# Elkhart Lake turns 125

This month the Village of Elkhart Lake will celebrate its 125th anniversary.

On Tuesday, November 19, an ice cream social is planned at the Grashorn Civic Center, from 4 to 6 p.m. to commemorate the event. A slide show of historical photos of Elkhart Lake will run continuously during the social. Special buttons with the anniversary logo will also be available.

In recognition of the milestone date, here is an abridged look at some of the key moments in village history, based on historical records from the centennial book, and updates from village officials.

The village's history dates back to the times of tribal peoples inhabiting the area. In 1847, J. L. Moore purchased a large tract of land from the government to create the first "settlement" in the Elkhart Lake area.

The unincorporated village grew quickly with acquisitions by D. Carver, William Reineck and Peter Sharpe. Sharpe bought 80 acres, which later became the site for Shapre's Hotel.

In just 10 years, Elkhart Lake had its own post office with Frederick Spaulding as its first postmaster.

By 1872, largely at the urging of William Schwarz, the Milwaukee and Northern Railroad saw value in placing its tracks through Elkhart Lake on its push northward. Once the railroad came to town, it created an enormous opportunity for the development of businesses and resorts in the community.

To meet the demands of the growing population, Schwarz laid out the original plat of the village in 1875. Street names

# Long-tenured residents saw history in the making

Although no resident of Elkhart Lake can lay claim to witnessing all 125 years of the village's history, a few residents can say they have seen a majority of that history from a first hand view.

The rich history of the village, as seen through the eyes of some long time citizens gives keen insights into the changes and cultural shifts that have occurred in the last two-thirds of that time span.

Memories range from childhood experiences to political debates. Their recollections recall trends and changes—some welcome and some not.

They have seen generations of business

owners, resort guests, local residents—all people who comprise the character of Elkhart Lake—from the unique spectacles of the passage of time.

Here, we can listen to and ponder some of those perspectives.

They are the views of people who have seen Elkhart Lake from the perspective of government, business, civic, volunteer and family ranks within the community.

They all share one thing in common, however. They still love it here in Elkhart Lake, and they still call it home.

#### **Childhood recollections**

Betty Lou Lanser recalls when the square was "really a square."

"They used to plow all the snow into the middle of the square. It was hollow in the middle, and we used to climb inside and play. Eventually they kicked us out because of safety factors."

Frank Thielmann, whose family once ran one of the village's meat markets, recalls the square as a place where concerts were held. As a grade school drum player, he joined the school band every Friday night, well past dark with the lights from the bank shining down on the musicians.

"The cars all parked there and listened to the concert. When the train came, we would quit playing until it left."

Others recalled the free movies at Fireman's Park on Tuesday nights.

On occasion they would run up to the canning company and help themselves to a #10 can full of peas. "The next morning we had a belly ache," one recalled.

Some fondly remembered the puppet shows where the gazebo is located now.

Others waxed about the old theater in the Kissinger Electric building, where tap dance lessons were offered.

Yvonne Gessert Landgraf admitted she wasn't suited to the lessons, as her left foot wouldn't cooperate.

Yes, the memories of an older Elkhart Lake flowed with ease-


# Save the date for Elkhart Lake's Christmas in the Square!

#### Thanks for the giving

It was 398 years ago (November 1621) that about 140 Pilgrims and Wampanong Indians gathered together for a 3 day festival. We now refer to it as the first Thanksgiving. There were no religious overtones - they were just getting together for a celebration of fun and games.

Our Thanksgiving had it's birth with George Washington who set aside the 4th Thursday of November as a day of public prayer. Then on October 3, 1863 President Abraham Lincoln set aside the same date as a "day of gratitude for the Army's victory at Gettysburg (obviously the South ignored this). On November 26, 1941 President Franklin Roosevelt established the 4th Thursday of November as the Official Thanksgiving Day. Actually, his basic motivation was to bolster the economy by promoting this

It's interesting to know the origins of our present day Thanksgiving which is probably known as a day we we overeat rather than really taking time to reflect and give thanks for all we have.

So let's review the "eats" portion of the day. At that original 1621 festival there might have been a wild turkey but probably roasted deer was the main dish, no potatoes but plenty of turnips, lots of fish — especially mussels—and pumpkins were used, but they were hollowed out and filled with milk, honey and spices and then roasted in hot ashes.

We prefer out current food choices and here are some of our tips to make a no-hassel-make-ahead Thanksgiving authentic American dinner.

Start with the turkey. We roast it one or two days before Thanksgiving. Cool it, slice it and place pieces on an oven broiling pan and cover with aluminum. On Thanksgiving day, add water to the bottom of the broiling pan and heat. Really - the meat gets hot and the steam keeps it moist and everyone will assume you just cut it up.

Also, your mashed potatoes can be done the day or so in advance. Just boil them (I rice them) add butter and salt or whatever else you want and place them in a double boiler. If you don't have a double boiler just put the pan with the potatoes into a larger pan 1/3 to 1/4 filled with water and heat.

Make whatever veggies you like but we like carrots cut into coins, steamed and doused with honey and dill. This can also be done in advance and also we suggest re-heating in a double boiler.

Cranberries—yes—the best bet is the recipe on the package. It never fails and can be made in advance.

For dessert Pumpkin pie is the perfect choice but if you're not a baker then take a visit to the grocery store.

Oh you ask, "what about beverages" here you're on your own.

A bottle of champagne is always nice. Yeah, beer will probably be the main choice and that's ok-lots of choices there.

Finally, in addition to probably overeating why not also remember to start the meal with a prayer giving THANKS.



Becky is still practicing as a veterinarian for her personal horses, cattle, and pets. She is also performing relief veterinarian services to local practices and at her daughter's rodeos

Jonathan O'Neil, a 1995 ELGHS graduate, was very involved while he attended ELGS before he became a successful physician practicing in Neurology and Sleep Medicine. Jonathan was a member of the National Honor Society, was on the JV football team his freshman year, and played on the varsity football team his sophomore through his senior year. Jonathan also helped locally in the places he has worked to improve neurology and Sleep Medicine Care. He also volunteers with the medical school and has volunteered with disabled athlete organizations.

Mr. Duane Schuler, a 1968 ELGHS graduate, is known for his outstanding creativity and incredible lighting design

that has been recognized throughout the world. Duane graduated from the University of Wisconsin-Madison graduating with a Bachelor's of Science in Communication Arts. He has been designing lighting for opera, ballet, and theatre for the past 45 years. Duane's first professional design was at the Guthrie Theatre in Minneapolis in 1974 for a production of Love's Labor's Lost. The following season Duane became the resident lighting designer and from 1974-1982 he designed over 35 productions at the Guthrie Theatre.

In 1976 Duane started designing for the Lyric Opera of Chicago and has designed over 150 productions at the Lyric Opera. He has worked with many well noted directors while designing for Lyric Opera. Duane worked on the production of Otello in 1994 that began his relationship with the Metropolitan Opera in New York. Since then he has designed 28 new productions for the Met. He has worked with directors and designers that include Franzo Zeffrielli, Robert Carson, and John Copley just to name a few.

In 1996 Duane designed a production of Madama Butterfly for the Santa Fe Opera and has since designed 48 operas for that particular venue. Duane also works with many other companies which include the San Francisco Opera, Seattle Opera, Dallas Opera, Houston Grand Opera, and the Los Angeles Opera.

Duane's work is known internationally as well. His international work includes productions for the Royal Opera House, English National Opera, Glyndebourne Festival, Wien Staatsoper, Deutsch Oper Berlin, Baden Baden Festival, Salzburg Festival, Opera Lyon, Paris Opera, Amsterdam Nationale Opera, and La Scala. Duane also designs for ballet companies including The Stuttgart Ballet, Houston Ballet, and many more. Duane is also a cofounder of Schuler Shook, a Theatre Planning and Architectural Lighting Design firm with offices in Minneapolis, Chicago, Dallas, San Francisco, and Melbourne.

Tom Wiese, a 1962 ELGHS graduate, who still resides in Elkhart Lake, was very involved while he attended ELGHS. Tom was Student Council President from 1961-1962. He was also the captain of the basketball team and the golf team. He was the Junior Prom King in 1961 and loved being in the senior class play "Girl Crazy" in which he played Lank. After high school, Tom attended the University of Wisconsin-Madison. He rowed on and captained the Freshmen Crew team and he earned a varsity letter in Golf while earning his degree. After earning his degree, he joined the US Peace Corps from 1968-1970 with his wife, Lynn. After the Peace Corps, Tom then owned and operated the Quit-Qui-Oc Golf Club with his wife, Lynn, and family for 33 years from 1977-2009. His leadership turned it into the community asset that Quit-Qui-Oc is today. He served as the President of the Wisconsin Professional Golfer's Association and created golf fund-raisers which supported the American Cancer Society. Tom and Lynn, also began, in the 1970's, and continue to promote cross-country skiing in this part of the country.

Tom is still very involved in the Elkhart Lake community. Tom was a village board member for many years, served two terms as the Elkhart Lake Service Club President, and also served two terms as the Elkhart Lake Chamber of Commerce President. His spirit of community service led him to help spearhead the beginning of the Elkhart Lake-Glenbeulah Education Foundation. Tom has also been a member of the Elkhart Lake Lions Club for 35 years. Tom noted that he is "happy to be an ELGHS grad" and that he "Likes to sing!"

Brigadier General Ron Wilson, a 1978 ELGHS graduate, was extremely involved while he attended ELGHS. He was on the football, cross country, wrestling, and track teams. He was also involved in the high school band, plays, and the ski club.



were selected, and still stand as familiar names today—Maple, Pine, Spring, West, Lake and East Streets.

A group of local business people petitioned the Sheboygan County Circuit Court on July 17, 1894, to incorporate the settlement of Elkhart Lake into a village. That group led by Terrett Sharpe, Louis Laun, A. J. Goldhammer, C. H. Griem, John Brickbauer, Val Raeder and George Rosenthal spelled out their rationale for incorporating on a five point list-

- Part of the area had already been platted, including the designation of streets;
- The valuation was sufficient to support a local government;
- The Chicago Milwaukee & St. Paul Railroad was making stops every day in Elkhart Lake.
- The community had become a marketing and business center for the surrounding area; and
- The community had an established summer resort business.

The petition to become a village was also posted in local stores operated by Goldhammer, Griem and August Riess for local consideration.

Three months later, Judge N. S. Gilson approved the incorporation of the Village of Elkhart Lake, including 595.22 acres. The incorporation was still subject to a public vote. On November 3, the vote was taken and passed by a 73-2 margin. At the time, the official population of Elkhart Lake was 392. Today, Elkhart Lake has nearly trippled in numbers of people.

On December 1, the first town meeting was held in the local schoolhouse on Block 8.

T.C. Sharpe was elected the first village president. Trustees were O. A. LaBudde, William Reineck, Jacob Mirsburger, Herman Kadau, C. H. Mudrow and George Sattler.

George Kraemer was named village clerk, while C. H. Griem was treasurer.

Mudrow also served as constable, while George Rosenthal was named marshal. Louis LaBudde was tabbed for police justice. John Bauernfeind and Peter Breckheimer were the first justices.

#### Some historical highlights for the village

April 1895 - First permanent jail and village hall authorized for construction on corner of North Lake and Maple Streets.

1896 - Village authorizes Plymouth Power & Light Company to erect poles and wires to provide electricity. Permission granted to G. A Kraemer to operate a telephone line and exchange.

1897 - Volunteer Hook & Ladder Company requests village to provide a hook and ladder truck.

1897 - 15 kerosene street lamps purchased and used to light streets at night. H. Holzschuh is village's first lamplighter, being paid \$44 per year.

1898 - Kerosene street lamps replaced by four electric arc lamps installed in center of street at four locations.

1899 - Waterworks becomes next village priority. Pumping station built on lake frontage lot on South Lake Street, acquired from William Schwartz. Source of water is Elkhart Lake. Stone brick reservoir authorized for construction on Elkhart Hill.

1900 - Village amends job description for marshal stating that a marshal or deputy must be at the depot for all incoming or outgoing passenger trains.

1902 - Street railway authorized with



granting of franchise to the Sheboygan-Elkhart Lake Railway and Electric Com-

1904 - Elkhart Lake High School begins with freshman class only. Sophomores added the following year.

1906 - Elkhart Lake village board supports free library.

1912 - Elkhart Lake has approximately 500 inhabitants, the village has three smitheys, a bakery, two meat markets, two lumber yards, two grain elevators, one saw mill and five large hotels. Approximately 4,000 guests stayed at the hotels this year.

1922 - Quit Qui Oc Golf Course established.

1928 - New school built on Maple Street. 1931 - Fireman's Park purchased by Elkhart Lake Fire Department.

1940 - The village has its summer hotels with 442 rooms, and another 174 rooms in licensed tourist homes.

1940 - Prohibition of gambling passes by Wisconsin. Gambling had been one of the main attractions at the hotels for many years.

1948 - Spring election passes a referendum for a new fire station.

1950 - New fire station dedicated.

1950 - Road races brought to the streets of Elkhart Lake.

1950 - The Elkhart Lake Businessmen's Association formally renamed the Elkhart Lake Chamber of Commerce.

1955 - Road America holds first races at the new track south of Elkhart Lake.

1955 - Osthoff Hotel sold to Harand sisters, becomes Harand Camp of the Arts. 1967-68 - Elkhart Lake constructs a new high school.

1968 - The Elkhart Lake Railroad depot is closed.

1969 - Era of railroad passenger service to Elkhart Lake comes to an end.

1972 - Separate sewage treatment facilities proposed.

1980 - Grashorn Civic Center opens as home to village government and Elkhart Lake Public Library.

1991 - Project Osthoff proposed.

1993 - Village Created Tax Increment Financing District #1 to support the Osthoff Resort project.

1994 - Elkhart Lake celebrates its centennial from June 28 to July 2.

1998 - Village Offices and Police Department opened at 40 Pine Street and the Elkhart Lake Public Library expanded.

1999-2000 - Barefoot Bay was redevelopment into Victorian Village Resort.

2005 - Cedar Communities Development started.

2009 - The new fire station, jointly owned with the Town of Rhine, opened at 610 S. Lincoln Street.

2012 - TIF #1 was closed after successful completion of all projects.

2015-2019 - There has been a surge in development over last 5 years, including projects such as Compassionate Care Animal Clinic, Throttlestop Phases 1 & 2, and Aston Flats.

#### Inside the Bottle

#### Beaujolais

November means cooler days, searching for the perfect turkey recipe, and Beaujolais. The Beaujolais ("Bohsjoh-lay") region of France is associated with November because each year they release the first wine of the harvest called Beaujolais Nouveau. This wine is fermented quick, bottled super fresh, then shipped out around the world for its coordinated release on the third Thursday of November. Because of the timing being so close to Thanksgiving, Beaujolais Nouveau is typically featuring in Turkey Day pairing recommendations, but as you may recall from last year's November "Inside the Bottle", there are lots of other great wines to try, including non-nouveau Beaujolais.

Beaujolais is a wine region located near the middle of France, just south of Burgundy and north of the city of Lyon. Gamay is the main cultivar here, a grape that isn't all that well known outside of this region but can produce some lovely red wines and rosés. Great Gamay can taste similar to Pinot Noir with a lighter body and tannin, but a lot of complexity and notes of cherry, raspberry, and black pepper. This vigorous variety has been cultivated since at least the 15th century and can also be found outside of Beaujolais in California, the Loire Valley of France, and Oregon.

In Beaujolais, there are 10 "crus" or villages/subregions of higher status that craft high-quality Beaujolais. These include Brouilly, Chénas, Chiroubles, Cote de Brouilly, Fleurie, Juliénas, Morgon, Moulin-à-Vent, Régnié, and Saint Amour. These names appear boldly on the front label of a bottle and tend to be a bit more in cost, but way over deliver in taste and value. My favorites tend to come from Moulin-à-Vent (more robust) and Fleurie (more aromatic), but all of them offer lovely options.

Below Cru Beaujolais there are wines that are simply labeled with the regional name of "Beaujolais" and the slightly higher "Beaujolais-Villages". Wines labeled in this way are made from a blend of Gamay grapes sourced from the vari-

ous crus or from vineyards within the region, but outside the cru vineyards. They can vary more from producer to producer and the key is to look for reputable producers.

Further down the quality-level hierarchy of Beaujolais is "Beaujolais Nouveau". Often the only level that Americans are familiar with, this wine is produced in a rapid fermentation process called carbonic maceration. This process tends to create a very fruity red wine with almost bubble gum-like aromas. It is light-bodied and can be food friendly, but it isn't meant to age and can taste simple and underdeveloped. I typically only carry it in exemplary vintages, as I think there are lots of other great options at that price point and from this region.

If you're looking for something unique to try with your Thanksgiving meal this year, give Cru Beaujolais a go! It's subtle body and tannin won't overpower anything, its peppery notes are great with turkey and stuffing, and its red berry notes are delicious with cranberry sauce. Plus, you can share your newly learned Beaujolais knowledge with family and friends and look like an expert!

Whatever you do enjoy this Turkey Day, I am thankful for your support and wish you a wonderful Thanksgiving!

bler not only sold and repaired shoes, but made some of their own—sandals being very popular;

- sulky racing held on the property where the high school stands;
- Elkhart Hill as a site for toboganning, complete with a lift;
- **a** time when the village had four grocery stores;
- an era where upstart comedians performed at Pine Point resort;
- a time when the Schwartz Hotel had big dance band entertainers;
- and memories of the resort industry that has long been a part of the village's identity.

#### Seasonal business

Like so many Elkhart Lake residents, their interactions with resort guests have left lasting memories.

Landgraf's family owned Gesserts back in the day, and she recalls the "summer people" who frequented Elkhart Lake.

"Back in the 1940s, the women always wore formals, black dresses with gold jewelry, and the fellas always had a suit and leather soles shoes," she recalled.

Another mentioned, "We would like to touch their dresses just to feel the fabric."

Landgraf remembers Gesserts serving plate lunches, dinners, malted milks and sandwiches to the resort guests. The storefront would stay open and serve until 1:30 in the morning.

"That's when the dance pavilion would shut down, and the people would come up to the store. The booths were packed, and they would line up outside the store to wait. It was a fun era back in the 1940's."

Lanser and Viola Feldmann both recalled how the example of the out of town guests led to the local children wanting to play "dress up" in their spare time. "The kids loved dressing up in high heels and showing off pretty purses," one resident recalled.

"We also played outside a lot—all the time, you never see kids doing that any more," Feldmann recalled.

#### Waiting for the trains

Others recall waiting for the trains, even as a means of earning a little extra



cash.

Peter Menne, a former Village President, was one of those who got on the early entrepreneurial bandwagon. "When the people from Chicago would come out, we would help carry their bags. Once we got 25 cents we would go to the Tern and Anchor for a cold turtle sundae."

Thielmann worked as a bag handler as well. "I remember one time helping a family, a husband, wife and three little girls. I had to lug all five suitcases down to Siebkens and up to the second floor. They only gave me 10 cents," he recalled. "It should have been a quarter."

The passenger and freight trains were a major focal point of village life. They had a regular schedule, an 8:15 southbound in the morning and a 3:30 north in the morning. Other trains moved through Elkhart lake at 6:30 in the morning and 10:30 at night, only stopping if they had passengers.

Some of the residents recalled packing lunches and sitting in the fields behind Osthoff on a little knoll to watch for the

train to come in at 3:30. Of course, they stomped down some poor farmer's wheat or grain in the process.

#### **News connection**

The trains also brought the news from the outside world to the community in the form of newspapers.

Landgraf recalled that the papers came from a wide range of news sources—the Herald Examiner, the Chicago Tribune, the Chicago Sun and Times and the Milwaukee Journal.

"They would shove the paper bundles off the train in the village square and Dad would load up all the newspapers to prepare for sale," she said.

"We had a long metal table where we cut the wrappings and the string, and then stuffed all the sections together."

Sometimes the papers would tumble under the wheels of the train and get shredded. "We had to explain to the people why they were missing part of their paper. Some were pretty considerate. Others were not at all."

Menne saw the mail operations from the inside of the train, riding the mail cars that would distribute the mail up and down the route from Milwaukee to Elkhart Lake and beyond. The train would carry as many as seven mail cars, which had up to 35 guys working feverishly to sort the mail.

"We would pick up mail in Elkhart Lake and have to have it sorted by the time we got to Kiel."

#### **Gambling part of the attraction**

Long-time Elkhart Lake residents know that gambling was always one of the attractions, perhaps even after it was declared illegal.

"There was a lot of gambling in the Tern and Anchor," Menne recalled. "They had gambling in the basement and penny slot machines upstairs. Old Floyd Dixon got nailed for gambling at the Osthoff (the original Osthoff)."

Menne recalled encountering some traditional "friendly gambling" on the porch of one of the resorts where he served as a bus boy. "We would go out there as bus boys where the Jewish people from Chicago were playing poker. We had to get them their cocktails, because the bartenders weren't allowed to go out there. If we did a good job for them, they would give us a little portion of the pot. We could make out pretty handily in the process."

Others relied on more traditional means of income from the resort connections.

Several of the ladies recalled doing laundry for some of the resort businesses. The Camp Harand laundry operation provided some income for some, while others recall working as chamber maids at one of the resorts.

#### **Cultural connections**

Residents of Elkhart Lake recall strong cultural connections for the resort guests coming to the community. The presence of Jewish visitors was well-noted, along with the strong presence of German people.

Some of the German folks who came to Elkhart Lake in the 1940s were not exactly resort guests.

They were German prisoners of war, housed down the road at the Sheboygan County Fairgrounds. Many worked for the local canning company. Some even came back to the area after being sent home to Germany following the second world war.

#### **Troubled times in the 60s**

Many of the long-time residents recalled the challenges of the 1960s, when the village was nearly overrun by young people during racing season.

"There was a lot of unrest in the country during those times," Landgraf recalled, "and it seems the young people who went to Florida for spring break wanted to do the same thing here in Elkhart Lake."

She recalls the village deputizing anyone and everyone to help with the "riots."

People were stealing, lobbing beer cans across the street. Some tried to break into local business after hours.

"The fire department came in and tried to settle things down by hosing the crowd, only to have the rioters cut the hoses," she remembered.

Eventually, the National Guard was called in. The current Chamber of Commerce office was a temporary police office. Thielmann recalls how law enforcement backed a bus up to the back door of the building, and as the young people were arrested they were ushered in the front door, and out the back into the bus. When the bus was full, they were wheeled away.

This type of "guest" found their own lodging outside the village.

#### Forging a future

Another key unsettling event in Elkhart Lake's history involved the village taking sides over the closing of Lake Street for the purpose of allowing construction of the new Osthoff Resort.

Landgraf remembers opposing the closure of the street. "It was the main thing we objected to. We even drove to Door County to interview store keepers there on how this might impact business."

Despite her objections to the street change, Landgraf believes the project has been a great benefit to the village. "I didn't want the street closed," she said. "But through the years you learn to adjust and have an open mind to things."

Menne was one who advocated for the change. "As the president of the village, I was very much in favor of the development. I think it's beautiful, and it has been a real advantage for the village. This development has helped Elkhart Lake to grow as a destination village, and it has also attracted other business to come to Elkhart Lake and to stay here."

Some residents may take the approach that it has brought "way too many people" to the community, while others see the greater good.

"If it weren't for the people, our businesses couldn't survive. We need those people," Menne said. He added that a parking problem is a small issue when it means that all the local restaurants are full of customers.

He added that the people who have come to serve in these business are a great asset to the village.

Thielmann added that the Osthoff development, along with the presence of Road America are two of the hub businesses that drive the success of the whole village.

In the conversation, all were reminded by current Village Administrator Jessica Reilly that the Osthoff development helped the village upgrade a lot of its infrastructure. As taxpayers, they enjoyed the benefits of new roads, sewer upgrades and more. "Our village could never have afforded all that infrastructure without the construction of the Osthoff. Our tax-payers would have been up in arms if they had to pay for that themselves."

#### Still their home

On one perspective, the long-time residents agree.

Despite the changes, Elkhart Lake is still home to them.

"It's still a great small town, and we get to hold onto that," one said.

# Pace to succeed Laun as RA board chair



#### Winter Rules begin November 15

Winter parking regulations go into effect on November 15. As a reminder, here is the ordinance.

New This year!!! Parking is allowed overnight in the N. East Street parking lot overnight until 6 am, at that time your vehicle must be moved.

#### PARKING REGULATIONS All Night Parking Regulated.

6.04(2) (a) No parking of any motor vehicle shall be permitted on either side of any Village street or in the parking lot north of Square Street between the hours of 2 am. and 6 am, and no parking in the lot on North East Street from 6 am until 9 am commencing the fifteenth (15th) day of November and ending on the first (1st) day of April of every year.

(b) Any vehicle parked in violation of the provisions of this ordinance shall be removed from the streets and stored, and such removal and storage shall be at the expense of the owner of said vehicle.

Vehicles violating this ordinance will be ticketed

Depending on the type of project, many permits can be issued when you bring your application to the Administrator/Clerk-Treasurer's Office. Washer Fluid – Fill the windshield washer fluid reservoir with a cleaning solution that has antifreeze components for cold weather

Brakes - Have brakes inspected by a certified technician to ensure all components are in good working order.

**Tire Pressure** – Check tire pressure more frequently during winter months. As the temperature drops, so will the pressures in the tires—typically 1 PSI for every 10 degrees Fahrenheit. The proper tire pressure levels can be found on a sticker located on the driver's side door jamb. And, don't forget to check

Tire Type and Tread - Heavy winter weather, changing to snow tires on all four wheels will provide the best winter traction. All-season tires will work well in light to moderate snow conditions, providing they have adequate tread depth. If any tire has less than 3/32-inches of tread, it should be replaced. Uneven wear on the tires can indicate alignment, suspension or wheel balance problems that should be addressed to prevent further damage to the tires.

**Battery and Charging System** – Have the battery and charging system tested by our trained technicians. A fully charged battery in good condition is required to start an engine in cold weather.

**Battery Cables and Terminals** – Check the condition of the battery cables and terminals. Make sure all connections are secure and remove any corrosion from the terminals and posts.

**Air Filter** – Check the engine's air filter by holding it up to a 60-watt light bulb. If light can be seen through much of the filter, it is still clean enough to work effectively. However, if the light is blocked by most of the filter, replace it.

Coolant Levels - Check the coolant level when the engine is cold. If the coolant level is low, add a 50/50 solution of coolant and water to maintain the necessary antifreeze capability. Make sure the correct type of coolant is used.

**Lights** – Check the operation of all headlights, taillights, emergency flashers, turn signals, brake lights and back-up lights. Replace any burnt out bulbs.

Wiper Blades - Blades should completely clear the glass with each swipe. Replace blades that leave streaks or miss spots. In snowy conditions, consider installing winter wiper blades that wrap the blade in a rubber boot to prevent ice and snow buildup that can prevent good contact between the rubber blade and the glass.

Transmission, Brake and Power Steering Fluids – Check all fluids to ensure they are at or above the minimum safe levels. It's important to fill with correct manufacturer's

Drive Belts - Inspect belts for cracks or fraying. Don't just look at the smooth top surface of the belt, but turn it over and check the grooved underside where most belt wear occurs.

Engine Hoses -Visually inspect the cooling system hoses for leaks, cracks or loose clamps. Also, squeeze the hoses to check for any that may be brittle or excessively spongy feeling and in need of replacement. Look for any leaks or crusty dried coolant, indicating
