LEAP maintenance worker Larry Lord evacuated employees from the building. Firefighters were investigating inside

when the building exploded moments later. Larry Lord's actions undoubtedly saved many lives.

We lost a brave firefighter—Captain Michael Bell of Farmington—while others, including Larry Lord, and our Police Chief Terry Bell, brother of Michael Bell, remain hospi-

You know, I was born and raised in Farmington, and it's my home still. I know the Bell family and I have a great deal of respect for every one of them.

Captain Michael Bell served our community with

dedication for 30 years. His loss is one that is deeply felt by the greater Farmington community.

In times of tragedy I sometimes think about Fred Rogers, you know Mr. Rogers, who said "Look

for the helpers. You will always find people who are helping."

Firefighters from as far away as Saco are on-site in Farmington to help our community. Office space for LEAP employees has been donated by the Western Maine Development Group. The Red Cross is organizing a blood drive next Wednesday, September 25 at the University of Maine at Farmington from noon to 5 p.m. And, people are fundraising to help the families and the people displaced by the explosion.

I am deeply grateful

for all of the efforts to help our community heal and I hope you will also consider helping in whatever way you can.

In the meantime, the investigation into the cause and origin of this explosion is underway. I have directed the Fire Marshal's office to do as much as they can, as soon as they can, to determine the cause of this tragic explosion.

While this was a terrible event for the town of Farmington and for our broader community, I am confident that we will emerge from this as a stronger community, a stronger state, and a stronger people, because that is who we are as Mainers.

I hope that you will join me in offering hopes, thoughts and prayers for the full recovery of those injured.

And, by the way, if you see a first responder, please give them a hug and thank them for the service they perform for the people of Maine.

# **Guest Column: Proud to support laws that help Maine students**

The leaves are turning, the air is cooler, and kids are back to school. As a parent and legislator, I know how important it is to invest in our kids' education, so they can grow to be confident, healthy, productive adults. I'm glad to report that several bills the Legislature passed this session, many of which went into effect this month, will help support the next generation of Mainers. Hungry kids can't

learn. The sad truth is that more than 18% of children in Maine, and almost 20% of children in Androscoggin County go to school hungry. To help make sure more Maine kids have access to healthy meals, the Legislature passed a law that helps Maine schools purchase fresh produce from local farms at low costs to the districts. We also passed a bill to modernize and streamline the process for applying for the free lunch program, expanded breakfast after the bell programs, and expanded the free school lunch program to include all families who qualify for reduced-price lunches. In talking with teachers and administrators in Lewiston, I've learned there's often a direct connection between empty bellies and learning and behavior issues.

Low starting salaries for teachers is a problem, causing many well qualified people to avoid the profession all together. We need to make sure our kids are being taught by the best teachers around. But many school districts in our county just can't afford to offer high enough salaries to compete with more affluent towns. To help address this problem, I wrote and passed a bill that will help more schools hire high-quality teachers. Under this new law, teachers who have attained certification from the National Board for Professional Teaching Standards will be eligible for an increased stipend if they choose to teach in a district where more than 50% of the students qualify for free or reduced meals.

Schools should be safe places for our students and teachers. This year, the Legislature passed a law that will make sure school districts test for lead contamination in drinking water. Lead can get into water through ground contamination and through old pipes and plumbing. Lead poisoning can seriously hurt kids, and can cause longterm health complications, including damage to the brain, slowed development, and hearing problems. Another bill I wrote and passed, which is already in effect, expands the state's lead poisoning control act. This will help more families find out if they're being exposed to lead contamination, so

they can work to address the problem. Lewiston and Auburn have the highest rates of lead poisoning in Maine due to a combination of older housing stock and a recent increased awareness of the importance of testing for lead poisoning.

Over the years, study after study has shown the importance of early childhood education. Quality early education can impact everything from crime rates to economic prosperity. But in order for students to get that good education, we need to make sure they're showing up for their lessons. Early education is the foundation for all learning, and if a kid falls behind, the effects can ripple for years. That's why, after 5 years of trying, I finally passed a bill that will help schools work with families if a child is falling behind in attendance. There are any number of reasons that can impact a child's attendance. Giving teachers and administrators the support they need to help parents just makes sense.

When Maine students succeed, our whole community succeeds. Investing in our schools and our children's education is investing in the future of our state's economy and overall prosperity. I'm proud of all the Legislature has done this year to help kids grow and learn





### Gov. Mills announces Flags to remain **lowered across Maine in honor** of fallen, injured firefighters

Governor Janet Mills authorized the Town of Farmington and fire departments across the state to keep the United States and State of Maine flags at half-staff in honor of those who were critically injured and still recovering from the explosion in Farmington on Monday.

Additionally, Governor

Mills has said she will issue an additional flag lowering directive upon the release of funeral arrangement details for the deceased.

"With deep and enduring respect for Captain Bell and his family, and as we pray for the full recovery of our firefighters and Larry Lord who remain hospitalized, I am authorizing the Town of Farmington and fire departments across the state to keep their flags at halfstaff," said Governor Mills. "Please join me in keeping all of our first responders in vour thoughts and pravers and thank them for the service they perform for the people of Maine."

### St. Dom's Students raise nearly \$1,000 in a day to help victims of hurricane Dorian

Inspired by a conversation about the destruction caused by Hurricane Dorian, students at Saint Dominic Academy in Auburn decided to do more than feel sad.

"I incorporate current events, whenever possible," said Anne Pontbriand, religion teacher at St. Dom's. "At the beginning of each class last week, I brought up the people of the Bahamas in our class prayers. Some students wanted to talk about it at length and know what they could do."

The students quickly came up with the idea for a "dress down day" to raise money for victims of the hurricane in the Bahamas.

"Sarah Brown, Molly Brown, and Alec Beaudin took action and asked our administration if they could do a fundraiser," said Pontbriand.

For \$3, students, faculty, and staff could wear jeans and a t-shirt to school, and for \$5, students could wear athletic clothes.

"Many donated more than the required fee just to support the cause," said Debra Anthoine, director of advancement at the academy. "The total raised was \$925 to support the victims of Hurricane Dorian."

direction it is heading in.



Workforce training partners at Western Maine Community Action (WMCA) marked the celebration a success following the completion of the fourth Lewiston Construction Cohort, a partnership with academy training partners at Lewiston Adult Education, and four local construction business partners (Hahnel Bros., Northeast Paint and Coatings, St. Laurent and Consigli Construction).

Lewiston Adult Education, in partnership with the Lewiston CareerCenter, WMCA, John T. Gorman Foundation, Community Concepts, City of Lewiston, Take2/Goodwill, and Fed Cap offer a construction skills training program designed to equip students with the work readiness skills and sector-specific skills, necessary to become employed in an entry level construction position. Students are provided a work experience with local employers and are eligible for on-the-job training upon completion of the program. Participants must pass CASAS assessments in reading and math, have the ability to work in the United States, and successfully complete an eligibility screening, including an employer-sponsored drug screening. Successful candidates earn a Work Ready credential, OSHA 10, RRP certification completing assignments addressing workplace safety, hand and power tools, construction measuring, fractions and basic geometry.

"In our 5-county area, we are fortunate to have community organizations, educational facilities, and employers willing to collaborate on training projects that benefit both job seekers and business. ### **Lewiston High School referendum:** Administration area reconfiguration

When Lewiston High School (LHS) opened in 1973, an administrative area large enough for the principal, two assistant principals, a couple of secretaries, and a nurse's office, was adequate.

Today, that main office area, the nerve center serving 1500 students—and growing, with approximately 250 Lewiston High School and area community agency staff on-site every day-is seriously in need of renovation. The evolution of society and elevated level of students' personal problems, and the resulting need for more, and varied, resources to meet those situations, have driven the need for increased staffing to be housed there.

The proposed wing of LHS would provide a more secure entryway, with a staff member in a protective 'bubble' who would screen visitors prior to allowing them into the building. The school resource [Lewiston police] officer's headquarters would be adjacent to the main lobby (instead of in its current second floor

location), providing added protection for students and staff. All administrators' offices would be moved closer to the main entrance.

The nurse's office, woefully inadequate for the population of a secondary school the size of Lewiston High, would be expanded, and the vision is that the school-based health center, operated by St. Mary's Regional Medical Center, would be relocated from the second floor of the technical wing to the new section. An expanded guidance department area, with before/ during/after school conference rooms for counselors from outside agencies to meet with students, would round out the new administrative suite

The enhanced structure and capabilities of the area will strengthen LHS's capacity to respond to Lewiston teens' physical and emotional wellbeing as they are trying to cope with an ever faster paced world and its burgeoning challenges.

Richard Sykes, LHS

principal for two decades spanning the end of the 20th Century through the early 21st—and, later, a state representative—views the need for a better administrative suite from a singular perspective. "In the culture and world of today, there must be safety and security in a school building before we can even talk about educating kids. We have to be proactive; having the resource (police) officer located near the main entrance is critical.

"Then," he continues, "there has to be privacy for conversations—teacher to teacher, teacher to student, teacher to parent, and secretary to teacher. The nurse's office has to provide privacy, also, and have the size, equipment, and materials to adequately meet students' needs. As a community, we need to realize that the administrative area is the hub of school activity, and it must have the best possible resources and services, which have to be readily accessible to the students,' Sykes contends.

### **New Maine urgent care center opening**

The Lewiston-Auburn community will have a new source of convenient, affordable, walk-in healthcare—everything from flu shots to stitches—with a Maine Urgent Care center coming in February.

The clinic, operated by Central Maine Healthcare (CMH), is currently under construction at 685 Sabattus Street in Lewiston and is scheduled to open in late winter. As part of CMH's vision to increase access to care through a distributed network of ambulatory health centers, Maine Urgent Care will offer patients with minor illnesses and injuries a more convenient and less expensive alternative to a hospital Emergency Department. The clinic will provide diagnostics including X-ray and lab services.

"We want to offer our patients the care they

need, where and when they need it, and at a good price point," said Melissa Caccamo, CMH's system director of ambulatory and retail services. "Whether you need to be seen for life's everyday bumps and bruises, a flu shot, or even something more emergent, you don't need to schedule an appointment with your primary care provider or wait in an emergency room." The cost of care outside the four walls of a hospital is lower too, she said. Most insurance plans will be recognized, and the clinic will offer accessible pricing for self-pay patients.

A number of providers, including nurse practitioners and physician assistants supervised by a medical doctor who directs the clinic, will see patients in the brand-new two-story building. Hiring is under way for about 20 staff members. The acces-

sible first floor, about 4,800 square feet, will include all patient and clinical areas such as exam rooms, lab facilities, an X-ray suite and comfortable waiting rooms. The second floor will house IT functions and some administrative workspace.

No appointments will be necessary, but patients will be able to reserve a spot online and check wait times.

The Lewiston location is the second of a planned network of ambulatory care centers for Central Maine Healthcare. The first, Maine Urgent Care in Topsham, is one of only two fully accredited urgent care clinics in Maine. It opened just over a year ago and has seen 8,000 patients from more than 80 communities, Caccamo said.

The Lewiston clinic will be open daily 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. Ample parking will be available.


