Nearly nine full months have passed since that decorated day, and here we are on the doorstep of what promises to be another action-packed, memory-making high school football season.

The big question is how do area teams top what happened in 2018?

High school football isn't a game of "Can you top that," but it sure is fun to try.

For instance: • Kirtland, with a coach (Tiger LaVerde) who could lose 142 straight games and still own a .500 record, has moved up to Division V this season after winning the Division VI title last year.

Even though Kirtland graduated a slew of seniors, does anvone actually believe the Hornets will take a step back in a bigger division?

 The bar at Kenston has been raised. After chasing an elusive state

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championship for its entire existence, the Bombers now have one.

We're not sure how a team improves on a state title and hanging a running clock on every oppo-

nent during a five-game tournament run, but the Bombers are gonna give it a go.

 Mentor enters the season with somewhat of a sense of urgency, with Coach Steve Trivisonno having announced he is stepping down at season's end.

Trivisonno, four games away from 200 career wins, has led Mentor to four Division I state runner-up finishes in his career.

It doesn't take a rocket scientist to calculate how one tops that.

 Perry has played in a state semifinal (2016), regional final (2017) and regional semifinal (2018) in the past three seasons.

The Pirates return an experienced skill set on offense loaded with firepower. Can the Pirates top what they've done in recent years?

Chardon and the Bombers - to the postseason last year, and Mayfield also made the playoffs.

 One rule change to keep an eye on this year is the implementing of a 40-second play clock.

The following is a preseason list of players to watch who are key returners from a year ago. That being said, the Fisher Award watch list is fluid, where players can appear

based on the previous week's performances. The Tony Fisher Award is tentatively scheduled to be awarded on Monday, Nov. 25, at a special edition of the Varsity Chalk Talk show at Hooley

Jaylen Anderson, Perry: The junior running back is a two-time All-Ohioan. He can run and catch the ball. There's a reason his college offer list (including Nebraska) is large and growing.

D.J. Bowman, Chardon: The Hilltoppers will have a group of great backs — as usual — but this senior two-way starter is in line for a huge breakout season running the ball.

Alex Dragas, Madison: A three-year starter at quarterback, Dragas is a dual-threat QB that has a big, experienced offensive line in front of him. He could put up huge numbers passing and running.

Luke Floriea, Mentor: The senior slot receiver is committed to Boston College. He can catch, run and even throw if needed. One of the area's top playmakers.

Chase Fortkamp, Wickliffe:

He had 110 tackles and seven sacks as a sophomore. Kent State has already offered him. He is set to have a big year running the ball.

Luke Gardner, Kirtland:

He was the No. 3running back last year for the state champion Hornets. Now he's THE man. He runs a 4.38 in the 40 and can run away from defenders. Give him a crease and he's gone.

Michael Huss, Mayfield: He

has experience at quarterback and a talented skill set, including Joey Isabella, around him. Couple that with an offensive scheme that fits his talents, and Huss is primed for a huge vear.

Ian Kipp, Mentor: The junior quarterback had a big year last year despite missing a few games with injuries. He could run for 1,000 yards and pass for 2,000 yards with his talent and skill set around him.

Jaabir Mujihad, Euclid: He shared carries last year with Michigan State commit Brandon Wright. This year he'll be the primary carrier. Look out.

Jack Robinson, NDCL: The senior running back had a breakout season last year as a junior. With a veteran offensive line, he could have a record-breaking season as a senior.

Jack Porter, Kenston: The senior running back is a twotime, first-team All-Ohioan. He has run for more than 1,500 yards in each of the past two seasons. When he has the ball in his hands, scoreboard numbers change.

Charles Rosser, Benedic-tine: The speedy receiver is commited to Akron. With a 6-foot-3 frame, he's a night-

mare in matchups.

Drew Schiano, Perry: The senior quarterback had huge numbers last year and has a dynamic skill set around him again this year. That spells another big year for him.

Rico Small, South: The electric playmaker is a senior. He could line up at slot, receiver, running back or even take snaps in the wildcat sets and defenses would shudder.

Mason Sullivan, Kirtland: He was a first-team Division VI All-Ohioan at linebacker last year, and will also be a focal point of the Kirtland rushing attack this year.

Charlie Taylor, Geneva: What do you get when you put a 6-2, 220-pound running back behind a huge offensive line anchored by a Division I recruit (tackle Sam Davis)? Watch Taylor run this year and find out.

Jon Tomcufcik, Kenston:

The senior quarterback threw for more than 3,000 yards and accounted for more than 30 touchdowns last year. He's the trigger man for the Bombers' highlight reel offense.

Brian Trobel, Mentor: The senior running back, one of the best backs Mentor has ever had, Trobel has a 1,000-yard season last year despite missing a few games with injuries. He's healthy now. Look out.

Dion Valentine, Euclid: He got a lot of experience at quarterback last year, and has a tremendous skill set around him this year. Look for a big season.

Max Vujaklija, Chardon:

When the Hilltoppers' offense is at its best, the quarterback is a big reason why. Vujaklija is experienced and savvy. He's primed for a big year.

"We had to start building from the ground up," Trivisonno said. "The youth program we had to fix. Then the junior high. Then ninth grade. We had to build that 2003: 12-1 Mentor pride that being from Mentor meant something."

Which meant putting up a proverbial fence around the school district, giving athletes a reason to stay rather than go to private or parochial schools.

"When I first came here, 18 of Lake Catholic's 22 starters were from Mentor 2013: 13-2 junior highs," Trivisonno said. "We needed to do a better job of keeping our kids at home. We needed to sell taking great pride of where you're from."

The early results were decent. In the first four years with Trivisonno's plan in place, Mentor went 32-19 (.627). After a 2001 year in which the Cardinals went 7-3, Mentor implemented the fast-paced spread offense.

Talented Hornets in hot pursuit of back-to back state championships

Luke Gardner just knew he wasn't going to sleep very well the night of Dec. 2, 2011.


A fourth-grader at Kirtland Elementary, Gardner and his classmates were all sprung from school that day to go watch the Hornets play Coldwater in the 2011 Division V state championship game.

Of course, Gardner was giddy all day. It wasn't even about getting out of a day of school. It was about getting to watch the hometown heroes such as Christian Hauber and Damon Washington hoist the championship trophy after plowing through the Coldwater defense for a combined 343 yards rushing in a 28-7 victory at Massillon Paul Brown Stadium.

As Gardner laid in bed that night, all he thought was "I wanna do that someday."

Now a senior, Gardner will not only get a chance to do that. But he and his teammates on the 2019 Kirtland football team will get a chance to do what no KIRTLAND » PAGE 8

Win back-to-back state titles

As the Hornets grind through the August practices, that's the goal – to go where no Hornet has ever gone as a back-to-back state champion.

"That would mean so much," Gardner said. "I want to get two rings. Being back-to-back would be so great."



Madison and Mayfield both started a lot of juniors last fall, so perhaps they're in line to take a similar path. ... Brush boasts some key returnees, but needs to show more mettle down the stretch than it did in 2018, when it

lost three straight to close. ... With respect to the WRC, though, something around 7-3 for whoever does emerge as an upper-echelon squad will probably not yield home field, because the extent of league parity makes points too scarce when vying for the top four. ... No need to belabor this point: Four-time defending state champion Akron Hoban is unbelievably good again. The Knights have two of the top five Ohio seniors in the ESPN 300 in Deamonte Trayanum (Arizona State) and TE Caden Clark (Alabama) and a third standout on the list in LB Devin Hightower (Michigan State). ... As stacked as Hoban is, so

is the quest for Nos. 2-4 with Massillon and the Federal League contingent. Massillon Perry, with standout lineman Vinny Scuiry, and North Canton Hoover, with QB Connor Ashby, will be a handful. ... Uniontown Lake could be a sleeper as well, especially if it can capitalize more on those Federal League points. ... Austintown-Fitch will be

playing this season in honor of longtime coach Phil Annarella, who unexpectedly died over the summer.

Favorites: Avon (12-2), Maple Heights (12-1), North Royalton (4-6), Wadsworth (12 - 1)

What to look for: The lone area representative in this region is Benedictine — but the Bengals are an intriguing option. ... This time a year ago, Benedictine had two senior starters on offense and four on defense. Granted, one of those seniors was standout QB Nick Demchuk, which will be a big loss. But most of the squad that took its lumps during a 4-6 campaign is back. With the amount of talent returning, there's possibly at least five winnable games on the Bengals' schedule, and if they can take a step forward in the North Coast League, the dominoes may fall into place here for a return to the playoffs and potentially making it interesting for home field late. ... Generally, there was a lot of graduation turnover in this region, including with the usual front-runners. Until proven otherwise, though, it's safe to side with programs such as Avon, Maple Heights and Wadsworth. ... A deep sleeper in this region could be North Royalton. The Bears return QB Joey Marousek, who threw for 2,422 yards and 29 TDs and ran for 575 yards and nine scores last fall, along with fellow seniors Simon Antonio (595 rushing yards, eight TDs) and Riley Knurek (1,153 all-purpose yards). North Royalton was electric all of last year and had three one-possession setbacks. So if it can fare better in close games, a memorable campaign could be in the cards.
