## Evergreen Valley College president placed on leave; reason a mystery

Chancellor will assume Keith Aytch's administrative duties

he president of Evergreen Valley College, Keith Aytch, has been placed on leave, but there is no explanation for his absence.

Byron Breland, chancellor of the San Jose-Evergreen Community College District, has taken over Aytch's administrative duties in the interim, according to spokesperson Ryan Brown.

Breland sent an email regarding Aytch's leave, but he provided no details on why he was placed on leave, or if he will be returning. It was reported that Breland did not discuss the matter at a recent staff-wide meeting and asked the faculty not to discuss Aytch's leave.

Brown said that rumors about Aytch being arrested See AYTCH, page 19

# Initiatives introduced to build back yard cottages

Abodu Corp. will rapidly install backyard home in two weeks

he mayor recently unveiled a series of initiatives that he says would shorten the time and lower the cost to build a backyard home (Auxiliary Dwelling Units – ADU) by streamlining San Jose's application process.

"We all know that we are in a housing crisis," Liccardo said. "We are struggling mightily to get more rent restricted apartments built. We are not going to solve this crisis \$650,000 at a time—that's the cost to build a single apartment."

San Jose lawmakers hope that as a result of the initiatives, more people will build back-yard cottages. The city's goal is to add 25,000 units—10,000 of them below-market-rate—to the city's housing units by 2022. ADU construction has been prioritized largely because it's a potentially cheaper, faster way to boost the number of housing units.

To make the process as easy as possible, the city has created an online portal and a check-

list to educate homeowners about ADUs and the regulatory requirements to build them. Liccardo said a full-time employee, Sarah Shull, will help homeowners applying for an ADU permit. Officials estimate that there's room to build as many as 160,000 such backyard homes in San Jose.

#### **ADU Online Portal**

The new online portal asks San Jose residents to sign up for information on how to build and permit Auxiliary Dwelling Units (ADUs) and how to take advantage of ADU programs. The online portal will also allow home

# Dust flies as buildings are demolished at Evergreen Valley College

he dust was flying and metal screeching noises could be heard as the old San Jose/Evergreen Community College District Office and South Bay Regional Public Safety Training building used for the police academy were demolished on September 5.

The old District Office facility sat vacant since early 2015 when the District Office was relocated to its current location at 40 South Market Street in downtown San Jose. The Academy relocated to Gavilan College.

"The primary purposes and uses for both the old San Jose/Evergreen Community College District Office and South Bay Regional Public Safety Training ended and the buildings were



in poor condition and presented a community safety hazard, said SJECCD Interim Vice Chancellor Jorge Escobar. "The buildings are located on what has been designated as surplus land and they are contained in approximately 27 acres at a premium location in Evergreen."

Escobar said, "The District felt that with the liability and safety concerns on vacant and fully powered buildings, the best course of action was to demolish the existing buildings. The project planning and architectural work on this project began in 2018 and is being funded through general obligation bonds."

The old San Jose/Evergreen Community College District Office and South Bay Regional Public

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#### Three finalists for San Jose Planning Commission announced

Three finalists for a highly-coveted position on the San Jose Planning Commission will be interviewed by the San Jose City Council during its meeting on Sept. 17.

The finalists are: Mariel Caballero, a Santa Clara County deputy director at the probation department; Louis Barocio, vice principal at East Side Union High School District; and business owner Rolando Bonilla.

In order to become a finalist, applicants must receive indications of interest from four or more San Jose councilmembers. The candidate who receives six or more votes will be appointed to a term that expires June 2020

#### BART's extension through San Jose chosen to receive \$125 million federal grant

BART's long-awaited extension through downtown San Jose is poised to get a \$125 million windfall from the federal government to bring its construction vision into reality.

"This \$125 million is really a down payment on the future," San Jose Mayor Sam Liccardo said. "And of course, this is a down payment on the future of transit."

The Federal Transit Administration picked Valley Transportation Authority (VTA) for a pilot program to fast-track funding for major transportation projects. VTA requested about \$1.4 billion in federal funding for four new stations. The agency will collect the \$125 million grant when it meets all the requirements to proceed to a construction agreement.

Liccardo said, "Silicon Valley suffers from a 'suburban sprawling pattern,' where families struggle to find affordable housing and residents are caught in traffic that is 'choking us.' The extension project will be instrumental in creating a promising vision of Silicon Valley See BART, page 21

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





It is the conclusion of the CWC that, for the period of FY 2018, 2000 Measure A tax dollars were spent in accordance with the intent of the measure.

FY 2018 Key Accomplishments

- Extending BART to the Silicon Valley cities of Milpitas, San Jose and Santa Clara. Construction
  for the two stations and parking structures for BART Silicon Valley Phase I was completed and
  systems integration testing is underway. Revenue service is projected by the end of 2019. In FY
  2018, the VTA Board of Directors certified Phase II's Subsequent Environmental Impact Report,
  approved a single-bore tunneling methodology, and approved two station options: Downtown San
  Jose West and Diridon Station North. Phase II also received a Record of Decision from the
  Federal Transit Administration, the first required step to seek federal funding.
- Improving Bus Service in Major Corridors. The Alum Rock Santa Clara Bus Rapid Transit had its first complete year of operation in FY 2018. Curb side shelters will be installed to enhance customer experience.
- Extending Light Rail from Downtown San Jose to the East Valley. Final engineering was advanced
  for the Eastridge to BART Regional Connector Project (EBRC) in FY 2018. The supplemental
  environmental report incorporating aerial alignment and expressway geometry improvements was
  adopted in June 2019.



to swiftly install an ADU," said Rosalynn Hughey, director of Planning, Building and Code Enforcement. "ADUs can help us address the housing crisis, and San Jose is committed to making ADUs easy to build; we welcome and appreciate vendors like Abodu for helping achieve that goal."

#### **Installation process**

## **Closure of recycling centers** creates environmental problem

Closure of recycling centers throughout the bay area, and especially San Jose has created an environmental problem.

It is noticeable that our streets are becoming more and more cluttered. Some say that some folks do not care about the environment any more. Some say that it is because the homeless, who used to be able to pick up a few cans and bottles along the streets, are unable to sell them any more due to recycling centers closures.

Regardless of the main reason, the fact remains that we do have more of a clutter problem. Two people, at least, care for the environment. They can be seen picking up the litter around the San Felipe and Yerba Buena Rd. area that originates at the local eateries in that area in Evergreen.

Each time we buy drinks in aluminum and plastic containers, we must pay a deposit fee as dictated by the state of California. The fee ranges from 5 cents to 15 cents per container, depending on the size, volume, and the beverage therein. Consumers are supposed to be able to return these containers to the store where they were purchased for a refund on the bot-

tle or container. Where is this happening? As a result, these containers are most likely ending up on the streets.

With the closing of recycling centers, there will be more clutter on the city streets. Some are blaming the Federal Government because of the standoff with China on tariffs. Some say it is because of health issues that recycling centers are closing. What is the answer? If the State Government requires each of us as consumers to pay deposit fees, then it is up to the State Government to provide us with a place to recycle these objects requiring a deposit fee.

Many Californians are losing hundreds of dollars per year on deposit fees. It is especially so for those with larger families and who need to buy bottled water because they are afraid of existing water supplies. "Dumpster Divers" used to come around the neighborhood dumpsters and help keep down the amount of recycles in the dumpsters. These are not seen any more as there is no profit in doing it.

SB54 requires that all singleuse plastics be made out of recvclable materials. This was a California Key Vote. State Senator Jim See CLOSURE, next page

Beall voted yes on this piece of legislation. The question that most folks would like to ask Mr. Beall is: It is all well and good to require that all single-use plastics be made of recyclable material, but where do citizens go to recycle these materials to regain their deposit? Will this not add to the existing problem?

Closings of the recycle centers were brought about, supposedly, because of the dropping prices of aluminum and plastic. These centers were just no longer profitable to operate.

Most countries that were taking recycled material such as India, China, Vietnam, and a few others, have reached their limits of American recyclables. Some countries will not take our recyclables because of food contamination. So, what happens to the things we cannot recycle? They end up in landfills where some States have admitted that recycled materials are being incinerated. Is this what will happen in California? This will only add to the environmental problem.

The average American does not realize the environmental impact of one single piece of legislation. Not only the added manpower needed to implement the legislation, but the extra costs of implementing the law. It is easy for a legislator to submit a piece of legislation to the State Senate to please his or her local constituents, but the paying for the legislation rests solely upon the local taxpayers.

Cries can be heard from those who depended upon the local recycle centers for a few extra bucks. Before the local centers closed, they were able to walk there as they had no other transportation. Some could be seen carrying as many cans and bottles as their bikes allowed. The nearest recycling center for them now is in Berryessa. The recycler is helping to keep cans and bottles off the local streets. Such is progress!



igarette smoke in people can cause lung cancer, bronchitis and heart disease.

Exposure to environmental cigarette smoke, also known as second hand smoke is linked to a long list of ailments and diseases in pets. Nicotine, tar and carbon monoxide are carcinogens found in cigarette smoke. Unfortunately, pets can be innocent victims of somebody's choice to smoke in the same home.

Pets share their home with us and breathe the same air as their owners. Small pets that

spend a great deal of time with their smoking owners have almost the same nicotine levels as their owners. Nicotine can be detected in and on the hair of dogs and cats when they are exposed to second hand smoke. So along with inhaling second hand smoke, pets also ingest nicotine when they groom or clean themselves. When they inhale and ingest they get a double dose of the nicotine, a carcinogen. Typically, smoker owners have smoke residue in their home which has settled in the environment and other things like carpets, chairs, beds etc. so when pets sleep in that environment they

again are exposed to smoke residue.

#### Effects of second hand smoke on pets

Pets have smoke related illnesses just like people, most commonly cancer and lung

disease. Pets can have buildup of carbon in their lungs exactly as smoker's lungs which can lead to lung cancer. So your smoking affects your pet's health.

- Continuous exposure to secondhand tobacco smoke increases chances of your pet having nasal cancer. Pets also are more susceptible to having skin issues like allergies and scratching.
- Studies have found that dogs exposed to environmental smoke had higher chances of

having heart disease and suffered damage to heart vessels.

- In cats, the most common tumor is lymphoma and cats inhaling secondhand smoke are at increased risk for developing this lymphoma.
- Oral tobacco use in humans can cause oral cancer. Similarly cats and dogs exposed to years of environmental smoke can also have oral tumors.

Protect your pet from cigarette smoke. Your veterinarian is always concerned See PETS, next page

Continued from previous page about your pet's health and yours as well. If you are a smoker, then please consider things you can do to reduce your pet's exposure to environmental smoke. You can take certain steps to minimize presence of secondhand smoke in your pet's environment:

- Steam clean carpets, curtains, and bedding to remove carbon deposits from your home.
- Bathe your pets to get rid of smoke residue from their fur.
- Smoke outdoors and away from pets. Do not smoke while your pet is in your lap or while driving when your pet is in the car.

So let's try to minimize the exposure to secondhand smoke. Quit smoking for good to protect your beloved pet's health and yours as well

Once the project is complete in 2026, officials estimate it will carry 52,000 riders each weekday and cut back 27 million miles of car travel annually assuming enough people elect to ride mass transit. Vehicle fuel emissions are expected to be reduced by 22,340 metric tons annually.

"This project is one that is very innovative and so we are very excited to move to the next level with VTA on that project," Federal Transit Administration Acting Administrator K. Jane Williams said in a statement.

VTA officials expect to open the first segment of the line by the end of this year.

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
