Bring out the whole "swarm" to join in the fun and festivities of Bug Day. You won't BEE disappointed!

Bug Day is back celebrating Bugs that Blend in! Bugs of all shapes, sizes and colors surround us every day and sometimes we must look closely to spot them! Look carefully in your own backyard and you may spot a camouflaged caterpillar that looks just like a leaf or a moth that blends in perfectly with the bark of your favorite tree! Famous bugs that blend in include:

Phasmidas, better known as walking sticks or stick bugs Katydids, also known for their distinctive voices The beautifully green praying mantis And so many more!

Bug Day is noon to 4 pm Sunday, September 8 at Penitentiary Glen Reservation. This free event is designed to entertain, enlighten and educate about the importance of bugs in our lives. Insects are everywhere and children are intrigued by them; maybe because bugs are smaller than they are; maybe because children are just naturally inquisitive. Whatever the reason, we'll tap into that curiosity and take a look at all those insects we take for granted, but your children find fascinating!

Never been to a Bug Day!? Well, you are in for a treat of "buggy" proportions! Don't like bugs? This event just may change your mind (or at least help you to appreciate them a little better). What can you expect? An action-packed day filled with games, crafts, live animal presentations, songs, sto-

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rytelling, and family fun that will help you learn more about these amazing creatures.

Kids can earn a "Bugology" degree by participating in at least five of the many activities. They will have so much fun, they won't even realize they are learning! You might also learn a thing or two! See live bug displays in the Nature Center. Visit the Kevin P. Clinton Wildlife Center to meet native Ohio wildlife and find out what bugs they like to eat!

FREE train rides, operated by the Lake Shore Live Steamers, 1 to 3 pm, weather permitting. For safety reasons, children ages 10 and younger must be accompanied by an adult. All passengers must be seated in a designated seat. Pregnant women and toddlers/babies are not permitted to ride the trains – children must be able to sit up and hold on their own.

Other activities to enjoy at Penitentiary Glen Reservation: hike more than eight miles of scenic trails, interact with nature in Nature Play, a children's outdoor wild play space, discover the beautiful butterfly gardens or enjoy a leisurely picnic. The Nature Center and Wildlife Center are open 9 am to 5 pm every day.

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Don't Quit On Your Difficult Student

"Don't you love New York in the fall? It makes me want to buy school supplies. I would send you a bouquet of newly sharpened pencils if I knew your name and address." Can you guess which movie that's from? Yes, you guessed it! It's from "You've Got Mail"! I personally love fall, New York and freshly sharpened pencils. (Honestly, I do!) This time of year gets me excited! I'm gearing up for sweater weather, fall decorating, cooking BIG and using blankets! I'm also getting ready for back-to-school, which can be fun, but not always.

If you have a student living at home right now, you're probably getting your mind (and theirs) into school-mode. It's that time isn't it? It's not comfortable, it's not easy, and it always seems too soon. When I homeschooled, we did it all year round. I preferred that because I never liked the transition from having three months off...seemed cruddy to suddenly cut the summer short to make them sit still, or worse, return to stuffy classrooms.

I have one student left at home with me now who's going back to high school. While I feel very blessed that I'm not yet an empty nester...I'm not in love with being a parent at this time. My last little student is not so little, not so organized, not very studious, and he's *not* too cooperative either. He's fifteen... No fun for me. Or for him.

Last year we had a rough time. While we got lots of wrestling match acknowledgements, made tons of witty jokes, and played in plenty of Lacrosse and football games, we also wound up with one concussion and had THE worst parent-teacher conferences ever! (I mean, EVER.) My oldest is 22 and graduated at the top of her class and my



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other daughter just graduated from Army Basic Combat Training where she scored just two points shy of the best score you can get on the ASVAB to get in! Clearly, they're smart and they know what to do. That meant I didn't really have to do much. That's all changed.

This past year we struggled. So much, that by the time I got to the last classroom during parent-teacher conference night, I was afraid to even knock on the door! Once invited in, I immediately wanted to crawl underneath the nearest desk. I just couldn't face one more teacher. (Thank goodness one was absent- it was one less earful. And thank goodness the last one had a sense of humor, a strong desire to help and a nononsense attitude – we banded together to say the least - lol.)

I used to love parenting, love schooling, and loved helping my kids accel by setting up guidelines, etc., however, that has changed. I'm not having fun anymore. "*Do your thing dude*" -go eat in your room, play your games, hang out with your friends and girlfriend – yes, that's new too. I kinda just want to quit.

But. I can't. I have to make sure he does well and while I didn't need to push my girls to study or get their homework done, I'm playing a completely different ballgame now, and there's a lot of curveballs. UGH. But, it's not the time to quit, it's actually the time to amp it up. It's time to put my Mama Big Girl Pants on! If my little-notso-little guy is going to succeed he's gonna need some serious help...it's not going to be in the simple form of what I had done for the girls; make food, keep bedtimes and routines the same, limit electronics and check their grades once a week. It's gonna take a lot more sweat on my part for him to put more effort in on his. "Embrace the suck!", as they tell my Army daughter and her platoon. I've got this! Besides, I've had many years of experience using tough love, and sometimes I just have to remember to pull that baby out of my back pocket - *like a Ninja* - if I want my kids to fly right.

But, eh, I'm tired! He IS number 3, after all. That's my defense and I'm sticking to it! Lol. I mean almost anyone who has more than one kid can probably attest to this progressively laxed attitude. My first child didn't have soda pop until she was 8 years old (and then it was Sprite, and her grandparents gave it to her). The second one had a homemade marshmallow lined cake for her first birthday (her favorite treat? FLUFF!). The third one? He had a chocolate Easter Bunny when he was probably just 10 months old. Like I said, I'm tired! Or just want it to be fun. Those are probably horrible examples, but you know what I mean. The first one wore hats and socks when we went outside, the second one never wore socks and the third one...well...like I said, I gave him that bunny...and now his favorite food group is YOU GUESSED IT CANDY. (Shocker I know.) Learn something from me young parents reading this right now.

Reality is that my last kid is what he is, he is my last kid! I have to see this through! Can't quit now! We're almost there! And this happens to be the most important series of school years coming up! High School is no joke - he thinks it is! But, he has to do well, at least acquire some good habits, or above anything else, do his best. Now. And forever. That's what I believe. So we will be buckling down. (Yes, I'm from the eighties. No, I've never used that word on my kids, just here and with teachers at last year's conferences lol). Mama's whippin' out that Ninja Sword of Whoop A#\$! I mean TOUGH LOVE. And she will be super stellar at follow up! There is no plan worth making, if it's not followed up on. (*Ask me how I know*.)

We'll be bringing back and building upon some of the same ideas we implemented last year:

- All Homework is written in a notebook (YES he needs to be told to write down homework!).
- The notebook is kept in a binder with some folders/dividers for subjects so homework can be immediately put into it (otherwise it winds up on the bedroom floor- *isn't that right Mrs. S?*).
- There will be a Due-Date column in the binder.
- Homework lists and dates are shared with Mom every evening.
- When homework is done, items will be checked off.
- If homework is 'project oriented', a plan

will be made of when it will be worked on and what will be done on which day (library, group meeting dates, supply purchases, etc.), put on calendar.

- Tests will be listed daily time is reserved *and enforced* for studying (practice quizzes by Mom).
- NO games, computer or outings allowed unless grades are 'decent' (B's depending upon the type of class, difficulty level and abilities, some C's are fine).

This is my scale:

- F's-you aren't even trying, you get nothing-Period.
- D's-something's going on, we need to work together and step it up before you can get privileges.
- C's-okay, within reason, we should be working on a plan to improve and/or find out the actual source of the issue and if it can be fixed, limited privileges
- B's-great job, you're trying hard and privileges given anytime on the weekends, sometimes limited, and not during the week.
- A's-Awesome! You're doing the work and you care! Weekends privileges, not often limited, and during the week is okay with limits -not too close to bedtime (usually an hour or two before is "screens off")

Yes, it might sound like I'm parenting a third grader (probably because he's acting like one), but I love him and he's a very smart kid, so we need to do this. Plus, according to all the grown-up previous-15-year-old-boys like mine out there...he's not able to think much anymore, so I have to help him. We all want our kids to succeed. We have to help them...especially if they're still young and are about to mess up big time.

Since my son has sports interests too, we also have another set we use:

- 1. If grades aren't good enough OR if any F's pop up on quizzes or tests (weight bearing or not- because I *love* that argument he uses - "It doesn't *matter*, it's *not graded*, Ma"), he will be yanked off the practice field (yes, I've done it) or not permitted to attend practice at all (also done it).
- 2. If he wants to get into his sport and it's mid quarter, and his grades are currently not good, he pays the fees for the season, because I'm not 'investing' if he's going to wind up with bad enough grades that he can't even play.

The girlfriend. That's easy. I support them hanging out together, going places, having her over for dinner, etc., *HOWEVER*, grades must be 'decent' (see above) and if I permit time during the week for them to get together, it must involve at least a half hour to an hour of study time and they can split the rest of the time with an activity, socializing, dinner, etc.

So, there you have it, my big plan. My ways might not work for you and your child, but I know my son's weaknesses and also know what helps him operate better in life. That means making a set of goals and expectations which instills better habits so he has the best chance at success. The bottom-line is don't be afraid to stop doing what isn't working and step back. Take a look at what your student needs (FIRST), then look at what they want (LAST), then go ahead and step up to the plate. Take your best swing at getting them squared away. Whether it's focus they need, better study habits, or some help getting organized, don't be afraid to roll up your sleeves and get in there and help them. They might resist it at first, but the long-term results will be amazing. Teach them some of the skills they need for success (they're small is best time to do this, and if they forget, reteach them). Get serious! Don't be like me and get laxed with the third one, claiming your tired. Embrace the suck! Devote some extra time and energy to help them get there. You CAN do it! And if you aren't sure how, ask for help! Talk to the teachers, because they want your student to achieve their very best! Just like the drill sergeants at boot camp...they're scary, but they want to help trainees succeed!

Get a taste of apple cider, sample a variety of apples and help grind apples and press cider during Apple Butter and Cider Weekend. Apple slushies are available at the Apple Cider Bar. Enjoy other harvest activities including an applethemed cooking demonstration on Sunday.

Join us on September 28 & 29 for our new Horsepower Weekend. Witness history unfold as this new two-day event tells the story of how transportation and farming have evolved over the last 150 years. On Saturday, the focus will be on the power of the draft horse. These 900 to 2000-pound animals will provide special demonstrations with horse-drawn equipment on how
