

Christmas Can Help Us Prepare for the 2020 U.S. Census By Louis Medina

The Christmas story from the Gospel of Luke shows us how a census can alter the course of world events.

"In those days, Caesar Augustus issued a decree that a census should be taken...And everyone went to their own town to register...Joseph also went up from the town of Nazareth...to Bethlehem...because he belonged to the house and line of David. He went...with Mary, who was pledged to be married to him and was expecting a child...and she gave birth to her firstborn, a son." And the rest is history.

In the U.S., we also have a mandate from our Constitution to count every person once every 10 years.

Fortunately, census taking has improved dramatically since Mary and Joseph's day. We should be glad about this because we have a census coming up next April.

First, you don't have to go anywhere for the census: You just need to fill out a form counting everyone in your household. The U.S. Census Bureau boasts how easy this is: 10 questions in 10 minutes. And, beginning in 2020, the questionnaire can be completed on paper, online, or by phone.

No having to travel by donkey while pregnant to be counted! Reminders that the census is coming up will be sent out by mail next March.

Second, for those who need assistance filling out the census in a language other than English, the Census Bureau provides either the forms or assistance in dozens of languages.

Third, whereas the census of the Bible was all about Joseph and Mary's lineage and personal informa-

tion, the U.S. Census is completely confidential. It is against the law for the Census Bureau to publicly release your responses in any way that could identify you. The information can only be used to produce statistics and will not be shared with other government agencies.

Fourth, in Kern County we have a great local resource called the Kern Complete Count Committee, or KCCC. This collaborative of community leaders representing nonprofits, faith-based organizations, local government, media and other stakeholders is working to ensure everyone in Kern gets counted accurately. Why? Because we lose about \$2,000 in federal funding per person, per year, for 10 years, for everyone who is missed. And we lose important representation in government as well.

Our community will be hearing a lot more from the KCCC in the coming months, especially regarding hard-to-count (HTC) populations. Readers of this publication should note that a significant HTC group are children under 5. Little ones often get missed in the census because they are newly born, living in large or split households, staying with relatives, or for other complex reasons.

Please do like Mary did in the Bible and ponder these weighty things in your heart. Make sure everyone in your household gets counted in next year's census—including all children. That little one living with you could grow up to be a world changer someday.

Groundbreaking Ceremony for Covey Cottages

A groundbreaking ceremony was recently held for Covey Cottages in Oildale, a 12-unit "Tiny Homes" permanent housing project aimed at reducing veteran homelessness. Each cottage will consist of 400 sq. feet of dignified housing space for residents: living area, bedroom, bathroom and kitchenette. The complex will create a soothing sense of community through landscaping, a common gathering room, and laundry area. CVAF Staff will provide the supportive services that are key to keeping housed the project's vulnerable residents who might otherwise slip back into homelessness.

CVAF President & CEO Deborah Johnson called Covey Cottages for Veterans a low-density housing model designed for populations that are extremely low-income, have co-occurring disorders, and have had issues staying permanently housed for long periods of time. "We hope this will pave the way for other homeless populations in our community by providing a new, innovative way to work with our most challenging homeless persons," she says.

Johnson is grateful to local businesses and individuals who are truly committed to giving back to local veterans by providing the money and muscle—through the donation of in-kind materials and labor—that have made it possible to break ground on Covey Cottages in just a little over a year since CVAF put the word out to the community for support.



11 Memorable Gifts to Give-No Wrapping Paper Required

Choosing to give a gift doesn't have to require tape, scissors or wrapping paper. Giving in your community can fulfill a greater good without struggling through holiday hassles.

Although some of the ideas below require making a purchase, the way they're used still reaches beyond the joy of the moment to provide lasting happiness, meet a need, or help a child.

Here are 11 suggestions:

- 1. Make a donation to a charity that advocates for a cause that resonates with you. There are so many amazing local causes. For example, the Mission at Kern County helps individuals recovering from drug addiction to find a second chance, through sobriety and stable life choices. Kern Community Foundation partners with many regional charities, from the Alzheimer's Association to entrepreneurial programs that support women and girls.
- 2. Host a holiday party and request that each guest bring an unwrapped book to donate instead of hosting a gift exchange. Foster care organizations and public libraries are always looking for new titles.
- Pick up a package of diapers to donate. Local charities are always seeking diapers because they're not covered by public food assistance or Medicaid.
- **4.** Choose an extra package of socks or underwear the next time you're at the store to donate to a shelter drive.
- **5**. Fill an old purse you're no longer using with hygiene products and store it in your car. The next time you see a woman in need, hand it to her. Those small but important items are often forgotten in charitable giving.
- 6. Pay off school lunch balances at your neighborhood school's cafeteria.
- 7. Give your time to an organization you care about. Volunteer to better understand its work first-hand.
- **8**. Illness knows no season and never takes a holiday. Provide respite care to families in local intensive care unit (ICU) settings by working directly with hospital-based volunteer groups.
- **9.** Plan an outing with one member of your family at a time. Turn off your phone and just enjoy your conversation together.
- 10. Set up Amazon Smile to benefit a group of your choice through a percentage of all your holiday purchases this year.
- 11. Participate in an organized fun run to support an organization that makes a difference right here in Kern County.

Holiday Air Travel Tips for Families

Traveling with children can be a delight and a challenge, so preparation is key. The American Academy of Pediatrics has the following tips for safe and stress-free family air travel:

Time it right. Allow your family extra time to get through security, especially when traveling with younger children. Have children wear shoes and outer layers of clothing that are easy to take off for security screening. Children younger than 12 years are not required to remove their shoes for routine screening. Strollers can be brought through airport security and gate-checked to make travel with small children easier.

Smart talk. Talk with your children about the security screening process before coming to the airport. Let them know that bags, dolls and "lovies" must be put in the X-ray machine and will come out the other end and be returned to them. Discuss the fact that it's against the law to make threats such as, "I have a bomb in my bag." Threats made in jest, even by a child, can delay the entire family and could result in fines.

Don't forget the seat. When traveling on an airplane, a child is best protected when properly restrained in a car safety seat appropriate for the age, weight and height of the child. The car safety seat should have a label noting that it is FAA-approved. Belt-positioning booster seats cannot be used on airplanes, but they can be stowed in overhead bins or checked as luggage (usually without baggage fees) for use in rental cars, taxis or ride shares.

Arrange to have a car safety seat at your destination or bring your own. Airlines will typically allow families to bring a child's car safety seat as an extra luggage item with no additional luggage expense.

Check the airline's website ahead of time so you know their policy before you arrive at the airport. Children who weigh more than 40 lbs can use the aircraft seat belt.

Although the FAA allows children under age 2 to be held on an adult's lap, they recommend that families explore options to ensure that each child has her own seat. If it

is not feasible to purchase a ticket for a small child, try to select a flight that is likely to have empty seats where your child could ride buckled in her car safety seat. Alternatively, there are also some FAA-approved harnesses for older infants and toddlers that fold down in a small, compact bag for convenience.

Don't forget the extras. Pack a bag of toys and snacks to keep your child occupied during the flight. In order to decrease ear pain during descent, encourage your infant to nurse or suck on a bottle. Older children can try chewing gum or drinking liquids with a straw.

Wash up - a lot! Wash hands frequently and consider bringing hand-washing gel and disinfectant wipes to prevent illnesses during travel.

Turtles Linked to Salmonella Outbreak

The Centers for Disease Control and public health officials in several states are investigating a multistate outbreak of human Salmonella Oranienburg infections linked to contact with pet turtles. Due to the number of illnesses related to these small turtles, the U.S. Food and Drug Administration has banned the sale and distribution of turtles with shells less than four inches long as pets.

As of October, a total of 21 people infected with the outbreak strain of Salmonella Oranienburg have been reported from 13 states. California reported the highest number of illnesses associated with six residents infected with the outbreak strain. Most people infected with Salmonella develop diarrhea, fever, and stomach cramps 12 to 72 hours after being exposed to the bacteria. The illness usually lasts 4 to 7 days, and most people recover without treatment.



In some people, the illness may be so severe that the patient needs to be hospitalized. Salmonella infec-

tion may spread from the intestines to the bloodstream and then to other places in the body.

Regardless of where turtles are purchased or their size, turtles can carry Salmonella germs that can make people sick. Turtles can carry Salmonella germs in their droppings while appearing healthy and clean. These germs can easily spread to their bodies, tank water and habitats. People can get sick after they touch a turtle or anything in their habitats. Pet owners should always follow steps to stay healthy around their pet. The CDC suggests the following precautions:

Wash your hands. Always wash hands thoroughly with soap and water right after touching, feeding, or caring for a turtle or cleaning its habitat. Adults should supervise hand washing for young children.

Play safely. Don't kiss or snuggle turtles, because this can spread Salmonella germs to your face and mouth and make you sick.

Clean properly. Don't let turtles roam freely in areas where food is prepared or stored, such as kitchens. Clean habitats, toys, and pet supplies outside the house when possible. Avoid cleaning these items in the kitchen or any other location where food is prepared, served, or stored.

Know your risk. Children under 5 years of age, adults aged 65 and older, and people with weakened immune systems are at a greater risk for serious illness. Households with these people should consider a different pet.

Know the Ten Warning Signs of Alzheimer's

Be Mindful of Dementia-Related Behavior this Holiday Season— It is Not a Normal Part of Aging

Every 65 seconds someone in the United States develops Alzheimer's disease. It is the third leading cause of death in California. To help the public recognize dementia-related problems early, this holiday season the Alzheimer's Association has launched an awareness campaign identifying the ten warning signs of Alzheimer's:

- 1.) Memory loss that disrupts daily life;
- 2.) Challenges in planning or solving problems;
- 3.) Difficulty completing familiar tasks at home, at work or at leisure;
- 4.) Confusion with time or place;
- 5.) Trouble understanding visual images and spatial relationships;
- 6.) New problems with words in speaking or writing;
- 7.) Misplacing things and losing the ability to retrace steps;
- 8.) Decreased or poor judgment;
- 9.) Withdrawal from work or social activities;
- 10.) Change in mood or personality.

Individuals may experience one or more of the signs in different degrees. Close family members and friends, who know their loved ones best, are typically the first to notice memory concerns or cognitive problems. If they notice any of the signs in themselves or a loved one, they are advised to call their healthcare professionals to discuss their dementia-related concerns and diagnosis. Farm to (Classroom) Table

from their school garden and use them to make lemon pomegranate cookies as part of their Farm to Table class curriculum at Rosedale Middle School (RMS) taught by Melissa Richert.

very day the Farm to Table class offers different tasks for students to learn about farming and cooking processes, from planting to watering to pruning to making healthy food to eat.

"I have learned how to work with others and how to do things for others," says Kate. "I like this class because Mrs. Richert makes it a safe place to come every day and makes it fun."

"Farm to Table is a wonderful addition to our campus. It's one of only 22 programs statewide recognized as a CDE Exemplary Program for 2019. Farm to Table allows students to engage in real world higher order thinking skills in a broad array of areas: agricultural business, finance, environmental sciences, and health," says Tom Board, Principal of Rosedale Middle School. "The program is also fun, and it gives students another way to feel connected and successful at school.'

When Mrs. Richert came to RMS in 2017 as the Life Skills teacher, the school garden, which had been tended to by volunteers and teachers, was not being fully utilized in the school curriculum. With her background in math, music, and science, and her love for curriculum development, she designed this new Farm to Table class to not only have students experience a real, hands-on education using core subjects, but it also cut down her Life Skills budget for fresh produce.

"I want to give students a chance to start a healthy lifestyle with a healthy image of nutrition," Mrs. Richert says. "I want them, by being part of the growing process, to have a willingness to try new foods."

The garden is sectioned off into different areas, with every student having his or her own role in its success. In the space, there are more than 40 trees, a grape vineyard, an herb garden, a greenhouse, and rows and raised boxes with all kinds of vegetables and produce. The students take care of everything within the garden, including its future plans. And, they even help decide what kinds of food to make from their garden's produce.

With the recent removal of a 60-foot fruitless mulberry tree whose roots were depleting the soil, a whole new section opened up. Eighth graders Paris Teagarden, Hallie Dilley, and Camila Flores were tasked to prepare the soil to make rows for new seeds to be planted. During the semester, Paris has also pruned grapes and herbs, made anaerobic compost, and used coffee grounds to combat an ant infestation.

"In this class, I have learned the basics of farming, planting crops, different ways of composting, and new ways to cook. I've also learned that it takes a lot of teamwork," says Paris. "It's fun, but you're still learning new things."

Mrs. Richert calls the class an inquiry-based program where she takes some direction from the students' interests and questions. They are even assigned their own tree in the orchard to nurture and name. "I want this to be their little baby," she says. "I want them to be a part of the decisions so that they have ownership."

In fact, two students, Zane Thygerson and Michael Stout, were interested in cross-pollinating two peppers after Zane watched a YouTube video on how the Carolina Reaper was made from a Habanero and a Ghost Pepper. He brought his idea to Mrs. Richert and she came up with a plan to make their very own Bulldog Pepper, named after RMS's mascot, by cross-pollinating a bell pepper with a Jalapeño pepper. Now they're just waiting for the right time to cross-pollinate. "The timing has to be perfect," Mrs. Richert says.

Chaudhry's Champions:

Local YouTube Channel Gives Children a Nightly Bedtime Story

ajeha Chaudhry of Bakersfield's Loudon Elementary teaches third grade by day, but by night she's a kind of superhero to her students and the community. The YouTube channel Chaudhry's Champions stands out by merging education and technology for the best result: nightly storytelling. The channel has 119 subscribers and counting but popularity has never been her goal as a content creator.

"The goal is to reach every single kid so they can have a story every single night, and it's not a chore for parents," said Chaudhry. "Helping a child love reading is the reason I keep making videos."

Math was actually the reason Chaudhry joined YouTube in October 2015.

"I noticed that parents weren't always able to help with math homework, even though they really wanted to, because math is taught so differently now compared to when we were kids. I started to wonder how I could get parents involved without bringing them into the classroom," said Chaudhry. "I remember telling my students, 'I can't go home with you. I wish I could, but I can be in your tablets and iPads every night to help with your homework."

Early videos feature long division and fractions, but the concept extended to reading homework because of some key conversations in the classroom.

"I asked my students how many heard a bedtime story every night and one or two raised a hand. Then I asked how many had an iPad, a tablet or a phone. There were definitely way more hands. Every single child had access to the internet," said Chaudhry. "So I said 'Okay, you will now have a bedtime story every night, whether your parent didn't get a chance to or it just didn't happen for whatever reason."

The channel grew from one subscriber to five to 15 within a few weeks. There are no sponsors, although support from the school's administration has been important. Filming involves a cellphone and a \$12 microphone. The effort's sincerity shines through to connect with fans of all ages who often continue watching long past the third grade.

Hesitation about the role of screens in parenting can lead some families to forego seeking out the channel, a fact that Chaudhry understands first-hand as the current generation of parents seek to define what rules work for their household in the golden age of the silver screen. Never before has so much information and content been so accessible.

"Personally, I limited my own children's screen time. There's a lot on the internet, and on YouTube specifically, that isn't appropriate for children, but I always tell parents my channel is perfectly safe for kids. I completely understand. If children are going to be on a tablet anyway, though, this content makes sense for them and brings learning and technology together in a beautiful way," said Chaudhry.

Chaudhry is quick to point out that she knows first-hand how difficult it can be to squeeze in a storybook night after night for parents.

"Sometimes you're tired, you've had a rough day, and your child brings you the longest book or something you don't feel like slogging through, like a tongue twister book by Dr. Seuss. All you want to do is skip a few pages," said Chaudhry. "All children should have an opportunity to hear stories, regardless of their background or the language they speak. Parents are working or they're just busy, or they didn't have a chance today, other kids in the household get sick; life happens. As a single mother for quite some time myself, I understand. It's a team effort, all of us working together to get that love of learning and reading to happen for children."

The channel features three videos in Spanish, too. "Just because a child does

not speak English, or their parents don't, that doesn't mean they should miss out on the wonders of reading," said Chaudhry, who immigrated from Pakistan at age 6 and also attended schools in Bakersfield. She is the daughter and granddaughter of professors and remembers the positive influence local teachers had on her childhood.

"My parents and grandparents always read me stories," said Chaudhry. "Kids love to hear people reading to them, especially when they're being silly and animated. Most kids love watching TV and movies and YouTube, but if we extend that love of narrative and discovery to reading, they may love that, too."

Guest readers are featured on the channel each Friday. Different community leaders, from local police officers to her children's dentist, older students, the story continues on page 14

school's vice principal, and other celebrity-style narrators are invited to share a story and what they do. That behind-the-scenes look at different professions serves to inspire students as well.

"When kids hear about careers, that opens up another world to them. I want them to know there are so many different careers out there and that the world is so much bigger than our own homes and schools. When they see a profession, I want them to say, 'I didn't know about that, but now that I see it, I want to do it!' Then, they have the opportunity to find out more through their love of reading," said Chaudhry, who often films at offsite locations, like a virtual field trip she created from a family visit to the Long Beach Aquarium.

"The Magic Treehouse" is a popular chapter book Chaudhry has read on the channel. She also takes requests and is always looking for other voices who want to read aloud as featured professionals. The channel has inspired one of her former third grade students to start her own YouTube series in which she also reads books aloud.

"I need more people to volunteer to read and show us what they do for a living. I also really appreciate when people like, share, comment, and subscribe on You-Tube. It's all for the kids," said Chaudhry.

Ms. Chaudhry's three tips to encourage reluctant readers

- 1. Find books kids are able to read: A teacher or librarian can point to age-appropriate books at the right reading level.
- 2. Find a book that they enjoy reading: Not everyone will like the same things. Later, you can challenge them with things they need to know.
- 3. Read to them: Being silly and animated is one way to make reading more engaging.



Snowball Cookies

Ingredients:

- 1/2 cup shortening
- 1 cup sugar
- 1 egg
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 2 1/2 cups flour
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon baking soda
- 1/2 cup Greek yogurt
- 3 3/4 cups powdered sugar
- 1/2 cup butter
- 3 tablespoons milk
- 2 teaspoons coconut extract
- 1 cup shredded coconut

Directions

- 1. Heat oven to 400 F.
- 2. Cream together shortening, sugar, egg and vanilla
- 3. Sift together flour, salt and baking soda. Add mixture to wet ingredients, alternatively adding in Greek yogurt.
- 4. Flour surface and roll out cookie dough. Use top of jar or biscuit cutter to make round cookie shapes.
- 5. Bake 8 minutes. Transfer to cooling rack immediately.
- 6. In medium bowl, using mixer on low, mix powdered sugar, butter, milk and coconut extract until thoroughly combined. Beat on high until frosting is smooth and fluffy.
- 7. Spread frosting on cookies. Pour shredded coconut into small bowl. Press cookies, frosting side down, into shredded coconut.

Store in airtight container.
