

Should Halloween Change to the Last Saturday of October? By Callie Collins

A national petition via Change.org focuses on a national movement to change Halloween from Oct. 31 to the last Saturday of the month, regardless of what specific calendar date it would fall. The public query has gained more than 140,000 signatures.

Proposed by the Halloween & Costume Association, the petition will be pitched to White House staff for a final decision. Any official date changes would likely take place in future years rather than the current 2019 season. Instead of Halloween as it's currently known, the celebratory date would be rebranded as National Trick or Treat Day. The organization wrote on its online petition that "it's time for a safer, longer, stress-free celebration!"

Supporters cite the ability to celebrate for a full day, instead of a few hours at night, with less of a rush to get home in order to prepare for school and office hours the next day. More children are fatally struck by cars on Oct. 31 than any other day of the year, according to the National Safety Council. More parents could, in theory, accompany their children to trick-or-treat during a weekend night than on a school night. Candy sales, which have dropped in recent years, could also benefit from a full-day celebration that revolves mostly around collecting packaged sweets.

Those against the petition are quick to point out the movement's commercial interests and the eschewing of tradition in favor of convenience.

At Kern County Family Magazine, we reposted a TODAY Parents article about the Change.org petition and asked our readers to tell us what they think: **Should Kern County consider the idea to move Halloween trick-or-treating?**

The vocal majority was not in favor of moving the celebration. Here's what some of our readers had to say, both for and against the proposal:

Kara Olson: Yes! It would be so much easier!!!

Pamela Rodgers: Yes yes yes!!!

Christina Martinez-Vas: **Why not** move it to Saturday? That would make things so much easier for teachers and parents!

Karrie McNeal: As a teacher and parent, **keep it the way it is.** Just because someone doesn't like something doesn't mean we go and change it. You can control YOUR world, not everyone else's world.

Veronica Gomez: **No.** It will be hard for the parents who work on Saturday nights. They will not be able to celebrate it with their kids. Why change something that does not need to be changed?

Tori Ramay: I won't teach my kids to live for the weekend. Every day is a great time to celebrate.

Breast Tests That Could Save Your Life

A yearly mammogram is the gold standard for breast-cancer screening and detection. Mammography is the only test that has been scientifically proven to save lives. Still, it's not infallible.

"In women with very dense breasts, mammography will miss cancer 58 percent of the time," says Thomas Kolb, M.D., a breast-cancer radiologist.

Dense breasts contain more glands, ducts and connective tissue than fat. Breasts tend to be denser during a woman's reproductive years; density makes it harder to detect suspicious lumps on a mammogram. That's because glandular tissue appears white on a mammogram, just like a mass can.

Fortunately, these tools are available that can give you a clearer picture of your breast health—and could possibly save your life--especially if you have dense breasts or you're at higher risk for breast cancer because of your personal or family health history.

How Do You Know if You Have Dense Breasts?

Breast density depends in part on hormonal status, which is why premenopausal women are more like to have dense breasts. Genetics also plays a part. If your mom had dense breasts, you're more likely to have them. But only a mammogram can make that determination.

Tomosynthesis

The latest in breast cancer detection technology, tomosynthesis, also known as 3D mammogram, is a digital mammogram that takes images of the breast from multiple angles.

Tomosynthesis takes an arc of pictures through each breast, in 5 millimeter slices, which are then reconstructed into a three-dimensional image. It allows radiologists to see through the breast tissue. With tomosynthesis, they can more easily distinguish a true mass from overlapping structures that can hide or mimic cancer, such as ligaments or glandular tissue. Tomosynthesis can be used for screening and diagnostic mammograms.

Pros/Cons: Compared to a digital (2D) mammogram, tomosynthesis is more precise. Studies show that three more women per thousand will receive a cancer diagnosis with tomosynthesis, compared to a digital mammogram. Also, women with dense breasts who undergo tomosynthesis are 40 percent less likely to be called back for additional imaging.

Should you ask for it? Screening tomosynthesis is in order if you have dense breasts or you're at average or intermediate risk for breast cancer.

To determine your lifetime breast cancer risk, visit BrightPink.org and take the risk assessment quiz. Depending on your answers, you'll end up in one of three categories: high risk, intermediate risk or average risk.

High risk is defined as a lifetime risk of breast cancer of 20 percent or more; intermediate risk is a lifetime risk of breast cancer of 15 to 20 percent, and average risk is anything under 15 percent.

Automated Breast Ultrasound

During this test, an automated ultrasound machine, which uses a computer program, takes ultrasound images of breast tissue. The images are recorded and given to a radiologist who can interpret them. Doctors currently use handheld ultrasound devices to hunt for breast tumors in some patients. The



labor-intensive process can skip some tumors. Automated breast ultrasound eliminates the need for an ultrasound technologist so there's less risk of missing a lesion.

Pros/Cons: Automated breast ultrasound can help detect breast cancer. Breast cancer detection doubled from 23 to 46 in 6,425 screening studies using automated breast ultrasound with mammography, resulting in a significant cancer detection improvement. Some insurance providers don't cover the test yet, so check your policy.

Should You Ask for It? Ask for automated breast ultrasound in addition to a screening mammogram if you have extremely dense breast tissue (in the 75 percent or greater range).

Magnetic Resonance Imaging (MRI)

This tool employs magnetic and radio waves instead of X-rays to create high-definition cross-sectional images of breast tissue. For the test itself, the patient is injected with safe, nonradioactive contrasting salt solution in the arm, then lies face down on a table with both breasts positioned into cushioned coils that contain signal receivers. The entire bed is then sent through a tube-like magnet. In areas where there might be cancer, the contrasting agent pools and is illuminated on computer-generated images.

Pros/Cons: MRI has been shown to find 2 to 6 percent more cancers than mammogram alone. In 1,000 women, studies show MRI will find twice as many cancers, compared to 3D mammogram alone.

Should You Ask for It? If you're at high risk for breast cancer (in the 20% category or more), you automatically qualify for supplemental screening with MRI. Insurance carriers will cover the cost of this sensitive but expensive time. If you're not a high risk but you have extremely dense breast, consider paying out of pocket for this test. Screening breast MRI costs \$600 to \$700.

"Even if you have as little as a 2 percent risk of breast cancer over the next five years, talk to your doctor about adding MRI," says Wendie Berg, M.D., Ph.D., a breast imaging consultant in Baltimore. MRI breast-imaging centers are springing up across the country, but it's important to seek out a facility that has MRI-guided biopsy capability, so a tissue sample can be retrieved for diagnosis at the time of your scan if a questionable mass is spotted.

When to Get a Mammogram

The American Cancer Society recommends that women at average risk between age 40 and 44 have the option to start with a screening mammogram every year. Women 45 to 54 should get a mammogram yearly. Women 55 and older can switch to a mammogram every other year or choose to continue yearly mammography. If you're at high or intermediate risk, your doctor may advise starting mammography before age 40.





Young Engineers, Parents & Community Leaders to Welcome Bestselling "The Boy Who Harnessed the Wind" Author William Kamkwamba at CSUB

Don't miss his Oct. 30th book signing and speech

Celebrated author William Kamkwamba, known for the book that inspired the Netflix film, "The Boy Who Harnessed the Wind," is coming to Kern County! His Oct. 30th visit to California State University, Bakersfield (CSUB) will take place in the Icardo Center at 7 p.m. Admission is free.

The bestseller recaps Kamkwamba's biographical journey to bring power to his family's home, at age 14, by building an electricity-generating windmill out of scrap metal and miscellaneous parts based only on rough plans from library books in Wembe, Malawi. After being invited to attend a TEDGlobal Conference on a fellowship, Kamkwamba has since led multiple projects for local improvements in his home country, including expanding access to electricity and drinking water and preventing malaria. His story has become known throughout the world as he works to promote science, technology, engineering and math (STEM) education.

Kamkwamba's community conversation will center on his experience in building the famed windmill and the current state of affairs in Malawi, as well as the importance of inspiring young people to pursue STEM careers.

The book signing and inspirational speech is the culminating event in the One Book, One Bakersfield, One Kern #OneBookProject event series organized by the Kern County Library. "The Boy Who Harnessed the Wind" is its most recent focus title. The project encourages community-wide literacy, especially among students of all ages who may read the same book or an abridged, age-appropriate adaptation.


In addition to the full-length novel intended for grown-up readers, a Young Readers Edition by Penguin Puffin for ages 10+ and a picture book version by Penguin Young Readers Group are available at Kern County Library branches and for sale at local book retailers.

Kern County Library cardholders can download the eBook or audiobook version free through its electronic resources system, Hoopla.com.

It's not too late to join in on local book club discussions, with tracking through the library's Beanstack system. Related promotions run through November. Rewards, including Chipotle Incentives and the possibility of winning a pinwheel, are available while supplies last. Community partners include Barnes & Noble, Russo's Books, Kern Literacy Council, the Kegley Institute of Ethics and many others with local ties.

The One Book Project started in 2001 as a grassroots effort and launched in 2002. Bakersfield elementary school teacher Jillian Fritch read about its success in other cities and decided to start regional efforts in Kern County. The Kern County Library has been involved in its success since 2003.

Unique Abilities Autism in Kern County: Elijah's Story

Stevenson, age 10, is already making headlines for his unique abilities. Elijah has autism spectrum disorder, a diagnosis that keeps his mother, Nerissa, busy with his therapies and managing what works for him.

"He's considered high functioning," Nerissa explained in a recent interview. "His ability to hyperfocus is his gift, besides having an incredible ability to connect with others and accept them for who they are."

Elijah has participated at the Kern County Fair for the past two years with its hobby exhibition. His collection of more than 100 dinosaurs, complete with prehistoric-style plants and other figures, won First Place and Best of Show last year. These two blue ribbons underscore Elijah's unique way of connecting with the world.

Results from the 2019 Kern County Fair, in which Elijah also participated, were still pending at press

The fifth grader at American Elementary School participates in a special needs program, but he is

also active in Sunday school and related activities at Westside Church of Christ.

"If it wasn't for the Lord, I don't know where we'd be," said Nerissa, who cites her faith as a source of strength. Elijah's autism diagnosis came at age 3 and Nerissa, a widow, found herself in charge of a child whose behavior was difficult to work through. Her husband died of stage four lung cancer when Elijah was 9 months old. She sought professional evaluation and therapies on her own when Elijah was a toddler, in part due to his underdeveloped speech and unusual behavior.

"I can't tell you how many times I walked out of a supermarket leaving a full cart, because we were just done. Elijah's behavior made it impossible to shop and just complete a transaction. It can be like a temper tantrum but 100 times worse," she said, "I didn't understand why. Now, I understand that the sensory experience can be too much for the child, because he is hearing the wheels of the shopping cart screech and people's conversations, and seeing all the bright colors of a grocery store. Kids like Elijah start to experience sensory overload, and the natural 'no' that comes as part of the shopping experience with a child is just too much."

Nerissa describes those senses as "high-tuned", but she says no two children with autism are exactly alike. Their skills and abilities differ greatly according to where they are on the spectrum and their individual progress, interventions, and per-

Elijah and the Dinosaurs

A fascination with dinosaurs became noticeable as an affinity Elijah held at about age 2. He wanted to learn relevant facts and seemed obsessed. Nerissa recalled purchasing a DVD of "The Land Before Time" but noticed that he was disappointed.

"What he wanted was a show about the real thing. We would watch these documentaries that I thought were pretty boring with paleontologists

What is Autism?

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention define autism as "a developmental disability that can cause significant social, communication and behavioral challenges. There is often nothing about how people with autism spectrum disorder look that sets them apart from other people, but people with autism spectrum disorder may communicate, interact, behave, and learn in ways that are different from most other people. The learning, thinking, and problem-solving abilities of people with autism spectrum disorder can range from gifted to severely challenged. Some people with autism spectrum disorder need a lot of help in their daily lives; others need less."

The Autism Society - Kern Autism Society reports that more 2,000 cases of autism have been recorded in Kern County.

According to the Child Mind Institute, one in 59 children has an autism spectrum disorder. That gap may be narrowing as more cases appear. Boys are also three to four times more likely to be diagnosed than girls. Both genders benefit from peer inclusion.

and scientists who were there trying to chip away rocks," she said.

The fascination grew from there and Elijah continued collecting dinosaur toys.

Last year, Nerissa's mother suggested he enter his collection in the hobby section of the Kern County

"Elijah wasn't proficient with glue and scissors, but I showed him some things and got him going and now, he's a champ," said Nerissa. "It's a six-foot island, most of which is based on movies and documentaries he has seen, that all makes sense to him. There are soldier figures, too. If someone gets eaten, well, he tells me that's just nature. He likes gathering things throughout the year."

What each dinosaur ate, the scientific names of each species, and its habits are all familiar facts to Elijah. In an age of distraction, his ability to focus is extraordinary and that attention to detail has made his exhibit a standout feature at Kern County Fair two years in a row.

Nerissa says no matter what prizes Elijah wins at the Fair, he is already first in her life. He has lived social situations in which he was picked last or simply not invited by his peers to participate in daily social interaction. The attitude that 'if you're not first, you're last' is really problematic," she concluded. "That's the most beautiful thing about these types of kids: their heart. They include everybody, even

though they may live in a world that shuns them or disrespects them or puts them last. They're all about love. They just want a friend and to be a friend. They just want to love. They just want to play. I'm so excited to see who he's going to be, who he's becoming. Just like his dinosaurs, Elijah is the leader of his own pack."

The Stevenson family embraces the challenges that come with Elijah's diagnosis. Nerissa describes herself as a patient person who has developed even more patience and empathy than she knew was possible.

"I tell my son not to worry, because the Bible clearly tells us 'Those who are first shall be last and the last shall be first. Many are called but few are chosen,'" said Nerissa. "You are clearly somebody in God's eyes. You are different and that's okay."

How to Include Children With Autism

Children not wanting to include Elijah and others like him is a major problem kids with autism face in both school and social settings.

"What I wish is that people would stop looking at a book and judging it by its cover. People always are surprised by what our kids can do. I know kids who are going to be broadcasters. We may have an autistic president one day," said Nerissa. Although she tries to avoid showing that she is sometimes offended by others' exclusion and lack of empathy, she does feel that pain at times. "I stopped doing birthday parties when Elijah turned 5. No one would come. I felt alone. We felt the stigma of it," she admitted.

Nerissa's tips for inclusion:

Teach your children how to be a friend: Encourage them to invite children who have different abilities to play and join in by inviting them to playdates and parties.

Know that others may need more time to respond ap-

propriately: A lack of action isn't always a lack of understanding. Some children just take longer to respond. Be patient and remind children that not all kids react on the same timeline.

Take the first step: Simply invite children to play.

Reach out to the parents: "Choose a mother that you know has a special needs child and include her," said Nerissa. "Offer respite care. She may not be able to let you babysit because of the child's needs, but she will appreciate the offer. Inviting her for a cup of coffee or tea is a welcoming thing to do, because it acknowledges that you see her as a person."


Which leaves me.





he superstitious people of New York's Hudson Valley spoke of many ghosts, but the "commander-inchief of all the powers of the air" around there was the most feared spirit in all of New York state: the ghost of a Hessian from the American Revolution.

The Hessians were German soldiers hired by the British, and you may recognize them from the Declaration of Independence, which complains of "Armies of foreign Mercenaries" sent "to compleat the works of death, desolation and tyranny." This particular Hessian, though, did not "compleat" anything. A stray Patriot cannonball removed his head in battle, and his ghost began riding through the forests near Tarrytown "in nightly quest of his head." They called him the Headless Horseman of Sleepy Hollow.

And who should blunder upon that headless fiend one fateful night but Ichabod Crane?

Crane was a superstitious, gossipy schoolteacher who had been living a peaceful life in Sleepy Hollow, New York, which was, after all, "one of the quietest places in the whole world."

Now, Ichabod already had a problem: He had fallen in love with a local heiress named Katrina Van Tassel, and Katrina was also being wooed by a man named Abraham "Brom Bones" Van Brunt.

Brom Bones was everything Ichabod was not. While Ichabod Crane looked like a "scarecrow eloped from a cornfield," Brom Bones was a titan of strength, "broad-shouldered and double-jointed." Ichabod was scared of spooks and goblins and "terrors of the night," while spirits were just a joke to Brom Bones. He was a superstitious man, and to a good imagination the dark woods on a dark night were filled with creaks and moans and half-glimpsed "ghosts and goblins." And then one figure, which Ichabod saw plainly. The figure of a man, "muffled in a cloak," riding a black horse.

It would not be accurate to say that the figure had no head. But, the head was not on his shoulders, where it should have been. Better to say that the figure had a head, and he carried it in his hand.

Well, that was about enough for Ichabod Crane! He rode away in terror, but the Headless Horseman followed him. The chase proceeded through the woods, and Ichabod strove to reach a bridge near a church where (legend says) the Hessian ghost would always disappear. Far from disappearing, though, when the Horseman reached the bridge, he threw his head at Ichabod, knocking him from his horse.

Spooktacular Spiced

Halloween Cake

Halloween party hosts may want to have a variety of treats on hand to satisfy the assortment of sweet tooths in attendance. Candy might be the first thing people think of on Halloween, but cakes and cookies can make for delicious treats as well.

Borrowing from the flavors of the season, including pumpkin, cinnamon and nutmeg, "Spiced Pumpkin Cake" from "Real Simple: Easy, Delicious Home Cooking (Time Home Entertainment)" from the editors of Real Simple can be a welcome addition to any Halloween spread.

Spiced Pumpkin Cake

Serves 12

Ingredients

- 1 cup (2 sticks) unsalted butter, at room temperature, plus more for the pan
- 3 cups all-purpose flour, spooned and leveled, plus more for the pan
- 5 teaspoons pumpkin pie spice
- 1 1/2 teaspoons baking powder
- 3/4 teaspoon baking soda
- 1/2 teaspoon kosher salt
- 1 1/2 cups granulated sugar
- 3 large eggs
- 1 15-ounce can pumpkin puree
- 1/2 cup whole milk
- 1/4 cup molasses
- 1 1/4 cups confectioners' sugar
- 2 tablespoons fresh lemon juice

Directions

- 1. Heat oven to 350 F. Butter and flour a 12-cup bundt pan.
- 2. In a large bowl, whisk together the flour, pumpkin pie spice, baking powder, baking soda, and salt.
- 3. Using an electric mixer, beat the butter and granulated sugar on medium-high heat until fluffy, 2 to 3 minutes. One at a time, beat in the eggs. Beat in the pumpkin puree, milk, and molasses (the mixture may appear curdled). Reduce the mixer speed to low; gradually add the flour mixture and mix until just combined (do not overmix).
- 4. Pour the batter into the prepared pan and bake until a toothpick inserted in the center comes out clean, 55 to 65 minutes. Let cool in the pan for 30 minutes, then invert onto a wire rack to cool completely.
- 5. In a small bowl, whisk together the confectioners' sugar and lemon juice until smooth. Drizzle over the cake. Let set before serving.
- Tip: This cake can be baked and glazed up to one day in advance. Store, covered at room temperature.



Halloween PUMPKIN CARVING POINTERS



Begin with a fresh pumpkin. Look for a pumpkin with a green stem. If the pumpkin has been sitting around for too long or has been handled too much, the stem can get brittle and/or fall off. A thick, fresh pumpkin is best for carving.

Plan your ideas. Draw a plan for your pumpkin before you make your first cut. Then transfer that design to the pumpkin with pen or a thin marker. Pumpkin-carving kits come with designs that can be "traced" by poking small holes to create the outline of the design.

Don't cut all the way through. Many professional pumpkin artists do not actually cut clear through the flesh of the pumpkin. They carve and shave off layers of the outer rind until it becomes more translucent. The level of transparency can be adjusted based on how much skin is removed and as a way to add texture and shadowing. The more air that is allowed to penetrate the pumpkin, the faster it will start to degrade.

Delay carving until the last minute. Wait until the day before

Halloween to begin carving. Pumpkins are a perishable item, and they'll begin to rot as soon as you begin carving. Spritzing them with water can help them stay fresh, but there's no turning back the clock once the first cut is made.

Cut a hole in the back. Cutting off the top of the pumpkin can affect its structural integrity and cause it to rot faster. Instead, cut a hole in the back of the pumpkin and use an electric light to illuminate it. LEDs are advisable because they don't generate much heat, which can cook and rot the pumpkin from the inside out.




