VTA light rail extension to Eastridge moves forward

he Valley Transportation Authority Board of Directors on Thursday, June 6 voted unanimously to approve new plans for a light rail extension to San Jose's Eastridge Transit Center — giving what should be the go-ahead on an almost 20-year-old project.

The vote came decades after East San Jose residents waited for the wheels of government to crank the fully-funded project into action, after county voters first approved the extension project in 2000 with Measure A. The VTA board discussed new findings in a second study that details impact from noise, vibration and traffic impacts, including the loss of carpool lanes. The unavoidable impacts will affect East San Jose residents along Capitol Expressway between VTA's Alum Rock and Eastridge transit centers, where the 2.4 mile extension will be placed.

VTA officials Ken Ronsse and Christina Jaworksi explained the changes to the previous project plan.

"Tonight's action improves the project," Ronsse told San José Spotlight. "With the approved project, we'll be able to move full steam ahead."

During Thursday's board meeting, Supervisor Dave Cortese, who has supported the project for years, called the new plan a "breakthrough" for public transit in the region.

"There's literally hundreds of reasons, practical reasons, to keep moving down this path," Cortese told the board.

Construction for the \$453 million project is planned to start in late 2020, according to VTA officials. In the meantime, contracts and permits must be approved, utilities must be relo-

cated and land must be acquired, among other things.

A few board members expressed reservations in the plan — such as Councilmember Magdalena Carrasco, who said that more traffic congestion is not something she's looking forward to as public transit changes in her district. Still, Carrasco has been a staunch supporter of extending light rail to East San Jose, which has been largely left behind in the city's See EXTENSION, page 3

San Jose lawmakers narrowly approve budget amid inequity concerns

San Jose City Councilmembers on Tuesday, June 11 narrowly voted to approve Mayor Sam Liccardo's June budget message, despite criticism that it didn't go far enough to address racial and economic inequities in the city.

The split vote marked the first time in recent history that nearly

half the City Council voted against a mayor's fiscal budget, which is historically unanimously approved. It also underscored an increasing rift on San Jose's council, splitting councilors along racial, political and socio-economic lines.

Five councilors voted against Liccardo's budget proposal, including his idea to implement an "equity screen" – a tool the mayor said could ensure funds are allocated to areas with the greatest needs. But the five lawmakers said it's insufficient in addressing the needs of Silicon Valley's impover-

ished districts.

The dissenting voters, Councilmembers Raul Peralez, Maya Esparza, Sergio Jimenez, Magdalena Carrasco and Sylvia Arenas, in April proposed the creation of a \$500,000 equity fund to meet the needs of the city's poorest and resource-scarce neighborhoods. They

also held a news conference Monday pushing for more equity in the city budget.

When Liccardo released his June budget message earlier this month, he allocated \$4 million to programs he felt fit the equity screen, relying mainly on data See BUDGET, page 22

Continued from page 1 transit improvement plans and cut off from other parts of the Bay Area because of a lack of services.

"This doesn't look good to me as a consumer, as someone who commutes every day and who is always late," Carrasco said of VTA's new impact report, but added that "it's a small incon-

venience in comparison to those who are transit dependent."

But the new light rail extension will open access to public transit to and from East San Jose for thousands across the Bay Area, said San Jose Councilmember Raul Peralez. Elected leaders earlier this year worried about another delay in the longawaited project — despite the fact that East San Jose residents have taxed themselves for years to pay for it.

"Right now, it is still too fast to ride in your cars around the Bay... people still do that instead of taking public transportation," Peralez said. But if the lane closures get people out of their cars and into trains and buses, the downtown councilman sees that as a benefit. "The reality is that I think the benefits go much beyond what we see

Sunil Sharma, an East San Jose resident who spoke to the board Thursday, said the extension could help boost revenue at the Eastridge Mall, where he said he's concerned businesses are slowing and shutting down - especially following the Barnes and Noble closure at the mall in January 2018.

"I'm concerned other stores might close," Sharma, 61, told San José Spotlight. But with a new light rail extension, he said the area could see an uptick in business, and he might gain some new neighbors, too. "I'd like to see more high income residents, like technology workers, move in.

San Jose Mayor Sam Liccardo weighed in during Thursday's meeting to show his support for the new extension.

There are a lot of members on this board that are not from San Jose that are still supporting this project because they think it's the right thing to do," Liccardo said. "And it is the right thing to do."

olly Cuevas, who grew up in Evergreen Valley, has completed the 74th day of her 3,000 mile, threemonth cross-country trek from California to New York and is now in Pennsylvania.

Molly, who is expected to cross into New Jersey in the next few days, started her run in Santa Monica, California on April 1 and will finish in Montauk, New York on June 29. It's taking her three months, through 12 states. When it is over she will have trekked

Molly is running across the United States to raise funds and awareness for the Challenged Athletes Foundation (CAF), a nonprofit based in California that provides opportunities and support for athletes who face physical challenges.

Molly has run across 10 states so far: California, Arizona, New Mexico, Texas, Oklahoma, Kansas, Missouri, Illinois, Indiana,

Land use discussion enlightens many

he District 8 Community Round Table (D8CRT) hosted a Land Use Panel Discussion covering Evergreen Valley/ San Jose planning and land use at their June 6 meeting.

At the end of the presentations during the question and answer session Trustee Maria Fuentes of the SJECCD (San Jose Evergreen City College District) spoke regarding the development of the 27 acres of land at Evergreen Valley College.

Robert Reese, Chair, Land Use Committee, D8CRT introduced the panel to the audience.

The panel of the meeting included the following speakers.

- Michael Brilliot, Deputy Director, City of San Jose, Citywide Planning & Urban Design. Brilliot is overseeing the 2040 General Plan.
- Jim Zito, Past Chair of the San Jose Planning Commission and Past President and current Board of Trustee for the Evergreen School District.
- Alice Kaufman, Legislative Advocacy Director, Committee for Green Foothills. The Committee supports sustainable smart transit oriented residential mixed use development.
- Shawn Milligan, KT Urban, Partner & President of Milligan Land Company, who has experience in residential development, including downtown high-rise, Urban Village and R-1 detached residential units.
- Jerad Ferguson, Senior Policy Advisor -Land Use & Economic Development, Office of Mayor Sam Liccardo.

SPEAKERS' COMMENTS Michael Brilliot

Brilliot explained that the General Plan is a blue print on how the City's growth is envisioned through 2040. The plan calls for the accommodation of 400,000 more people and approximately 350,000 more jobs. To accommodate future growth, 68 urban growth boundaries have been identified. "An example of an urban growth area is the Evergreen Village Square," said Brilliot. "This urban growth

boundary village offers services, such as a library, offices, retail, and homes."

Brilliot stated during question and answer session that Evergreen is not considered an area appropriate for significant development, particularly housing development. He stated, "We could build a lot more housing, the right places to do it is in urban locations closer to transit and places near employment."

Iim Zito

Zito addressed the audience and gave some historical facts about development in Evergreen Valley. "When David Cortese first took office as a councilmember he put together a group that did a study on the east hills visioning project," said Zito. "That is primarily what we are working with now as developers came See LAND USE, page 18

Yerba Buena Road was closed for several hours while San Jose Police took over the investigators from the Highway Patrol.







Our last Day at the Races included a person


who had read about it here in the *Evergreen Times* and was reunited with a long time teaching colleague, fun and friendship, a perfect combination.





to the city and said we want to develop the areas that are still available in Evergreen. Dave said we should have a master plan so he put together a committee. The community members considered four sites: The Evergreen Valley College site, the Pleasant Hill golf course, the Arcadia site, which is being developed right now, and the Berg property to one that was subject of the ballot measure last year. The four sites called for more than 7,000 units which have now been reduced to a little more than 5,000 units. The question that arises with these developments is how much traffic and how much impact can all this development have on the community. We have some very limited arterials to get to and from the freeway. There have been some substantial upgrades with the two interstate freeway exchanges, and also significant contributions to the Evergreen Elementary School District and the high schools. In 2008 you might have a vision in your head of what happened at that time and everything was basically tabled. The college original proposal was to build 600 low income housing primarily for teachers, fire personnel and police officers. What has never been cleared up is the environment impact and whether or not the homes should be built.

Alice Kaufman

"Preserving open space gives us a lot of benefits," said Kaufman. "Open space provides protection from flooding, filters pollutants in both air and ground water, provides locally sourced food, and offers beautiful outdoor recreation for health and many other positive things. Some city planning regarding building such as Daly City chose to build out and not have too much open space except for designated parks." It was explained by Kaufman that "residential sprawl" sometimes causes development on hillsides which create patterns of building that are bad for the environment and our own quality of life. It was stated that when a choice is made to build in infill areas it preserves open space. "It equates to people not traveling so far from work to home," Kaufman said. "Developing new forms of transit gets more cars off the road. Environmental groups are now working to purchase land for conservation in order to permanently protect the land."

Kaufman said large companies that are developing and growing are now building in the center of San Jose and this creates a new

view of expansion. Areas like Coyote Valley are strategized to be protected as open space lands. The City of San Jose is a partner in this effort with the passage of Measure T on the ballot in November providing more than 50 million dollars for flooded groundwater protection. In a year and a half San Jose will be initiating the review of the four year general plan and it is hoped that planning will take place for a general vision of how Coyote Valley will be cared for by the City. Kaufman closed with the statement, "If we protect nature it will protect us."

Shawn Milligan

KT Urban has been developing since 1988 and have focused their development efforts in downtown San Jose. They have developed about 3,000 residential units and large downtown construction of condos. KT Urban has also reached out to help write the code of living ordinance for San Jose. It is a new model of housing space for those who wish to live in units which cost less. Milligan stated, "For those who can't afford a studio apartment, these folks have all kinds of common amenities and then the bedrooms are much smaller so they are able to offer the units for about 20 percent to 30 percent less than a studio apartment; so we think it will be hugely successful especially for young people who want to stay here in Silicon Valley." It was explained that developments are limited to residential and downtown urban villages. Milligan expressed that it is really expensive to build high rises so he asked for help from the general public in support for building Infield Developments. "The City needs to look at how developers are charged for building smaller residential buildings to encourage more development and not penalize development of such innovative projects," said Milligan. "Downtown San Jose has seen some amazing traction, we are all holding our breath to see when some of these projects are going to come out of the ground. I think there is 20 million square feet of new office development in the downtown area and Google has eight million of that. That translates to the need of about 80,000 new housing units in downtown San Jose."

Jerad Ferguson

Ferguson and a staff of three others advise Mayor Liccardo on business retention and economic development with working with land use. Ferguson stated that "housing affordability is a big focus." He stated siting a state report that it is estimated that 1.8M homes are needed to be built in California in the next five years.

Citing California State estimated data it was stated that currently on average the state of California is producing about 80,000 homes a year. There is a tremendous need for providing places for people to live due to an estimated need of 1.4M homes or living units to be developed in California over the next five years, said Ferguson. The State of California lawmakers are currently presenting bills

opment statewide. Ferguson stated, "Our goals on housing through our general plan are to focus development of building units in urban villages." The City will be reconvening a 43 member group to act as a task force in the second four year review which will take a look at how well the urban centers are preforming, how housing is being produced and all other aspects of land development. This will all be presented to the San Jose City Council for review. Ferguson stated that the mayor is interested in seeing more accessory units (inlaw or granny units) being built for the City has passed new laws to allow more flexibility in the building of small units. Such units are often built in the backyards or near current home sites. Year-todate 104 permits have been filed to build accessory units which is a steep increase compared to previous years due to the new flexibility of filing for such permits.

During the Q & A session Trustee Maria Fuentes of the San Jose-Evergreen Valley College District spoke regarding the development of the 27 acres of land at Evergreen Valley College.

Fuentes stated "The question

Fuentes stated, "The question was asked about what's happening with the developer, Republic. Right now the district (Evergreen Valley College) is in the process of renegotiating the contract. The contract was only for one year and they've actually received two extensions one for one month and another for two or three months so we are in the process of being negotiated."

Fuentes invited those in the meeting to attend the San Jose-Evergreen Valley College District board meeting in order to provide public input and feedback before the closed session agenda. "I wanted to mention it is really important. I know the community has a lot of concerns about what's going on and I think now that it's being negotiated I think now is the time to go."

Fuentes mentioned that Evergreen College had the highest graduation in its 35-year history. "More people are going to Evergreen and more are needing Evergreen (College) and also City (San

Jose City College) for our community and when we think of right now what Republic (developer) is proposing using only the 13 acres, that leaves about 14 acres that we could be using for education."

Fuentes requests community input on how to use 14 of the 27 acres at Evergreen College

"I feel there is a lot of energy including our City Council member Sylva Arenas to meet the educational needs of our community and I hope that people will speak up and give input because right now the need is there, the land is there, and if we were to use that to expand Evergreen College then all of you would need to be a part of the process, "Fuentes said. "I hope we can have a better future meeting either the Chancellor or the President of Evergreen College to talk about this. If we are going to

use that land for education we have to start planning and start doing it now; our community needs that land for educational purposes."





from the Social Progress Index and Government Alliance on Race and Equity. And while the City Council on Tuesday agreed on one thing – it needs to address San Jose's history of inequity – opinions differed on how to accomplish it.

The five dissenting councilors voiced concern that the city had not yet developed a framework for the equity screen and instead advocated for the \$500,000 equity fund

"I don't think we should subject anything to a screen that we don't know what will entail," Peralez said.

But Liccardo said he was not prepared to stall passing the budget Tuesday, and the council majority ultimately compromised to hold a study session to work toward developing the requested framework.

"We're not going to get it right the first time," Liccardo said. "We can start in this moment with \$4 million."

City Manager Dave Sykes said he wasn't entirely sure how an equity fund would work.

"I think there is complete agreement that

equity means something different to everyone," he said. "We are interested and we see tremendous value in engaging in more learning."

Esparza provided an example of inequity in Liccardo's budget on Tuesday. She noted that funding for traffic calming measures was unfairly distributed across districts – giving the city's most affluent neighborhoods the bulk of the money. She added that not all councilmembers submitted a proposal to fund traffic improvements, but that the money should be allocated based on need.

"We need to have a process that funds things based on need, not on whether you wanted to fund our budget document one year," she said to the mayor.

Jimenez was one of many councilors that advocated for research first. He also said the topic, which saw over five hours of heated discussion, shouldn't be a controversial one.

"It seems that most folks are in agreement that something must be done," Jimenez said. "It's about advocating not for our districts, but really advocating for all our residents."

Still, Councilmembers Johnny Khamis and Lan Diep expressed concerns about how the equity fund would work.

"What I don't want to do is to establish a preexisting fund to address something that we don't know and make it so it only can be used for bureaucratic procedures," Khamis said

Diep acknowledged the collective council's goal of finding some way to implement equity in future budgets.

"I'm not ready to proceed today with an equity fund. It is more a concern over a process, not the merits," Diep said. "When I say process, I really mean money."

This year councilors submitted 103 budget proposals to the mayor, totaling \$41.3 million. They ranged from installing metal detectors in the council chambers to incentivizing the registration of home security cameras with the police department.

Councilmember Dev Davis – who voted for the mayor's budget message – said City Hall needs to spend time and resources gathering data on how San Jose should address inequity.

"We are in desperate need of a study session because we're having this discussion without a lot of background knowledge," she said.

Full adoption of the 2019-2020 budget is scheduled to occur at the June 18 meeting.
