

## Thank A Father Figure This Month

There are expectations we have of people. And sometimes people don't meet those expectations, and that's okay, because often others will. Father's Day may not seem like a time of celebration for some of you, but it might actually be. While my life wasn't the way I'd love it to be, there is still reason for me to celebrate some special men on Father's Day.

My grandfather's been gone two years this July, but he was a genuinely interested man right up until the day he died. My Poppy spent hours each morning before work cleaning his pool so us grandkids and Nanny could swim. He liked to provide for us. Christmas was out of this world. He always had time to listen and would tell me what to focus on; myself. He always told me I was good and deserving of good. He made me feel loved, cherished, forgiven,

accepted, and was always there for me no matter how old I was, or how far away. (Reminds me of my son and my oldest daughter.) He was motivated, hardworking, sweet and doting. His demeanor was 110% happy and he had a smile that never quit no matter what he went through. (That reminds me of my son.)

Two of my favorite childhood memories are when he reluctantly took me grocery shopping for the first time, at my Nanny's urging. This was an interference, as he was the Master 'Deal' Shopper and couldn't be bogged down with a child in tow. But he took me anyway, and we had fun! I learned a lot and he took me again after that! Another memory is when I was too scared to come out from behind the living room chair during thunderstorms. He'd just smile and say, "God is just bowling up in

Heaven, nothing to be worried about", with his hand out. I would always come out. My best adult memory is talking to him on the phone while sitting on an airplane, waiting on the tarmac, preparing for takeoff to Italy. I was so scared to travel so long over the ocean; he calmed me with my favorite travel story of his trip to Spain when he was in the service. He told me I would love Italy and that he was proud of me for being brave enough to go. (So confident and supportive, reminds me of my middle child.)

I never felt like a Princess growing up. I didn't even know what a Princess was, since I hadn't seen my first Disney movie until I was nine...and it was *Bambi*. I realize I reflect on, and learn from, the toughest parts of my life. It's heavy stuff! But I also think that if I peel back all the layers of muck and mud, there's so many glistening moments in my childhood. Some truly sparkly times!

If I knew any better, I think I should've felt like a Princess all along, because I was blessed with four amazing father figures who loved me very much and were very good to me. How they've treated me, all they've done for me and taught me, how they helped me be who I am today and influenced how I parent my own children...it's made a difference. I didn't have a crown, wasn't spoiled with 'stuff' or told 'yes' to my every asking...but I was treated very special.

My grandfather is just one influence. Let me introduce you to the others. My uncle. We could spend hours on the phone. We both lived with my grandparents. He's like my big brother. He colored with me, we fought over my grandmother's record player, my grandfather's recliner, and what

ice cream was left in the freezer. When we were older, I became his sidekick and he was like my second dad. He took me trick or treating and made my costumes, took me out to eat and talked to me about what I wanted to do with my life after high school. He helped foster those interests and always believed in me. He talks to me and genuinely makes me feel like I matter. I have a stepfather who I didn't meet until I was in my thirties (sadly we're not in touch anymore). He's also a genuine, sweet soul, that made an impression. I feel as if we'd known each other our whole lives. He taught me about meditation, shared interesting books he'd read, valued introspect, and we could talk for hours about things. I miss him greatly. I could go on about these men, but I've

got to brag on my own Daddy. During my parents' divorce, he could've bowed out and said, "this isn't for me, I quit". He could've said, "this is going to be too hard". But he didn't. He chose to take sole custody of me when my own mother didn't want me. He took me everywhere with him; the movies, parks, road trips (where my children and I get our love for Twizzlers and Slim Jims). My dad taught me how to drive a stick shift, change a tire, and drive in the snow all before I got my license. I could wire a C.B. radio, dress appropriately, get a job, work hard, manage my money, obtain good credit, follow my dreams, and most importantly, no matter how high the waters rose, never quit. Daddy didn't teach me about football or any other sport. No trade, like woodworking, welding or mechanics. He taught me about sticking it out, chasing your dreams, finding a quality of living within your means. We never went to Disney or on vacations, but we were always out on Saturday morning for breakfast at Dunkin Donuts and Sunday afternoon we ate our regular at Papa Gino's. We ran errands and visited our family every weekend. We did life together, he and I. While I might not have truly appreciated those things when I was younger (who does), I can tell you those times mean the world to me today. Just knowing he spent time with me and taught me about so many things. My father raised me by himself. I was involved in a lot of grown up things. I wrote my first check when I was eleven, learned to pay the bills due to his wrist surgery, and he never kept a story or joke a secret from me. Nothing was ever too far over my head for me in Daddy's eyes. I learned how to play poker when I was eight, learned how not to flaunt my girl things to woo a man way before I

pajamas? Izetta, "Red." "You are almost right, they are pink," says mom.

My older granddaughter is very precocious. She and four kindergarten classmates are designing a "hotel," and "printing" money to buy it. Her mom gave her a catalogue with furniture ideas for her hotel. She put post-it notes by the many pages of furniture she liked. She and I spent about a half-hour on FaceTime where she explained where all the furniture would go in the hotel. She told me, "This table is for "hors d'oreuvres" and this furniture is for the VIP suite." I did not tell her these words; she knew them and used them comfortably.

When I visited with my grandchildren in March, she drew designs for some of the rooms in the hotel. Her ideas were creative and complex. She has strong spatial skills. My daughter recognizes this strength and encouraged it.

My granddaughter is very bright. However, her mom has nurtured that intelligence with experiences, language and time. They do not watch much television. In fact, Sophie, the oldest does not like television very much. They do not play games on their parents' cell phones. When they are together, they talk, explore and discuss using advanced vocabulary.

Sophie has read The Little House on the Prairie series by Laura Ingalls Wilder, five times. She is fascinated by the way pioneers lived and their experiences. She has read, Ann of Green Gables and The Voyages of Narnia by C.S. Lewis.

Think of your own children or grandchildren. Do you take the opportunity to teach a new experience with the young children in your life? In fact, with older children, the experiences are different but you can also turn their experiences into learning too. The best part, the kids do not realize they are being taught. They are human sponges, absorbing all you

These learning experiences do not need to cost money. Books can be borrowed at the library. Cooking in the kitchen is a necessary task. Involve your children. They learn to measure, mix and follow recipes. They also learn to be creative. Talk with your children. Build their vocabulary and curiosity. Watching less television may prevent ADHD and strengthen the bond with your children.

None of the examples given in this article cost a cent. The only cost is time. Time that is short with your children. Give them the gift of time. They do not need expensive toys to keep them busy. They need you to guide, teach and explore the world.

## Take the Kids Fishing!

Introduce children to the lifetime hobby of fishing at Lake Metroparks' ponds throughout Lake Countv.

Fishing is a great family activity that can include several generations enjoying this lifetime hobby together. Lake Metroparks offers several well-stocked ponds with easy access for all ages and abilities.

Young children aren't always ready for a long day of fishing, so be ready to be flexible. When you take a child fishing, make it simple. Use a smaller pole, with a closed-face reel and a simple hook and bobber. Basic live baits such as worms or maggots will offer the best chance for success. Worms can be purchased at any bait store, or make hunting worms part of your adventure. Find an open area at one of our ponds, free of surrounding trees and top water weeds to teach your child the basics of casting. Don't worry if your child doesn't have enough patience to sit for long periods of time, allow them to reel and cast again if they wish. Children much prefer catching to fishing, so target easy-to-catch species such as the panfish stocked at several of our ponds.

Don't forget snacks and drinks to keep your child comfortable and enjoying their time outdoors. Fish early morning or early evening, when the weather is cooler and the fish are more active. Don't expect a child to sit quietly for several hours—if the fish aren't biting, allow them to explore some of the nature around them. Talk to them about the importance of conservation. Teach them pack in, pack out. Consider cleaning up the litter



at your local fishing hole. This is an ideal time to talk with your child about the wonders of being outdoors. Be sure to check local rules and regulations before you head out. Fishing offers a great opportunity to make lifetime family memories.

While fishing with your child on your own is great, Lake Metroparks also offers many beginner fishing programs to get you started. Go Fish is a favorite for many first-time anglers and is offered throughout the year. We also offer adapted fishing programs to assist participants of all abilities.
