#### **Raildroad Club to sponsor ExTRAINaganza**



The Great Falls Model Railroad Club of Auburn will hold its annual holiday season "ExTRAINaganza," a unique four-day family fun event with special activities for children, at 144 Mill Street in Auburn on the weekends before and after Thanksgiving. The handicapped-accessible club house, across from the Barker Mill, will be decorated for Christmas with trains of various sizes operating on five permanent layouts throughout the two-story building. The ExTRAINaganza will be held from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. on Saturday, November 23; Sunday, November 24; Friday, November 29; and Saturday, November 30.

Long trains running on multiple tracks and through the tunnels of the large G-gauge layout greet visitors as they enter the building. The interactive ski slope is a special feature of the attractive winter scene. In the main room, guests will see brightly decorated Christmas trees, railroad games, and craft tables. Around the corner, young children can enjoy Thomas the Tank Engine on a separate layout in the G-gauge room, with other engines from the Thomas series running on the upper trestle. Adults and children will discover that the G-gauge layout has many unique features that were hidden from the entrance. In the next room interesting details have been added to the club's permanent layout for the smaller n-scale. Trains will also be operating on the new Lionel layout, which is still under construction in the hallway.

Older children can sign up to be "Guest Engineers" and operate one of the trains on the club's extensive HO layout downstairs. Longtime residents of the area will recognize Bates Mill #5 and many of the 1950's scenes reproduced in the Lewiston Lower section of the HO layout. Children will enjoy decorating and eating gingerbread boys and girls, creating Christmas ornaments to take home, and playing the special railroad games designed by the club. The younger children always have fun with the Brio set and age-appropriate trains in the children's play area. While watching these activities, parents can enjoy light refreshments from conveniently located tables and chairs in the craft area. TRAIN TIME videos, produced by the Great Falls Model Railroad Club and seen on many local cable channels, will be shown continuously each day and are available for sale.

# *Guest Column: The tide is beginning to turn on Maine's lead crisis*

The U.S. banned the use of lead paint in 1977. Yet, four decades later, hundreds of children and families in Lewiston-Auburn are still dealing with the harmful consequences. The rest of the state doesn't fare much better as home to one of the nation's oldest housing stocks.

Maine continues to grapple with not only preventing lead poisoning but also identifying and treating it. The most common source of lead exposure is old wooden windows covered in lead paint. Opening and closing the windows allows the lead paint to turn into a fine dust that settles into curtains and on to carpets where kiddos play and accidentally inhale the poison. For a long time, it was hard for everyone from parents to local officials to even know which children were in danger.

The good news is that the tide is beginning to turn. Between several newly enacted laws, substantial funding from the federal government, and the work of local public health groups and health providers on the ground, it seems we are finally reaching a turning point in this crisis.

For too long, Maine lagged behind all the other northeastern states in screening young children for lead. Over half of Maine's one- and two-year-olds were going without the simple, cheap and easy pinprick blood test at their annual checkups. That's why, this year, I introduced and enacted new legislation to require universal lead testing in Maine. To treat children with lead poisoning and remove the toxins from their homes, we need to be able to identify them. Universal lead testing will help Maine children get the treatment they need earlier and make sure their home is safe for the entire family.

The new law builds on recent efforts to better identify Maine children with lead poisoning and take appropriate action. A 2015 law updated how Maine measures lead poisoning to reflect federal standards. Since that law took effect in 2016, more than 1,000 Maine children have been identified as having lead poisoning. Of that thousand, 92 percent of the children wouldn't have been identified without this law. Consequently, those children wouldn't have received the intervention necessary to protect them from further harm.

Every child we identify and treat for lead poisoning is a win. However, the cost of removing lead paint from old homes and apartment buildings can be enormous. With more children being identified due to increased screenings and stronger standards, more funding is needed to abate their homes. Lewiston City Officials estimate that it costs \$36,000 to abate the average 3 unit building. Fortunately, the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development has stepped up to help. Since 2002, Lewiston has received four grants totaling \$10 million in remediation funds. Last month, HUD announced that it would send an additional \$5.2 million funds. These funds are essential as we move forward with this work.

Between the headlines both locally and out of Flint, Michigan, public awareness about the dangers of lead is on the rise. The connection between early childhood lead poisoning and learning disabilities, lifetime earnings potential, and even our incarceration rates has become crystal clear. Prolonged lead exposure at a young age can interfere with brain development at the most critical stages. It can limit both a child's ability to learn and the ability to regulate behaviors later on. While no amount of lead exposure is safe for children, catching and treating lead poisoning early is vital if we want Maine kids to thrive.

Every child deserves the chance to grow up healthy and thrive. With this new law in place, more kids will have that chance.

In 1991, my predecessors in the Legislature enacted what they believed was an aggressive series of programs with the stated goal of eradicating lead poisoning by 2010. Although former lawmakers meant well, it's clear that people didn't truly understand the size and scope of the problem. Now, largely thanks to hardworking health care providers, community organizations, public officials, and advocates, we have the facts, we have a plan and we're starting to see results.

#### Governor's Address: I look forward to hearing your thoughts on how we can foster economic growth in Maine

This past week I had a great discussion up at Blair Hill Inn and Restaurant in Greenville with business owners, residents, development leaders and local lawmakers. We focused on ideas and strategies for economic growth in rural Maine, particularly Western Maine.

You know diversifying our economy, empowering innovators and attracting young, talented people to live and work in Maine is crucial to the future of our state.

That's why earlier this year, I directed the Department of Economic and Community Development to create the very first long-term statewide economic development plan in decades.

That plan, which will be finalized in the coming weeks, is being written with input from government agencies, business leaders, educational institutions, private organizations and individuals like yourselves. It will focus on strategies to enhance economic growth, particularly in rural Maine, and address Maine's workforce challenges.

As we finalize that plan, I think it's important for me to hear the voices of business leaders and residents all over Maine, to understand their challenges and to learn how state government can help.

So, during our discussion up in Greenville, I heard about the issues that town faces, from funding local schools without increasing property taxes to repairing aging roads and bridges to health care and energy costs. I listened and I shared what my Administration has done to date to address those challenges.

In the biennial budget for instance, we invested \$115 million in K-12 education, we began raising the minimum teacher salary to \$40,000, and we allocated \$18 million to repair aging school infrastructure.

We also invested \$75 million in property tax relief for Maine seniors, families, and small businesses. That's money going back to you.

We fully funded the Medicaid expansion program and we restored Maine's Low-Cost Drugs for the Elderly and Dis-

abled Program. We enacted legislation to help lower the cost of prescription drugs, and we told the federal government that Maine will pursue its own state-based exchange to put us in the driver's seat when it comes to health care.

And don't forget to check www.CoverME.gov this week to find out what health insurance is available to you at the lowest cost and best coverage.

We also enactedwith the voters' approval—a \$105 million transportation bond to repair roads, highways and bridges, and to protect working waterfronts, and to restore commercial fishing wharfs.

Of course, we still have a lot to do. Every rural community has its strengths. For example, besides Greenville, I also visited Monson and Monson Arts which is located

in downtown Monson and which offers four-week residencies to artists and writers from all over the place as well as intensive workshops and programs for local school kids and community members.

I met resident artists and writers and learned about the program's work to spark educational growth, to attract people to rural Maine, and reinvigorate the economy of that town. I also visited Jemma Gascoine Pottery and Monson General Store on Main Street in Monson and talked about their experiences and their excitement about the future.

Undoubtedly the strategy to growing our rural economy will be multi-faceted, but one thing is clear. Supporting these rural communities as they build on their own strengths-as Monson and Greenville are doing-is critical

#### 'Basic Life Support' certification course offered at Central Maine Community College

The Center for Workforce & Professional Development at Central Maine Community College (CMCC) will offer the American Heart Association's Basic Life Support for Healthcare Providers course on Friday, December 13 from 8 a.m. to 12 p.m.

This course is designed to provide healthcare professionals with the skills to keep people alive until they can be brought to a hospital or be treated with more advanced lifesaving measures. This course covers adult and pediatric CPR, use of the bag-valve mask, airway obstruction, automated external defibrillation (with child AED update), stroke and cardiac arrest and other special resuscitation situations.

This course is open to the public and intended for physicians, nurses, paramedics, first responders, medical technicians, aids or assistants and anyone whose work brings them into contact with members of the public such as school, hotel, fitness center and restaurant employees. The cost of the class is \$89 and includes materials.

# St. Dom's to hold open house and placement test next week in Auburn

Saint Dominic Academy invites all prospective school parents, students, and families to an open house on Thursday, November 21, at its Auburn campus on 121 Gracelawn Avenue.

The open house is from 2:30 to 6 p.m. Visitors can take a tour of the campus and meet coaches, teachers, and students to hear about the St. Dom's experience.

It is not an entrance exam. It contains five sections that measure verbal ability, quantitative ability, reading comprehension, mathematics, and components of written language. "By introducing this new placement test, we will make certain that students are placed appropriately in our school," said Gallic. "This test is used primarily for course placement to ensure that our upper grades are receiving challenging course work and given the best opportunities to be successful."

# *Town of Norway to benefit from \$3.8 million USDA investment in community infrastructure*

U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) Deputy Under Secretary for Rural Development Donald "DJ" LaVoy has announced that USDA is investing \$394 million to improve critical community facilities in 28 states and the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico. USDA is making the investments through the Community Facilities Direct Loan Program. In Maine, the Town of Norway has been selected to receive a total of \$3.8 million in infrastructure improvements to benefit the community.

"Modern facilities for essential services such as schools, first responders, hospitals and health clinics are the bedrock to healthy and prosperous communities," LaVoy said. "Under the leadership of President Trump and Agriculture Secretary Perdue, USDA is committed to being a strong partner in building and modernizing facilities and creating jobs and educational opportunities, because when rural America thrives, all of America thrives."

USDA Rural Development State Director Timothy P. Hobbs said, "Investing in rural communities, like Norway, helps to ensure that Maine people have access to the infrastructure they need. The investment in upgrades to Norway's



municipal building will result in expanded space for first responders, while construction of a new highway building will help maintain roads. These projects deliver critical services that help build thriving rural Maine communities."

In Maine, the Town of Norway will receive a total of \$3.8 for two community projects:

The Town of Norway will receive \$3,120,000 in Community Facilities Direct Loan funds to fund the construction of a new 18,000 square foot highway building with an attached 1,800 square foot wash bay. The new building will include three maintenance bays, an overhead crane, six double drive-thru bays, staff offices, a locker room, two bathrooms, one ADA shower, a tools and parts room, a kitchen, and a utility room for the town of Norway. The existing highway building is undersized, structurally deficient, and needs numerous repairs. It is also inadequate to store all of the town's equipment. The new building will provide more room for the employees and adequate storage of the Town's equipment that needs to be kept under cover. This new highway building will meet the current and future needs for the town.

The Town of Norway will receive a Community Facilities Direct Loan in the amount of \$700,000 to provide funding assistance to complete the necessary renovations and upgrades to the municipal complex for the Town of Norway. This project will include the construction of a three bay, two-story garage for police cruisers, which will allow adequate storage for cruisers to be kept under cover. The garage will also have space for storage, evidence lockers and a police locker room. This project will also convert the community space, kitchen, and recreation space into the police department. The evidence/security safe will be expanded and an additional IT room/office is also being planned. The public space flooring and 30-year-old diesel generator will be replaced and the phone wiring and windows for the facility will be upgraded. The renovations and upgrades to the municipal complex will meet the needs of today and future needs for the town.

More than 100 types of projects are eligible for Community Facilities program funding. Eligible applicants include municipalities, public bodies, nonprofit organizations and federally recognized Native American tribes. Projects must be in rural areas with a population of 20,000 or less.

The investments announced today will benefit 1.6 million people in Alabama, Colorado, Delaware, Florida, Georgia, Hawaii, Idaho, Illinois, Kansas, Kentucky, Louisiana, Maine, Michigan, Minnesota, North Carolina, North Dakota, New Jersey, New Mexico, New York, Ohio, Pennsylvania, the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico, South Carolina, Tennessee, Texas, Utah, Virginia, Vermont and West Virginia.

#### Orphans from war torn Ukraine coming to Maine



United Nations and international children's rights groups have reported on the growing number of children living in state-run orphanages in Ukraine, due to the ongoing war with Russia and economic collapse. Now, families in Maine can directly impact some of these children by providing respite from war and poverty with a four-week Christmas visit to the US.

Host Ukraine is bringing more than 100 children from Ukrainian orphanages to family homes this holiday season. From December 16 to January 12, these kids will enjoy housing, food, and the love of a family for the holiday season. Maine resident Gina Stearman describes this program as "a reverse mission trip that your family and community can participate in." The Stearman's have opened their home to several Ukrainian orphans over the past three years, and share, "it's been more of a blessing than we could have imagined seeing the transformation of these children during their time with us."

Approximately 25 host families are still needed to avoid leaving any child behind. With a growing economic crisis and instability, orphanages are experiencing increases in the number of children abandoned to state care while budgets for food, medicine, clothing and other essentials continues to decline. The exact number of children in state care in Ukraine varies between government agencies, but it is estimated between 95,000 and 200,000 and is on the rise. Recent reports from UNICEF and Disability Rights International highlight the dangers children face in institutions. Hosting provides a way to change the life of one child, in a tangible way, and transforms them from a statistic to a person.

Rep. Jessica Fay, D-Raymond, received the "Champions of Change" award from the Maine Coalition to End Domestic Violence (MCEDV). Fay received the award for her work on her bill to help victims of economic abuse.

"Although I am very grateful for this recognition, this was really a team effort. When I knocked on the door of a constituent in 2016, I had no idea that conversation would lead to such an important law being passed. A big part of the credit should go to Jeannine Oren," Fay said. "She first told me about this issue and has been a driving force behind it."

Many domestic abuse situations involve economic abuse, when an abuser uses access to money to control a victim. This control can

keep someone in an abusive relationship and make it harder to leave a dangerous situation. When survivors are able to separate, they often leave with their finances and credit history destroyed.

Fay's championing of the issue has resulted in the passage of a new law that provides a range of protections for survivors of economic abuse, and an increasing awareness that controlling finances is a common and devastating tactic used by abusive people.

Representatives from Maine's Federal Delegation also shared their congratulations

"It is not possible to put words to the significant impact that this work has on our state ... with your support, many victims have found exceptional strength to tell their story, reclaim their safety and economic security and support others facing similar circumstances," wrote Sen. Angus King in a letter of congratulations read by his regional representative.

MCEDV is a Mainebased nonprofit organization that works to end domestic abuse, dating abuse, stalking, elder abuse and commercial sex trafficking. The award was presented at a ceremony at Maple Hill Farm in Hallowell last Monday.

Fay is serving her second term in the Maine Legislature and represents parts of Casco, Poland and Raymond. She serves on the Legislature's Environment and Natural Resources Committee and the Inland Fisheries and Wildlife Committee.

The Foundation grants IOLTA funds to six providers of civil legal aid in Maine: Cumberland Legal Aid Clinic, Immigration Legal Advocacy Project, Legal Services for the Elderly, Maine Equal Justice, Pine Tree Legal Assistance and Volunteer Lawyers Project. These six agencies serve more than 30,000 clients each year.

Hikers ascend Goat Trail on Norumbega Mountain

On the first full day of the Penobscot Paddle and Chowder Society fall outdoor weekend on Mount Desert Island I was scheduled to lead a bike trip on the Carriage Trails. The problem was rain, fog, and wind. No one was interested in biking in those conditions except one truculent hold out, me.

Someone mentioned a short hike instead. Concerned with the prospect of losing a day playing in paradise and the realization that our remaining time on planet earth was fleeting, a group of us old folks responded with guarded enthusiasm. Another wannabee hiker suggested Norumbega Mountain. An epiphany, none of us had climbed it in years. A new plan was in place.

How Norumbega Mountain acquired its unusual name piqued my interest. According to Steve Pinkham in his book, Mountains of Maine: Intriguing Stories Behind Their Names, Norumbega was a mythological city of gold sought by early European explorers and reputed to be situated near what is now Down East Maine, Originally called Brown's Mountain, George Dorr, known as the father of Acadia National Park, changed its name to honor the fabled location.

The first time I hiked Norumbega was about 35 years ago with my wife Nancy and our two young sons. The boys were quite small and a brief, uncomplicated hike seemed preferable. What we didn't anticipate was a Columbus Day weekend snow squall at the summit. Wearing low cut hiking shoes, our feet were soaked by the heavy wet snow. Determined to make lemonade out of a lemon, we built a snowman and engaged in a spirited snowball fight.

While I'd returned to Norumbega a couple of times since, my recollection was sufficiently obscured, so the trek was almost new except the expectation of encountering snow at high elevations. At my age, week old memories are often murky. Six of us met at a trailhead for Goat Trail on Route 3 just north of Upper Hadlock Pond. An ancient group, our median age qualified us for full Social Security benefits. The good news, rain had diminished. However, a gloomy day of light precipitation, fog, and wind was the prospect.

Whoever named Goat Trail clearly had mountain goats in mind. Climbing steeply for .6 mile to the 832 foot summit, slippery rocks and several precipitous ledge scrambles made for mildly treacherous conditions necessitating caution. A recurring conversation among my senior friends during outdoor activities; we're too old for injuries, no time for recovery.

A surprise for me, no snow on the summit! Fog impeded views of Somes Sound below in the west and the surrounding peaks of Acadia National Park were shrouded in clouds. Stormy conditions have their own peculiar allure in the mountains. Exploring the huge anomalous boulders dominating the crest amidst swirling clouds, mist, and fog, provided unique exhilarating entertainment.

Departing from the top, we descended gradually south on Norumbega Mountain Trail to the southern terminus of Lower Hadlock Pond. Our original intent had been to complete a 3 mile loop by following the Hadlock Ponds and Norumbega Connector Trails north to the start. Spirits buoyed by the lack of rain, we decided to extend our adventure by hiking along the south shore of Lower Hadlock Pond and then traveling north adjacent the east side of the tarn to Norumbega

Connector Trail.

If that itinerary sounds confusing, it is. Or, at least we managed to make it mystifying. The signage south and east of Lower Hadlock Pond leaves something to be desired. Sketchy seems a fair characterization. On a more positive note, the trail along the pond is exceptionally scenic.

In retrospect, I'm still not sure the cause. Perhaps the continuous lively conversation was a distraction. We elderly trekkers occasionally talk about something besides our countless health issues, but not usual-

ly. Or maybe we were thoroughly lost in the outdoor moment. Regardless, six experienced hikers carrying maps somehow managed to miss the Norumbega Connector Trail returning to the south end of Lower Hadlock Pond; completing an unanticipated circumnavigation of the entire picturesque body of water.

We had acquired what a group of us hiking in the Alps several years ago termed "free mileage." Our excursion had evolved from a 3 mile loop to a 5 mile double loop.

in paradise. Filling them with exciting adventures seemed a prerequisite. Rain-free after completing our extended journey, several of us finished the day with a bike ride on the Carriage Trails. Sea Kayaking was scheduled for the following day.
