately stone bridge was no longer used. The unfortunate collapse of the Stone River Bridge came at 9:15 a.m., Feb. 1, 1969. Due to rain, the waters of the Elk were running high. Freezing weather followed and caused water in the crevices of the bridge to freeze. Large icicles hung on the sides of the bridge the morning it fell. The results of the frozen water and the explosives used during the construction of the new bridge are believed to have contributed to the weakening of the aging structure.

The Present - A Gathering Place

In the spring and summer months, colorful flowers adorn the grounds around the Visitor's Center. The old cedar log cabin, donated by the Joe Wiser family, originally stood on Dunroamin Lane. Members of the Mennonite Community numbered all the logs, disassembled the structure, and then reassembled the cabin exactly as it was.

The beautiful walkway winding through Stone Bridge Park is full of simple pleasures for all to enjoy. The 1/4 mile loop passes over the replica Stone Bridge, past a historic cabin, a cascading waterfall with sprays of water misting the air, and a channel with ducks floating in the peaceful waters. The path is handicap accessible and perfect for baby strollers as well.

Fast Facts

- The original bridge cost over \$30,000 and the new replica bridge cost \$80,000.
- The waterfall includes 17 stones taken from the original Stone Bridge approach on the South side of the Elk River.
- The flowers near the Visitor's Center Cabin are planted and maintained by Stone Bridge Garden Club.
- The original bridge was built without any approaches which were added later at an additional cost.

The Lancaster cabin, donated by Celia Lancaster Oldham, dates back to 1791. Inside the cabin is authentic period decor, including an 1860 rifle which hangs on the log wall. Inside the fenced yard around the cabin is the Mother's Memorial, with plants that are an accurate representation of the period as well. If you notice the faint smell of cinnamon in the air, it's the sweet bubbly bush. In years past, ladies used the aromatic flowers as perfume. With thorough research and attention to detail, Phillip McCown and Katherine Simmons took great care to present a historically accurate experience for visitors, even down to the selection and planting of each plant.

Through a passageway under Thornton Taylor Parkway, another walkway leads to the Father's Memorial Park. There you will find benches and swings overlooking the Elk River. Walking along the path and taking in the scenic views is a respite from the busyness of life, where even the sounds of the nearby traffic seem distant.

Stone Bridge Park hosts several special events throughout the year, making it a destination for family fun. During the holidays there is a breathtaking display of animated lights synchronized to music. In the spring, the Art Center hosts an Arts and Crafts Show. Early in June, the Tennessee Wildlife Resources Agency presents the annual Kid's Fish Day. And on Thursday evenings throughout June and July, music fills the air during the eight-week Music in the Park concert series. The picturesque park also provides the perfect setting for weddings and serves as a stunning backdrop for family photographs and prom pictures as well.

The Future - Forging New Paths of Connection

A greenway master plan is underway which includes a walkway connecting downtown Favetteville with Stone Bridge Park. Also, with the recent award of a 1.1 million dollar federal grant for alternative transportation, a pedestrian bridge that crosses over the Elk River to the Camp Blount Historic Site is in the works.

These extended walkways will allow even more accessibility to the park, giving visitors additional opportunities to experience the rich history of Lincoln County—to walk on the same ground where soldiers once gathered, built their campfires, and carried out the plans that shaped Lincoln County's history.



Workforce Training Close to Home

ow does a community build a workforce? Lincoln County knows how through their partnership with the Tennessee College of Applied Technology Shelbyville. This partnership has been successful since 2005 when the first Industrial Maintenance Automation class was offered in space provided on the campus of Motlow State Community College. Since that time, over 200 Industrial Maintenance Technicians have graduated from the program and filled in-demand positions in the southern middle Tennessee area. This is also a major selling point for the community when potential industry is considering locating in Lincoln County. Having a training site close to a student's home is also a major selling point for prospective students looking for a training program that works well with their employment schedule and their busy lives. The Tennessee College of Applied Technology Shelbyville (TCAT) is

one of twenty-seven technical colleges in the College of Tennessee System governed by the Tennessee Board of Regents. Opened in 1964, TCAT Shelbyville's main campus is located in Bedford County with off-campus training sites in Marshall, Lincoln, Coffee, and Franklin counties. The college offers thirteen training programs to include Administrative Office Technology, Computer Aided Design Technology, Collision Repair Technology, Automotive Technology, Practical Nursing, Patient Care Technology, Industrial Maintenance Automation, Information Technology and Infrastructure Management, Industrial Electricity, Welding Technology, Heating, Air-Conditioning, Ventilation, and Refrigeration, Truck Driving, and Machine Tool Technology. Day and evening training is available as well as financial aid for those who qualify by completing the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA).

Why should you consider attending the Tennessee College of Applied Technology Shelbyville? Not only is the institution close to your home or place of employment, students are also graduating at an 89% rate and being placed in positions relevant to their field of training 90% of the time. Additionally, students, who are Tennessee residents and attending any of the full-time training programs offered at TCAT Shelbyville, may be eligible for the Tennessee Promise or Tennessee Reconnect Scholarship programs, which covers all tuition and mandatory fees.

otlow State Community College is recognized as one of the fastest-growing community colleges in Tennessee, and for the fourth consecutive year, has the largest enrollment in school history. Motlow also continues to lead all Tennessee community colleges in three-year graduation rate at 33.5 percent. With a campus right here in Fayetteville, the opportunity to get a college education is not only possible but also within reach.

Community colleges across the state are experiencing unprecedented growth due to students participating in the Tennessee Reconnect Act and Tennessee Promise program. TN Reconnect, launched in the fall of 2018, offers eligible adults the opportunity to earn a post secondary degree or certificate free of tuition and fees. TN Promise, a scholarship and mentoring program which began in 2015, provides Tennessee high school graduates with a "last dollar scholarship" which covers the cost of tuition and mandatory fees not covered by the Pell grant, the HOPE scholarship, or the Tennessee Student Assistance Award.

With these two programs in place, Tennessee is one step closer to reaching the goal set in the Drive to 55 initiative presented by Governor Bill Haslam in 2013—to equip 55% of Tennesseans with a college degree or certificate by the year 2025.

Motlow offers a wide range of quality academic programs one of which is an AAS in Mechatronics Technology. Mechatronics is a blend of mechanical, electrical and computerized technologies that together form a complex system used by many manufacturing, packaging, and other modern operations. The need for skilled individuals to support these systems is ongoing and in high demand at many of the industries here in Lincoln County.

Beginning in Fall 2018, Motlow State Community College's Fayetteville Campus introduced two associates degrees in agriculture to support the largest industry in Lincoln County. In addition, the Fayetteville campus has partnered with Tennessee State University to offer a B.S. Degree in Agricultural Sciences. This 2+2 program allows area students to earn their associates' degree from Motlow State Community College, then complete the last two years of a four-year degree from TSU on the Motlow State Fayetteville Campus.






