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

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Waterfalls The majestic beauty and solace of falling water.

Ready to find a place where you can unplug, unwind, and refresh your body and mind? A waterfall will take you there. It's a powerful gift from nature that's both calming and exhilarating. Watching the water flow over a rocky ledge and free fall in slow motion as a luminous spray casts a rainbow of color is not only a stunning sight, but it also awakens the other senses as well. With the peaceful, surround-sound effect of the rushing water, it's a sensory experience unlike any other.

Tennessee's abundant waterfalls are one of the state's most significant natural resources. No two waterfalls are the same. Moment by moment, day-to-day, season-to-season, they are everchanging. Manchester is the perfect place to launch your waterfall adventure. So load up your backpack with the essentials and visit these nearby waterfalls — the first stop is less than five minutes from downtown.

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
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
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Step Falls, Big Falls, and Blue Hole Falls

Easy 1.4-mile loop Old Stone Fort State Park 732 Stone Fort Dr., Manchester

The well-maintained and relatively flat Enclosure Trail loops between the forks of the Duck River, following a mound wall built by Native Americans 1,500-2,000 years ago. Step Falls is a beautiful series of cascading tiered waterfalls along the Little Duck River side of the trail. You can access the falls through several steep side trails. The largest of the waterfalls, at over 30 feet, is Big Falls located on the Big Duck River side. Though not easily accessible by foot, Big Falls can be viewed from the hiking trails above and below the fort, or the large rock sitting above the falls. Blue Hole Falls is nearly 30 feet in height and plunges into a magnificent blue pool along the Duck River.

Rutledge Falls

Easy .2 mile walk to the top of the falls 1289 Rutledge Falls Rd., Tullahoma

Rutledge Falls is located on private property in Tullahoma, but due to the generosity of the owners, the falls are open to the public from dawn to dusk. Just look for the big red barn. A wooden fence and a driveway with a millstone mark the entrance to the trail. The waterfall is a short walk from the parking area across from Rutledge Falls Baptist Church. At the top of the falls, you will be greeted by a stately female statue known as the Lady of the Falls, who was saved from destruction during a renovation project at the Tennessee State Capitol in Nashville. The rocky trail leading down to the swimming hole is steep, so be sure to wear good walking or hiking shoes. This waterfall also made its big screen debut in "Hannah Montana: The Movie." The swimming hole is the perfect remedy to Tennessee's hot summer days.

Machine Falls

Moderate 1.5 mile loop trail Short Springs State Natural Area 2250 Short Springs Rd., Tullahoma

One of the tallest falls in the state, Machine Falls drops more than 60 feet and is almost as wide. The hike to the waterfall is short but can be slippery and steep in places. Watch for the signs when you get to the creek. The falls are hidden from the trail, but to get there, you just have to walk up the creek about 100 yards. You will not be disappointed. Seeing Machine Falls up close is well worth getting your feet a little wet. Parking and a map of the area can be found beneath the large white water tower on Short Springs Road.

Lower and Upper Busby Falls

Easy 1/2 mile trail off of Machine Falls loop in Short Springs State Natural Area

The Bobo Creek Trail loop branches off of the trailhead and then joins up before the Machine Falls loop. Wooden steps and flat rocks provide easy access to the water above the falls. Overlooks on the trail offer views of the Upper and Lower Busby Falls.

Greeter Falls

435 Greeter Falls Rd., Altamont

The scenic Greeter Falls is a 45-minute drive from Manchester at the Savage Gulf State Natural Area in Altamont. The two-tiered waterfall drops over a 15-foot upper ledge and then plummets over a 50-foot lower shelf into a cold, clear plunge pool. A flat and sandy path leads to the upper part. The lower area can be reached via several flights of stairs and a rocky, descending pathway to a swimming hole. This waterfall offers excellent options for wading in the water or sunbathing on the flat rocks.

Foster Falls

Easy/Moderate 1/4 mile hike South Cumberland State Park 498 Foster Falls Rd., Sequatchie

Foster Falls is less than an hour from Manchester. Experience the 60-foot- tall waterfall from a clifftop overlook a few minutes from the parking area, or take the rocky path to the bottom of the falls where a refreshing swimming hole awaits. Foster Falls is also home to a picturesque suspension bridge. The trailhead begins at Foster Falls Visitor Center in Sequatchie, Tennessee.



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
Tennessee Whisky

Cascade Hollow Distilling Co. Stays True to Tradition

One drop at a time, chilled whisky seeps through thirteen feet of sugar maple charcoal held in four giant steel vats at the Cascade Hollow Distilling Co. just outside of Tullahoma. It's a filtration method known as the Lincoln County Process, and it's what sets Tennessee Whiskey apart from all other whiskeys and bourbons. The process, which takes from seven to ten days, mellows the distilled spirits, giving them a smoothness that is "mellow as moonlight."

The whisky business was booming, but unfortunately, Tennessee prohibition began in 1910 and distillers were given one year to shut their operations down as the state became "dry." However, thanks to the quick thinking of Schwab, the recipe was moved to the Stitzel distillery in Kentucky. In



distillery was one of six to receive a permit for medicinal spirits, which allowed the production of whisky to continue.


Bringing the Whisky Home

In 1958, near the same site and spring as the original Cascade Hollow Distillery, Ralph Dupps, who worked for one of the largest distillers in the nation, purchased 600 acres, built a replica of the distillery and brought the whisky back to its Tennessee home. It became the second registered distillery in Tennessee, just a few months after Jack Daniel's.

It's in the water

When it comes to making whisky, a pure water source is critical. It's so important, that many great distilleries are named after the water source.

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Hours & Location:

Cascade Hollow Distillery is located at 1950 Cascade Hollow Rd, Tullahoma. It is open Monday through Saturday from 9:00 A.M. - 4:30 P.M., and Sunday from 11:30 A.M. to 5:00 P.M. It is closed on Tuesdays and all major holidays.

Tours

The last tour starts at 3:30 P.M. Monday and Wednesday through Saturday and at 4:00 P.M. on Sunday—there are no tours on Tuesdays. One-hour tours are \$14 per person and include a complimentary tasting (must be 21+ to sample); Tours are free for guests under 21 as well as active and retired military personnel. At Cascade Springs, the water comes up from the ground through layers of limestone that act as a natural filter. The pure water, tapped at the source, has no iron content which can make the whisky taste bitter. It's the same water source George Dickel used in 1870 and is exclusively used by the distillery today.

Handmade the Hard Way


What does that mean? For one, the distillery isn't run by a computer. Every single step of the traditional production process is run by people who still take temperatures by hand and weigh grains on an old weigh scale. The charcoal is made onsite from 2" x 2" x 4' pieces of sugar maple wood perfectly stacked in ricks and then set on fire. Under careful supervision, the wood is burned down to a certain point and then doused with water. Afterward, it is laid out to dry and

then broken down into piles of charcoal. Workers scoop up the charcoal into burlap sacks, and carry them up to the filtering vats in the distillery. Making fine whisky has never been easy, and Cascade Hollow Distilling Co. is keeping the process true to tradition. Today, General Manager and Distiller Nicole Austin oversees the brand's 148-year legacy of making Tennessee's award-winning craft whisky.

Nestled in the picture-perfect setting of Cascade Hollow, the distillery is surrounded by lush meadows and forested rolling hills with Cascade Creek winding it's way through. Sit in one of the rocking chairs on the porch of the visitor's center and take in the beautiful view. Whether you are a whisky drinker or not, it's a wonderful place to experience a unique part of Tennessee history.

Did you know?

- Tennessee law states that the whisky has to be aged in charred new white oak barrels.
- Cascade Hollow Distilling Co.is the only distillery in Tennessee using single-storied warehouses which helps keep the aging whisky at a uniform temperature and eliminates the need to rotate the barrels.
- George Dickel is the longest aged Tennessee Whisky.
- Dickel believed that whisky produced in the winter was smoother than that in the summer months. To this day, the distillery chills its liquid to 40 degrees before charcoal-filtering and is the only Tennessee distillery to do so.
- Whisky or Whiskey? It depends on where it is from the Scots spell it whisky and the Irish spell it whiskey. George kept to the Scottish tradition.
- Whisky is taxed per gallon, before evaporation.





Great live music brings people together. It has the power to make people forget about their differences and to feel like they're a part of something bigger. That's just what the members of the Manchester Tourism and Community Development Commission had in mind when they launched the Manchester Music Series earlier this year. The effort, led by committee members Allison Dotson, John Richardson, Tim McFall, and Ryan French, builds on what the Downtown Manchester Movement has been trying to do for years—bring people back downtown and develop a sense of community.



The Downtown Revival is well underway, and it's already creating quite a buzz. The first two events were held at The Church @ 117, a beautiful event space housed in a restored



church with stained glass windows and a bell tower. "We started with the indoor events to get the word out and let people know we are serious about it," Tim McFall says. "Our goal is to have outdoor music events on the square."

So far two top high-energy bands have rocked the house. Rubiks Groove, an '80s and '90s tribute band, launched the series in February, and Vinyl Radio, a '70s tribute band, played to a full crowd in April. Burning Las Vegas, a band out of Nashville, will be headlining the 4th of July Celebration at Rotary Park in partnership with the Manchester Parks and Recreation. In August and September, the series will move back to the square. The commission hopes to present 5 to 6 music events per year.

Usually, to hear top-rated acts, you would have to travel to a bigger city. But through the financial support of several corporate sponsors, locals can listen to these acts without leaving their home town. "We are fortunate to be so close to Nashville with so many good musicians and so many good bands," McFall says.

This year when the community of Manchester comes together, there will be music, food, laughter, little ones bopping to the music, lots of smiling, and community. So mark your calendars, dust off your dancing shoes, and head downtown. It's time for a revival, Manchester style.

Manchester's proximity to several lakes and rivers makes it the ideal location to enjoy some quality time on the water. Whether it's fishing for crappies, kayaking, stand-up paddle-boarding, water-skiing or anything in between, there are plenty of places to get your feet wet.

Normandy Lake

Anglers will love this 3,160- acre lake filled with large-mouth bass, small-mouth bass, Kentucky bass, and crappie. In addition, the Duck River below Normandy Dam is regularly stocked with trout. Campgrounds and picnic areas are available making it the perfect setting for a weekend fish fry. This peaceful lake is also a great choice for paddling.

Tims Ford Lake

The largest of nearby lakes, Tims Ford stretches out over 10,700 acres with 265 miles of shoreline. It is known for being one of the most picturesque lakes in Tennessee. The deep clear water contains large populations of small-mouth bass, large-mouth bass, Kentucky bass, hybrids, crappie, and catfish. There are also numerous boat ramps, marinas, and campgrounds. Tims Ford Bass Club and the Middle Tennessee Crappie Club hold weekly fishing tournaments. If you are interested in learning more about the clubs, check out their Facebook pages.

Woods Reservoir

This 4,000-acre lake has a wide variety of fish species making it a local favorite. Considered one of the best crappie lakes in the state, Woods Reservoir is also known for its walleye, catfish, sunfish, muskie, and trophy-sized largemouth bass. Its unique surroundings make it a great place to explore. Although the lake is located at Arnold Air Force Base, it is managed by the Tennessee Wildlife Resources Agency (TWRA), and fishing is open to the public. There is also a campground available to past and present service members only.

Coy Gaither Bedford Lake

If you are looking for a little peace and quiet, the Coy Gaither Bedford Lake is the place. For over three-quarters of a century, this small 47-acre lake has been a local favorite. As one of Tennessee's family fishing lakes, it is just for fishing—no recreational canoeing, kayaking, or pleasure boating is permitted. The lake contains largemouth bass, bluegill, sunfish, black crappie and channel catfish. Anglers are welcome to bring their own boats, but gas engines are not permitted, only electric trolling motors. A \$6.50 daily lake permit is required and can be purchased from area license agents.

Elk River

Beginning at Tims Ford Lake, the Elk River flows 195 miles to Wheeler Dam in northern Alabama where it connects with the Tennessee River. The Elk River offers unique fly fishing opportunities. Cold water released into the river from Tims Ford Dam creates optimal conditions for rainbow and brown trout along a 14-mile stretch of river. This calm-water river is also a great place to float or canoe. Keep your eyes open for a glimpse of a playful North American River Otter.

Duck River

The Duck River, at 284 miles long, is the longest river located entirely in the state of Tennessee. It is also one of the most biologically diverse rivers in North America, home to more than 50 species of freshwater mussels and over 150 species of fish. The Duck River is also a popular river for floating, kayaking, and paddling.

Little Duck River

The Little Duck River is a 6.5-mile long stream that joins the Duck River in a cascading display of waterfalls at Old Stone Fort State Park. The Little Duck River Greenway in Manchester winds along the river, allowing easy access for anglers and others who want to play in the water. It's the perfect place to enjoy the sights and sounds of nature without having to leave town.

Cumberland Caverns

Cumberland Caverns located in McMinnville, Tenn., is one of the most extensive known caves in America. Portions of this caving system were originally known as Higgenbotham Cave and Henshaw Cave. Considerable exploration of previously unseen sections along with integration of the two caves substantially enlarged Cumberland Caverns to the more than 32 miles that can be toured today.

Surveyor Aaron Higgenbotham discovered Higgenbotham Cave (now a national landmark) in 1810. Venturing into the cave alone, he was trapped for three days on a high ledge when his torch went out. According to local legend, his hair had turned white by the time a rescue party found him. Aaron Higgenbotham did not penetrate very far underground, but shortly after the close of the Civil War, someone explored for over a mile in Higgenbotham Cave and discovered a huge avenue—60 ft. wide, 10 ft. high, and 2000 ft. long—the

"Ten Acre Room." The name "Shelah Waters" and the date "1869" are inscribed on the walls in candle smoke or scratched into the rock in many rather remote areas. This is the oldest name and date in the cave. Higgenbotham Cave is mentioned in old histories of Warren County as a local attraction, and Thomas L. Bailey in "Resources of Tennessee" first described it in print for 1918.

Old Stone Fort State Park

Upwards of 200,000 people visit Old Stone Fort State Archaeological Park annually, many to experience its history and others for the abundance of outdoor offerings, including its iconic cascading waterfalls. Located at the point where two rivers drop off the Highland Rim plateau, the park is rife in water sources; falls plunge from the beginning of the trail down to the depths of Tennessee's Central Basin. Long, wall-like mounds that were characteristics of the Woodland Period flank the riverside trail, and park visitors will find a set of parallel mound walls oriented to within one degree of the summer solstice sunrise at the narrow neck of land before the Little Duck and Duck rivers meet. Boasting 51 heavily wooded campsites outfitted with water and 30-amp

electrical hookups, grills, picnic tables, hard-surface pads and restroom facilities with showers, Old Stone Fort State Park is not just for day-trippers, but also appeals to those who want to spend a weekend—or longer—exploring the area with Manchester as their home base (campsite fees are \$25) a night with a two-week stay limit). The park has a museum and gift shop, a 1.25-mile perimeter trail within the ancient enclosure and four additional miles of developed trails, while the campground has its own Nature Trail.
