



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

Camille Horne, commanding officer of the 127th Force Support Squadron. "Given [her] altruistic nature, she solicited 127th FSS members to help out with this high profile IRT."

Horne had no doubt that Porleadership and outstanding service and the feedback from IRT leadership supported this. Once on-the-ground in Alaska, Porter was given responsibility to lead a team of junior enlisted Airmen. she brought the group together quickly.

"Master Sgt. Porter had a [group] with very little cooking experience and within the first week they became a team," Capt. Alyson White, Newtok to Mertarvik Relocation IRT officer in charge, said. "[They] were able to keep the troops happy throughout like Porter and her team.

Airman 1st Class Dominic Raona of the 127th Force Support Squadron also received excellent feedback. White thanked Horne for sending Raona.

"Raona was constantly looking for ways to help out and support fellow Airmen and always had a great attitude about him," White said. "I hope he shares his IRT experience with the Squadron and shows off the work that he helped complete."

Selfridge History Notes: July

 Julv 1, 1971 — Command passed from the active duty Air Force's. Air Defense Command to the Michigan Air National Guard, changing the name of the base to Selfridge Air National Guard Base. The first ANG commander was Lt. Col. (later Brig. Gen.) Rudolph D. Bartholomew. This change was the first active, Air Force Base to come under ANG control.

 July 8, 1917 — The first military flight occurred at Selfridge Field when Capt. Byron Q. Jones, took to the air in a Curtiss JN-4 Jenny.

 July 20, 1948 — The first transatlantic flight by fighter aircraft took place when 16 F-80 Shooting Stars, led by Col. David C. Schilling, launched from Selfridge, bound for West Germany during the Berlin Airlift. This was the first such transatlantic flight in Air Force history.

Byron Q. Jones, the first base commander, made the flights in a Curtiss JN-4D Jenny only seven days after the field was activated as a military installation. On July 16, 1917, he stood up the first pilot training school here.The "Jenny", was a twin-seat, dual-control biplane. Its tractor propeller and maneuverability made it ideal for initial pilot training with a 90 hp Curtiss OX-5 V8 engine, giving a top speed of 75 mph and a service ceiling of 6,500 ft.


Selfridge History Notes: August

Aug. 12, 1908 - Lts. Frank P. Lahm, Bejamin D. Foulois, and Thomas E. Selfridge began the first, official American airship tests at Fort Myer, Virg.

• Aug. 27, 1917 — The 107th Fighter Squadron was first organized as the 107th Aero Squadron at Kelly Field, Texas in response to the U.S. entry into World War I earlier that year. The unit was demobilized and disbanded in March 1919, following the conclusion of the war.

• Aug. 31, 1931 - Michigan's first state-owned airport officially opened in Alpena County as Captain Phelps Collins Field. It's now known as the Alpena Combat Readiness Training Center.

Top guardsmen, late Soldiers and Airmen honored at Michigan National Guard Memorial Pass in Review

Michigan Gov. Gretchen Whitmer and Maj. Gen. Paul Rogers, adjutant general, Michigan National Guard, presided over the Michigan National Guard Memorial and Pass in Review ceremony at Camp Grayling Joint Maneuver Training Center, Mich., June 28, 2019.

At the annual tribute to Michigan National Guard members deceased in the last calendar vear. Whitmer and Rogers also presented medals and trophies to the Michigan National Guard's Soldiers and Airmen of the year for 2018-19. The event was attended by approximately 150 family members and guests, with more than 400 Soldiers and Airmen participating in the formal "Pass in Review" tradition.

It was the first time for Whitmer and Rogers to have officiated the event since the beginning of Whitmer's administration January 1.

In their remarks, Whitmer and Rogers emphasized the accomplishments of the Michigan National Guard over the past 12 months, including support for exercise Northern Strike, a signature annual readiness event hosted by the Michigan National Guard at Camp Grayling and Alpena Combat Readsummer. Beginning in 2012, Northern Strike has grown of Defense's largest joint, reserve component exercise.
