

## Grand opening of newly relocated Fire Station 21 celebrated Jan. 23

Vice Mayor Rose Herrera, the San Jose Fire Department and other dignitaries gathered with the Evergreen community to celebrate the grand opening and ribbon cutting of Fire Station 21 on Jan. 23.

The new fire station, built by Sausal Corporation for more than \$5 million, is located at 2100 White Rd. across from Lake Cunningham Park. The fire house was previously located on Mt. Pleasant Rd. Groundbreaking for Fire Station 21 occurred on Aug. 29, 2014. "Public Safety is one of the most important functions of a city," states Vice Mayor Rose Herrera, "With the construction of this state-of-the-art fire station, our fire personnel will have the most modern design which allows the fire crews to have quicker access to fire apparatus to reduce response time within the station itself. The practical function of this new station matches its esthetically pleasing design - in my opinion, one of the most beautiful stations in the city."

The new station is comprised of 8,750 sq. ft. with a community room, five dormitory rooms and three engine bays. The station also can be expanded to 11,500 *See STATION, page 5*

### **Top tips for riders during Super Bowl 50 week**

altrain is serving Super Bowl 50 fans when the biggest football game of the year comes to Levi's Stadium on Feb. 7, 2016.

Whether you plan to attend the NFL Experience in San Francisco, Opening Night Fueled by Gatorade in San Jose or the Super Bowl itself in Santa Clara, Caltrain can get you there.

Because thousands of people are expected to visit the area and may be using Caltrain to get them around, we'd like to offer all passengers our Top Tips during Super Bowl week:

1. Go to Caltrain's website for updates: The Super Bowl 50 Host Committee has been adding pre-Super Bowl concerts and events for the last few weeks, and will likely add more activities as the event nears. Visit www.caltrain.com/SB50events for all the latest information and special train service updates.

2. Pre-purchase Option for SB50 Attendees: Anyone can ride our system, but if you are planning to go to the Super Bowl, Caltrain and VTA will be offering a special joint ticket for SB50 attendees. Game day attendees will need to purchase the ticket in advance using VTA's mobile ticketing app under the fares tab. Details can be found on VTA's Levi's Stadium page. Caltrain customers can also travel using their Clipper cards or by purchasing a regular ticket at Ticket Vending Machines. The joint Caltrain/VTA ticket will not be sold at Caltrain's TVMs. Customers planning to transfer to light rail on Super Bowl Sunday must have pre-purchased their mobile ticket and must have a valid Super Bowl ticket to use VTA's light rail system. VTA will be offering a bus bridge for non-Super Bowl attendees.

3. Learn the NFL Bag Policy: Customers

attending the Super Bowl should be aware of the NFL's bag policy. For safety and security, bags must be clear plastic and no larger than 12" x 6" x 12" on game day. No other bags will be allowed into the stadium and they will not offer a "bag check" area or lockers for attendees. For those planning to visit Super Bowl City, there is a list of prohibited items, such as bags larger than 18" X 18" in size, coolers and bikes that cannot be taken into the venue.

4. Take the SB 50 Special Train Service: If you are going to the big game on Feb. 7, Caltrain encourages you to take one of the three special Super Bowl Baby Bullet trains to the Mountain View station before transferring to the VTA light rail. Regular weekend service trains are already quite busy. While any passenger regardless of destination can take one of the SB Baby Bullet trains, the special service has been added to accommodate the extra riders going to SB50.

ogy where he served as vice president in their financial organization.

A resident of Evergreen since 1987, Waite believes he is best qualified for the challenges confronting the City of San Jose with his extensive financial and corporate experience.

"I want to ensure that government at the speed of business is the expectation, not the exception that it is today," said Waite. "I am the only candidate for City Council in District 8 with the breadth and depth of financial knowledge and experience to help ensure that our city fulfills its obligations in delivering critical core services that all city residents deserve," he said. "I look forward to working on our district's behalf to build a sustainable financial model for our city."

"I love our city, and Evergreen has been a great place to live and raise my family," said Waite. discuss the fact that San Jose has long term financial obligations totaling over \$13 billion dollars. "Think about it...that's \$13,000 for every man, woman, and child in our city, explained Waite. "It's composed of debt, unfunded retiree obligations, and deferred maintenance costs."

A graduate of the Community Leadership San Jose/Silicon Valley class of 2006, Waite is heavily involved in San Jose's nonprofit community, and currently serves as board chair at Expandability, a local nonprofit that provides school to career transition services and job placement services to youth, young adults, and adults with disabilities. He also serves as chair of the finance team at the St. Francis of Assisi Catholic Community in Evergreen. He previously served in various leadership roles with Archbishop Mitty High School, Catholic Charities, and Citizens for Fiscal Responsibility.

Waite graduated Magna cum laude from Northern Illinois University with a B.S. in Economics and a Political Science minor. He received an M.B.A. from the Atkinson Graduate School of Management at Willamette University in Salem, Oregon, graduating with highest honors. He lives in Evergreen with Ginny, his wife of thirty four years. Their two adult children, one grandchild and one grandchild-to-be live in the Bay Area.

# Silver Creek High senior named candidate in U.S. Presidential Scholars Program

Senior at Silver Creek High School, has been named a candidate in the 2016 U.S. Presidential Scholars Program.

The candidates were selected from nearly 3.3 million students expected to graduate from U.S. high schools in the year 2016.

Inclusion in the U.S. Presidential Scholars Program, now in its 52nd year, is one of the highest honors bestowed upon graduating high school seniors. Scholars are selected on the basis of superior academic and artistic achievements, leadership qualities, strong character and involvement in community and school activities.

"I am incredibly humbled and honored to be recognized by the 2016 US Presidential Scholars Program," said Sabrina. "Personally, it validates all the late nights I have stayed up studying and all the hard work I have put in these past four years," she said. "It motivates me to continue working hard towards my dream of making a difference in our community and hopefully, the world we live in."

The U.S. Presidential Scholars Program was established in1964 by Executive Order of the President to recognize some of our nation's most distinguished graduating seniors for their accomplishments in many areas: academic success, leadership, and service to school and com-

munity. It was expanded in 1979 to recognize students demonstrating exceptional scholarship and talent in the visual, creative, and performing arts. In 2015, the program was expanded once again to recognize students who demonstrate ability and accomplishment in career and technical fields.

Annually, up to 161 U.S. Presidential Scholars are chosen from among that year's senior class, representing excellence in education and the promise of greatness in America's youth. All Scholars are invited to Washington, DC in June for the National Recognition Program, featuring various events and enrichment activities and culminating in the presentation of the Presidential Scholars Medallion during a White House-sponsored ceremony.

A distinguished panel of educators will review these submissions and select 800 semifinalists in early April. The Commission on Presidential Scholars, a group of up to 32 eminent citizens appointed by the President, will select the finalists, and the U.S. Department of Education will announce the Scholars in May.

Scholars will be invited to Washington, DC, for several days in June to receive the Presidential Scholars Medallion at a recognition ceremony and to participate in events and activities.

### Evergreen College approves committee to move forward with 27-acre development

The San Jose Evergreen Community College Board of Trustees approved the creation of a closed committee ("Asset Management Committee") with the goal of moving forward on the proposed development of the 27 acres on the college site.

This committee has stated its goal of moving forward to the Planning Commission and City Council sometime in late 2016 with zoning approvals by 2018. The controversial project will be called Montgomery Place and will feature high density housing and commercial development.

The plan includes: 125 to 250 apartments, 80 to 150 senior apartments, up to 40,000 sq. ft. of retail, and 18,000 to 40,000 sq. ft. of office space with a gym. The District is also considering building an aquat-

ics center that would be used by the school and also be open to the public. The district would lease the ground to a real estate developer but retain ownership of the land, which it says is not needed for expansion of the academic program.

"It's all part of providing stable, long-term funding for the college, which operates two schools," said Douglas R. Smith, vice chancellor of administrative services. "We want it to integrate well with the community college," said Smith.

Many Evergreen Valley College students have expressed displeasure about the proposal to develop the south campus into a strip mall. Many believe that the land can be better utilized to build a baseball diamond or a football field. The only sport Evergreen offers is men and women's soccer.

"Students aren't interested in going to a half-baked community college becoming a landlord of an ugly strip mall instead of building state-of-the-art teaching facilities," said college student Greg Moore. "

The City of San Jose will review and approve all land use entitlements. The City will review all environmental matters including but not limited to traffic and noise. The City will also evaluate the proposed use in conjunction with the City's adopted general plan and zoning for the Surplus Land. No public money will be used to build the project. Once it's leased to a developer, they will be responsible for all the costs.

The *Evergreen Times* will update readers as the process moves forward.

# **Hotels big winners for Super Bowl 50**

hile no one can be sure who will win the 2016 NFL Championship, one thing is for certain: hotels in the greater Santa Clara area are already winning big.

According to forward-looking hotel data from TravelClick, hotels that are

located around the Big Game (including San Francisco and San Jose - totaling 216 hotels and more than 52,000 rooms) are seeing significant increases in demand and commanding increases in rates.

From Feb. 4 through 8, 2016, overall committed occupancy is up 11.7 percent and average daily rates (ADR) have increased by a whopping 91.6 percent year-over-year. The majority of this demand is being driven by corporate and group business, while transient (individual) bookings are softer.

### Chaboya opts out of science fair

Chaboya will not be participating in this year's traditional school and district science fair that has been past practice for 25 years, according to Chaboya's physical science teacher, Irene Khor.

This year the science department has decided to change protocol for at least one year. The objective of school and district science fairs is to encourage and highlight the use of the "scientific" process and the fundamental principles of science.

'Students are guided in their development of a topic, complete the required research, and then conduct an experiment or engineering project that shows an understanding for many of the processes of science," said Khor. "They also make available an opportunity to recognize "student" scientists."

With the implementation of the new NGSS and STEM standards, the science department feels that students have had ample opportunities to meet these district objectives by performing experiments and engineering projects by doing research and presentations throughout the year through a variety of science topics that better align with the new science concepts that are being taught. With the challenge of implementing the new standards, we feel that time can be used more productively by continuing with these practices while learning about the new concepts simultaneously.

Chaboya Science Showcase April 2016 A new Chaboya tradition that has had great success has been to showcase student work in all subject areas at the Open House in late April. Science projects that have been completed by students throughout the year will be chosen to represent that teacher at the showcase much like a school fair. Students who have been chosen will receive ribbons just like the school fair.

Meadowfair has more than 450 students that have to cross Tully or Capitol to get to school. Additionally, with the forthcoming Arcadia Development in the community, there could also be as many as 125 new students in need of an area school.

Enrollment projections district-wide indicate a drop of approximately 1700 students over the next 4-5 years, a drop that is already affecting Dove Hill, which currently has 18 empty classrooms. Nearby Montgomery Elementary School has 12 empty classrooms.

school that would serve Meadowfair families which would mean moving Dove Hill students from other neighborhoods. There are nearly 300 students that would be affected next year according to demographic estimates.

During the public meeting pertaining to this possible new project the District heard from an engaged and passionate group of community members. Those attending the meeting shared their thoughts and suggestions as to how the District should proceed.

"Ultimately, whichever way we decide to proceed, we will shortly be forming a committee made up of members of the community that will help set priorities and determine next steps," said Cathy Gomez, Superintendent, Evergreen School District. 'We will keep the community in the loop as we move forward."

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

ven during difficult years, the business did well. By 1938 the brothers had moved into their own plant on Julian Street near the northern edge of downtown San Jose.

At the time, in the Santa Clara Valley, there weren't many places to eat out. Most of the area's restaurants that served breakfast bought Eggo batter for making waffles. As a merchandising bonus, the company provided waffle houses with free use and maintenance of the waffle irons.

Brother Tony Dorsa had a high level of business prowess. Frank was good with his hands; he liked to design and build the manufacturing equipment. The third founding brother, Sam, was a genius at keeping all the trucks and other motorized equipment working. The differences among the brothers sometimes led to friction, but it was also their differences that made them a successful team.

That calamitous morning in 1946. Frank and his family were enjoying a vacation in Yosemite. Frank placed a routine call to his business and was unable to get through. It was from an AT&T telephone operator that Frank learned his business had gone up in flames during the preceding night. Recalling the loss, Frank shook his head slowly, hands clasped and elbows braced on his knees.

I was scarcely able to imagine what kind of setback this devastating event must have been for the family. I allowed him his moment of silent reflection. Then, trying to brighten the mood, I asked, "So what was the best thing that ever hap-pened to the family business?" Frank looked up and grinned: "The fire."

At the time of the fire, Frank had told me that a railroad spur made it possible for food products to be loaded and unloaded adjacent to the plant. His speculation was that hobos may have accidentally contributed to the start of the fire. No specific cause was ever found.

The restaurant owners who served breakfast understood the temporary predicament. No one had waffle batter, and that was just the way it was. For them, it meant that their menus were short an item for a little while. Under a mutual understanding, competitors filled Eggo's spaces on store shelves with their brands of mayonnaise and potato chips until the business got back on its feet.

Within a few days of the fire, the brothers had set up shop under a huge tent.

Insurance covered all losses. From the insurance companies Eggo bought back the fire-damaged, but salvageable, production-line equipment for a fraction of its value. The balance of the insurance monies made it possible to modernize the plant.

The result was a state-of-the-art factory-beautiful, bigger, and better in every imaginable way. For Eggo, greater efficiency led to growth and to continuous economic rewards.

In the postwar boom of the 1950s, the Dorsa brothers decided to branch further into the burgeoning retail market. Frank designed and built the machinery and production line for producing the frozen product that soon became famous as Eggo Waffles.

It was on another childhood visit to San Jose from our home in Long Beach, when I was about 14, that I saw the original Eggo Waffle production line in its final phase of development. Frank's carousel-like device was waist high, some 30 feet across, and powered by a real merrygo-round motor.

Imagine dozens of restaurant waffle irons mounted on the carousel and bolted down. Roller skate wheels were attached to each lid. As the structure revolved, each waffle iron passed a stationary side bar and one by one the roller wheels traveled up the bar, slowly opening the lids. Batter was shot from a tube onto the hot iron, and the lid gently closed. The speed of movement of the carousel was timed to correspond to the requisite cooking period. At the other end of the cycle, with the aid of the skate wheels, each waffle iron was reopened. Uniformed women wearing white aprons and hairnets removed the square waffles with table forks. flipping them onto an adjacent conveyor belt. Golden-brown waffles were then packaged and stacked on six-foot-high racks. Workers pushed filled racks into huge walk-in refrigerator rooms where the waffles were flashfrozen.

A new and larger plant was eventually built on Eggo Way near McKee Road and Highway 101 in San Jose. The company turned out thousands of waffles per hour and had the capacity to hold 40,000 cases of waffles in cold storage.

One day there was an unexpected visit by a representative of the County Department of Sanitation

"I was always very busy," Frank recalled, "but when someone from Sanitation arrived, we always gave visits and concerns our prompt attention. They had the authority to shut us down in the blink of an eve.

On that particular day the inspector was a young woman of about five foot five inches, with dark brown hair, glasses, and a blue hard hat. A row of Paper Mate pens sprouted from her left shirt pocket. And of course she also had an official Santa Clara County Department of Sanitation clipboard.

The young woman asked for a tour of the entire plant.

"She was wet behind the ears," Frank told me, "and I couldn't wait to get rid of her. I had other work, important work, to do.

In the middle of the production floor was a structure big enough to hold four 55-gallon containers. That day there were just two, each made of heavyduty cardboard half an inch thick. The upper half of the 6by-6-foot structure was made of a fly-proof mesh.

The Sanitation official leaned into the tiny structure and asked what was in the two containers. The two lids were removed. Both units were full and held tiny white granules.

Frank touched his index finger to his tongue and dipped the moistened tip into the nearer container. "This one is sugar, so that one has to be salt."

Frank chuckled ruefully as he recounted what happened next. The kid from the Department of Sanitation whipped out her little official pen and started writing on the official Department of Sanitation papers attached to her little official clipboard. I asked, 'What's the problem?'

"She told me-boy, did she tell me! 'You can't put your finger in your mouth and then into food containers for any reason, not even to determine which is sugar and which is salt.'

'For thousands of years cooks have used the finger-taste method to differentiate sugar from salt. We had always done it that way'

Poor Uncle Frank got written up. He eventually got a copy of the young lady's Department of Sanitation report, and it wasn't complimentary. Frank soon found a better way to distinguish sugar from salt. "I attached labels to the containers," he said.

The brothers' Eggo food company was sold in 1966, and Frank retired a wealthy man. He continued to design, tinker, and build many of his ideas in his home workshop in Saratoga, California, for three decades thereafter.

In a lengthy obituary in the San Jose Mercury News, dated January 18, 1996, the paper's Local & State headline read. "Frank Dorsa, 88, king of frozen waffles, dies." The article recapped Frank Dorsa's life long successful business adventure. That and a 2011 newspaper article helped me to fill in some of the unknowns about Frank. But it was my first-hand knowledge of the man and his stories that have always fascinated me.

Today, the distinctive red and gold Eggo Waffle logo is recognized across the United States. as well as in Canada and Mexico. The Dorsa brothers' product, now manufactured by Kellogg, is enjoyed each morning by millions of people.

A group of 32 students from Clark, ranging from 2nd grade to 6th grade, attended the *Super Kids* 




*Super Sharing Drive* event at Santa Clara University to help sort out all the items donated.

eukodystrophy, Aicardi Syndrome, Gestermann's Syndrome, and Stendhal Syndrome are just four of the many health disorders that most people are not aware of.

Various disorders like these are affecting the world around us, and we should try our best to help. But how is it possible to help, if you don't know? In this "Stay Aware" column, I want to inform the readers about the different health issues or disorders, starting off with a wellknown disorder, Autism.

What is it?

From 2008 to 2010 the rate of people having Autism has increased from 1 in 150, to 1 in 68 of US population. Autism is a disorder in which the development of the brain is slow. This is characterized by impaired verbal communication, a lack of social communication, and repetitive behavior. In Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD), the "spectrum" ranges from low to high functioning, based on behavior and capability.

The cause of ASD cannot be limited to one particular thing. One of the many theories of obtaining autism starts from the pregnancy stages. According to a Harvard study published on Dec. 18, 2014, breathing in smoke conditions or smog fumes by vehicles might double the risk of obtaining autism. Because of the immense neuron growth during the third stage of pregnancy, inhaling those toxins could affect the development of brain of the baby.

### What are the symptoms?

Every autistic individual is unique as they can never share the same exact symptoms as another person with ASD. Some characteristics of a person with ASD include: poor eye contact when talking, having difficulty in absorbing others' emotions and repeating certain phrases or sentences.
