Country legend to perform at Roxy Theater June 22nd

When it comes to staying power, there's nobody more powerful in the country music industry than Whisperin' Bill Anderson.

Anderson, 81, has the distinction of having a country song (either recorded or written by him) on the charts for seven consecutive decades, dating back to 1958, when Ray Price released City Lights, an Anderson composition that soared to the top of the charts. Anderson was 19 when he wrote the song.

Anderson said he's not sure why he's appealed to fans for so long, but he traces the roots of his staying power to the mind frame he had when he started his career.

"When I got into this business in my late teens, I never intended it to be something I did for just five or ten years and then go do something else," Anderson said. "I was very committed to make this my life's work. Writing and performing songs then opened a lot of other doors (game shows, soap operas) that just came along later.

Franklin among Alabama counties eligible for disaster loans in wake of 2018 flooding

ATLANTA – The U.S. Small Business Administration is reminding small businesses, small agricultural cooperatives, small businesses engaged in aquaculture and most private nonprofit organizations located in Alabama that July 8 is the filing deadline for federal economic injury disaster loans as a result of rainfall and flooding from April 1 through June 30, 2018.

The loans are available in the following counties: Colbert, Franklin, Lamar, Lauderdale, Marion, Mobile, Pickens and Washington in Alabama.

"These counties are eligible because they are contiguous to one or more primary counties in Mississippi," said Kem Fleming, director of SBA's Field Operations Center East in Atlanta. "The Small Business Administration recognizes that disasters to not usually stop at county or state lines. For that reason, counties adjacent to primary counties named in the declaration are included."

Under this declaration, the SBA's Economic Injury Disaster Loan program is available to eligible farm-related and non-farm-related entities that suffered financial losses as a direct result of this disaster. With the exception of aquaculture enterprises, SBA can not provide disaster loans to agricultural producers, farmers or ranchers.

The loans are for working capital and can be up to \$2 million with interest rates of 3.58 percent for eligible small businesses and 2.5 percent for non-profit organizations, and terms up to 30 years.

In Alabama, July 8 is the filing deadline for federal economic injury disaster loans as a result of rainfall and flooding from April 1 through June 30, 2018.

Applicants may apply online using the Electronic Loan Application (ELA) via SBA's secure website at DisasterLoan.sba.gov.

Disaster loan information and application forms may also be obtained by calling the SBA's Customer Service Center at 800-659-2955 (800-877-8339 for the deaf and hard-of-hearing) or by sending an email to disastercustomerservice@sba.gov.

Loan applications can be downloaded from the SBA's website at www.sba.gov. Completed applications should be mailed to: U.S. Small Business Administration, Processing and Disbursement Center, 14925 Kingsport Road, Fort Worth, TX 76155.

Completed loan applications must be returned to SBA no later than July 8, 2019.

City council takes action on nuisance property

The Russellville City Council voted unanimously to abate an ongoing nuisance at 234 Highsmith Court at the council's June 3 meeting.

The property is owned by Bank of New York Mellon in West Valley, Utah, and includes a residence and lot.

City of Russellville compliance officer Brian Shackelford filed the complaint on April 18, 2019, based on violations including litter, weeds and nuisance animals living inside the residence. Shackelford's complaint gave the property owners five days to remedy the violations, which was not done, according to Russellville mayor David Grissom.

The citation read: Your property is in violation of city ordinances. Your property must be cleaned of all litter, grass cut and maintained as well as secure the property from nuisance animals living inside the residence.

City employees will now clean the property, and a lien will be placed against it for the expenses incurred in the cleanup.

In other action, the council:

•Approved the annexation of four lots in the Pace Hamilton Subdivision into the city limits. The lots are owned by Connie Christeen Funderburk, who made the request for annexation.

•Approved a \$1,709 expense for advertising with Business Alabama as part of a special issue that will highlight Franklin County.

•Approved a \$600 annual website design and maintenance contract with Shoals Computers to

maintain the website for the City of Russellville Parks and Recreation Department.

•Approved the acceptance of grants for the purchase of eight automatic external defibrillators. The grants were for \$2,506 from the Franklin County Community Development Committee and \$2,000 from Northwest Alabama RC&D. The remaining balance of \$2,475 will be paid by the city.

•Accepted the resignation of Russellville police officer Jacob Brimer and declared a vacancy for patrol officer and asked the Civil Service Board to add an additional name to the list.

•Declared a vacancy for Utility Technician in the Russellville Street Department and agreed to promote from within the Classified Service.

•Declared a vacancy for Equipment Operator III in the Russellville Street Department and authorized advertisement to solicit job applications.

•Approved a request from Antioch CME Church to waive the rental fee of the A.W. Todd Centre on July 6, 2019.

•Heard an update from Russellville Fire Department chief Joe Mansell about the acquisition of airpaks valued at \$168,000 through a grant from the Federal Emergency Management Agency. The grant was a 95/5 grant, meaning the city only was responsible for five percent of the purchase price. Mansell thanked RFD employees Justin Green, Grant Tarascou and Chris Watkins for their efforts in securing the grant.

"These guys help keep our fire department going. These airpaks keep our guys living when they go into a fire," Mansell said. "I thank the council for what you do. If not for the mayor and coun-

cil and what y'all do and allow us to do, we couldn't move forward."

The next regular meeting of the Russellville City Council is set for Monday, June 17, with work session at 6 p.m. and meeting to follow.

Ten local establishments earn satisfactory ratings

Each of the ten Franklin County establishments that received health ratings during the week of May 27-31 had scores that fall into the "satisfactory compliance" range.

Health ratings are required to be prominently posted in all food/lodging establishments. Scores are graded by the Alabama Department of Public Health inspectors on a 100-point scale.

Establishments with scores of 85 to 100 are considered to be in "satisfactory compliance" and are routinely inspected. Establishments scoring between 70 and 84 will be inspected again in 60 days, and those scoring between 60 and 69 will have another follow-up within 48 hours. Any establishment scoring below 60 will be immediately closed.

"Making that my long-range goal maybe helped me stay focused and try not to do the same thing over and over. I've reinvented myself about a dozen times over the years, and I think that's helped."

Anderson and his full band will perform at Russellville's Roxy Theater on Saturday, June 22. The show begins at 7 p.m. Tickets are available at WGOL studios, 113 Washington Avenue NW in Russellville, or online at www.eventbrite.com. Tickets are \$30 and \$45, both of which are floor seats.

Anderson has released seven number one singles and 29 Top 10 singles, and he's a member of the Country Music Hall of Fame. His hits include "Mama Sang a Song," "Po' Folks," "Tips of My Fingers," "I Get the Fever," "My Life" and "Still."

He's also a prolific songwriter, and his music has been recorded by the likes of Connie Smith, George Jones, George Strait, Brad Paisley and Alison Krauss and Mark Wills.

"Songwriting got me in the door to start with. I pretty much came to Nashville on the heels of *City Lights*," Anderson said. "The recording-artist part sprang from that. There's a different kind of satisfaction in both. You write a hit song and it's a hit in Philadelphia, Chicago and Los Angeles, and that's a wonderful feeling, but not the same high as when you go on stage and perform and people love it and stand up not wanting you to leave the stage.

"I've been fortunate to do both in my life."

These days, Anderson enjoys performing at smaller, historic venues like the Roxy.

"I think those are wonderful. Over the past five to ten years, I've played dozens of those kinds of places," Anderson said. "The lighting, seating and acoustics are good at these restored theaters, yet they retain some of their old flavor as well. You can close your eyes and be back in the 40s and 50s. If a

community cares enough to restore its theater, they care enough to support it and keep it going, and I'm glad to be a part of that."

Anderson is a fixture at the Grand Ole Opry, where he first appeared on the main stage in 1959. He still makes four or five appearances each month on the Opry stage.

"It was January 1959, and I'd just recorded my first single for Decca Records," Anderson said. "I got a spot on the Opry. Porter Wagoner introduced me the first time I went on stage. It's a wonder I could walk to the microphone. It was really a very humbling experience. At that time it was at the Ryman Auditorium. It never ceases to be a thrill to walk onto the Opry stage, wherever it may be."

Nicknamed Whisperin' Bill for his soft vocal style, Anderson roars like a lion in the music industry, where he's released a staggering 72 albums.

"I think the key to my staying relevant the last 20 to 25 years is I surrounded myself with a lot of these young people in the industry like Brad Paisley, Vince Gill and Kenny Chesney," Anderson said. "When I go into a room and write with these people, I never say this is how we did it in the 60s and 70s. I try to soak up all the knowledge they can share with me about how it's done today. I learn from them, and they learn from me. I have a young manager, young publicity team and that helps keep me young and keeps my energy going.

"People ask me about today's country music, and I say there's only two types of music, good and bad. Some is good, some is not so good and over the years I've made a little of both."

Anderson has hosted several game shows, including TNN's *Fandango*. He was a three-year regular on ABC's *One Life to Live*, and he co-produced TNN's *You Can Be a Star.*

When asked whether he considers his songwriting abilities a talent or a gift from God, Anderson quickly responded.

"In the first gospel song I ever recorded, I wrote a line saying 'I held the pencil but He wrote this song," Anderson said. "I have a very deep and abiding Christian faith. My grandfather was a Methodist minister, so I grew up in that environment.

"I never go to bed at night without thanking the good Lord for His many blessings. I've sat down before and stared at a blank piece of paper. Later, I stare at it and see words and wonder how they got there. There's no question the good Lord has had a big hand in my songwriting, my career and my life."

"It's a pretty expensive ordeal," Renfro said. "I've known Jason all his life. I grew up with him. We were in the same hunting club and fished together.

"We had a great response from the club and their families. You get in this car club by being a good-hearted person, and that's what we're built on and why we're growing so much."

The StreetFlex raised more than \$800 to help Handley, and the afternoon was highlighted by Handley becoming the newest member.

"It was really exciting [to see] how touched Jason was," Renfro said. "We made him a member and put the StreetFlex sticker on his chair. At that moment, it was a pretty emotional moment for everyone there."

StreetFlex, which has been in existence two years, is now 75 members strong, Renfro said. Although their interest in cars initially draw members together, the club is about much more than displaying their custom cars. In fact, many club members don't own one.

"One thing that's special about this club is it doesn't matter what kind of car you have. You don't have to own a show car to be a member," Renfro said. Six local softball players earn All-State recognition

A banner season for Belgreen continued to generate accolades for the Lady Bulldogs this past weekend, as sophomore pitcher Emma Dempsey and senior first baseman Camie Terrell were both named first-team All-State in Class 1A by the Alabama Sports Writers Association.

"We are very proud of Camie and Emma," said head coach John Smith, who guided Belgreen to a 30-15 record and a berth in the state tournament. "They performed well this season under pressure and were clutch for us all year. I know they both know that without their teammates, the honors don't happen. I know their teammates are happy for them."

Dempsey had an outstanding season in the circle, leading Franklin County and ranking in the Top 12 in the state (according to MaxPreps.com) with 20 wins, 176 innings pitched and 219 strikeouts. She pitched in 39 of Belgreen's 45 games, starting 33 of them. She tossed 24 complete games, including 10 shutouts.

Ward, Greenhill help Auburn earn first CWS bid since '97

Several other local players make splash this season

The last time Auburn played in the College World Series, neither Judd Ward nor Cody Greenhill had been born yet.

On Monday, the two former Russellville High School teammates both helped the Tigers punch their ticket to Omaha for the first time in 22 years with a 14-7 win over North Carolina in Game 3 of the Super Regional in Chapel Hill.

Ward, a sophomore left-fielder, highlighted Auburn's 13-run first inning (the second-biggest inning by any team in NCAA Tournament history) with a three-run homer—his fifth of the season and finished 3-for-5 in the leadoff spot with a walk and two runs scored.

Greenhill, a sophomore right-hander in his second season as the Tigers' closer, recorded the final five outs of Monday's series-clinching win in a non-save situation, allowing one earned run on three hits. He had already earned his 12th save of the season earlier in the series, pitching the final two innings of Auburn's 11-7 win in Saturday's opener.

Ward was coming off an All-Tournament performance the previous week at the Atlanta Regional, where he went 5-for-12 in three games with a double, three walks, an RBI and two runs scored. He also made a pair of highlight-reel defensive plays in the late innings of Auburn's regional-clinching 4-1 victory over Georgia Tech.

Greenhill closed out that 4-1 win with three solid innings, retiring nine of the ten batters he faced to earn the save. He gave up one earned run on one hit and struck out four.

Headed to Omaha for the first time since 1997, Auburn (38-26) will open play in the College World Series this weekend with a game against Mississippi State.

After playing part-time in the outfield as a freshman in 2018, Ward has put together a breakout sophomore season. The 6'1, 195-pound lefty hitter has started 63 of the Tigers' 64 games and leads the team in hits (70) and on-base percentage (.390) while ranking second in batting average (.283) and walks (37). He has 12 doubles and two triples to go along with his five home runs and has driven in 34 runs while scoring 42.

Ward has also been a weapon defensively all season, racking up nine outfield assists and starting three double plays—one of which came in the regional-clinching win over Georgia Tech when he caught a fly ball near the fence in left and doubled a runner off first base.

Greenhill, meanwhile, has made 27 relief appearances this season and ranks third on the team in ERA (3.49) and WHIP (1.23). He is 2-3

all of Franklin County and ranking in the state's Top 30 this season with 66 hits, including 16 for extra bases (one home run, four triples and 11 doubles). She tied for the county lead with 20 multi-hit games and ranked third in both batting average (.520) and RBIs (38). Her .539 OBP ranked fifth in the county.

"Emma's bat was big, but her pitching was even bigger," Smith said. "She is an outstanding athlete. She has blazing speed, but we didn't run her much. One wrong slide would have hurt our team."

Terrell batted .544 this season, ranking first in the county and 13th in the entire state (all classifications), according to MaxPreps.com. Of her 62 hits, a whopping 28 went for extra bases—easily the most in Franklin County. Her 21 doubles tied for sixth-most in the state, and she also had four home runs and three triples.

Terrell tied for the county lead in both multi-hit games (20) and RBIs (48). She ranked second with a .567 OBP and scored 36 runs while stealing 12 bases in 14 tries.

"Camie had a great senior year for us, and we are gonna miss her," Smith said. "Her bat and her glove were clutch. She was also a sneaky base runner who could steal a base in a big situation."

Dempsey and Terrell were two of six softball players from Franklin County to earn All-State honors from the ASWA. Red Bay sophomore shortstop Lila Blackburn was a first-team selection in Class 2A. Blackburn tied Russellville's Karlie Moore for first in Franklin County with seven home runs this season, and she also shared the county lead in RBIs with 48 in 35 games.

An on-base machine, Blackburn drew 19 walks to go along with her 45 hits and posted a county-best .604 OBP. Her .529 batting average ranked second in the county and 17th in the state, according to MaxPreps.com. She pounded out 12 doubles and two triples to go along with those seven homers, ranking third in the county with 21 extra-base hits. She also scored 40 runs and, just for good measure, stole 14 bases without getting caught.

Blackburn was a force to be reckoned with in the Class 2A, Area 15 tournament, going 12-for-16 with three home runs, three doubles and 15 RBIs in five games to help the Lady Tigers take home the area title.

"Lila is a hard-working kid who is willing to do whatever it takes to win," said Red Bay head coach Shane Nichols, who led the Lady Tigers to a 23-12 record and a berth in the North Regional. "She is fun to coach, with how hard she plays the game and the fun she has playing softball."

Blackburn also had a big season in the circle, going 8-4 with a 3.28 ERA as Red Bay's No. 2 pitcher. She struck out 85 batters and allowed just 48 hits in 63.2 innings. She made 18 appearances and 12 starts in the circle, tossing seven complete games.

Russellville senior pitcher Megan Warhurst was a second-team All-State selection in Class 5A. The senior left-hander carried a heavy workload for the Lady Golden Tigers, pitching in 36 of their 41 games. She made 25 starts and tossed 16 complete games, including five shutouts and a no-hitter against area rival Lawrence County in a 3-1 win on April 9.

Warhurst signed with West Florida last fall and then looked every bit the part of a collegiate pitcher this spring, putting together the best season of her prep career. She reached peak dominance in a five-day stretch in late April, striking out 32 batters while allowing zero earned runs on just five hits in 24 innings of work against Cullman, Decatur, Mortimer Jordan, Lawrence County and Hamilton.

"Megan has been a cornerstone for our program," said RHS head coach Kathryn Montgomery, who led the Lady Golden Tigers to a 22-18-1 record this season and a North Regional berth. "She is a goal-oriented and selfmotivated individual. It's been a pleasure having her on our pitching staff and in our lineup. The Argos definitely got themselves a competitor."

in our lineup. The Argos definitely got themselves a competitor." Warhurst finished the season 18-7 with a 1.41 ERA that led Franklin County and ranked 15th in the state (all classifications), according to MaxPreps.com. She completely stifled opposing lineups, giving up just 87 hits in 149.1 innings pitched (an average of barely four hits allowed per seven innings). Her 18 wins and 172 strikeouts both ranked in the state's Top 20, according to MaxPreps.com.

Two Tharptown juniors, pitcher Olivia Ergle and shortstop Shaylee Wieitng, both earned second-team All-State honors from the ASWA in Class 2A.

"I am so proud of Olivia and Shaylee," said head coach Susie Tverberg, who led the Lady Wildcats to a 26-16 record and a berth in the North Regional. "They're both very deserving of this award. These two girls work so hard at being good at the game they love. They both are great examples of team players, and they tend to make the players around them better.

"Olivia and Shaylee both spend their spare time playing travel ball or taking hitting or pitching lessons. They are always trying to get better. To me, that's what makes them special."

Tverberg says that Wieting is one of the fastest players she's ever coached.

Maggerise, three Tigers honored by ASWA

On more than one occasion over the past couple of years, Red Bay baseball coach Richard Maggerise would get a late-night phone call from a concerned member of the school's administration.

"My phone would ring at 10 p.m., and it would be the principal telling me the lights were on at the baseball field," Maggerise said. "And Cade would be up there working, with nobody else watching."

That would be Cade McKinney, a reserve outfielder throughout most of his Tiger career who blossomed into a big-time contributor this past season as a senior-in large part due to those late-night practice sessions on a lonely field. Not to worry, though. He's in good company now.

McKinney received All-State honorable mention in Class 2A from the Alabama Sports Writers Association this past weekend after a breakout season in which he batted .391 with 12 extra-base hits, 24 RBIs, 30 runs scored, 14 stolen bases in 14 attempts and a .486 OBP for a Red Bay team that won 20 games and reached the state quarterfinals for the first time in 26 years.

"Cade didn't even start when he played in junior high," Maggerise said. "He didn't become a starter for us on the varsity until halfway through his junior year. I've never been around a kid who worked so much on his own. It's astounding. I have the utmost respect for that kid, because he did every bit of it on his own. He decided in the tenth grade that he was gonna make baseball a priority and work to be the best he could.

"For a guy who was not even starting in junior high and then didn't start in the ninth grade, the tenth grade and most of his eleventh-grade year to make All-State his senior year is just amazing."

McKinney was one of three Red Bay players to earn All-State honors from the ASWA. Senior shortstop/pitcher Kolby Bragwell was a first-team selection as an infielder, and senior Chase Allen earned second-team honors as a designated hitter.

Wieting put that speed to good use this season, leading Franklin County by a wide margin (and ranking third in the entire state, according to MaxPreps.com) with 55 stolen bases in 59 attempts. She also led the county (and tied for 12th in the state) with 63 runs scored in 42 games. She ranked third in the county with 61 hits (including four doubles and three triples), batting an even .500 for the season.

Wieting tied for the county lead with 20 multi-hit games and also drew 18 walks, reaching base at a stellar .563 clip. She struck out only 11 times all year in 142 plate appearances.

Ergle finished in the state's Top 20 (according to MaxPreps.com) with 17 wins and 174 strikeouts in 137.2 innings. Ergle pitched in 34 of the Lady Wildcats' 42 games, making 26 starts and going the distance 18 times. She tossed three shutouts and a pair of no-hitters, finishing the season with a 3.55 ERA and a very solid strikeout/walk ratio of 3.2/1.

Ergle was also productive at the plate, driving in a team-best 30 runs while batting .279 with three homers and five doubles.

Bragwell received the All-State nod for a third straight season after finishing fifth in the state (according to MaxPreps.com) with a .541 average. The 6'2, 205-pound slugger set new career-highs with 17 extra-base hits (including 13 doubles, two triples and two homers), 50 runs scored, 36 walks (including four intentional free passes in an area game against Colbert County) and 28 stolen bases in 29 attempts.

Opposing pitchers by and large did whatever they could to avoid throwing Bragwell anything over the plate, but he still managed to be both productive (27 RBIs in 31 games) and disciplined (only nine strikeouts in 114 plate appearances). He reached base safely either by a hit, a walk or a hit by pitch 79 times, posting a staggering .693 OBP.

When opponents pitched around Bragwell, Allen more often than not made them pay, leading the Tigers (and tying for 13th in the state) with 44 RBIs. In the game in early April when Colbert County walked Bragwell all four times he batted, Allen went 3-for-3 and drove in seven runs to lead a 16-0 Red Bay rout.

After batting a solid .338 as a junior in 2018, Allen improved that mark to a See 'TIGERS,' page 19

with 12 saves and has allowed 52 hits in 56.2 innings, holding opponents to a .242 batting average. The 6'4, 218-pound righty has struck out 43 batters while walking just 17.

Ward and Greenhill both graduated from RHS in 2017 after helping lead the Golden Tigers to three straight state championships and earning three All-State selections (and one Class 5A Player of the Year honor) apiece. They were not the only former Russellville players to make their mark at the collegiate level this spring.

Reed Smith, a 2016 graduate of RHS and former Class 5A state finals MVP, put together a strong finish to his first season at Troy University. The 6'0, 180-pound sophomore collected multiple hits in six of the Trojans' final 12 games, batting .333 (14-for-42) during that stretch with three doubles, a triple and seven runs scored.

For the season, Smith played in 48 games and made 41 starts, eventually settling in as Troy's everyday starter at second base. He batted .232 (35-for-151) on the year with four home runs, three triples, six doubles, 16 RBIs and 22 runs scored while committing only three errors in the field.

Smith, who earned All-Conference honors as a red-shirt freshman at Dyersburg State Community College in 2018, started his Trojan career with a bang, blasting a tie-breaking two-run homer in the seventh inning of a season-opening 3-2 win over Central Michigan on February 15 in his first-ever at bat for Troy. On February 27 against in-state rival Jacksonville State, Smith went 3-for-5 in the leadoff spot with a home run and a triple in a 9-7 loss. Perhaps the biggest highlight of Smith's first season at Troy came on April 2 in Tuscaloosa, when he smacked a second-inning grand slam to break up a scoreless game and spark the Trojans to an 8-4 win over Alabama. He had another big game on April 30 at Alabama State, going 2-for-5 with a homer and a triple in a 20-5 win.

0-5 win. Troy finished the sea-

son 31-29, winning a pair of games at the Sun Belt Conference Tournament before being eliminated with a 1-0 loss to Georgia Southern.

Austin Bohannon, another 2016 graduate of RHS and former Class 5A state finals MVP, put together his share of highlights this spring in his first season at UAB. The 6'4, 225-pound junior lefty made his debut for the Blazers on February 23, tossing a scoreless inning of relief in a 20-6 rout of Holy Cross. He picked up his first win in relief on March 2, allowing one hit and striking out one in 1.2 scoreless innings in an 11-8 victory over Radford.

Bohannon also pitched well on multiple occasions against opponents from the SEC. He retired all four batters he faced in a 15-9 loss at Ole Miss on March 8. On March 19 at Auburn, Bohannon entered the game in relief in the third inning and retired the first seven batters he faced. He then issued a oneout walk in the fifth and allowed a single to right field by Ward, his former Russellville teammate. After the Blazers committed an error, Bohannon allowed another single and issued his second walk before coming out of the game. Despite pitching well, he wound up taking the loss in a 13-5 defeat. Bohannon, who spent

the first two years of his college career at Shelton State, made his firstever start at the Division I level on March 26 against Samford and was terrific, allowing just three hits and striking out five in four shutout innings. He ended up with a no-decision in a 9-0 win.

Bohannon got another starting assignment on May 7 at Auburn and went 3.1 innings, allowing two earned runs on three hits. The first time he faced Ward, he hit him with a pitch and then promptly picked him off first base. In Ward's second at bat, he put down a sacrifice bunt. Bohannon again ended up with a no-decision in a 6-4 win by the Blazers.

For the season, Bohannon was 1-3 with a 6.51 ERA in 16 appearances, including four starts. He allowed 31 hits in 27.2 innings, striking out 15 and walking 15. UAB finished the year 27-29.

Elsewhere in Conference-USA, former Golden Tiger ace Jacob Green picked up three wins and a save while making 23 relief appearances in his final season at Western Kentucky. The 6'3, 205-pound senior, a 2015 graduate of RHS who pitched two years at Shelton State and then two more for the Hilltoppers, struck out 37 batters in 33 innings this season while holding opposing hitters to a .256 average.

Green was highly effective in several multi-inning relief stints for Western Kentucky (26-29-1). On February 27 against Murray State, he retired all six batters he faced (striking out three of them) in two innings of work in a 9-5 win. On April 13, Green

Green pitched the final 3.1 innings of a 16-11 victory over Marshall, earning the win. He gave up two earned runs on two hits and struck out four.

Green got another win on April 28 in a 4-2 victory at Texas-San Antonio, allowing just one hit and zero earned runs while striking out two batters in 3.2 innings of relief. He finished the 2019 season 3-2 with a 7.09 ERA.

For his two-year career at Western Kentucky, Green made 46 appearances and went 4-2 with two saves and 67 strikeouts in 57 innings pitched.

Landon Ezzell, a 2018 graduate of RHS, capped off a strong debut season at UAH with an outstanding performance at the plate in the 2019 Gulf South Conference Tournament last month.

The 6'3, 205-pound freshman collected a season-high four hits in the tournament opener against Montevallo on May 3, going 4-for-4 with three RBIs and two runs scored to lead the Chargers to a 7-3 win. Two days later, Ezzell went 2-for-5 with an RBI and two runs scored in a 12-8 loss to West Florida. He then went 1-for-3 with an RBI in the Chargers' final game of the tournament, a 5-4 loss to Valdosta State.

Ezzell finished the tournament 7-for-12 with five RBIs and four runs scored, batting cleanup in all three games and splitting his time between third base and first base.

Ezzell singled in his first collegiate at bat against St. Leo on February 3. He had a big doubleheader on February 27 against Miles College, going 2-for-4 with a double and an RBI to help UAH win the opener 9-2 and then blasting a three-run homer in the first inning of Game 2 to help the Chargers overcome an early 5-0 deficit and finish off the sweep with a 10-8 win.

On March 30-31, Ezzell enjoyed a productive series against GSC rival Delta State, going 3-for-8 with four RBIs and two runs scored to help UAH take two out of three.

Ezzell played in 32 games this season, starting 24 of them. He batted .323 See 'AUBURN,' page 18

stellar .410 in 2019, collecting 34 hits in 83 at bats. He struck out only a dozen times in 112 plate appearances, drawing 21 walks and posting an elite on-base percentage of .527. He also had one home run, four doubles and 27 runs scored, stealing eight bases in nine tries and recording eight multi-hit games.

"I've had a few times where we've had two guys make All-State, but never have we had three," Maggerise said. "I knew Kolby would probably get All-State for a third straight year, but this is an unbelievable honor for those other two guys.

"Chase is just a great kid with tremendous parents and a tremendous work ethic. He's always been a 'Yes sir' kind of guy. In six years of coaching him, I don't think I've ever heard him say something negative about anything. He's been a tremendous leader on and off the field for us."

Maggerise also received a major honor from the ASWA, which named him Class 2A Coach of the Year. He found out about it on Sunday morning when his wife Miranda spotted the news on social media.

"My wife saw it on Facebook or something that morning, and she asked me about it," said Maggerise, who has been at Red Bay for seven seasons, including the past six as head coach. "I said, 'Let me go look on AL.com.' And that's where I happened to see it.

"I'm not gonna lie to you—I was like a kid in a candy store. It's a very humbling thing to be honored by the state, obviously. For a coach, outside of winning a state championship, this is the highest honor you can get, just for the simple fact of how people perceive you as a coach and how they

perceive your program."

Red Bay recovered from a 3-5 start this season to win 17 of its last 23 games, finishing 20-11. The Tigers went 6-0 in area play and swept a pair of playoff series (against Collinsville in the first round and Sulligent in the second) to earn a quarterfinal berth for the first time since 1993.

"I'm not gonna lie to you—I was like a kid in a candy store," Maggerise said of his reaction to learning he had been named Class 2A Coach of the Year. "It's a very humbling thing to be honored by

the state, obviously. For a coach, outside of winning a state championship, this is the highest honor you can get, just for the simple fact of how people perceive you as a coach and how they

perceive your program."

Maggerise thought that such a special season might garner him some accolades on the local level, but ASWA Coach of the Year was not something he expected.

"I was joking around with my wife back when we got beat by Westbrook [in the state quarterfinals]," Maggerise said on Monday. "I said, 'Wouldn't it be something if I got Coach of the Year?' She was like, 'Do you really think you might get it?' And I didn't. People usually have to win a state championship or do something really astounding that year to get that honor. I really didn't think a whole lot about it.

"I thought I might could get something from the local paper. I thought there was a possibility there, but statewide? No. I didn't think it was that realistic of an opportunity."

Maggerise and his wife have two sons, three-

year-old Easton and one-year-old Camden.

Elsewhere in Franklin County, Phil Campbell had three players earn All-State honors in Class 3A from the ASWA. Sophomore pitcher Ridge Raper was a first-team selection, while junior catcher Rilan Garrison and senior first baseman Nate Owens each made second-team All-State.

Russellville senior catcher Hunter Briles received All-State honorable mention in Class 5A.
