

"The core of the Almaden Art & Wine Festival has always been the community," says Almaden Valley Women's Club President Jenny Teixeira. "It's about families and friends coming together to enjoy an afternoon of music, art, delicious food and local wines."

The Almaden Art and Wine Festival also has booths set up for local area businesses who can sponsor the event giving back to the commu-

Kren Rassmussen, owner of Bloomsters, knows a little about giving back to the community via the Festival. His business, Bloomsters, has participated in the Festival for more than 20 years. "Almaden is such a unique township," he says. "It's very family-oriented and pretty unique. You get a real sense of a neighborhood here." Resident interrupts Wasserman regarding SJUSD's plan

anta Clara County Supervisor Mike Wasserman recently addressed a packed house at an Almaden Valley Community Association meeting.

He spoke from the heart about the mass shooting at the Gilroy Garlic Festival, housing the homeless, and emergency planning.

However, many of the residents had one thing on their minds: San Jose Unified School District's (SJUSD) plan to replace Leland High School and Bret Harte Middle School with low-income housing and relocate the schools to property adjacent to Harry and McKean Roads. When pressed on the issue, Wasserman read a prepared statement. Dissatisfied residents expressed their concern and asked him to look further into the matter.

Gilroy Garlic Festival

"Last month's shooting...was a senseless tragedy that has rocked our community and shocked the world," says Wasserman in his newsletter. "My heart goes out to the families affected. I am grateful to all of our first responders and law enforcement personnel for their quick actions."

Stephen Romero (6), Keyla Salazar (13), and Trevor Irby (25) were killed, and 15 others injured in the attack, including Romero's mother and grandmother.

A woman was standing by the stage when she noticed a man coming through the fence carrying a gun. She exclaimed to him, "What the "F?" Hearing her voice, he swerved away from the crowd and shot her and her husband. He strode towards the couple lying on the ground. The man was unconscious. "Are you okay?" he asked the woman, standing above her. She didn't respond. "She knew in her $heart, "says \, Wasserman, "that \, if \, she$ See QUESTIONS, page 16

Added trails means more backpacking coming to Grant County Park

he County of Santa Clara Parks and Recreation Department is planning some major changes for Joseph D. Grant County Park in the hills east of Evergreen.

An additional 1155 acres are slated to be opened for public use, including a first for the park: backpack camping.

The additional acreage lies on the remote southeast corner of the park and was acquired by the county in 2012 from former San Jose Sharks captain Owen Nolan. Planning for public use of the area, known as the Sulphur Springs Ranch, began in earnest last year. The parks and recreation department gathered public input at a February 2019 workshop and through a follow-up survey.

Tentative plans include opening several miles of multi-use trails in the new section of the park and establishing a camping area for backpackers. While there are no plans for bringing potable water to the remote campsites, the county does plan to install a vault toilet, according to Michael Hettenhausen, associate planner in the parks and recreation department. Hettenhausen envisions four backcountry campsites for up to four persons each, with flat sites for tents and cooking stones for camp stoves. There may also be a separate zone for backpack campers to pick their own sites within the zone.

Hettenhausen is excited about the Sulphur Springs Ranch addition and the opportunities it affords outdoor enthusiasts. "There's a real feeling of remoteness to the area," he says. In addition to backcountry camping, a new trail along the Isabel Ridge will offer views not only of Lick Observatory on Mount Hamilton, but also of the distant Santa Cruz Mountains.







office has fielded numerous complaints of vehicles stored or abandoned on city streets, plus occupied motor homes settling into neighborhoods for stays that exceed the 72-hour limit. It's not just an issue in District 10, but

Our Department of Transportation personnel responded to 55,000 vehicle abatement requests in the one-year period from July 2017 to June 2018 alone — over 150 per day, every day of the year!

Those who have contacted the city or used their MySan-Jose app to report offending vehicles know that some people game the system and are able to stay one step ahead of parking enforcement which is stretched thin covering our 180.5 square miles. The sys-

tem already has big loopholes that make it difficult to prevent people from using streets as public storage for their vehicles, making it hard for residents and visitors to find parking in some neighborhoods. Now, the state Legislature is proposing to make enforcement even more difficult for our

Department of Transportation's parking enforcement personnel and the SJPD by passing AB 516.

Two troubling features of the bill that was passed by the State Assembly and is now waiting for a vote in the State Senate are: 1) the 72-hour rule will be extended to a 5-business day rule (which can mean

> 7 or more days); and, 2) law enforcement would no longer be allowed to tow the vehicles of people who have received FIVE citations - even though they have not made any effort to resolve these citations. The official city position on this bill "Oppose unless remains Amended."

> I told the San José Spotlight in a recent interview, it will make the city less effective at handling things like stolen or abandoned vehicles, increase blight and make our citizens more frustrated than they already are.

There's also the aromatic Sulphur Creek itself, dotted with Sulphur springs similar to those in Alum Rock Park, though on a smaller scale.

There are still some bureaucratic and logistics hurdles to overcome before Sulphur Springs Ranch opens to the public. Hettenhausen will be briefing the SCC Parks and Recreation Commission in October once recommendations are finalized. He'll then take their input and try to gain commission approval in December. Eventually, he hopes to have final approval from the county board of supervisors by spring 2020. After that, work will commence on trails, bridges, and the campsites. The Sulphur Springs Ranch section will likely open to the public in 2021, contingent on all

approvals and staff and funding availabil-

Joseph D. Grant County Park is the largest of Santa Clara County's parks with 10,882 acres. It currently has 51 miles of trails, of which 41 miles are open to mountain bikers and 46 miles to equestrians. It also has family tent campsites with hot showers for \$34 per night and group picnic and youth camping areas.

Camping reservations can be made at gooutsideandplay.org or by calling (408) 355-2201. The park entrance is on Mount Hamilton Road, eight miles from the Alum Rock Avenue junction.

Mayor Liccardo proposes ordinance to reduce public cost of gun violence, fund efforts to combat gun violence

"Harm reduction" model to combat gun violence, by mandating Gun Liability Insurance

ayor Sam Liccardo is proposing a city ordinance that would require all firearm owners in San Jose to carry liability insurance for their weapons, the first such requirement in the nation.

Those gun owners unable to purchase liability insurance could pay a fee to compensate taxpayers for the public costs of firearm violence in America's tenth largest city.

Two weeks after San Jose families lost two children in the recent Gilroy shooting, Mayor Liccardo observed that "A mayor doesn't have the luxury of just offering 'thoughts and prayers'—we have to solve problems. While this is far from a complete solution, it is something we can do to reduce the harms of firearms, without waiting for Congress to take action." said Mayor Liccardo.

"Under current Supreme Court rulings, the 2nd Amendment to the US Constitution protects the right to keep and bear arms. However, the Constitution does not require taxpayers to subsidize that individual choice. The cost of city police and emer-

gency services required to address gun violence should be paid by gun owners, not all taxpayers," continued Mayor Liccardo.

Mayor Liccardo compared his approach to the successful "harm reduction" strategies that have helped dramatically lower smok-

ing rates and deaths and injuries from automobile accidents.

"We require motorists to carry automobile insurance, and the insurance industry appropriately encourages and rewards safe driver behavior. We tax tobacco consumption both to discourage risky behavior and to make sure non-smokers are not forced to subsidize the substantial public health costs generated by smoking-related illnesses and deaths. These successful public health models inspire a similar "harm reduction" approach for firearms," Liccardo said.

"As Silicon Valley's largest city, if we prove up this innovative solution and scale it across other cities and states, the history of "harm reduction" efforts instructs that we can make a long-term impact," Liccardo added.

In addition to an insurance-or-fee mandate, Mayor Liccardo also proposed:

1. Imposing gun and ammunition sales taxes to help fund gun safety classes, gun violence prevention programs, and additional victim assistance services for survivors of gun violence.

2. Exploring a consent-to-search program for juveniles, which would allow parents to consent to have local

3. Creating a program that would offer cash rewards to anyone who reports someone who possesses unlawfully-obtained guns or weapons.

International competition launches to create a Silicon Valley icon

Silicon Valley has no icon. For more than 50 years the area has had an international reputation as the world's leading region for technology, business innovation and venture capital. In all that time, no monument has been built to symbolize its prestige.

But this week, a group of local philanthropists launched Urban Confluence Silicon Valley, a worldwide ideas competition to create a recognizable landmark just northwest of downtown San Jose — on Arena Green in Guadalupe River Park — one they hope will rival the Eiffel Tower in Paris or the Gateway Arch in St. Louis.

"We thought it was odd that an area as important as ours didn't have a monument," said Steve Borkenhagen, executive director of the San Jose Light Tower Corporation, a nonprofit group founded by Borkenhagen, Jon Ball and Thomas Wohlmut to manifest the missing icon

He says the group has raised more than \$1 million from hundreds of donors to finance the contest and the construction of the monument.

The nonprofit takes its name from San Jose's first, and last, international symbol — a 237-foot light tower that could be seen from San Francisco — a 19th century technological wonder making it the first city west of the Rocky Mountains to light itself using electricity in 1881.

But the tower did not endure. It survived the 1906 earthquake that destroyed many of the surrounding structures. But strong winds toppled it in 1915, and more than a century later, nothing has emerged to replace it.

The original concept the non-profit came up with was to create a 21st century version of the tower near its original location at the corner of Market and Santa Clara streets.

Although the light tower continues to be an inspiration for the project, Borkenhagen said the group opened up to a wider set of possibilities after that idea received a lukewarm reception from the public. Part of the excitement around the project will be examining new ideas the founders of the group

never envisioned, he added.

"We've come a long way from our original notion of a light tower," Borkenhagen said, noting that the competition takes its name from the confluence of the Guadalupe and Covote Rivers.

It's a good thing too, says Bob Staedler, a land use consultant who worked in San Jose's redevelopment agency for 12 years.

"The starting premise was off putting," Staedler said. "Trying to replicate the past to make it seem iconic is futile."

Former newspaper publisher David Cohen, who also serves on the Urban Confluence Silicon Valley community task force, says he wasn't excited about the original concept either.

"Back in the day, the light tower was monumental, but today if it were replicated it would only be a relic," Cohen said.

Even with the change in direction, Staedler says he's not confident the project will achieve its

"I'm extremely skeptical on this," he said. "But I don't make it a habit to tell other people how to spend their time and money, so as long as it's not draining the general fund, God bless them."

Staedler said the city should focus on expanding its trails and maintaining its parks for the people who live here, rather than building a monument for tourists.

But Borkenhagen says the monument will be a source of civic pride, something that is sorely lacking, conspicuous by its absence in a place with an oversized ego in many other ways.

"Silicon Valley has great selfesteem in certain areas," Borkenhagen said. "Intellectually and technologically, but we don't have a place that causes people to have that feeling of awe that these great icons and landmarks do. That was our original motivation."

That said, the nonprofit is not looking for an artist's interpretation of the tech industry.

"We are in Silicon Valley, but we don't want this to be an homage to the microchip or bro-culture or coding or any of that stuff," the executive director said.

The group started soliciting entries urbanconfluencesiliconvalley.submittable.com/submit for the contest on Tuesday and Borkenhagen says he expects hundreds, if not thousands, of applications. The deadline to submit is October 15. Next, up to 50 submissions will be selected by a community panel for a public exhibition in November. Those entries will go before a distinguished panel of artists, designers and place-makers, which will select three finalists.

The finalists will each be given \$150,000 to develop their ideas and make their final presentations to the panel in May 2020. Borkenhagen says construction on the winning entry will begin later that year and continue into 2021.

It can't come soon enough for Cohen, who arrived in Silicon Valley 35 years ago when "in terms of architecture, San Jose was the most boring place in the universe." In other words, he's been waiting for this for a long time.

"There's no iconic structure that speaks to the innovation that has come out of this area and I think it is going to be fascinating to watch it happen with this project," Cohen said

battlefield. He carried the flag that represented his kingdom which was used as a means of communication in battle, and he was expected to defend it with his life. Losing the flag to the enemy would mean disruption in communication, confusion for the soldiers and finally defeat. The flag was considered a symbol of purity, it was not allowed to touch the ground and must never fall into enemy hands. In the event of being attacked, the flag bearer would throw the flag to a comrade. Strength and accuracy were critical skills as the flag had to be thrown long distances to ensure the saving of the flag and keeping it away from battle.

Today, what was once a frontline necessity has gradually morphed into a ceremonial art form that lives on and is part of the present day medieval and renaissance themed festivals, palios, parades and other historical pageants in Emilia Romagna, Tuscany, Umbria and the many regions of Italy.

This year, Festa goers can experience this colorful display of pageantry as the flag throwers parade through the streets of the Italian Family Festa and entertain us with their astonishing flag throwing performance accompanied by the sound of drums and trumpets. This is a once in a lifetime opportunity to experience old world Italian traditions in Santa Clara Valley.





had, he would've killed her." The gunman moved on. Hearing gunshots, the police started coming and the crowd started running away. "If she hadn't gotten his attention," says Wasserman, "there were so many people there..."

Wasserman visited four of the survivors at Valley Medical Center and commended the hospital staff who he says, "dropped everything and worked long past their shifts ended to provide world-class care for the victims

County hospitals

Victims of the shooter were first rushed to St. Louise Hospital for treatment. Based upon their injuries, some were transported to Valley Medical Center or Stanford Hospital.

"Thank God St. Louise was open because...several of the people would not have made the 40-mile drive [to another hospital]," says Wasserman.

Santa Clara County acquired O'Connor and St. Louise Hospitals, as well as the DePaul Urgent Care Center in December: a \$235 million purchase. St. Louise is the only hospital open 24-7 with an emergency room in south county serving Gilroy, Morgan Hill and San Martin.

Wasserman says he fought hard for Santa Clara County to acquire the hospitals to prevent them from closure.

"The two hospitals and the clinic are essential to the lives of the

residents who would have been left without nearby emergency care," says Santa Clara County Supervisor Dave Cortese.

On June 30, the county passed their \$8.1 billion budget. The purchase of the two hospitals added a billion and a half dollars and 2,000 employees. "We are the third or fourth largest hospital system in the nation," says Wasserman, "and Valley Medical Center is one of the top trauma, burn, and rehabilitation centers in the state."

Homeless

Housing the homeless is an ongoing battle. Four years ago, the county had 7.000 homeless men. women and children. During the last four years, 5,200 homeless were housed. Six months ago, they did another count. There are now 7,100 homeless in the county.

"More people have become homeless in the last four years than we've housed," says Wasserman. "With Measure A funding, we have funded 14 to 15 low income housing projects, which is going to help...but with rising rents forcing people out...it's very frustrating. It's a huge problem."

SJUSD Controversy

At this point, a resident interrupted Wasserman regarding SJUSD's plan. "I came to the meeting because I thought you were going to talk about the most important issue to this area: what's happening with Leland High School?" he asks.

"The topic you're talking about is the topic du jour," says Wasserman. "Six months ago, it was another See QUESTIONS, page 18

Times Staff Writer lmaden Residents are invited to join Sikhs from the Gurdwara on the Hill (a community center and religious place) in San Jose to celebrate their annual parade which starts at 11 a.m. on Sept. 1. Everyone is invited!

The San Jose Sikhs of the Gurdwara invite all religions, all people, everyone to come as their guest many times a year at various events and Sunday, September 1 is a special day. The word Sikh is derived from a Sanskrit word meaning 'disciple', or one who learns.

The Parade is about peace in our world and the celebration is placed

The Guru Garanth Sahib (Holy Book) is considered one of the world's great scriptures for it enlightens and has information that helps people. It is their eternal and final Sikh Guru for it encompasses the writings of the Ten Holy Gurus which established Sikhism and also contains special writings of people from other faiths too. As stated from the website Sikhism.about.com, "Sikhism rejects idol worship, so the Guru Granth Sahib is not worshipped as an idol, but rather emphasis is placed on respect of the scripture for the writings which appear with-

upon their Holy Book which acts as | in. Guru Granth Sahib is a collection of devotional hymns and poetry which proclaims God, lays stress on meditation on the True Guru (God) and lays down moral and ethical rules for development of the soul, spiritual salvation and unity with God." This book is paramount to the entire Sikh religion.

> Through the centuries great sacrifice was experienced by the Sikhs in protecting the writings and ensuring they remain pure. Many a religion tried to stop the Sikhs from worship. Even today the Sikhs face challenges in the world.

> The parade is a way for the Sikhs to bless the neighborhoods, city and world. They walk with their flower covered float and wish for all people of all religions to join them in celebration of honoring sacred beliefs of their book.

Sikhs do not try to change other people's religion and instead embrace the individual religious beliefs of others while encouraging everyone to follow religious pathways to delving deeper into each individual faith to be closer to the common truth of one creator.

There is great fanfare as the beautiful decorated float leaves the Gurdwara to travel the route (approximately 3 ½ miles). It looks similar to a cable car with a white dome on top. All are encouraged to walk the journey and there are many stands along the way with complimentary snacks and rehydration refreshments. One can also go to Evergreen High School on Quimby Road where there is free parking and shuttle service. The float will ride by at about 12:30 p.m. and you can supply yourself with complimentary refreshments and either choose to walk or be shuttled the last quarter mile up the hill to one of the most beautiful Gurdwara's in the world.

A special guest speaker, Bhai Harjinder Singh, will speak with beautiful hymns while he rides in the float. He is revered in his ability to communicate in special ways to followers. The Kirtan as defined by Wikipedia is; (Sanskrit: कीर्तन; IAST: Kīrtana) is a Sanskrit word that means "narrating, reciting, telling, describing" of an idea or story. It also refers to a genre of religious performance arts, connoting a musical form of narration or shared recitation, particularly of spiritual or religious ideas.

The entire event is enjoyed by people of all races, religions, creeds and colors

This Parade is fun to walk in and there is no rush at all to keep up with the float. You can walk the route and the crowds in the thousands will be with you. The refreshments along the way are pleasing. As you walk back up Quimby Rd. you are rewarded with tasty handmade food and booths of delicious treats including ice cream. It is all complimentary for you are a guest of the Sikhs!

This is a great way to engage children in the understanding of other cultures. It is fun and so inspiring to see people from different religions visiting the large open field and sharing smiles and building friendships too. This is what the Holy Book is all about. It is all about a belief that reflects what one of the founders stated in the 15th century, "Before becoming a Sikh, a Muslim, a Hindu or a Christian, lets become Human first."

You are welcome at the Sikh Gurdwara

If you wish to learn more you can take a tour of the Gurdwara, which is open to the public 365 days of the year, there is also complimentary food in the Langar (kitchen) every day. It's good to know and understand all religions and people in our world.

Some simple questions answered regarding the Sikhs

The Sikhs wear turbans as part of their Khalsa beliefs. They honor long hair. The Oxford Sikhs website states: "As everyone knows, male Sikhs are easily recognized by their turbans and beards. Over the centuries, they have acquired a reputation for being sturdy, hardworking and adventurous; they are a people who have earned the reputation for being extremely brave and loyal soldiers." In Sikhism, Kesh (sometimes called Kes) is the practice of allowing one's hair to grow naturally out of respect for the perfection of God's creation. The practice is one of The Five outward symbols as a means to profess the Sikh faith. You can learn more in the future if you choose by visiting the history room at the Gurdwara.

Sikh architecture is influenced from artful buildings created centuries ago and display exquisite intricacy. This style of architecture is also seen in non-religious buildings due to its beautiful flow of lines and use of space. The San Jose Gurdwara is the largest in the United States and considered an asset to the city. It is quite beautiful just to walk the grounds.

Beautiful memories of past parades

Last year, as the float traveled the streets of Evergreen on the hillside, little girls riding in the float sang joyfully with words that were more than 500 years old. The hymns are a form of poetry. As translated, one verse which was sung in Punjabi stated, "Keep praying to God, God is one, serving us all."

A devout man and woman walked slightly ahead of the float and sprinkled water in front of its path to offer purity in its journey.

A woman fervently stated, "Throughout the centuries those with deep religious convictions from all religions brought light to our world. They capture a powerful energy and one positive person who is connected to the Source is more powerful than a million who are negative"

She continued, "There is a physical and nonphysical energy and they work together. We all have the power to bring more and more light into our world."

San Jose celebrates record-setting street pavement program

The City of San Jose, Valley Transportation Authority, and the Silicon Valley Leadership Group celebrated San Jose's 2019 Pavement Maintenance Program on Monday, August 19.

San Jose will repave and repair nearly 300 miles of major and residential streets during the 2019 pavement maintenance season. Since 2012, budget shortfalls forced the City to focus its pavement maintenance efforts only on major roadways. Local and residential streets were maintained only through pothole repair, rather than full repaving.

"This summer, San Joseans will start spotting road repaving crews throughout our city, as we pave nearly 300 miles of deteriorating streets – more than we've repaired in two decades," said Mayor Liccardo. "Thanks to our collective efforts to pass 2016 Measure B and 2018 Measure T, and to defeat 2018 Prop 6, we have finally secured the stable funding we need to repave

every local and neighborhood street over the next decade."

'We are ecstatic to see our local neighborhood streets paved, for far too long our community has suffered increased expenses to their pocketbooks due to blown tires, traffic accidents, and needed alignments. For our poorest families, this could mean the difference of paying for a car repair and putting food on the table. Our families rely on smooth roads to go to and from work, take their children to school, and run errands. This is good government delivering on our promise to maintain our most basic infrastructure," said Councilmember Magdalena Carrasco.

"The Silicon Valley Leadership Group and our members were proud to lead 2016's Yes on Measure B campaign and play a role in the statewide strategy to protect SB 1 funding. We are thrilled that right now voters can see positive transit changes and improvements that

provide smoother commutes and safer travels for the residents of San Jose," said Carl Guardino, President, and CEO of the Silicon Valley Leadership Group.

With these new funds, San Jose's Department of Transportation has set an ambitious goal of repaving and repairing 200 miles of the smaller streets, while also improving 88 miles of major streets, in 2019. Over the next nine years, 1400 miles of local and neighborhood streets will receive upgrades. In less than a decade, the condition of San José's streets will be upgraded at least four points, to the highest end of the "fair" range, according to the pavement condition index

(PCI).

"A pavement maintenance program of this scale is a long time coming for San Jose," said Transportation Director John Ristow. "Our team has been preparing for two years and is excited to get these local and neighborhood streets back into the kind of condition our residents expect and deserve."

Continued from page 16 concern. Six months from now it will be another topic."

"It's not a topic du jour," says the resident. "It's a critical issue."

"It's a big issue for me, too," says another community member. Others agreed.

In response, Wasserman shares the county's official statement on the issue: "The Board of Supervisors was informed there was a mutual interest between the Parks Department and SJUSD to purchase property from the school district. The parks department's interest in the potential acquisition of school district properties is to preserve and protect open space while creating trail connectivity between Santa Teresa and Calero County Parks. We are not involved in any plans the school district may have for their properties."

"The school district approached the county," he adds, "knowing their land was between our parks. On your property tax bill, by 72 percent, you voted that a portion of the money goes to a park acquisition fee to acquire park land or open space. So, we have the money to buy it, but we're not involved with closing the schools. We are interested in buying the land connecting our parks and trails."

"The concern we have," says a resident, "is, if the district is successful in selling the parcel to the county, they will use the proceeds to acquire a parcel on Harry Road to build the schools nobody wants."

"They could do lots of things to buy the property," says Wasserman. "If we can acquire that land at a fair price, we will."

Another resident tries to clarify their position: "There is a lot of concern about the school district's proposal," he says. "The proposal is to shut down two schools well-located in the neighborhood—high performing schools—and move them out to open space we'd rather see stay open space. Some of the land the school district needs on Harry Road is owned by the county. I'm wondering if you'd consider looking into that specific issue...and the county not agreeing or at least pushing back on the district's plans to move the schools."


"What I'm hearing," says another resident, "is that as Supervisor, you're not willing to go on record in support or against the proposal. Are you personally in favor of this concept?"

"I don't know what the concept is," says Wasserman.

"You know as much as I do," replies the resident.

Wasserman says that when he wanted to create a mobile home park for teachers, nurses, police and firefighters, he was informed by his council that he couldn't designate housing for specific individuals as it would be considered discrimination. "The county isn't allowed to do that," says Wasserman, "but the state is."

"We started an organization: Save Neighborhood Schools San Jose (www.snssj.org),' says a resident. "We want to keep our schools in the community. We do support teachers...but we just don't want our schools relocated. You can go on the website for information since you said you haven't been too informed vet."

Emergency Prep

Community members express concern with evacuating Almaden Valley in the case of an emergency as the only roads out are Almaden Expressway and Bailey Road.

"How are you going to evacuate this area if we have a fire like Lexington fire, which reached the top of the hill?" asks a resident.

Wasserman says that County Fire and Cal Fire "currently have no concern about an exit strategy for getting out of Santa Clara County in the event of a natural or terrorist explosion." What the county does have is seven mobile towers. "There is no place we can't reach, and all agencies have radios and can talk with each other," says Wasserman. The county has also purchased two portable military-grade transmission stations so texts can be sent to residents' phones during an emergency to update them on what's happening and where to go.

"So, we'll know we have to evacuate," says a resident, "But how?"

An audience member suggests having all the lanes of Almaden Expressway and freeways headed away from the disaster, as they



do in the south during a hurricane.

"I'll find out and come up with plans and work with fire and police to do so," says Wasserman.

Another resident suggests granting the public access to IBM's private road, which crosses the hill to Santa Teresa Blvd. in the case of an emergency.

"I'll look into it," says Wasserman.

Wasserman came to update residents on what the county had accomplished but left with a laundry list of issues to delve into. What is unclear is his feelings on SJUSD's proposal to relocate Leland and Bret Harte and whether he will create a cohesive evacuation plan for Almaden Valley.
