The mission of the Fair Board, which produces the fair, is "to promote and provide education about agriculture, to build our youth into productive citizens, and to offer entertainment celebrating the traditional values of the community."

Each day of the fair brings a new headlining event. The fair is huge.

There may be as many as 10,000 individual exhibits at the fair, said Shafer.

For the carnival, Michigan-based Big Rock Amusements features a line-up of 27 unique rides for fair-goers of all ages on Armada Fair midway, including the Giant Wheel that towers 80 feet above the midway and gives riders in the six-passenger gondolas a bird's eye view of everything.

The beer tent features live music each night of the fair, with the alt rockers The Gobies playing Friday and Saturday.

All of the events and exhibits are free with fair admission.

Regular admission for adults (age 13+): \$10.00; children (ages 9-12): \$2.00; children (ages eight and under): free.

Tuesday, August 14, is military appreciation day. Admission is free with valid ID.

Wednesday, August 15 is senior day; admission is \$8 for those 62 and older.

Parking is \$5 a day or \$25 for the week.

Hours of operation: Gates open at 8 a.m. Barns open at 10 a.m. The carnival runs 1-11 p.m. The fairgrounds close daily at midnight.


