Auburn unveils tower plan to display bells from St. Louis Church

The tower, which will stand at 40 feet, 9 inches, will anchor the New Auburn Village Center Plan, a multiple-phase improvement plan focusing on the riverfront between Mill and Broad Streets.

The Bells of St. Louis Committee recently hosted a "Celebration and Fundraising Kick-Off" at New Auburn's Anniversary Park. Those attending were able to view the site of a new tower that will serve as the permanent home for the four bells that, for nearly a century, graced the neighborhood's former St. Louis Church.

"This tower will be the second-tallest monument in Maine," said Auburn Mayor Jason Levesque. "As a true and lasting symbol of the heritage and history of Auburn, it will stand as testament to the vibrance and resurgence of our city as we head into our next 150 years."

The bells arrived in the city in October of 1916, shortly after being cast in the world-famous Paccard Bell Foundry of Annecy, France. Once in Auburn, they were blessed and raised skyward

into the grand gothic tower of St. Louis Church, where they touched the lives of countless members of the



community for generations.

When the church was decommissioned in 2003, the Roman Catholic Diocese of Portland planned to sell the bells, but a small group of local citizens successfully moved to keep them. Thanks to the generosity of the community, the bells were purchased and preserved.

The tower to be erected in Anniversary Park (formerly "Little Andy" Park) is the result of an ongoing effort since they were purchased to create an appropriate way to permanently display the bells in New Auburn. The tower, which will stand at 40 feet, 9 inches, will anchor the New Auburn Village Center Plan, a multiple-phase improvement plan focusing on the riverfront between Mill and Broad Streets.

"Our new bell tower will grace this gateway to our city for decades to come," said Levesque. "And See Tower, page 13

Senior College art work will benefit Camp Sunshine

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

Highlights of the trip will include: the Cliffs of Moher, 400 feet high and stretching for five miles along the Atlantic coast; Cobh, last port of call for the RMS Titanic, with its colorful homes and heritage center; Dingle Peninsula,

with its incredible stretch of seaside cliffs, sheepstrewn fields, and majestic hills, described by National Geographic Traveler as "the most beautiful place on earth"; Dublin, including a tour of St. Patrick's Cathedral; and Galway, where the group will visit Glenstal Abbey, take a ferry ride to the Aran Islands, and tour Dún Aenghus, a Celtic fortress perched on cliffs overlooking the Atlantic Ocean.

Other stops on the itinerary will be: Glendalough, which features Baltinglass Abbey, sixth-century monastic ruins, and a seventh-century monastery; Kilkenny, with its famed restaurants, music halls, shops, and medieval buildings; Knock Shrine, where the Virgin Mary appeared to 15 people in 1879; Kylemore Abbey, for a tour of the elegant mansion, garden, and church set beside a tranquil lake in the heart of the Connemara mountains; Tipperary, including a visit to the Rock of Cashel, majestic church ruins clustered high on a limestone outcrop overlooking the surrounding countryside; and Trinity College, to see the Book of Kells and the Old Library's Long Room, which holds over 200,000 books.

Rounding out the trip will be a visit to Cork, Ireland's second largest city; Gallarus Oratory, a chapel built of large cut stones discovered in 1756; and historic Kilmalkedar Church in Ballyferriter, a coastal community on the Dingle Peninsula.

The tour will include round-trip Concord Coach bus transportation from Portland to Boston; roundtrip flights from Boston to Shannon and Dublin to Boston; nine dinners and ten breakfasts; hotel accommodations for ten nights; transportation on a deluxe motor coach in Ireland; visits and admission fees (per itinerary); hotel porterage, service charges, and government taxes; and gratuities for local guides.



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New bipartisan budget includes real tax relief for Mainers

It has been a crazy, busy month at the State House as we kicked things into high gear to finish up on time. It was a lot of hard work and long hours - the legislature adjourned for the summer at 6:33 a.m. on Thursday after a marathon session that began Wednesday morning - but we made it.

There are many accomplishments I'm proud of this session, but perhaps the biggest is the bipartisan budget deal we were able to reach. Ninety-nine percent of the 1,154 line-item votes taken by the Appropriations and Financial Affairs Committee were unanimous. I want to thank committee co-chairs Sen. Cathy Breen (D-Falmouth) and Rep. Drew Gattine (D-Westbrook) for their strong and fair leadership throughout these negotiations.

The two-year budget was passed by the legislature on Friday night, June 14, and was signed by the governor the following Monday. While the process was long and at times tedious, it was

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always civil, with the aim of reaching a compromise that everyone could be proud of. It was a refreshing return to normalcy and an example of how government should run.

One of the most important provisions in this budget is a real investment in property tax relief. I know every lawmaker in the state, regardless of party, has heard from you, the voters, about how property taxes keep getting higher and higher. While the previous administration promised tax cuts, the reality is that the burden was just shifted around to communities and homeowners.

When the state cut back on revenue sharing, towns and cities had little choice but to increase taxes just to keep services and schools open. That has meant that more and more Mainers have had more and more trouble paying their property taxes, with many facing the possibility of losing their home because they just couldn't afford the growing bill. Nothing about that is okay. But I want you to know we heard you in Augusta, and relief is on the way.

Our new biennial budget doesn't include any new taxes. In fact, there's an extra \$75 million for property tax relief. Thanks to the agreement we reached, the Homestead Exemption will increase by \$5,000. That means Maine homeowners can take up to \$25,000 off the valuation of their homes when they're filing their taxes. This was a huge priority for me, because this exemption specifically helps Maine residents - not tourists who happen to own a summer home on the Maine coast.

With this budget, 13,000 more Mainers will be eligible for the Property Tax Fairness Credit. Under this program, Maine seniors can save up to \$1,250 and working Mainers and families can save up to \$800 on property taxes or rent. That's more money staying in the wallets of Mainers who earned it and need it the most.

This budget also works toward restoring revenue sharing, which will help cities and towns regain their financial footing. Under this plan, revenue sharing would increase this coming year from 2 percent to 3 percent, and go up again the following year to 4 percent. This is a smart, measured step toward getting this important program back to where it should be.

I'm proud of the work that was put into crafting this budget. I know no one got everything they wanted; if they did, it wouldn't be a good compromise. But what we do have is a budget that funds programs that will help Mainers, and will help more hardworking families keep the money they earned, to spend on the things that matter the most to them.

Designed to help prevent burglary and theft from homes and motor vehicles, the program is quick and easy: police urge residents to take a few extra moments each evening to make sure their doors are locked and their garage doors are closed and secure.


"Motor vehicle burglary is a crime of convenience," said Police Chief Jason Moen. "Burglary of an unlocked motor vehicle is one of the most easily preventable crimes we have."

"There is an average of 70 motor vehicle burglary incidents each year in Auburn," said Deputy Chief Timothy Cougle. "The vast majority of these are thefts from unlocked vehicles."

As you go through your evening routine, just a few extra steps will make criminals think twice. Here's the plan. Every evening at 9 p.m., please: remove all valuables from your

vehicle; lock and secure your vehicle; lock and secure your house, garage, and out-buildings; turn on exterior lights; arm your security system, if you have one; and then report any suspicious activity in your neighborhood.

Maine Warden Service recruiting new game wardens

The Maine Warden Service is now seeking to hire several new officers. Interested candidates can obtain an application and career opportunity bulletin by visiting mainegamewarden.com.

"Maine's Game Wardens are among the State's most highly trained and trusted law officers," said Colonel Joel Wilkinson of the Maine Warden Service. "The extensive recruitment process ensures that we get the best candidates."

Created in 1880 to protect Maine's fish and wildlife, the Maine Warden Service is the state's second largest law enforcement agency. To be a successful Maine Game Warden, candidates must possess considerable knowledge of wildlife; hunting, fishing, trapping, and other related outdoor sports; a strong desire to work in law enforcement; and a willingness to work outdoors in all weather conditions.

Game wardens' key responsibilities include enforcing fish and wildlife laws, conducting search and rescue operations, enforcing recreational vehicle laws, providing safety education for hunters, trappers, boaters, snowmobilers, and ATV operators, and fostering

good relations between outdoor enthusiasts and private landowners.

The Maine Warden Service is a modern, professional, highly effective conservation law enforcement agency. Members are certified law enforcement officers with full police powers and statewide jurisdiction. Equipment issued for carrying out their responsibilities includes four-wheel drive trucks, boats, snowmobiles, ATV's, two-way radio repeater networks, portable radios, GPS units, personal computers, fixed-wing aircraft, and night vision equipment. In addition, the service maintains a critical incident management team for search and rescue activities, a dive team, and a K-9 unit.

To qualify to become a Maine Game Warden, you must be willing to locate anywhere in the State of Maine, have a high school diploma or equivalent, have no extensive motor vehicle or criminal record, be at least 21 years old (or be at least 20 years old and have completed an associate's degree or 60 credit hours of post-secondary education prior to the start of formal training at the Maine Criminal Justice Academy), and have or be able to obtain a



valid Maine Class C motor vehicle operator's license.

The selection process for a Maine Game Warden is extensive and thorough. Applicants must submit proof of having already taken and passed the ALERT and the pre-employment physical fitness test, the latter within one year of the date of application.

Applicants who meet the minimum requirements are scheduled for a written examination. Those scoring above a certain level will then take an oral board examination. Successful applicants placed on an employment register will need to pass a swim test and then will go through an extensive background check.

A final interview is conducted, and a job offer is made contingent upon the outcomes of a physical examination, polygraph examination, and a psychological examination.

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








Theater at Monmouth opens golden anniversary season with "Murder for Two"





and recreational facilities. While the camp is in session, each family stays in its own family suite. Breakfast, lunch, and dinner are served daily

Another distinctive component of the program is the medical facilities and professional staff that are available to address the taxing physical needs of children with intrusive diseases. A physician is located at the camp for the entire session, so families can be secure in the knowledge that the camp offers 24-hour onsite medical support. In addition, a hospital with full-time emergency room physicians and pediatricians is only 25 minutes away.

Bereavement sessions are also offered for families who have experienced the death of a child from a supported illness.

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
