Two-day conference aims to help returning citizens to ‘Flip the Script’

Having just a minor criminal record can often create substantial barriers to employment.

Further, studies have shown that a criminal record makes it more likely that returning citizens will end up back in jail or prison. However, one local entrepreneur is providing some hope.

Jamasee “Jay” Simms, the owner of J. Simms Events and Marketing, is combining her passion for criminal justice and public relations.

The criminal justice major, who once worked in the U.S. Attorney’s Office, will host a two-day conference dedicated to rebranding individuals who have difficulty finding employment because they have a criminal record.

On Friday, October 25, and Saturday, October 26, Simms will host, “Flip the Script: Rebranding After Incarceration,” a conference she hopes will go a long way in helping to break the cycle at Perfect Office Solutions located at 6811 Kenilworth Avenue in Riverdale, Mary-

land. The conference starts at 9 a.m. each day.

“This event is the first of its kind. It’s a rebranding conference for returning citizens where those in attendance will learn how they can use public relations tools and techniques to transform their lives successfully. These tools were once only for large corporations and brands,” Simms said.

Simms says participants will engage in resume building, dress etiquette, rebranding, mock interview workshops, and other activities. A job fair that includes employers who are ready to hire individuals despite past criminal records will cap the conference.

“I am a firm believer that after incarceration, everyone should receive the help they need to reenter society. I want to use the tools and techniques that are typically reserved for CEOs and large corporations to help returning citizens,” Simms said.

According to one study cited by Simms, within three years of release, 67.8 percent of ex-offenders are

re-arrested. Within five years, 76.6 percent of ex-convicts are re-arrested.

Providing available opportunities should help, according to Simms.

“The stereotypes and negative perceptions of individuals who were in prison often supersede their skills and ability to perform job duties,” Simms said. “Prospective employers don’t often consider the mitigating circumstances of each individual that resulted in them being incarcerated. As a result, when prisoners are released, they face an environment that is challenging and actively deters them from becoming productive members of society.”

It has always been Simms’ goal to help others.

“I had to figure out what way I can give back, so I began to mentor children and returning citizens,” Simms said. “And, this event is something that I wanted to do for a few years because when these citizens return home, things are often different for them.”

One returning citizen Simms spoke with told her a sobering story.

“He mentioned technology, and you know technology is something that changes so much, even within a few months,” Simms said. “This young man went to prison in 1992, and he was released in 2017. So, when he went to prison in the 1990s, you used paper to apply for jobs. He needed to know how to use a computer. It was a major change.”

After one has paid their debt to society, they should be afforded a second chance to start a new life and become a productive citizen.

“Work keeps ex-offenders out of poverty, allows them to gain valuable skills and experience, and helps them avoid reoffending,” she said. “Although returning citizens face many obstacles when they are initially released, one of their toughest is combating widely-held stereotypes and re-establishing their identity. ‘Flip the Script: Rebranding After Incarceration’ conference aims to address the battle returning citizens face when they are pre-judged and denied opportunities solely based on their past.”

Four ways to protect yourself from deadly superbugs

Every year, drug-resistant bacteria and fungi known as "superbugs" infect two million Americans and kills up to 162,000 of those patients. Sadly, that toll could soon skyrocket. Microorganisms like bacteria and fungi build resistance to medical treatments over time. Each time someone uses an antimicrobial—think prescription antibiotics or antibacterial soaps—those microorganisms have a chance to evolve into a drug-resistant superbug.

Superbugs are evolving faster than we're creating new treatments. It's up to everyday Americans to prevent this looming public health crisis. Here are four easy steps to fight the spread of these deadly infections:

1. Avoid antibacterial products— Soap and body wash that contain "antibacterial" ingredients sound healthy. But they aren't.

The U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) determined that antibacterial soaps are no better at preventing illness than regular soap and water. These added ingredients just turn people's bodies into breeding grounds for antimicrobial-resistant bacteria.

Antibacterial cleaning products, meanwhile, leave behind chemicals designed to wipe out bacteria. However, these chemicals aren't 100 percent effective. The surviving bacteria may evolve to become resistant to antimicrobials—posing a threat to humans' safety.

2. Take antibiotics appropriately— When prescribed antibiotics, patients should always complete the full course of treatment, even if they feel better halfway through. Stopping treatment early allows some bacteria to live on and evolve.

Patients should also only take antibiotics when absolutely necessary. Many often clamor for antibiotics as soon as they catch colds, even though most colds along with the flu, bronchitis, and the stomach flu, are caused by viruses, which antibiotics can't treat. Thirty percent of antibiotics prescribed in the United States are unnecessary, according to a study in the Journal of Antimicrobial Chemotherapy. Only one in 10 sore-throat patients actually needs antibiotics, but six in 10 receive them.

By overusing antibiotics or not taking them as directed, Americans inadvertently accelerate the spread of superbugs. Patients can exercise caution and only use antibiotics as a last resort. For instance, folks should confirm they actually have strep throat before taking amoxicillin. Otherwise, they may increase their risk of resistant infections down the line.

3. Get vaccinated— It's crucial that people stay up-to-date on their shots. A single vaccine prevents the same infections as a whole regimen of antibiotics.

Consider the bacteria responsible for many ear and sinus infections, *Streptococcus pneumoniae*. If every child in the world was vaccinated for that bacteria, the World Health Organization estimates it would prevent 11 million days of antibiotic use every year.

4. Tell Congress to support the DISARM Act— In June, Senators Johnny Isakson (R-GA) and Bob Casey (D-PA) introduced the Developing an Innovative Strategy for Antimicrobial Resistance, or DISARM, Act. The bipartisan bill would incentivize doctors and hospitals to use newer antibiotics, instead of older less effective ones. The proposal would also require hospitals to start stewardship programs to monitor how and when they administer antibiotics. Such programs have proven effective at reducing the amount of unnecessary prescriptions that doctors write.

The DISARM Act is an essential first step in preventing the misuse of antibiotics. Americans can call or write their senators to advocate for the bill. By taking small steps to prevent antibiotic resistance, everyone can help save millions of lives from the scourge of superbugs.

Black pilot flying with a mission of diversity

Walking on to an airplane and seeing a black pilot is as rare as a blood moon sighting.

The Bureau of Labor Statistics reports that of the approximately 690,000 active certificated pilots in the U.S., less than three percent are African American.

While a blood moon occurs about every two years, Jerome Stanislaus often takes the pilot's seat in the cockpit of a private aircraft.

He pilots friends, family members, and others from New York to Philadelphia. Sometimes, he flies further south to Virginia and, there are occasions where he traverses the skies above the Big Apple on a traffic-beating short flight to Long Island.

"Right now, I'm in San Antonio going through Flight Engineer School in the Airforce for the C5 Galaxy," Stanislaus said.

The C5 Galaxy is a large military transport aircraft.

"It's a huge cargo plane, and I would like to continue training to make it [as a commercial airline pilot] when I am done with this school," Stanislaus said.

Despite the limited amount of African Americans in the cockpit, Stanislaus said now is the time for people of color to join the pilot ranks.

"There is about to be a mass exodus of commercial pilots, and their spots will

said. "As far as they are concerned they don't need to be pilots if I can just fly them where they want to go."

After graduating high school, Stanislaus trained to become an aircraft mechanic in the Marine Corps.

Later, he earned a degree in airport management and then went to work as a school teacher.

Flying, however, remained his foremost passion.

He signed up for flight lessons and, in

officials at GoFundMe have reached into their pockets, too.

Flying isn't the only sky-high activity Stanislaus enjoys. He is also a licensed skydiver.

"In April 2014, I went on my first skydive for my [ex] girlfriend's birthday," Stanislaus said. "I was really calm and excited until I got into the plane and it started to leave the ground. During the climb, I had this internal fear that intensified tremendously, but I was calm externally."

When the door opened, Stanislaus said he could no longer "keep it together."

"I began to freak out. All of my dignity, pride, and masculinity went out the door," Stanislaus said. "It was hands down, the scariest moment of my life."

He later found the courage to complete the jump and then began searching drop zones to other jumps.

"I saw myself living myself to the fullest and inspiring others to do the same. Most importantly, I saw myself finding the courage to face the biggest fear in my life and enjoying the fuck out of it," he said. "My ultimate goal in life is to inspire others."

"The demand for what I offer is growing and renting no longer makes the most sense. In the long run, buying a plane is the most cost-effective course of action, so that is where I am focusing my money," he said.

Maryland Congressman Elijah Eugene Cummings Dies at 68

Representative Elijah E. Cummings, (D-MD 7th District), a political giant, died early Thursday morning at the age of 68.

Maya Rockeymoore Cummings, the congressman's wife, said Cummings died at 2:45 a.m. at Johns Hopkins Hospital. Mrs. Cummings said her husband's death resulted from complications concerning longstanding health challenges.

Over the past couple of years, Cummings had been in and out of the hospital.

"Dr. Elijah Saunders and I took care of Congressman Cummings for [years] for his blood pressure," said Cummings' longtime nurse, Barbara "B.J." Shaneman.

"He always called me the "boss" because he told his team I was a short woman with a big voice. I would fuss at him about watching his blood pressure. His health was my concern. I screamed when I heard the news. I said, 'this can't happen.' I said they [Cummings and Saunders, who died in 2015] were the last of the old guard," stated Shaneman.

Recently, and in increasingly rare sightings of the congressman, Cummings was seen using a walker.

He underwent an undisclosed medical procedure, and his office expected that he would only miss about one week of work.

"He was an honorable man who proudly served his district and the nation with dignity, integrity, compassion, and humility," Mrs. Cummings said.

The congressman was known as a passionate advocate for his beloved Baltimore. Earlier this year, he defended Baltimore after President Donald Trump disparaged the city – particularly parts of Cummings' district.

Trump labeled areas of the city a "rodent-infested mess where no human being would want to live."

Cummings immediately responded.

"Those in the highest levels of government must stop making hateful, incendiary comments that only serve to divide and distract the nation from its real problems, including mass shootings and white supremacy," Cummings said

"Those in the highest levels of the government must stop invoking fear, using racist language and encouraging reprehensible behavior," Cummings added.

The congressman told a local report that he and Trump had just one face-to-face conversation since the president took office in 2016.

"I said, 'Mr. President, you're now 70-something, I'm 60-something. Very soon, you and I will be dancing with the angels. The thing that you and I need to do is figure out what we can do – what present can we bring to generations unborn?'

Cummings was born and raised in Baltimore. He obtained his Bachelor's Degree in Political Science from Howard University, serving as Student Government President and graduating Phi Beta Kappa.

Later he graduated from the University of Maryland School of Law.

The recipient of 13 honorary doctoral degrees, Cummings dedicated his life of service to uplifting and empowering the people he is sworn to represent, according to his biography.

He began his career in public service in the Maryland House of Delegates, where he served for 14 years.

Cummings became the first African American in Maryland history to ascend to the position of Speaker Pro Tem.

Since 1996, Congressman Cummings has represented Maryland's 7th Congressional District in the U.S. House of Representatives.

Congressman Cummings often said that children "are the living messages that we send to a future we will never see."

He was committed to ensuring that the next generation has access to quality healthcare and education, clean air and water, and a strong economy defined by fiscal responsibility.

His last act in Congress came on Oct. 8, when he joined three others from a bipartisan group to introduce legislation called "The Family Asthma Act."

The bill seeks to expand federal, state, and local efforts to improve care for individuals with asthma.

"He was a champion of the people, a soldier and a warrior for his city, the state, and the nation," said Baltimore Times Publisher Joy Bramble. "Elijah Cummings made Baltimore and all of those who came across better."

"Long live the freedom-fighting spirit of Brother Leader Congressman Elijah Cummings," National Newspaper Publishers Association President, Dr. Benjamin F. Chavis, Jr., said. "On behalf of the Black Press of America, we extend our heartfelt condolences to Mrs. Cummings and the Cummings family."

Getting CB Marcus Peters good for Ravens now and future

The Baltimore Ravens sent linebacker Kenny Young and a 2020 fifth-round pick to the Los Angeles Rams in exchange for cornerback Marcus Peters in a surprise move on Tuesday, October 15, 2019. The fact that Peters was available via trade raised some eyebrows but the picture came together later in the day when the Rams acquired Jalen Ramsey from the Jacksonville Jaguars. Now Peters will suit up for the Ravens and bring an added edge to the defense.

Baltimore is stocked at cornerback with Peters joining a group that already includes Marlon Humphries, Brandon Carr, Cyrus Jones, Maurice Canady, Justin Bethel and Anthony Averett. Veteran Jimmy Smith should be able to return from a knee injury he suffered in the season opener. Smith's return will create a crowded group.

Humphries, Peters, Carr and Smith are all starting caliber cornerbacks that have played the CB1 role in the past. Peters gives Baltimore a young defensive player with the swagger of last Ravens defenses. He is not afraid to trash talk on the field and has the ability to back it up.

The Ravens defense is coming off a solid outing against the lowly Bengals but struggled in their two previous games. Adding Peters was a good move and comes at a low cost. He remains one of the better cornerbacks in the league and is playing in his fifth season. He already has two interceptions this season.

The bigger question is whether or not the Ravens will sign Peters to a contract extension. He will likely command a large salary. Carr's contract expires after the

2020 season but Baltimore can save \$6 million in cap space if they release him.

Smith's contract will expire after this season. Given that Humphries still has two years remaining on his deal, it's likely that he and Peters will form the Ravens top cornerback duo in the future.

Through four seasons and six games, Peters has 24 career interceptions. He is capable of playing man or zone defense but is best suited in a zone scheme. His ball skills and aggressive approach to coverage gives him a chance against most receivers, even those bigger than him. Add in his willingness to come up and tackle running backs and you have the makings of a top corner.

Peters makes his Ravens debut on Sunday, October 20, 2019, against the Seattle Seahawks. It will be a homecoming of sorts since he played college football nearby at the University of Washington.

Black superheroes take over the Reginald F. Lewis Museum!

The Reginald F. Lewis Museum of Maryland African American History & Culture located in the heart of Baltimore is giving visitors a different way to take in the black experience through a new exhibit called: EMPOWERED! Black Action Figures, Superheroes & Collectibles

Two-dozen black action figures await those who want to see familiar superheroes like Lt. Uhura from "Star Trek." Not so familiar figures are there too, like the crime-fighting Omega Man. The action figures date from the 1970s to the early 2000s.

"We've seen it first hand with kids that come in here just excited to see black and brown faces looking back at them as heroes and toys, so that's why we did this exhibition," said Jenn Biddle, marketing and communications manager of the museum.

Like the reaction to the release of the Marvel movie "Black Panther," the 2018 runaway hit comic book adoption starring a predominantly African American cast, museum staffers said they are getting the same reaction from exhibit visitors taking in EMPOWERED!

"When diverse people are shown in the role of superhero, it is actually a commentary of where we are as a nation. The rise of the black action figures shows that they would actually sell. There was a market there. People actually wanted to see a black action figure, a black hero," said Biddle.

The first black action figures date back to the mid 1960s with the debut of the first black G.I. Joe. Historians say after that, more and more black action figures became available as toys.

Robert Hall, who was an associate director of the Smithsonian's Anacostia Community Museum, is the collector who made the exhibit available for the world to see. Hall originally wanted to showcase his collection at The Smithsonian, but discovered the Lewis Museum. He told Lewis officials hosting the action figures the museum would be the best fit for the collection.

director, said the exhibit marries Hall's enthusiasm about his collection and the importance of representation.

"This is a fun exhibition, and it's very relatable. It's also a teachable moment for our audiences to understand the complex nature of black superheroes and collectibles," said Copeland.

Fans taking in the exhibit agreed that it is something worth experiencing.

"My favorite part was seeing all the figurines and all the representation in black culture because I wasn't really aware how much there actually was. So I think that in a time where black superheroes seemed a bit taboo, I didn't realize how much that was pushed," said Vincent Fasano of Long Island. "I think it definitely had a cultural impact, and I am glad that this exhibit is here to commemorate that."

"I am a huge superhero fan and it was very interesting to get to see how much African American culture has shaped



that and how superhero culture has been influential in improving the roles of African Americans in the media," said Ashna Pathan, a Baltimore area college student.



Southwest Partnership plans to turn home of free black man into museum



The Southwest Partnership continues to step up its work to build what officials call an awesome community in Southwest Baltimore.

Executive Director Michael Seipp says among the more intriguing projects is the home that sits at 1504 West Baltimore Street. It is believed that the home dates back to the 1820s, which makes it among the oldest in the district. What's more, it may be the only frame house in the area; and was once owned by Malachi Mills, a free African American carpenter.

"We're turning it into a museum," Seipp said of the historic landmark. "We have received grant money to stabilize it, and then we'll have a fundraiser to help us turn it back to what it originally looked like."

According to the Baltimore City website, the vast majority of existing residential structures in the Union Square district date to the period 1845 to 1880, with institutional and commercial buildings continuing to be added in the late 19th and into the 20th Century. The period of significance of 1820 to 1930 encompasses the range and location of housing for residents of a variety of socioeconomic circumstances and the institutions and businesses that served them.

In addition, the period captures the eras of Baltimore's growth as it expanded from its original core around the Inner Harbor into formerly open spaces, transforming them into dense urban neighborhoods adjacent to burgeoning industries. The Mills house itself is rich

with history.

"The Malachi Mills House is a unique Baltimore historic site both for its architectural features and for its social history. It's one of the few—if not the last—wood-frame houses in West Baltimore; and one of the oldest buildings

along W. Baltimore Street which historically has been a major commercial corridor," Elizabeth Weber of the Southwest Partnership told ExploreBaltimore.org.

"The survival of the Malachi Mills House represents continuity through change along the corridor—a fixed point in an evolving neighborhood," Weber said. "The Malachi Mills House offers insight into under-represented aspects of Baltimore's history—the lives of craftspeople of color and their families in the early nineteenth century—as well as an opportunity to explore the history of W. Baltimore Street and the surrounding neighborhoods."

Seipp says The Southwest Partnership is diligently working to secure more details about Mills. He further says the project should yield some of the more exciting finds in recent memory.

"We are researching Mr. Mills more extensively," Seipp said. "We also have a design team working to recreate how the house would have been originally laid out, and we hope to have a clean title in the next couple of months. At that point, we will be able to move full steam ahead."

"The building definitely sticks out. We were very excited when we had the opportunity to save this piece of Baltimore history. As one of the largest populations of free blacks in the country, the contribution of these citizens is rarely told."


